PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

In the last PC News, we started with the details of a possible new housing development for some 320 homes on a site just south of Newton Leys and yet again



we start with another new potential development this time to the West of Newton Leys. However, the difference this time is that this site was included in our emerging Neighbourhood Plan, currently with Buckinghamshire Council under the REG16 consultation period which runs until the 5th December 2024 (see the Neighbourhood section for more details). Neighbourhood plan working group involved in preliminary discussions with Willis Dawson and their planning consultants the Pegasus Group to try and make sure

that the style and number of homes plus recreational needs were what the Parish needs. You should have all been leafleted about this proposal and you had until the 21st November to submit any comments. As and when we know more news we will publicise via the PC News, our website and the Stoke Hammond/Newton Leys South Facebook sites. Reverting quickly to the proposed 320 homes on the 45 acres of land known as Chadwell Farm, your PC did via Teams have a video meeting with Richborough the land promotion company plus other involved parties, and several comments and suggestions were made by your council as to what we would like to see as part of this development if it was to go ahead. At this stage we have no further updates to bring you on this possible development.

Still on the subject of new homes, your Parish Council invited by Peabody Homes and Hills their builders to attend in October the official opening of their new site on the Fenny Road and what is now known as Roman Field and Murphy Lane. This was а sort of double celebration as this combination of two, three and four bedroom affordable homes had recently won the accolade οf 'Best Small/Medium Development'



in the 'First Time Buyer Readers' Awards. Your Cllrs Fran Sharkey, David Venn and Greg Noble had the pleasure to attend and cut the ceremonial ribbon.

As many of you will know your Parish Council is in the process of purchasing additional land for the purposes of creating new recreational and leisure facilities. We have been working on this project led by Cllr Champion for many months but at the request of the current land owner we were only able to make this public knowledge in the last couple of months. There have already been some public meetings and a site walkaround and the creation of four working groups. It has been titled 'Project Stocksfield' and for more detailed information and current status for this most important venture please do look at the specific section that follows this PC News.

For this year's Remembrance your PC were once again most honoured to place a Wreath on behalf of the Parish during the service at St Luke's church and a second at the Village sign on the Green. At the Church Service we were able to use for the first time the new Remembrance Service booklets which the PC were pleased to finance from our Community Funding Scheme. Cllrs Malcolm Newing, David Venn and exserviceman Greg Peck are pictured at the Village Green It's taken a while, but hopefully, by the time of you reading this article the replacement picnic bench for the vandalised fire damaged one in the play area by the Community Centre will have been installed. We have struggled to find a contractor to carry out this work. This new bench will be dedicated to the memory of the late Mary Bonner by way of a brass memorial plague.





Prior to our October PC Meeting we welcomed our new Buckingham and Bletchley Ward MP Callum Anderson for a public Q & A session. We were joined by 15 members of the public who very quickly started engaging in questioning Callum on a variety of matters. Callum did his very best to respond to these questions, but like most politicians the answers he gave did tend to follow the normal vague, noncommittal rhetoric.

As for the PC Meeting that followed the session with Callum, we were reduced to 6 members of the public, albeit we were also a little short on the Councillors, with 3 having sent in their apologies that they were unable to attend. We were however joined by our local PCSO officer Tina Hobson who gave the following update on crimes logged in our Parish from January to September 2024.

Full minutes of all PC Meetings can be found on our website, but some items of interest from this October meeting were as follows:

- Under Highways, Footpaths & Footways our clerk advised there had been a delay in repairing the damaged streetlight on Olde Bell Close, but it was hoped that this could be completed within the next couple of weeks.
- Cllr Ajaz presented a proposal for installing outdoor gym equipment in Newton Leys South to which the PC were fully supportive. Cllr Ajaz would now approach the local residents to determine the preferred type of equipment. It would then be decided whether to finance the project with PC or S106 funds.
- Our clerk was still chasing Bucks Highways for an installation date for our new entrance gate signs, but unfortunately to date has still received no response.
- Cllr Noble gave some details on the biodiversity training course that he recently attended and advised of the new requirement that all builders/developers must now achieve a 10% increase to the biodiversity to that that pre-existed before the site was developed.

When it came to our next PC meeting held on the evening of the 5th November. We were finally joined by what has been an absence of 2 years by one of our ward councillors, but not Phil Gomm but Cllr Jilly Jordan who we had never met before, and who had advised some weeks prior that she would be attending. Indeed, Cllr Jordan confirmed that going forward, she would attend every other meeting, as unfortunately our PC Meetings clash with those she also attends in Great Brickhill, so likewise she will now only go to the Brickhill meetings on alternate months. Cllr Jordan had previously sent through a full report a copy of which can be found under the November Minutes section on the PC website, but also gave a brief update on Ward matters, including the fact that in the upcoming May 2025 elections that the wards are being altered and renamed. With ours now becoming the ward of Newton Longville with a reduction from 3 to 2 Ward Councillors.

As for the meeting itself where we were joined by 4 members of the public, some of the main points if not already covered were as follows:

- Under Planning and although not within our parish the planning application 23/-2652/FUL for the development of 81 new residences plus 8 traveller pitches on land just north of Newton Leys South was felt to be something the PC should be commenting on. For full details of the PC's response please head to the 'Planning Section', elsewhere in this Edition of the SH & NLS News.
- During the Highways, Footpaths and Footways section, we were advised that the controversial sited dog waste bin in Newton Leys South is to shortly be moved as no objections had been received relating to its proposed new location. Cllr Noble also advised that during a recent Speedwatch session where traffic passing South on the Leighton Road was being monitored. That during a 2hr period running from 2-4pm, some 200 vehicles passed of which 4 were logged as traveling faster than 35mph, the speed at which their details are passed to the Thames Valley Community Speedwatch team.
- Cllr Champion gave the latest update on Project Stocksfield (Please see the specific section after this PC News), whilst Cllr Newing advised how the emerging Neighbourhood Plan was now at the Reg`16 Consultation Stage, but again please head to the NHP section for more details.
- Cllr Newing also advised about the meeting he attended with Bucks Council regarding planning across the county. A consultation was held on changes to the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) and a new document will be available by the end of the year. There are to be no specific changes to the Neighbourhood Plan element. Housing needs

methodology has changed, and 65,000 additional houses are needed. The Government will be issuing house building targets. There will be a task force created for new towns (10,000+houses) and the government is supportive of wind and solar farms. There is no strategy for infrastructure to support these new houses.

• Two Community Funding applications were to be considered, the first from High Ash Scout Group for £200 to go towards their 2024 Group Camp, and a second retrospective from the Sports Club for £350 as part funding for their recent fireworks evening. Both applications were fully supported with many commenting on the fantastic display that the Sports Club provided.

As is the norm unless some urgent matter arises there will be no PC Meeting in December. So, the next meeting will on the evening of Tuesday 7th January, commencing 7.30pm at the Community Centre, Bragenham Side.

In closing and if you've already glanced at the contact details below you will notice that the email addresses for your Councillors and Clerk have changed. This came about when our clerk identified that our PC website was not compliant with new WCAG 2.2 standards and that it should be hosted in the UK whereas it was currently being done by an American based organisation. We have now appointed a local Leighton Buzzard based company to rebuild and host our website, but at the same time, it was felt appropriate that we should also migrate our emails to gov.uk email addresses.





We are trying to encourage developers to talk to the Parish Council before designing their sites to try to improve both the design and facilities offered to residents, and to minimise potential issues.

Stoke Hammond and Newton Leys South Neighbourhood Plan Update

Bucks council commenced the Reg 16 consultation on the 24th October and it will complete on the 4th December. Everyone who commented during the February 2024 consultation were notified of the latest event and Bucks have advertised it via their own communication channels as well as contacting all statutory consultees. If anyone still wishes to comment they have until the 4th December via the Bucks Council website.

The next stage will be the appointment of an examiner by the Bucks Council in agreement with the Parish Council. This will be a member of the national planning inspectorate who will review the plan to ensure it meets the basic conditions laid down in law. It must be deemed to:

- have regard to the National Policy
- contribute to the achievement of sustainable development
- have general conformity with the strategic policies in the existing Local Plan.
- be compatible with EU obligations

The examination will most likely be carried out by written representations however it could, if felt necessary, involve a public hearing.

The examiner will consider:

- whether the plan meets the basic conditions
- any requirements set out by law
- that the plan conforms with National and Local policies
- Reg 16 responses specifically with respect to the above
- the recommended voting area for the referendum.

There are 3 possible outcomes:

- recommendation to proceed
- recommendation to proceed with modifications to the plan
- recommendation the plan does not proceed to referendum.

The Girl from Station X – by Elisa Segrave



This is a rather unusual book — an interesting account of a privileged young woman's life before and after the war and the author's reaction to her mother's indifference which results in her realising that she really knew little about her. After her death she discovered innumerable war time diaries which revealed the mother she really didn't know. Her mother had a very complicated personality and varying emotional needs plus addictions particularly to alcohol. The reader learnt that this mother/daughter relationship had been unsatisfactory as, although the daughter enjoyed bouts of closeness and having brief periods of attention, she often felt unloved and she was anxious to find out more.

There was a mixed response from the group. Everyone seemed to have enjoyed it in parts although a frequent criticism was that the title was misleading as many expected more emphasis on Bletchley Park and it was felt that she didn't really contribute a great deal whilst there. Some felt an affiliation as the book felt 'local' in parts and were amazed at the many facets of the mother's life both personal and work orientated, but it was also said that the format of the book i.e. extracts from the diaries being revealed and being followed by comments by the daughter was unusual and interesting.

So, it was described as 'hard going', boring at first but suddenly far more interesting, a page turner, well written (which was disputed) but also it was felt that there was too much concentration on analysis of her mother's personality and idiosyncrasies.

Conclusion: Definitely worth reading as certainly different.



PLANNING APPLICATION NEWS & UPDATES OCTOBER & NOV 2024



In this section you will find details of planning applications received, comments made by your Parish Council, and any updates on previous planning applications.

NEW PLANNING APPLICATIONS:

24/02734/APP Pennhurst, Church Road, Stoke Hammond MK17 9BP

Householder application for front porch, single storey rear extension and changes to external finishes and new dropped kerb.

Note: This application was first seen at the October PC Meeting and then again in a slightly modified form at the November meeting, as concerns had been raised by heritage (this house sits within the Conservation area) about some of the original proposed design/finishes. Cllrs resolved they had NO Objections to either the first or to the subsequent second application.

23/02652/FUL – Employment Land 2 & 3, Newton Leys, Milton Keynes MK3 5SD The erection of 81 residential dwellings with access, parking, landscaping and associated works along with provision for 8 traveller pitches and the construction of a store ancillary to Taylor Wimpey offices.

Note. Although outside of Parish of Stoke Hammond, this site sits very close to our Parishioners in Newton Leys South and Cllr Ajaz had previously attended a Bletchley & Fenny Stratford Town Council meeting, where Councillors there had requested that Stoke Hammond raise an objection to this application. Following a lengthy discussion and having reviewed a draft objection letter produced by Cllr Champion, your PC resolved to submit an objection letter to this proposed development, citing the following reasons:

Highway safety: In absence of any play equipment or play area on the proposed traveller site children of the site would be required to travel to alternative provision such as the Oakbrook Park. Consideration should be given to the fact Galapagos Grove is a busy main road at most times of day, children would be required to cross this road at some point to access Oakbrook Park. **The absence of a play park on the site is also in contrast to Planning policy for traveller sites design- Policy H 26 c**

Proposals in the Development Plan: The proposed development is a departure from the original development plan, the land in this planning application was allocated as employment land. By not developing this as employment land would deprive local residents from opportunity of local employment. Taking the local centre as an example many members of the community work there or have set up successful businesses there.

Stoke Hammond Parish Council discussed the possibility of purchasing this area of land to develop sports facilities for the residents of Newton Leys and Stoke Hammond. The Land Agent advised that Taylor Wimpey did not want to entertain a sale and had already turned down considerable offers for the purchase of this piece of land for employment purposes. It appears that there has been little actual interest in developing any facilities on this site apart from residential houses.

Newton Leys has many residents with entrepreneurial spirit who many consider setting up businesses in the area they love and are proud to call home. In addition, there are

many local residents who do not have access to their own forms of transport making local employment preferable, as demonstrated by the members of the community working at our existing local centre there is an appetite for local employment in the area. Development for employment use is also likely to be less disruptive to wildlife than housing, typically businesses operate during the hours of 9-5 it may be possible to place conditions on businesses to mitigate light pollution to the woodland. Buildings could also be orientated in a way in which they would not face the woodland further protecting habitat for wildlife

Unsuitability of location for Travellers Site: The centre of the site is approximately 350 metres from the West Coast mainline, a significant contributor of sound pollution in the area. Sound insulation of a static caravan is unlikely to perform as well as a home made of bricks and mortar exposing occupants to persistent round the clock noise. Locating sites away from railways was a recommendation in the document which this one supersedes (Designing Gypsy and Traveller Sites, Good Practice Guide) 3.18

The centre of the site is approximately 100 meters from the boundary of an active landfill site which has recently received planning permission to operate for an extended period of time. The area of the proposed traveller site is subject to regular odour events from this landfill site. In the previous document which this one supersedes (Designing Gypsy and Traveller Sites, Good Practice Guide) 3.7 mention is made to evidence provided to the Select Committee in regard to the importance of site location, particularly with regards to sites not being placed next to tips.

The community centre often hosts regular events which can be the source of noise such as football training and matches during the weekend mornings, these events can generate considerable noise in the localised area from activities such as shouting, cheering and the use of whistles. In addition to events such as Weddings and other types of celebrations where loud music may be present late into the evening.

We continue to believe that the most appropriate use of this land is to provide employment opportunities for the local community. We don't believe the existing application is appropriate. In any event, we understand that the demand for Traveller's site has reduced, and this application would provide only 8 travellers pitches by reducing approximately 40-50 potential residential dwellings.

We understand more Travellers are accepting brick and mortar properties and it would seem counter intuitive to not house up to 50 households so it could potentially provide 8 pitches without confirmation of demand.

It would be more beneficial to build on the existing traveller site in Wavendon, Milton Keynes, than to build where there are no community connectors and the economic cost is higher than building on an existing site.

What does it mean?: St Paul wrote this letter to believers in Philippi (Northern Greece) because he'd heard reports of dissention among the converted disciples. In the early part of the letter he corrects their misunderstandings and here at the end he's encouraging them if they have any disagreements to be kind to each other and most importantly to be joyful in the Lord as they all share that conviction which will bring them together. He advises them "in every situation" to pray for guidance to assuage their anxieties and this will bring God's peace which as Christians know, is the greatest joy.

Funeral information: New rules mean that crematoria are not offering a

religious service by default: it must be specifically requested. The Rector can conduct a funeral service at a crematorium if you wish. Also, any village resident can be buried or have their ashes buried in the churchyard if wished (for a small fee). Memorial



News from Buckinghamshire Council

Dear Resident 11 November 2024

It's hard to believe there are a little over six weeks to go until Christmas! Decorations are appearing in the shops and many of us will be gearing up for the festive season. There will be Christmas events and carol services in many of our town and village centres and if you're starting to shop for gifts and festive goodies, please don't forget to shop locally.

Christmas gifts are an important trade for our local shops and help maintain our high streets throughout the year. We will be offering free parking in some council car parks in the run up to Christmas so please keep an eye on our website for details



Our roads this winter

Hopefully you will have seen that we have made significant progress with our rolling £110 million four-year investment programme in our roads, with many roads resurfaced and thousands of potholes filled. However, wet and cold weather can still lead to new potholes and other defects, particularly on older surfaces and those being damaged by heavy goods vehicles. Although our roads repair programme continues, our focus over winter switches to less weather dependent work and often we need to operate a 'make safe' approach to road repairs during winter weather, so as not to waste precious time and resources doing substantial repairs that simply won't last or aren't practical on wet or frozen surfaces.

This means we will carry out many more 'temporary repairs' to potholes during winter; these aren't pretty and are just that – a temporary fix to make the road safe. We then carry out more permanent repairs and improvements during the spring and summer. Our road repair programme is designed using a combination of professional technical assessment, alongside local knowledge and priority from ward councillors on behalf of their residents. So if you feel there's an area that needs attention, please raise this through your local councillor. During the winter months our teams will also focus on keeping the roads safe in colder and icier conditions, gritting where we need to and making safe any defects that open up as well as responding to severe weather and flooding. I am hoping that this winter will be drier

The Council 'steps in' with Pension Credit surgeries

Following the government's surprise decision to withdraw the Winter Fuel Payment from nearly all Buckinghamshire pensioners we are doing everything in our power to support local residents of pensionable age who could now be struggling to pay bills and buy food. As you may well be aware, this year's Winter Fuel Payment will now only be made to pensioners on certain benefits and who are in receipt of Pension Credit. A significant concern with this is that it's known that nationally some 900,000 people receiving the state pension who are eligible for this benefit are not currently claiming it. This means these people, who really do rely on their Winter Fuel Payment, will not get it.

It's critical that people of pensionable age do check whether they're eligible for Pension Credit and make an application if so. As is often the case, the application form can appear somewhat complicated, so we have organised face to face 'surgeries' in many of our libraries and other council buildings where expert support will be on hand to help people fill out the required form, if they would like some help or guidance. This is all completely free and confidential. Anyone who needs this support is invited to look on our website for more information including times and locations.

Remembrance events

I want to take a moment to remember the poignance and importance of the Remembrance events that have taken place this weekend to pay tribute to those who have served, past and present, to defend our nation and to keep us safe. The council held a minute's silence at 11am on Monday 11 November and I personally attended my local village Remembrance service in Little Chalfont, while the council's

care services. I do however also want to let you know of some specific news about how we are supporting our residents who need it most this Christmas.

We have just launched our new 'Christmas Angels' campaign, highlighting five key local charities that we hope residents, if they are in a position to do so, can consider donating to this Christmas. One of these 'Christmas Angels' is 'Inspire Bucks', set up by local Buckinghamshire Councillor Paul Irwin. They run the annual Christmas Toy appeal for local children who otherwise might not get a gift this Christmas. Year after year, I am blown away by the sheer difference this campaign makes to our local children and I am incredibly grateful for the generosity of our communities – so I urge you once again, if you are able to do so, to give to this incredibly worthy appeal.

Alongside Inspire Bucks, our other 'Christmas Angels' also provide very significant support to local residents. They include 'Heart of Bucks' currently running their 'Together Against Poverty' appeal supporting local people facing hardship. The One Can Trust Foodbank is based in High Wycombe and provides free weekly emergency food parcels to anyone in High Wycombe and South Bucks who finds themselves in need.

Aylesbury Vineyard Storehouse and Chiltern Foodbank also provide similar support to people in those areas too. Together, our 'Festive Five' make a massive difference to local people who may be facing real challenges this Christmas.

I do want to be clear too that while we have highlighted these five charities, there are many other amazing local organisations doing great work in their communities and we also include these on our Christmas Angels webpage in case you want to see how you might help and support some of these other organisations too.

Enhanced online help for adults and carers

Continuing the theme of helping and supporting people who need it most, I want to draw attention to some significant work we've done alongside residents using our Adult Social Care services to introduce new resources for both these residents and carers. This aims to support their independence and personal management of their care needs.

We provide assistance to more than 5,000 adults with varying degrees of support. Our new measures focus on making it easier for them to get online information and advice about their adult social care needs. It also enhances the level of online support for the many carers supporting people who need additional help. Importantly, we've designed these new resources alongside the people we're supporting, so that they directly reflect what service users tell us they need.

We've launched our new-look Care Advice Bucks website to include content that outlines how to go through the care assessment process, how individuals can arrange and pay for their care and guidance on what home support and equipment is available, as well as some helpful health and wellbeing advice.

Alongside this, the council has also improved the online resources available to carers in Buckinghamshire, joining up for the first time with 'Mobilise', providers of specialist support for people who are caring for others. 'Mobilise' offers Buckinghamshire
