You may have spotted the Speedwatch team in action in the village, dressed as we are in yellow high-vis sat at the roadside with notepads and speed gun in hand. Many vehicles do slow down when they see us, so in some way that counts as a positive result. Sadly, a large number of the vehicles logged are exceeding the 30mph limit, but we can only report those at 36mph or above. On one session where the team were located on the verge of the Leighton Rd, out of 184 vehicles 16 were logged at 36mph or more and reported to the Community Speedwatch. PARISH COUNCIL NEWS



Your Parish Council was most pleased to receive and accept an invitation from the Hills Group and the Peabody Housing Association to attend a 'Topping Out' ceremony at the new Fenny Road development. Donned out in High Vis, boots, hard hats and protective gloves Cllrs Venn and Cllr Noble along with Kelly Harris our clerk were given a full tour of the site and the show home. What was quite

staggering to see in these energy efficient and semi passive homes was the thickness of the exterior walls which were almost double the width of normal walls packed with

so many extra layers of insulation. Similarly, all homes have underfloor heating to the ground floors connected to air source heat pumps and solar panels on their roofs plus EV Car Charging points. At the end of the tour the actual 'Topping Out' process took place which involved the ceremonial laying of some bricks, and Cllr Venn was invited to grab a trowel and lay a couple of bricks on behalf of the PC.





We must also thank Hills for organising a litter pick in their efforts to give something back to the Community. It was quite outstanding and rather disappointing the amount of litter that they came across, filling some 10 bags.

We understand the Speedwatch Group have undertaken several campaigns over the last couple of months and motorists

certainly do seem to curtail their speeds when they see them seated at the roadside, in their yellow jackets, notepads in hand and a speed gun being pointed at them. Hopefully, the long awaited 3 new MVAS (Mobile Speed Activated Signs) are to be installed and functioning by the middle of August, which will hopefully further slow the speeds of vehicles as they pass through our village.

The matter of no attendance at PC meetings or any communications from our 3 Unitary Ward Councillors, unfortunately still continues, and although we wrote to Councillor Martin Tett the leader of Buckinghamshire Council, seeking his assistance

in this matter, we received back a very short and rather unhelpful response. Our clerk will again be writing to Cllr Tett to once more explain our total frustration with this situation and that we expect Cllr Tett to get more actively involved in resolving this current unacceptable position that we face.

At long last (and it may well have happened by the time of publication of this edition of the SH & NLS News) the residents in Tyrells Gardens have received notification that after something like two years or more, their wait is finally over as Bucks Highways have confirmed they are to resurface their pothole ladened road. One would have hoped and this was explained by your PC to Highways on many occasions, that given many of the residents on Tyrells Gardens are elderly and less mobile, that they would have given this repair a much higher priority, but it would seem not, but at least the work is to now be done.

Aside from the normal two monthly PC meetings for June and July, an Extraordinary PC Meeting was held on the evening on Monday 22nd May to discuss 3 new planning applications that had been received, relating to Fontaine House, Church Road, The Birches also on Church Road and The Mellows, Hillersden Chase. Details of the PC's comments and decisions can be found in the 'Planning Updates' section.

The June PC meeting very nearly didn't happen, we already knew some Councillors were unavailable due to holidays and work commitments, but as we approached the 7.30pm start time there were just 2 councillors present along with the Clerk, but thankfully a third Councillor duly arrived, which meant the we were quorate and could officially go ahead with the meeting which was also attended by 6 members of the public. Aside from normal monthly business, some of the other items discussed and debated were as follows:

- Sadly, the Clerk had to advise that some of the gym equipment to rear of the Community Centre had been damaged with parts missing which was likely down to vandalism. A report had been filed with the police and a crime number obtained, in case we wish to make a claim against our insurance, and a quotation for repairs would be sought from the manufacturers. The PC were questioned about preventing future vandalism, albeit it should be noted this was the first recorded instance in the 6 years since the gym equipment was installed, but the possibility of maybe considering the installation of CCTV would be considered at the next PC meeting.
- In a further update the clerk confirmed a baffle had now been fitted to the streetlight
 to the rear of 31 Manor Close to reduce light spillage into the property and that the
 alleyway between Tyrells Gardens and the Fenny Road had been cleared. An
 application had also been submitted to Bucks Planning to reduce the Blossom tree on
 The Green.
- The Stoke Hammond Gardening Club had previously completed a Community Funding application but had not specified a figure they were seeking. They had now confirmed a sum of £350. The PC agreed that the Gardening Club does a great deal for the community and is important for mental wellbeing and inclusion. Because of this the grant application was unanimously approved.

For the July PC Meeting we headed off to the Newton Leys Pavilion where we were joined

by just 2 members of the public, but they were at least both residents of Newton Leys South.

- Following on from last month and the damaged gym equipment on the Community Centre land and the possibility of installing CCTV equipment, the Clerk had received quotes in the region of £5000-£8000, plus we would need to create a robust CCTV policy including the purchase of software or the use of a third party to edit footage if any requests were received from residents wishing to see footage that they appeared in. The PC felt that all these costs were prohibitive for what has been one possible vandalism incident in the space of 6 years and therefore decided to not proceed any further with this CCTV project.
- Separate too, but in some way related to the gym equipment, the PC had just received the 2023 RoSPA Playsafety report which had highlighted a number of issues with the play park equipment. The clerk will now seek out companies who maintain and repair such equipment and obtain quotes to make the recommended repairs.
- Cllr Champion gave an in-depth report into his investigations into S106 funds and how
 this can be best spent for the benefit of the community. The purchase of new land for
 recreational purposes maybe an option, but this could not be land that has already
 been put forward as part of the Neighbourhood Plan 'call for sites'. Cllr Champion also
 advised that Biffa Waste offer grants of up to £100,00 for projects within 10 miles of
 one of there waste sites, and would intend to apply for such a grant once an S106
 project had been identified.
- Cllr Champion also apprised the meeting on progress with regard to the Newton Leys Land Management Company with 36 residents having replied to his letter confirming they wished the company to be taken over
- In the Clerks update, we learnt that investigations were still ongoing into who is responsible for the drain on The Green which has been causing some flooding issues in nearby properties. Bucks Council do not have it on their list of assets and will be sending out a technician to investigate further. We also learnt that an application for the funding towards the planting of 200 fruit tees in Newton Leys South has been submitted to Bucks Council and we are awaiting a decision. Unfortunately, the PC request to include funding for a Christmas Tree for Newton Leys South was rejected.

The next PC Meeting is in September, as we take a break for August, albeit if any important or pressing items do arise, then an extraordinary meeting will be called. So, Tuesday 12th September at the Community Centre, Bragenham Side, Stoke Hammond MK17 9DB, starting at 7.30pm.

An Update from your Parish Council regarding the Great Brickhill, Wing and Ivinghoe Local Neighbourhood Policing Team


Councillors Newing and Venn, along with 6 parishioners, met the Community Policing team at the Dolphin on the 18^{th of} July. It was an opportune event given the recent apparent increase in anti-social behaviour highlighted by the mindless attack on the bus stop at the entrance to Bragenham Side.

It was agreed by both parties that the hastily arranged meeting had been poorly advertised and so it was agreed another meeting would be arranged later in the year. The good news is that recruitment has been taking place and the Community Policing team has expanded in size. Joshua Walton-Taylor is Stoke Hammonds nominated Community Policing representative. He has only been in post for a month but has 4 years' experience in the role with the Hertfordshire Constabulary. Joshua is also an ex-resident of Stoke Hammond having lived in Manor Close for several years, with his parents, so maybe known to some of you.

The recent issues of car theft were raised by Parishioners. Joshua was able to supply some material that the Police provide to support prevention. He emphasised that the best help residents can provide is that if you spot any suspicious behaviour, cars or people that seem out of place then a call should be made on 101 which is the most efficient way to log concern and for dissemination of information to relevant police groups. They came supplied with prevention tips on house security, keyless vehicle theft, online safety, cold calling etc. It was a helpful an informative session.

We recommend looking out for promotion of the next visit as it is well worth 60 minutes of your time.



The bid is for a selection of different fruit trees around the perimeter of the public open space with the aim to improve the visual appeal of the estate, increase shade and shelter from the elements and also provide free and healthy food for the community.



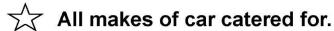



An Officer and a Spy - by Robert Harris.



This is a 2013 historical fiction thriller and is based on a true story of the French Officer Georges Picquart when from 1896 - 1906 he struggles to expose the truth about the doctored evidence that, following a public humiliation, sent Alfred Dreyfus (accused of spying) to suffer a life sentence on Devil's Island. Picquart ultimately puts his life and a blossoming army career on the line because he is convinced that there has been a massive miscarriage of justice and feels compelled to put it right.

With just one exception the Group loved it and we welcomed this alternative view of the book as that is

what the Book Club is all about and everyone's opinion is valued. Otherwise we all felt that it was extremely well written and although very detailed and complicated by innumerable unpronounceable French names and army ranks it was agreed that it was a real page turner. Our 'token man', although he was familiar with the subject and with the film directed by Roman Polanski in 2019, really enjoyed reading it and someone even experienced 'butterflies' at one stage while waiting to read the Court's verdict !!!



Stoke Hammond Book Club continued:

The House on the Strand - by Daphne du Maurier.



The main character (Dick) is staying in a house (Kilmarth) in Cornwall loaned to him by his friend (Marcus) for a summer stay. Dick initially has some time there on his own before the arrival of his wife and two stepsons. During his stay he agrees to serve as a guinea pig for a new drug that Marcus has discovered in his biochemical research. The effect of the drug transports Dick from the house at Kilmarth to the same area in the 14th century. This may sound too fanciful and a bit weird but it keeps your attention and in some cases persuades you to stay with it to the end but it is essential to read the introduction before you start!

To my surprise the Group were almost unanimous in their dislike of the book. Comments included 'dreadful', 'gave up half way through', 'disappointed as usual enjoy Daphne du Maurier', 'couldn't recommend it', 'no real character descriptions' etc. Our 'token Man' found it interesting in part as he knows Cornwall very well and was trying to recognise areas described. He also found the history aspect worth reading but, in common with the rest of the Group, was aware of the cold relationships between the characters, particularly Dlck and his wife Vita. There was one member of the Group with an alternative opinion. After a slow start she suddenly got in to it and really wanted to know how it would end. She enjoyed the parallel story lines and although found it a bit disturbing and occasionally long winded the different and unusual theme kept her interest to the end. Most of the Group thought it was rather a desperate last novel but one comment was that the Author was daring to tackle such a strange subject. Again, good to have at least one differing opinion.

Conclusion: main consensus - give it a miss and avoid disappointment!



Funeral information: The Rector can conduct a funeral service at a crematorium if you wish. New rules mean that crematoria are not offering a



23/01192/APP Fontaine House, Church Road, Stoke Hammond MK17 9BP

Householder application for the erection of a two-storey side extension and a single storey side extension.

This was a revised design to a previous application, to which the PC raised an objection, but they now felt this amended design addressed the previous issues and would sit well with this listed dwelling within the conservation area, and as such had NO OBJECTIONS to this latest application.

23/01344/APP The Birches, Church Road, Stoke Hammond MK17 9BP

Householder application for single storey front, side and rear extensions.

Cllrs resolved they had NO OBJECTIONS to this application. However, it was noted that the planning notices had only just been put on public display, and should this lead to any adverse community comments, they reserved the right to revisit the application and make further comments if felt necessary,

23/00668/APP The Mellows, Hillersden Chase, Stoke Hammond MK17 9DH

Variation of condition 1 (Approved Plans and 12 (Surface water drainage) attached to planning permission 19/00874/ADP (Approval of Reserved Matters pursuant to outline permission 16/03698/AOP for appearance, landscaping, layout and scale of a residential development of 16 dwellings and associated works)

Cllrs OBJECTED to this application due to the negative drainage board report and the proposed extensive use of cladding on the houses which is not in keeping with the style of other homes in the village. Other sites are being developed in this area, with only one access point and services, and the impact this will have on what this application is trying to deliver needs to be understood.

23/01525/ALB Stoke Lodge, Lodge Lane, Stoke Hammond MK17 9BU

Listed building application for removal of section of garden wall and the erection of a new garden wall and gates within the rear garden.

Cllrs resolved they had NO OBJECTIONS to this application

23/01532/AOP – Orchard End Hillersdon Chase, Stoke Hammond MK17 9DH

Outline application with access to be considered and all other matters reserved for residential development of 10 dwellings and associated works.

Cllrs resolved to OBJECT to this application on the following grounds:

- Biodiversity is a big concern which needs addressing.
- No open space has been factored into this application. Bucks Council Planning has confirmed that for developments of 10 homes or more, open space must be provided.
- Surface water drainage is a concern, and this is supported by the LLFA who has

objected to the application. Drainage concerns have been raised for all the applications at this site, and it is felt that all should be considered as one application.

23/01533/AOP Meadowbrook Off Newton Road, Stoke Hammond.MK17 9DH Outline application with access to be considered for residential development of 9 dwellings and associated works.

Cllrs resolved to OBJECT to this application on the following grounds:

- The Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan adopted in 2021 states Stoke Hammond does not have to take any more homes given the developments that have already taken place and the planning applications that were already approved.
- Surface water drainage is a concern, and this is supported by the Buckingham & River Ouzel Internal Drainage Board who has objected to the application due to concerns around flooding. Drainage concerns have been raised for all applications at this site, and it is felt that all should be considered as one application.
- Thames Valley Police has highlighted their concerns that the layout exposes many sides of the proposed plots, and that surveillance will be required, but this is not included in the application.
- There are concerns over noise from the railway and a noise assessment should be carried out.

PLANNING UPDATES:

Have others of you noticed that the Buckinghamshire Planning Department seem to have been getting their act together, particularly for the more basic and simple planning applications, which are now being processed in a matter of weeks, where it was not that long ago, that these types of applications were taking many months for a decision to ne made. Long may this improved situation continue.

23/01026/APP 10 Tyrells Road, Stoke Hammond MK17 9BS

Householder application for demolition of single storey side projection. Erection of two storey side, single storey front and rear extensions. Widening of dropped kerb. *Your Cllrs had no objections to this application which has now been approved.*

23/00709/APP 6 Dimmock Close, Bletchley MK3 5RB

Householder application for single storey rear extension *Your Cllrs had no objections to this application which has now been approved.*

22/02488/APP The Barns, Stoke House Farm, Stoke Rd, Stoke Hammond MK17 9BN Demolition of existing car port and erection of an ancillary annexe.

Originally supported by your PC but subsequently refused by the planners. The applicant appealed (22/00186/REF) the refusal decision, and have been successful with the planning inspectorate granting their appeal. The inspectorate felt the reasons for refusal were not correct and the main concern about the annexe potentially being used/sold as a separate dwelling in the future can easily be covered by a planning condition caveat.

23/01192/APP Fontaine House, Church Road, Stoke Hammond MK17 9BP

Householder application for the erection of a two-storey side extension and a single storey side extension.

Your Cllrs had no objections to this application which has now been approved.

23/01344/APP The Birches, Church Road, Stoke Hammond MK17 9BP

Householder application for single storey front, side and rear extensions. *Your Cllrs had no objections to this application which has now been approved.*

Stoke Hammond Neighbourhood Plan

We are in a lull with the Neighbourhood Plan because the Government have still not announced the Grants for 2023/24. This is now significantly delayed as we are a third of the way through the year, nevertheless they are still stating it is their intention to announce a scheme. Consequently, we have insufficient funding to complete the technical documentation which requires specialist input. However, the impact of the delay is not significant whilst the Bucks Local Plan remains under development, as we have met our targets for development within the current Aylesbury Vale Local Plan.



News from Buckinghamshire Council

Dear Resident 26 June 2023

With the longest day just behind us, the year suddenly seems to be rushing past. Summer is now well and truly here and it's been lovely to enjoy this long spell of warm, dry and settled weather. I know of course that some of the recent heavy storms have impacted a few of our communities with flash flooding and the council is supporting where needed.



Our roads

The dry conditions have allowed us to continue to make huge progress on road repairs, fixing the winter damage – to the extent where we have completed a remarkable 10,000 repairs since our new Buckinghamshire Highways contract began on 1 April on top of our annual re-surfacing programme. This is made up of some 4,300 individual repairs and over 6,000 using our 'Jetpatcher' on more rural roads. This of course demonstrates the impact the very harsh conditions that last winter had on the network, reflected up and down the country.

I have recently joined with other council Leaders across the south-east in writing to the Government asking for more money for our roads, given the heavy volumes of traffic and the large number of utility works in the region. I'm absolutely not complacent, we still have a lot of work to do, but I'm pleased that we've been able to respond at scale to complete so many repairs so quickly.

We have fifteen teams working on road repairs, including potholes, some round the clock, seven days a week. Alongside this we continue to roll out our programme of bigger improvement works, with over 200 larger re-surfacing, drainage and road safety projects on specific sections of the highways.

Our staff

Obviously to fix the roads we often have to close them or use other traffic management while we carry out the repairs. We do try to keep disruption to a minimum but we ask you to be patient and to bear with us as we carry out this essential work. I've been shocked at some alarming reports of our staff being not

just subject to verbal abuse but even physical violence while carrying out vital repairs on our roads.

I would ask everyone reading this to please appreciate the job they're doing and to treat them with respect. I understand road closures are frustrating and that, with the added disruption from HS2 and East West Rail, plus a very high volume of utilities works in the county, that getting from A to B is challenging at times but please be patient and understand that our people are doing this work to make the roads safer and better for all of us travelling around the county.

The council has put in place a range of support across the summer for families as part of our continuing measures to help residents with the cost-of-living pressures.

Our Helping Hand service is issuing digital food vouchers to eligible families over the summer holidays to make sure that these families have support buying food over the summer months. Eligible families will be contacted directly in the coming weeks with their voucher codes.

Our Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) programme now has even more locations — the scheme offers free holiday activities and a healthy hot meal to children in Reception — Year 11 who receive benefits-related free school meals. These are brilliant clubs which offer a range of high-quality activities from day trips, to adventure activities, to sports, dance and much more.

Being on the electoral register means that you can have your say and vote in future elections and it can also help with your credit rating. The easiest way to register is online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote.

Please be assured that emails coming from 'elections@canvass.buckinghamshire.g ov.uk' with a subject line of 'Electoral Registration – Response Required' are legitimate, and not part of a scam, which we know was a concern for some residents last year.

Lastly, I hope you can continue to enjoy the warm dry weather. After a really hot weekend please take any precautions needed on warm days, like drinking lots of water, wearing a hat and using sunscreen if necessary. Also, please keep an eye out for more vulnerable friends and neighbours who may be more affected by the heat.

There's now a new <u>heat-health alert service</u> in place nationally so keep an eye out for alerts as we enjoy these spells of good weather.


