but as wise,
making the best
use of the time,
because
the days are evil.
Ephesians 5:15-16

“Walk on, walk on with hope in your heart...”

Walking does not usually grab the limelight but it certainly has recently as Captain (now Honorary Colonel) Tom Moore, the hundred year-old veteran of the Second World War, hit the headlines and became the darling of the media! This intrepid man decided to walk a hundred laps of his garden with his Zimmer frame to raise money for the NHS. We all know how magnificently he succeeded in his aim and in so doing he has shown us the value of putting one foot in front of the other!

However, unlike spectacular activities such as skydiving, abseiling and bungee-jumping, walking causes little comment normally. And yet it is a fundamental means by which we engage in our daily lives. The spectacular is occasional (if at all for some of us!), the unremarkable is the norm.

And so it is spiritually. Some believers seem always in pursuit of the spectacular in their Christian experience, constantly reaching for the next spiritual adrenaline rush. But the overwhelming emphasis in the Bible is on walking. It is true that Paul the Apostle uses many metaphors for the Christian life and that one of those is running a race but I'm pretty certain Paul had in mind a marathon rather than a sprint! And that, like walking, is characterized by steady progress rather than a spectacular spurt.

In biblical terms, walking for the Christian means the settled, steady tenor of his or her whole life. But what characterizes this walk? Well, pre-eminently it is walking before God; remember God's word to Abraham, **“I am God Almighty, walk before me and be blameless.” (Genesis 17:1).**

In other words, we live in the presence and sight of our Father God and remembering that should radically affect the way we behave.

That inevitably leads to the need to **“walk in the light” (1 John 1:7)**, to have a life that is brought into line with God's truth and law, that shows we have a true relationship with him.

We are also told to **“walk in love” (Ephesians 5:2)**. This love is far from mere sentiment or warm feelings for it is to be patterned on the love of Christ to us. His love was immensely practical, based on no deserving on our part and painfully costly for him. And that is the model he holds up to us.

The King James version renders **Ephesians 5:15** **“Walk circumspectly”** and calls to my mind the picture of a cat making its way along the top of a wall that has pieces of broken glass bottles embedded in it. (Those were pre-Health and Safety days when you could protect your property without being sued by a burglar!) That cat went surefootedly picking his way along the wall with never a bloody paw to show for it! That's how we are meant to pick our way through all the various tricky situations and demands of living in a rebel world.

Of course we can only manage any of this if we **“walk by the Spirit” (Galatians 5:16)**. Thank God, we are not left to our own unaided efforts but are promised the grace and help of God's Holy Spirit. So we will walk with hope in our hearts – an everlasting, sure hope - and we will never walk alone.

But it's up to us to walk. You know how to walk, don't you? You just put one foot in front of the other and go!

In verse 4 there is a picture of God's city. The people of God, this one and that one born in her. In God's eyes the people of God are glorious as also Jerusalem is described as glorious.

John Newton's hymn reflects that wonderful truth. 'Glorious things of Thee are spoken' the thought that Jerusalem with it's temple and sacrifice prefiguring our Lord Jesus death and resurrection is glorious to the Lord's people because it speaks of what the Lord has done for us.

Yet in the eyes of the heathen even Jerusalem could not be compared to the great cities of Assyria and Egypt or the great rivers that fuelled the economies of those god-less nations.

The river of Shiloh, which passed through Jerusalem: meant, though the defence seemed small, if God appointed it, it is sufficient. It would seem trivial in the world's eyes but what the world despises makes glad the people of God. God's city is the place of joyful confidence,

Luther paraphrased this verse 4 by saying 'Yet for all the City of God shall maintain its marvellous cheerfulness with its little wells, for there are the holy places of the Most High'.

The channels are little runlets, seemingly insignificant in themselves but together watering the population, feeding them quietly yet sufficiently.

The people receive the Lord's presence gladly in this Psalm. The Lords people are safe when the Lord is with them.

We have here an idyllic picture of God in His temple worshipped while the people of God being fed by the streams of living waters and God protecting His city. The idyllic picture turns sour as the people turn to other nations to protect them which meant apart from the financial cost they received other gods.

God will always help us and He will not be moved. But we have a responsibility, one that the Jews in the city forgot, to have Him Lord of our lives. God is still Sovereign, He did not slink away like some early 20th century King of Europe. As in the past He allowed nations to destroy Jerusalem and even the temple He will in His loving mercy deal with us. As Jerusalem forsook her protector she had to learn a hard lesson to come back to God.

We should fear not even in these seemingly uncertain times as we see the nations shaking.

When the dangers of the night are past then the morning of God's help comes.

'His steadfast love never ceases. His mercies are new every morning. Great is His faithfulness.'

God's faithfulness is effective because He is in the midst of His people..

See the promises, feed on the promises in the end of this Psalm.

The God of Hosts is with us.
The God of Jacob is our refuge.
