PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Well on the front cover you have sight of your seven newly elected Parish Councillors. There were 12 candidates who put themselves forward for the elections held on Thursday May 6th with a turnout of 33% against the electorate of 1376, and purely in alphabetical order, you now have Cllr Alan Humphries, Cllr Stephen McNally, Cllr Malcolm Newing, Cllr Greg Noble, Cllr Fran Sharkey, Cllr David Venn and Cllr Damian Willingale, who will be serving this parish for the next four years.

At the same elections we were also voting for our three Great Brickhill Ward unitary councillors, and Phil Gomm, Jilly Jordan and Iain Macpherson, all representing the Conservative Party won through, with Phil Gomm acting as our primary contact for Stoke Hammond and Newton Leys.



So, the first order of business after the elections was to hold the Annual Parish Council Meeting (APCM) but a recent High Court ruling meant that the Coronavirus Act 2020 would not be extended and hence we are no longer allowed to hold remote meetings. With the Community Centre not available, we have to say much thanks to St Luke's Church who allowed us to hold our meeting there. This did make us realise and have much sympathy for the Rector and his Sunday church services, as anyone speaking at the meeting struggled to make themselves heard. The first order of business was to elect the Chair and Vice Chair of the Council, with Cllr Malcolm Newing and Cllr Stephen McNally being duly elected to these respective roles. With there not being too many other items on the agenda, this proved to be a shorter meeting than most.

At the tail end of April on Tuesday 20th we had our Annual Parish Meeting (APM) which was held remotely by Zoom, where we heard reports not only from the PC, but also from the Stoke Hammond Community Association, Button's Preschool, the Village Show, the Sport's Club, St Luke's Church, the Book Club and the Gardening Club.

Prior to this on Tuesday April 4th we held our last PC Meeting before the elections where we were joined by 12 members of the public. This was also the last meeting for long standing Cllr Mike Robinson as he would be stepping down. Given the number of years Mike had dedicated to the PC and the Parish, we felt it only fitting to recognise this, and we had secretly arranged for Mike's wife Julie to present him with a suitably engraved whiskey tumbler along with a bottle of his favourite tipple a single malt Irish whiskey plus vouchers to his favourite art supplies shop.

As is the norm there were planning applications to be discussed, and details of these and the Council's comments can be found in the 'Planning Applications' section, elsewhere in this edition of the SH & NLS News. Other items in brief from this meeting were:

- A resident from Brookfield off Brook Farm Close raised an issue about a recent planning application 21/00064/APP in that as an owner of a neighbouring property, they felt the planning department had not taken adequate measures to publicise this application, which they only learnt about through the last edition of the SH & NLS News. It used to be that the planning office wrote directly to neighbours, but this practice ceased some time ago. Likewise, the displayed planning notice was tied to a lamppost but facing in a way so as to not make it visible. The resident will be making a direct approach to the planning office, but the PC also resolved to in future publish details of new planning applications on the Stoke Hammond Facebook page.
- Fly tipping yet again seems to be on the increase, but this is of course not unique to us but a nationwide problem. Many of us except maybe the local authorities, recognise that part of the problem has been caused by the closure or reduced operating times to tip sites plus the introduction of fees for the disposal of certain waste types. Any Fly tipping can be reported via the FixMyStreet website, but as a PC we would welcome any suggestions as to how we tackle this issue.
- Another problem, again not unique to Stoke Hammond is the matter of dog mess, which despite the number of dog bins provided in the village which are emptied on a regular basis, still continues to be an issue. The PC like the vast majority out there cannot fathom as to why a certain small minority of dog owners think it's OK to leave their dog mess lying on the ground. No doubt the same people who discard their litter rather than use the provided bins. We do await an update from the new Ward Council on the possibility of a council appointed dog warden.
- The PC have approved the quotation to straighten up some 13 lopsided bollards to the Village Green, along with one to the small Green to the right of the Dolphin. It was also agreed to purchase a further 12 posts to match those already installed along Bragenham Side, these to be positioned to the r/h side of the entrance to the garages, to prevent cars parking and obstructing this entrance.
- As announced at the end of March the Oxford Cambridge Expressway project has been scrapped – good news for our surrounding communities. But the East West Rail project is very much alive, and we have just received an extremely large box of consultation documents and maps.

The next PC meeting is scheduled for 7.30pm on Tuesday 6th July, but should any urgent matters come up before this date then an extraordinary meeting will be called, and unless there should be any changes to the route out of lockdown, this July meeting will be held at the Community Centre, Bragenham Side.

Update on fighting coronavirus in Buckinghamshire



13 May 2021

Dear Resident,

Following the end of election restrictions, it is good to be able to write to you personally again with an update on the Covid situation in Buckinghamshire. It's a particular pleasure as I am able to report that the infection rate in Buckinghamshire is following the national trend downwards and is now at 12.1 per 100,000 residents. This is far lower than it was just a few weeks ago. A tribute to the effects of both the observance of the lockdown but also particularly the high take-up rate locally of the vaccination programme. There are still some causes for caution and I will cover them a little later in this update.

On Monday next week (17 May) we can all look forward to further easing of Covid restrictions. You'll no doubt be aware that the government is satisfied its four tests are continuing to be met and that the roadmap can safely continue.

From Monday we'll be able to eat and drink inside pubs, cafes and restaurants. We can meet others indoors (two households or rule of six), and we can stay overnight in a hotel. Of huge importance to all of us, we can hug loved ones once again, and we can make our own choices on social distancing with close friends and family – this includes everyone, including anyone who's been shielding. All of these are freedoms we've been without and that I'm sure we will never take for granted again.

I must underline the importance of doing all of this cautiously. The message is clear; **let's take this next step carefully**. Covid hasn't gone away – people are still catching it and people are still spreading it. There are still rules in place that should be followed, such as the limits on numbers of people who can meet socially, so I ask you to make sure you are familiar with **what we can and cannot do** from Monday. When considering close contacts, weigh up the risks and stay cautious. Social distancing will still apply in settings like shops and hospitals. Still meet outside where you can and let fresh air in when you're indoors.

Importantly – get tested regularly and have your vaccine when it's your turn. We have new mobile testing units offering free rapid tests in various locations from this week – you can also visit one of the fixed sites and take test kits home if you prefer. There's more information about rapid testing on our website and you can also get up to date information on where the mobile testing units are on our social media channels (Twitter, Facebook and Instagram)

If you or someone you live with develops symptoms of Covid make sure your household isolates and <u>book a test for anyone with symptoms</u>, either online or by calling 119.

Extra testing in Aylesbury

A small number of cases of the variant of Covid first identified in India have been found in the Kingsbrook area of Aylesbury. All the people involved have followed the guidance and have self-isolated. However, it's really important we track this as closely as possible, so Buckinghamshire Council and Public Health England have started targeted testing in the area this week. This is so we can help avoid the spread of this variant and understand whether it is spreading in our community.

We are asking everyone who visits, lives or works in the Oakfield Village area of the Kingsbrook estate (postcodes HP22 7AA to HP22 7BP) to come forward for a PCR test regardless of whether you have symptoms or not. There will be special mobile testing units in the area and we ask as many people as possible to visit them between today (Thursday 13 May) and Saturday 15 May. These test centres will be at four different locations, two in the centre of Aylesbury (Lidl Oakfield Road and Vale Retail Park) and two in Bierton (Aktiva Nursery and 'The Dog House' pub).

If you cannot attend a test site you can order a kit online; there will also be a team taking test kits door to door on Saturday for anyone who's not been able to get to a test site themselves. The full details are on <u>specially set up pages on our website</u>.

The situation in Buckinghamshire

As I mentioned, the infection rates in Buckinghamshire are now very low with an overall rate of 12.1 and a rate as low as 6.2 in the former Chiltern District area. You can see all the detailed figures on the <u>Covid dashboard on our website</u>. While every death is a terrible loss, the number of people dying from Covid in Bucks is currently very low. Nevertheless, the situation in Kingsbrook reminds us all of the need to stay vigilant.

Vaccine news

437,886 vaccinations have now been given in Buckinghamshire. The vaccine is safe and effective and anyone aged 38 or over (or who turns 38 before 1 July) is currently eligible to book their vaccination appointment.

You can book your vaccine online via the national booking system or by calling 119 – you can read more on the NHS website. Please remember that while your first dose will offer a good level of protection a few weeks after you've had it, you need two doses to further increase your level of protection. It is very important you attend both appointments.

Local people are being offered appointments at the Guttman vaccination centre at Stoke Mandeville Stadium, Aylesbury and other large centres in neighbouring counties (which may be closer for some Bucks residents). Community pharmacies continue to offer appointments too. Some GP practices are only offering COVID-19 vaccinations to

patients in <u>priority groups 1-9</u>. Anyone not in these groups should book their appointment online using the national booking system when it's their turn.

People aged 18-39 with no underlying health conditions will receive an alternative vaccine to AstraZeneca (AZ) - either Pfizer or Moderna. This follows the <u>latest advice by</u> the Joint Committee on Vaccination and Immunisation.

For updates and news on all our local vaccination sites, including which vaccines are being offered, visit Buckinghamshire Clinical Commissioning Group's <u>new local site</u> update webpage.

Lastly, a reminder that the vaccination clinic at the Odeon Cinema in Aylesbury has moved just up the road to Buckinghamshire New University, Aylesbury Campus. Anyone who has an appointment for the Odeon site is being contacted, so do make a note of this change if it affects your vaccination booking.

#WelcomeBackBucks

Many council services that were closed during lockdown are open for business again and it's brilliant to be welcoming customers back into libraries, leisure centres and other sites across Bucks. For details of opening times and arrangements at your local library check our website.

It's fantastic that Bucks County Museum is opening its doors again next week too. The garden is already open and you can take a look at what's happening from next week too on their website.

I should remind you that of course, Covid measures and social distancing will still be in place at all of these venues so please carry on sticking to the guidance to help keep us all safe.

Car parking

I hope as many people as possible are enjoying being able to shop, eat, exercise and enjoy themselves at our local businesses too. We expect even more people to return to our high streets with businesses such as pubs and restaurants being able to serve customers inside from Monday too. I just wanted to remind you that, after having been suspended for a month, parking charges do now apply again in Buckinghamshire Council car parks. We've put Covid safety measures in place such as marking out social distancing around ticket machines and there are ticketless and cashless payment options at more of our sites now.

Boost your Business

We know businesses across Bucks have faced unprecedented challenge this last year. If you're a business owner then do use our #WelcomeBackBucks hashtag in your social media promotion to reach a bigger audience. We've also produced a free 'Boost your Business' digital toolkit to help our local businesses get back on their feet, containing poster templates and a marketing guide – so do check it out if you want that extra support and advice.

Business grants

With businesses able to start trading again, the government support grants scheme we've been operating has now closed. I'm delighted to say we've been able to pay out more than £140 million during the pandemic to help our local firms to help cover losses caused by the necessary Covid restrictions. Unlike many other councils, we prioritised getting these grants paid so every penny of available help could be passed onto local businesses.

Stay safe, stay cautious and enjoy getting more of our freedoms back,

The swans are in breeding season and we hopefully will see cygnets in the near future, how privileged we are to be able to watch them grow throughout the year.



PAGEY'S SOW & GROW "PATCH"



Two months ago, the first sentence of this regular article started "as I write this the sun is shining through the kitchen window....." Well that didn't last long. April whilst dry was cold and windy, and May has been the same but add in wet too! So, in my

garden everything is 3 weeks behind. We have been eating the asparagus for 10 days whereas last year it was mid-April. Boo Hoo!! Mind you the slugs and snails love this, the wetter the better - party time as far as they are concerned...swings, slides and merry go rounds for them. I have lost a third of my parsnips to them - they just munched through the stalks where they come out of the ground and I'm sure underground my spuds are under attack too. Not much we can do but crack on, use the usual nematodes or eco-friendly methods of sheep wool or wagging your finger at them that's as good as some of the "friendly" solutions available).



We are also eating loads of rhubarb and making rhubarb vodka (yum). 2 kilos of rhubarb, 400 grams of caster sugar, 1.6 litres of vodka. Cut rhubarb into 2cm lengths, put into a Kilner jar and add all sugar. Leave for 24 hours. Then add vodka (or gin) and leave for 4 weeks, shaking occasionally. Then bottle. Keep rhubarb in freezer and make the most wonderful crumble with the boozy rhubarb. You can do a chilli vodka too if you are a little on the mad side

So, June is the month where everything can go outside, unless frost is expected - but you would have to be really unlucky (why did I say this?

(3)). Melons, squash, tomatoes and even peppers / chillies in protected sun pockets can go into the ground or pots / tubs. Stake the toms and any flowering climbers (clematis, cobaea, morning glory, Mina lobata, black eyed Susan etc) and feed every couple of weeks. Water if there is a dry period. In fact, water everything, especially in pots. Your fruits will be small if there is not enough

water - apart from pests this is the single biggest reason for poor crops. We don't live well in a desert and nor do juicy fruit and veg. You can prune stone fruits in June (plum, cherry, peach etc to avoid silver leaf) but not other fruits. Don't forget to dead head when flowers are finished to encourage more growth. So many people don't do this and miss out enormously on extended flowering.

If it continues to be cold you will have to do some hand germinating yourself (don't get too excited!). Take a small paintbrush to your tomato flowers, or for courgettes, melons and squash cut a male flower off and wave it around and onto the female flower. The female flower always has a baby fruit on the end of the stem which the flower then comes from. The reason you have to do this is that when it is cold there are not many flying pollinators around...so you imitate them, buzz buzz.

I'm always talking about garden nasties or garden baddies or even garden "foes". Things that try and undo all your hard work. Some we can protect our plants from, some are difficult to avoid. A few here are: rose black spot common fungal disease. Remove and destroy affected material and spray rose clear. Feed and mulch your rose - the stronger it is the more it will recover. Rust - fungal disease affecting leeks, onions, garlic, hollyhocks etc. With the veg just see it out and destroy any leaves and stems before eating the onion etc. There is no chemical control for alliums so keep them well spaced for good airflow,

well fed and watered. Lily beetlesgrrrr I love my lilies and so do these little red devils. Pick them off and squish 'em. They will eat your lilies and lay their larvae in their own poo (what a way to start your life) and strip it bare. Try Grazers G4 beetle deterrent. Vine weevils lay their grubs in your pots and eat the roots of your plants (any plant !!!) . Ever had a strong plant looking fab which goes downhill fast (be honest though, if you haven't watered or fed it, you maybe the pest) then I bet it is these little beggars. Empty the pot out onto a tarpaulin and go through the soil. I bet it has the grubs in and virtually no roots on the plant. Use nematodes in the summer and water with a solution of Bug clear Ultra. Whitefly and aphids can be



squished, sprayed with a soapy mixture or spray with bug killer. Slugs and snails - use nematodes twice through the summer - now and August, beer traps, search lights and ray guns and Le grand boot .



PLANNING APPLICATION NEWS & UPDATES APRIL & MAY 2021



In this section you will find details of planning applications received, comments made by your Parish Council, and any updates on previous planning applications.

21/00718/COUAR Barn at Bragenham Side, Stoke Hammond MK17 9DB

Determination as to whether prior approval is required in respect of transport & highway impact, noise, contamination risk, flooding and locational considerations for the conversion of agricultural barn into one dwelling house (Class Q(a)) and in relation to design and external appearance of the buildings (Class Q(b))

This application is exactly the same as the previously submitted and subsequently withdrawn planning application 20/03485. The first application we now know was withdrawn due to the lack of the inclusion of a structural survey.

For the same reasons as previously OPPOSED by your PC we reiterated:

- That the field on which the barn is situated was put forward previously under the VALP Call for Sites for residential development and rejected by the then AVDC on the basis it was contrary to their policy of not allowing residential development on land outside the village envelope. Both the National and Local Policy Frameworks remain the same in this regard, therefore, rules should be enforced and this application rejected.
- The Parish Council have concerns that the proposed property sitting on such a large plot would highly likely in time materialise into a further planning application for more houses.
- Converting this barn would considerably change the whole environmental area, this being a route used daily by parishioners for leisure activities and dog walking. Access is a major issue, this being a single country track, and with the amount of large farm vehicles that already use it to access agricultural land further down the track, concerns are high that this proposed change of use would inevitably result in many big lorries being driven up and down the track, causing further deterioration to what is already a very poor track surface. The PC are also very concerned about access for emergency services.
- In summary, this residential development would be contrary to policy, being outside the village envelope; would have a huge environmental impact on the landscape; access is already challenging (particularly in winter months), with it being a single track and, access would still be required for tractors and other farm machinery that currently have to use that track to access other agricultural land.
