

### **PARISH COUNCIL NEWS**

One can't start this Parish Council News without recognising the sadness that both you our parishioners and your Parish Council feel at the extremely sad passing of Her Majesty the Queen Elizabeth II. It was only in the last PC News that we were recognising and celebrating the way that our community came together to put on a fabulous 4 days of events that celebrated her 70 years of reign, her Platinum Jubilee. Those 4 days will be something we will always cherish and remember, a once in a lifetime or indeed generation moment. RIP your Majesty and God Save our new King Charles III.

Other news seems to pale into insignificance but other news there is, or in some cases no further news. Like the most of you, we have been a bit reliant on Facebook for the latest updates on what's happening regarding the Dolphin PH, but we do now know that it has new owners, and they are 'Beyond Pubs and Dining Limited' who also operate the 'The Plough' in Simpson and the 'Cross Keys' in Woolstone. You will have also no doubt noticed that in the last few days that there has been an increased amount of activity going on within the building, and we have it on good authority that contractors will be working there for next couple of weeks and once they are finished, new furnishings are to then be installed, with the aim to be open and trading by mid-November. But even before the Dolphin actually reopens its doors, the new owners intend to give us sight of their new food menus including their Christmas offerings and will be ready to take your reservations.

We do now have a full PC of seven councillors following the co-option of Dean McCann at our September PC Meeting. Dean is a resident of Newton Leys South (NLS), which along with fellow Councillors Craig Champion and Steve McNally, means that this part of our parish, now has a more proportional representation on the Stoke Hammond PC. Please see the NLS News section for a bit more background on Dean.

Your PC has had to get involved on a few issues relating to the new housing development on the Fenny Road which has now started in earnest. The first being concerns around the amount of hedgerow and trees that were being cut back where it fronts the Fenny Road to make way for the site hoarding, yet it quite clearly stated in the approved planning application for the new homes to this site that these trees and bushes along the boundary to the Fenny Road were to be retained. Our clerk immediately got in contact with both the Planning Case Officer and the Enforcement Team to advise of this apparent disregard of the planning condition, and they advised they would visit the site. It was also brought to the PC's attention that no site information/contact details were being displayed on the site hoarding, an essential requirement should for whatever reason someone need to make contact with the developers. It has also only recently emerged that 58 of the 64 homes to be built are to be classified as 'Affordable' with 24 to be for shared ownership and 34 for affordable rent. Your PC have long campaigned that new developments within the Parish should not always be made up of predominantly larger and more expensive 4/5 bedroom homes but also contain an element of smaller Affordable house types.

During the intense heatwave of this summer and the high risk of bush fires, I think we can count ourselves fortunate that we suffered just one case on a grass verge to the Newton Road just after crossing the railway bridge towards Newton Longville. Thankfully, a fire crew from Leighton Buzzard was very quickly in attendance and the blaze was put out

using a hose and beaters, which meant the damage was confined to an area of approximately 30metres by 20 metres.

We were so pleased to see how successful and well attended this year's village Show that was officially opened by our Unitary Ward Councillor Phil Gomm proved to be, so well done to the Show organisers. We also did our little bit by opening up the adjacent PC owned field for parking, which drastically improved the situation for both visitors and the residents of Bragenham Side.

Work continues on the evolving Neighbourhood Plan, and for more details please see the section that follows on the next few pages.

Hopefully, we are a bit closer to getting the locations for the 3 new solar powered speed signs approved, now that we have carried out the required surveys at all 3 sites and submitted these to the local authorities. Once approved, we will get their installation implemented without further delay.

As mentioned in the last PC News, we unlike previous years when we normally take a Summer Break, did hold a PC Meeting in August on the 2<sup>nd</sup> to be precise, and indeed it was a very well attended meeting with 14 members of the public there. It was also the first meeting that Kelly Harris undertook her new role as PC Clerk. For details of planning applications discussed at meetings please see our separate 'Planning Updates' page, and copies of the full minutes from PC meetings can be found on our website <a href="https://www.stokehammondpc.com">www.stokehammondpc.com</a>, but here are a few of the most relevant points discussed at the August meeting:

- In a written report received from Unitary Ward Cllr Phil Gomm, he advised that the
  uptake on the Community Funding Mini Grants was going well and that he had taken
  up the matter of the poor state of the pedestrian crossing and the resurfacing of
  Tyrells Gardens with Council officers, and would hope to update us at the September
  PC Meeting.
- Once again drains were a matter of concern, and in particular the drain on the Village Green. Further investigation is required to establish who is responsible for this drain.
- The Sports Club felt the PC were not giving them the support they needed when applying for funding grants. The PC agreed to address this by way of an informal meeting, and to also add The Sports Club in the same way the Community Centre is included, as an agenda item for all future monthly PC Meetings.
- Following the recent advert in the SH & NLS News Cllr Noble has been contacted by 4
  parishioners expressing an interest to be part of the new Speeding Working Group.
  Cllr Noble had thanked them for their interest and will liaise with Cllr Phil Gomm about
  arranging a first meeting.
- The clerk confirmed a new street light has been ordered to replace the one damaged by a reversing ambulance on Olde Bell Close, now that the South Central Ambulance Trust have accepted full liability.
- The clerk also confirmed that a new dog bin has been ordered to replace the damaged one by the zebra crossing and that planning permission has been sought to crown the low overhanging trees to the Green. This area lies within the Conservation Area hence the need for permission before any tree works can be undertaken.

Our second meeting took place on the 6<sup>th</sup> September, when we were joined by 10 members of the public and by our Unitary Ward Councillor Phil Gomm. Our Chair Cllr

Malcolm Newing was away on holiday as was Cllr Fran Sharkey, so our Vice Chair Cllr Stephen McNally took up the Chair's role, with one of the first items being and as mentioned earlier the co-option of Cllr Dean McCann onto the SHPC. Other matters discussed in brief were:

- Cllr Gomm gave a quite lengthy update on various matters, which included that he had been in contact with the new owners on Dorcas Lane, and he hopes to work closely with them to prevent future fly tipping in the area. Cllr Gomm was also happy to report that there had not been any further issues with school buses in the area since children returned to school after the Summer break. Albeit, some sixth form students were unaware they needed to apply for a place on the school bus and this is currently being dealt with. Cllr Gomm also advised that the reported issue of the Arriva buses speeding through the village had now been dealt with, but if witnessed again, then please record the time and date and pass the details directly to him. Cllr Gomm also advised that with the ever-increasing number of electric vehicles and the need for charging these vehicles, particularly for visitors to our communities or where homes have no off-road parking facilities, that Bucks Council will make available 4-6 EV charging points to both Newton Leys South and Stoke Hammond. A walk round both communities will be required to establish the best locations for these charging points.
- The long grass to the verge opposite Lansbury Road at Newton Leys South has been restricting the view of drivers and causing a safety concern. As this area has not yet been adopted by the highway's authorities Cllr Champion has been successful in getting the developers Taylor Wimpey to agree to cut this area.
- Many have felt the zebra crossing is in the wrong place but Cllr Gomm following his
  investigations, advised there is no chance of it being moved as it was strategically
  placed near the village shop, but he did confirm that the hedging close by is to be cut
  right back and he has also requested the upgrading of the crossing lights to brighter
  LED variants and the repainting of the white markings.
- There was once again a lengthy debate about the funding needs of the Sports Club and support from the PC. The Club is in need of a new mower and asked if the PC could assist. Cllr Gomm advised that he might be able to secure some grant funding for them, and that the PC should contribute the rest. The PC asked that the Sports Club provide the PC with a full breakdown of the costs prior to our next meeting.

Our next PC Meeting is on Tuesday 4<sup>th</sup> October, 7.30pm at the Community Centre, Bragenham Side, Stoke Hammond MK17 9DB. But for November we will be holding our meeting in Newton Leys. The date will be Tuesday 1<sup>st</sup> November with a start time of 7.30pm, the venue being the Newton Leys Pavilion, Furzey Way, Newton Leys MK3 5SP.

### Neighbourhood Plan and S106 Project

Progress is being made on the Neighbourhood Plan and S106 projects and we will be increasing the level of communication to Parishioners. This is essential as both the plan and the project will ultimately need to be agreed by our local community.

### **Neighbourhood Plan**

The Plan is our opportunity as a Parish to impact on future developments within the Parish. This approach is twofold, involving the creation of local planning policies specific to Stoke Hammond/Newton Leys, and determining preferred potential sites, if as expected, the Bucks Local Plan that is currently under development for the period until 2040 provides targeted additional housing numbers for our Parish.

Our achievements to date have been the creation of a Parish Steering group that has significant representation outside of the Parish Council. Current members are Damian Willingale, Bon Hine, Lorna Sharkey, Michaela Gardner, Andy Gardner, Eileen Currie, Nick Ellins, Tracey Youngs and 5 members of the Parish Council. Malcolm Newing chairs the group and we have a consultant Neil Homer, who is guiding us through the process. He has a track record of doing the same with a number of local Parishes including Stewkley.

Our consultants produce the technical planning documents but we have been working with them to produce the associated maps using our local input. In terms of what has been achieved, we scoped the specific issues with a questionnaire and have made subsequent progress on Design principles, local heritage sites, Green infrastructure to protect and sustainable travel within the parish.

We have recently put out a 'Call for sites' to local landowners at the same time as a similar exercise being carried out by Bucks County Council. In due course a draft of the plan will be made available to Parishioners for their early input.

### S106 Project

Over the years of development, as new sites have been built, developers as part of the process promised to make funds available to improve services in line with the increasing numbers of residents. Bucks County

Council holds these funds until a Parish comes forward with an acceptable plan to use the funds. The availability of money is normally time limited to 10 years. We have commenced a project with the following objectives: -

- To create a list of needs for the Parish so that a fully supported, prioritised list can be carried into a future delivery plan.
- To meet the Long term needs of the key parish groups within the Stoke Hammond and Newton Leys Parish so that their key future objectives are achieved
- To create a plan that takes into account all existing and future financial property and land resources held by the Parish Council and Community groups within the village so that the attainment of deliverables is maximised.

We're pleased to say that Craig Champion has offered to take on the project management role. This is a very large undertaking but, with the potential for £500k to spend in Stoke Hammond Village and £1.2m in Newton Leys, we need to address it with the full support and involvement of the Stoke Hammond and Newton Leys communities.

Long standing Parishioners will be aware of an earlier project tasked with providing a brand new Village Sports Hall in Bragenham Side. We have parishioner feedback prior to that project, in addition we have the more recent scoping questionnaires, so we aren't starting from scratch. Currently Craig is holding a string of individual meetings with the main Parish Community organisations with the aim of getting their in principle support to the project and their commitment to completing a discovery questionnaire about the organisations and their future plans. I'm pleased to report the meetings to date have gone very well.

We will endeavour to improve communications in terms of reach and frequency. For the time being this will be via simple updates on the Village Facebook pointing towards more detailed updates on the SH and Newton Leys Parish Website.

We would like to thank Bletchley and Fenny Stratford Town Council for allowing us to use the Pavilion and we are looking at how we can work together in the future for the whole of Newton Leys.

### Section 106 projects

When large developments are built, the developers will often agree to pay to the local council ring fenced sums of monies for certain types of improvements to the local community. Stoke Hammond Parish is fortunate to have funds available for sports and recreation from previous and pending developments in Stoke Hammond

and the completed development of Newton Leys South. Councillor Craig Champion is leading the two projects to determine how we can use those funds. For the Stoke Hammond project the first stage of engagement with local groups active in the village is well advanced together with the information gathering stage. By November Councillor Champion is hoping to start the next phase where the working group for Stoke Hammond will be formed to start to discuss potential options for allocation of the funds.

The Newton Leys project is in the planning stage, and some initial work has been done already. We would really like to speak to any clubs, groups or individuals that provide sports or leisure activities to Newton Leys South residents. The Newton Leys project will run in parallel to Stoke Hammond, and we really would value input from you. ### Land to rear of the allotments





**The Reader on the 6.27** - by Jean-Paul Didierlaurent



### Golden Hill - by Francis Spufford

The story begins with the intriguing arrival of Mr. Smith in 18th century New York with a bill of exchange for £1,000 and what he intends to do with it keeps the suspense going throughout the book. Everything is covered from mystery, thriller and comedy with a cliff hanger at the end. 

## PLANNING APPLICATION NEWS & UPDATES AUGUST & SEPT 2022



In this section you will find details of planning applications received, comments made by your Parish Council, and any updates on previous planning applications.

#### **NEW PLANNING APPLICATIONS:**

22/02392/APP Kings Farm, Leighton Road, Stoke Hammond MK17 9DD

Change of use from agricultural building to dwelling.

This is an existing structure/building and your PC had NO OBJECTION to this application.

#### 22/01744/APP The Mellows, Hillersdon Chase, Stoke Hammond MK17 9DH

Erection of two dwellings, parking and proposed new vehicular access.

Your PC had basically already looked at and commented on this application before and this was just some very minor alterations, and thus your PC felt the objections they had previously submitted were still applicable, and resolved to OBJECT on the same grounds, namely:

- The plans show that the two houses are proposed to be built where the attenuation pond and overflow was going in for drainage to service the already approved 16 new homes to this site.
- Being 2.5 storey houses, the design is not in keeping with the rest of the development.
- In association with the 16 homes that are already agreed (16/03698/AOP), these two further houses would effectively mean 18 new homes (or 17 if you take into consideration that Latrigg will be knocked down), but regardless, for 17 or more homes, provision should be made for affordable housing.

#### 22/01433/APP Barn, Bragenham Side, Stoke Hammond MK17 9DB

Conversion of agricultural barn to 2 no dwellings.

Permission was being sought to convert the barn into two rather than the already approved single dwelling. The footprint of the building was to remain the same. This application has been passed by the planners.

#### 22/01512/APP Fernbank Lodge, Stoke Hammond MK17 9DB

Householder application to replace 9 windows and front door.

Fernbank Lodge sits within the conservation area hence the requirement to seek permission to change the windows and doors with UPVC replacements. The application was approved by the planning department.

#### 22/01463/APP Paper Mill Farm, Bragenham Side, Stoke Hammond MK17 9DB

Change of use and works to convert an agricultural barn to a dwelling.

Whilst sited in Great Brickhill parish this barn can only be vehicular accessed via Bragenham Side in Stoke Hammond, hence our interest. The site already has permission to convert another barn into a dwelling but this new application sought to convert an alternative barn on the understanding it would not go ahead with the other barn conversion. It would seem the planning department also had concerns and gave the following reasons for their refusal: The subject building is remote from any main settlement, located in an Area of Attractive Landscape. It is therefore in an unsustainable location that would almost entirely rely on the private motor vehicle for transport. The application fails to demonstrate that the building can be converted without significant rebuilding, nor has it been demonstrated that the loss of this agricultural building would not lead to demand for replacement buildings elsewhere in this locality. Furthermore, even if the building were of substantial construction and it is genuinely redundant, it is considered that, by virtue of its prominent hillside location beyond the boundary of the main built-up area, the resultant dwelling, with associated paraphernalia including vehicular access and parking, traffic generation on local roads, lighting and activity generally, would be harmful to the character and appearance of the countryside within which it would be set, designated as an Area of Attractive Landscape. As a result, the proposed development is contrary to policies S1, S2, S3, BE2, T1, NE4, NE5 and C1 of the Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan (September 2021), to the guidance within the Aylesbury Vale Design Guide, the Conversion of Traditional Farm Buildings 1990, to the guidance within the National Design Guide, including part C1, and the NPPF 2021, including paragraphs 80 c) and 174 a) and b).

September 2022. Not a time for grumping in particular but a time of great sadness following the death of Queen Elizabeth.



I hope you've managed to enjoy a good summer and have coped well with the hot, dry weather. As we move into autumn there's one issue above all others that stands out and that, of course, is the current cost of living pressures, especially where energy and food bills are concerned.

This is impacting everyone; businesses, residents and particularly those who are already struggling. I know for some households the prospect of what winter will bring is extremely worrying. I know many people are in need now and want to know what extra support is coming in the winter months.

So today I'm letting you know about some of the actions your council will be taking to **help residents with the cost of living.** It's a package of support that will continue to develop over the coming months and we will keep you updated throughout.

#### Support available to those who need it



#### **Helping Hand**

Our Helping Hand team at the council offers advice, help and information to people who need it, including financial help to cover the food and energy costs to households in crisis, as well as helping with paying for other essentials like sanitary items and nappies. The team is available to help individuals or families in need, those on low incomes and those who are experiencing a financial emergency or crisis.

Our Helping Hand programme provides support to local individuals and families who are experiencing financial hardship. If you need to contact the Helping Hand team, please call us on 01296 531 151 or by using our online cintact form. You can read more about the help available on the dedicated section of our website.

The Helping Hand team is about to begin issuing food vouchers to some 8,000 pensioners in Buckinghamshire who are in receipt of Council Tax reduction or who are in receipt of Council Tax reduction or who have previously been supported by Helping Hand; letters should be arriving with eligible households shortly to ensure there is support available to those who need it most.

#### **Welcoming Spaces**

We will be joining forces with other organisations across Buckinghamshire to create a network of welcoming spaces this winter, to assist when the weather turns colder.

Starting with our own libraries, these locations will provide a warm, welcoming and supportive space for anyone who needs it. Anyone who comes in from the cold will be welcomed and will be guaranteed respect, dignity and warmth; the aim is to offer a friendly ear and overall, to create places that help people save on their heating bills and that also offer advice and support. I'll update on this initiative in the coming weeks.

If you want to offer some space to form part of our network, find out how to add a facility to our list of welcoming spaces by getting in touch with your local community board manager.

#### Information and advice

Our fantastic network of volunteer groups and charity organisations plays a vital role in providing community support and specialist advice and information. We have created a 'Cost of Living' section on our website to make it easier to find the advice and information you need. You can also search our Family Information Service Website for more information on the wider support and advice available to any households that need it.

We also have a number of incredible community projects that offer help in different ways. For example, take a look at the 'Grow it, Cook it, Eat it' project that the council supports. This offers local growing space for free for anyone to grow their own produce, plus any surplus goes towards local foodbanks, and anyone can also turn up to find out more about how to grow their own food, a fantastic initiative that both helps with the cost of food and is good for the health and environment. Local initiatives like this play a vital part in the overall general support available to residents who need a helping hand.

As well as the council's own cost of living actions, I do want to also underline the support also on offer from central government this winter. This is the current package already announced and we are watching out for further announcements this week now the new Prime Minister is in post.

- Cost of Living payments to eligible residents in receipt of disability benefits will receive an £150 cost of living payment from next week (20 September).
- All households in Great Britain will receive a £400 discount from their electricity bills this winter, which will be applied in six monthly instalments, automatically coming off bills, starting in October.
- In addition to this, households on means tested benefits including Universal Credit, Pension Credit and Tax Credits will receive a Cost-of-Living payment of £650 this year.

You can find out more about these payments on the government's website and access wider information about the overall support available to households via their website – this contains information on transport and childcare costs too.

And a final point; it's useful to us all to do as much as we can to save energy, so do take a look at the websites of the main energy providers as they contain lots of valuable tips about how to save energy in the home.

We absolutely appreciate the rising costs are impacting everyone.
