

Remembering those we've loved and lost



BBI AIRPORT

The Bois Blanc Island Airport (6Y1) sits at an elevation of 664 feet, just 3 miles Northwest of Pointe Aux Pins. With 3,498 x 75 feet of asphalt, runways 10 and 28 provide vital lifelines for year-round and seasonal island residents and guests, especially during the winter months when the ferry doesn't run.

This past winter was especially busy, with hundreds of air taxi flights provided by Fresh Air Aviation and Great Lakes Air, and twice weekly mail and package deliveries from the Post Office and Plaunt Transportation.

Frequent snow and ice events made keeping the runways clear an ongoing challenge, often requiring very early morning and late evening snowplowing by Brent Sharpe. Brent deserves our thanks and appreciation for his commitment and dedication to this important work.

To assist with snow removal around the airport runway banks and lights, the airport is in the final stages of securing a new snow blower with major funding assistance provided by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), and the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT). We expect to receive the new equipment in time for the 2023 winter.

Finally, please keep in mind that free short-term airport parking is limited to 72 hours, and all vehicles parked beyond 72 hours require a permit from the Township Office.

Vote for the Bois Blanc Island Fire Department!

New On-Call System depends on voters this August

"Do we have any kind of guarantee that anyone from our Fire Department will be on the Island when someone calls 911 for help?"

That's the question that was asked during a recent meeting of the Bois Blanc Island Community Foundation. It was a great question, and the short answer was, unfortunately...No.

It is a valid concern, one we've faced for years, and now we're doing something about it. That's why the crew at the BBIFD is asking all Bois Blanc registered voters to come out and support our Fire Department millage request, which will appear on the ballot this August.

The new millage would enable us to launch a formal On-Call System to ensure there will be a minimum of two trained first responders available and ready to respond on Bois Blanc Island, at all times. It would also allow us to continue providing and maintaining the equipment, gear, and facilities necessary for our entire crew to respond to fire and medical emergencies.

In recent years, our small BBIFD crew has made a voluntary effort to ensure someone will always be available to respond to calls. It has been handled informally, often through group text messages among members. When one or more members are planning to be off-island or otherwise unavailable, remaining member(s) do their best to cover for them. Each member has had to cancel or reschedule personal plans just so he or she wouldn't risk leaving the Island vulnerable in an emergency. However, there have been rare occasions—certain holidays, shopping trip days, off-island training sessions—when Bois Blanc has been down to one, or zero, available first responders. On those occasions, command staff has had to notify Mackinac County 911/Emergency Management of the need for off-island assistance in the event of a 911 call from BBI. That's scary. And that's why we need your vote this August.

The proposed On-Call System will provide two (2) trained crew members with compensation of about \$1.48 per hour to commit to staying on the Island, fully ready to respond 24/7, during a scheduled on-call shift. Of course, all other available BBIFD crew members will also continue to respond to emergency pages as usual. Each of our certified Firefighters and Emergency Medical Responders (EMRs) will rotate the on-call shifts.

The BBIFD is grateful to the Bois Blanc Township Board for its support of the On-Call System, and for bringing this important millage request to our voters on the August 2022 ballot. We are also grateful to the entire community for your continued confidence in us.

BBI FIRE DEPARTMENT

Need a burn permit? Just call (231) 634-7085 No more phone lists!



Planning to have a small bonfire or campfire on the Island tonight? Good news! Thanks to the proposed on-call system, we've just eliminated the hassle of tracking down that list of BBIFD members' cell phone numbers to call for your permit. Now, you call just ONE number—(231) 634-7085—and an on-call first responder will answer, letting you know whether conditions on the Island will allow your open burn.

Thanks to assistance from Township staff, the BBIFD was able to make the arrangements for permit requests and other non-emergency calls to be answered by a live person on the (231) 634-7085 line.

We hope this will encourage more people to follow the rules by having a single number to call. We ask that these calls be limited to the hours of 8:00am-9:00pm daily. Campfire permit calls received after 9pm will not be answered, meaning you will not have permission for your bonfire or campfire if you call too late.

As a reminder, large and/or non-contained brush fires are never permitted, except during winter months when snow is on the ground and prior arrangements have been made.

Bois Blanc Island continues to be covered by the Mackinac County 911 Emergency Management system.

To reiterate: The (231) 634-7085 line is NOT for emergency calls. It is for non-emergency use ONLY. For fire, medical, and police emergencies on Bois Blanc Island, CALL 911.

For those with rental cottages or guests coming to stay on the Island, please be sure to post the updated (231) 634-7085 campfire permit call number, along with instructions to call 911 in an emergency. The old Fire Department cell phone number lists should be discarded.

More BBIFD crew members receiving Firefighter I/II Certification in 2022

The Bois Blanc Island Fire Department is proud to announce that three more members of its crew are expected to complete formal Firefighter I and II training during 2022. BBIFD crew members James Gilligan, Jessi La Porte, and Michelle Satchell each began the rigorous 300-hour training course in December, 2021, in St. Ignace.

Upon satisfactory completion of the training in May, 2022, Firefighters Gilligan, La Porte, and Satchell will officially double the number of certified volunteer Firefighters serving the BBIFD. The 300-hour course combines intensive online learning and in-person practical training exercises. It is the same course that qualifies individuals to become firefighters in every department in Michigan, and also meets the requirements for nearly all fire departments in the United States.

Fire and EMS training opportunities in Northern Michigan are scarce, and are extraordinarily difficult for year-round Island residents to schedule. Work, family, weather, and off-Island transportation challenges mean that each trainee's dedication must go well beyond that of simply taking a class. The BBIFD is grateful to Jim, Jessi, and Michelle for giving so much of themselves to help make Bois Blanc Island a safer place for us all.

Generous donations help equip BBIFD with new turnout gear

Hand-me-downs are fine when you're a kid. But when you're a firefighter, having to stuff yourself into ill-fitting, worn and tattered old turnout gear on a moment's notice is a potentially dangerous struggle.

We were approached last year by members of the community who wanted to help the BBIFD through sizable financial donations. When they asked what kind of help we needed, the answer was quite clear: We need to equip our firefighters with modern, fully-compliant, properly-fitted turnout gear.

Basic turnout gear consists of a jacket and pants that are specially made with materials that are highly durable, resistant to heat, flame, abrasion, and chemical damage, and yet are still flexible and breathable enough to allow firefighters to do their jobs. Today's turnout gear is much more lightweight than our 20+ year old gear. Jackets are now equipped with a special drag device that allows an incapacitated firefighter to be pulled from a fire to safety. These garments alone cost nearly \$3,000 per firefighter. Fire boots, gloves, helmets, and thermal neck guards add several hundred dollars more, and all of these items must comply with current National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) standards.

The donations we received during 2021, combined with funds raised by the Bois Blanc Island Firefighters' Association through car wash fundraisers and shirt sales, have enabled us to purchase enough turnout gear to fully equip our seven (7) active members with new turnout gear during 2022, at a total cost of nearly \$25,000. While the purchase is already underway, it will be several months before we can take delivery from the vendor. We expect to have all of our active-duty firefighters in their new turnout gear by the end of the 2022 season.

Once again, we express our sincere gratitude to the individuals and families of BBI whose extraordinary support has provided these essentials for our crew.

Fundraisers and grant applications to continue

After the recent large expenditure of nearly \$25,000 to provide new turnout gear, the Bois Blanc Island Firefighters' Association will be working hard to raise new funds toward future improvements. We plan to continue our car wash fundraiser in the summer of 2022, and also to provide online donation and promotional item purchase options for donors this year. In addition, the BBIFD is in the process of submitting grant applications that will help to fund the purchase of four new air packs—a.k.a., Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus, or SCBAs—to replace our outdated units. These units are what enable firefighters to breathe air safely in environments where heat, smoke, dangerous chemicals, and other toxic airborne matter could be fatal. Each SCBA costs about \$5,000. If the grant applications are unsuccessful, then we will be turning once again to the public to help raise funds for these new air packs and tanks.

We continue to encourage Island property owners to install the reflective green 911 address signs at the roadside for each property. However, due to increased cost, the BBIFA is no longer able to offer the signs for purchase. We will be working on new BBIFD shirt designs for 2022, although new shirts may be delayed until we can raise enough funds to place new orders.

At this time, Cara Haapapuro, FNP will be at the clinic each Wednesday from 10:30am to 2:30pm until June 29th. Beyond that, a provider still needs to be secured.

Phlebotomy services are available, from Clover Schlund, trained phlebotomist, for those who need blood draws while on the island. Drawn blood is shipped to the mainland and processed by McLaren Northern Michigan Health, according to the prescription you present. Anyone needing a blood draw can call Clover @ 231-634-7500.

PARKS & RECREATION

We have a new P&R committee. Current members are Ginger Canup, Jay Beugly, Karen Beauchamp and myself as board liaison. We currently have one opening, but I'm confident that will be filled shortly. We have a great committee with each member bringing wonderful background and experiences to the group. We have representation from different areas of the island as well. Navy on Bois Blanc Island

Leaving Fort Gratiot were the brigs Niagara and Lawrence and the schooners Caledonia, Tigress and Scorpion under the command of Commodore Arthur Sinclair. On board were about 750 Army soldiers and extra cannon. Imagine how crowded that was. On July 26, 1814, the US Navy arrived near Mackinac Island, after sending a raiding party lead by Major Holmes up the St. Mary's River.

A drawing, done by Captain Charles Gratiot, shows that the anchoring ground of the American fleet was offshore of Bois Blanc Island. More specifically, from the drawing, it was somewhere offshore north of Dousman's private claim 323.

There are no official details of day to day operations. There is mention of tedious days of bad weather and a skirmish on Round Island. Eight days pass. Then on August 4, they moved to the NW side of Mackinac to land forces intending to establish, according to Col. George Groghan, "some favorable position", "to be taken and fortified".

Navy men went ashore on Bois Blanc. I say that, because, found by this author, was a Navy button 15 paces west of the center of a sawpit in Dousman's Claim. Also found, were Infantry and Artillery buttons near the Navy button. It appears, they were cutting planks or beams. The timbers, possibly, were sawed for the intended fortified position, on Mackinac Island.

The Navy button is a style worn during the War of 1812. The eagle facing right is standing on ground. Fifteen stars have 6 points each. The diameter is 23mm, about 7/8 inches. The eagle has a long skinny neck some call goose necked. The back mark says DOUBLE GILT LONDON. There is a 21 mm button like this in Albert's button book designated as NA 53. The next closest is NA 51. They are both flat brass buttons. NA 51 has the eagle standing on what looks like rope or cable. This button is on display at the Bois Blanc Island Historical Society Museum.

This may be the only Navy button ever found that is related to The Battle of Mackinac Island.

The Bois Blanc Island Wildlife Association, Inc. is a registered 501(c)3, non profit, group that promotes the care and conservation of Island wildlife. The Wildlife dinner, held annually the Sunday prior to Labor Day, supports the efforts to protect and enhance habitat for Island wildlife. The 2021 Annual Wildlife Dinner was held on Sunday, September 5th. Winners of the pig raffle were: Dennis Hoppe, 1st prize; Sayje Wilson, 2nd prize; Jake Kruszynski, 3rd prize. The dinner raised \$5,678.92 for the association, and the pig raffle raised \$3,360.00 of that amount. The Wildlife Association planted 1,000 fingerling bluegills in Lake Thompson. It also plans to plant some fish in Lake Thompson and Twin Lakes in 2022. This winter, feed was distributed to various places on the Island for the deer and birds. Winter has not been a hard one. Seek Out Your Island Neighbors



A flight over the Great Lakes would reveal a network of islands, like precious gems woven into the glittering fabric of the Great Lakes ecosystem. Globally unique and rich in natural heritage, these islands are havens for migrant songbirds, spawning fish, and rare plants. Ours is no exception! Unfortunately, there are still gaps in our knowledge of Great Lakes island biodiversity, which makes it difficult to make management decisions, identify research and management needs, and establish

monitoring protocols. Getting to know more about our plant and animal island neighbors can help us learn how to best protect them and the wider ecosystem countless islanders and Great Lakes basin residents rely on physically, economically, and culturally.

So where does one start? These neighbors don't need to borrow some sugar or catch a ride from the ferry, but there are other favors we can do for them - plant a patch of native flowers to make your yard more wildlife-friendly, keep the shorelines free of trash and ATV use, or even take part in an organized habitat restoration effort. Be respectful of wildlife and remember to pick up after yourself and others. Learn to use a tool like Seek by iNaturalist for discovering the names of plants or animals that are new to you. Seek is a free, easy-to-use app that provides real-time identification for organisms that you photograph with your smartphone. Plus, through documenting your observations on Seek, you'll be helping to inventory BBI's plant and animal communities to further develop our understanding of the island's biodiversity.

I invite you to pause and inspect a blooming wildflower for visiting bees, beetles, and butterflies. Take a walk and listen for the songbirds. Check for frogs in the pools along beaches and roads, and look out for depressions in the grass where deer have bedded for the night. You don't need to go far. Sit quietly in your own backyard and see who comes along. Look, listen, linger longer. And if you get the opportunity, try taking a picture with Seek! We are blessed to share this island with

However, a big shout out to Curt Plaunt, Ted Spray, Grant Spray, Shawn Nelson, John Maynard and Dan Blundy as they worked to remove the tree from the gazebo roof, moved the many treasured pieces and the roof to a safer location for the winter and then in the fall of 2021, when supplies became available, re-built the gazebo and put the roof back on. There are a few tasks remaining including painting and acquiring/re-installing the weathervane. We hope to complete these this spring so our treasure will be restored to its original beauty.

Bois Club

Hello, I'm Steve Wilson a member of the Bois Club on the island's west end. Next year marks the 50th anniversary of our club on Boblo. I am writing a history about the club to commemorate the landmark event of building the lodge—eleven men and their sons, aided and supported by many of the families of Bois Blanc. I'm interested in any stories, photographs, memories that you might have about the interactions of the eleven original members of the Bois Club with the island residents. Here is a selection from my Bois Club History Project:

Gene Babcock of LaHay Real Estate and Don Schimpf of the Bois Club headed down the narrow game trail toward the lake as Bob Kerlin and Hayward Lesley waited in the back of Gene's pickup downing the last remaining drops of the Old Grandad. Within a few minutes, Don was headed back up with a serious look on his face.

He leaned over the side of the truck. "Guys," he said, excitedly. "You gotta see this."

"We could tell Don was serious, so we scrambled out of the truck and hurried down a narrow trail through the pines."

Together the four of them pushed their way through the thick pine boughs until they made their way clear, stepping onto the craggy outcropping of sharply broken limestone and low green-brown shrubbery. Below them the waves rushed against the ice piled high along the rocky shore. All four men breathed in the chill wind from the Straits.

'Suddenly, there it was," Bob said, recalling the story in his Traverse City living room nearly 50 years later. "The Mackinac Bridge."

Bob, Les, Don and Gene stood in quiet astonishment. Shoulder to shoulder, each of them silently surveyed the dappled greys and blues flashing across the tops of the waves to the Herculean clarity of the bridge spanning the horizon.

"I can't remember who said it first. Maybe no one. We all knew we'd found the perfect place."

In the sobering air of April 1973, they found a survey stake marking the lot's north side, then paced off the full 200 feet of the lot to the south. Marking the spot with a pile of stones, they turned south again and paced 100 feet back to the middle. Don moved a big limestone rock into position at the exact center of the lot.

"Tell Frank Richardson we want the front of the foundation centered here," Don told Gene.

A Place Where Memories Are Made

When we purchased our property on BBI over 20 years ago, one of the first things we did to mark our arrival each time, was raise a small American flag, on an equally diminutive pole to fly it. This eventually lost its berth due to the constant gales and weather beatings that it faced head-on, over the early years of our island life.

The beach didn't seem right without this beacon, so I had asked Jeff to install another one, which he did about 10 years ago, with the help of a small army of CMU roommates/sorority sistahs' husband-units. It was a super straight cedar pole, very wide at it's base, extremely heavy and dizzyingly tall. They took turns digging the hole which was no small feat, through hundreds and hundreds of pounds of limestone rock, into which over 200 lbs of concrete was poured on our beach to form its foundation. My alma mater's flag was raised with much fanfare that weekend, and every summer thereafter, along with the addition of the Lion Rampant of Scotland (a nod to Clans Duncan & Munro) adding on the Maize & Blue Block M for Lilia, a Bronco "W" for Willow, displaying their clout under the lead of Old Glory at the top.



Sadly, with the continuing high waters of Huron ravaging the shoreline last summer, the waves had licked the foundation away and took with it, our mighty flagpole, which succumbed into a bed of surrounding cedars, cushioning it's fall until we found it defeated in it's tenure, this spring. This of course, set me into an annoying series of endless pleads for it's rebirth as I had arrived with a crisp, new Green & White Spartan banner to herald Fiona's team joining the ranks of collegiate flapping showmanship. With several back-&-forth trips to work for Jeff, visits with guests and island friends, and trips to Mackinac in-between, the flagpole did not receive attention until just this week. After having her nubby protrusions sawed-off, (we neglected doing this initially, leaving many previous flags in shreds by seasons end) sanded, and several coats of polyurethane added, a deep crater, back-breakingly dug by Jeffrey in a new & higher location on our beach, and thanks to the kind donations of several island neighbors: over 640lbs of concrete poured into her foundation, that same flag pole and her support posts, were reinstalled in the dim twilight and wicked winds of last evening. Thanks to the fortitude of old & young David, Stewart, & Sherry Manges, & Wesley Peterman, we raised her back into proud service on our beach facing the Straits. This morning, with a backdrop of cerulean sky & a strong September wind, Jeff and I hoisted her collection of kaleidoscopic canvases into their fluttering dance once again, waving to passers-by (via boat or plane), as if to say: "This is Duncan Pines. A much-loved, fun and friendly place where memories are made. Be sure to beep, stop by or wave!"

BOIS BLANC ISLAND MAPLE SYRUP



There had to be a way to generate a little more income during that time of year when there's still too much snow to do most things outside, and yet at the same time, too much snow and ice for the boat to run. So, we decided that maybe starting to make maple syrup would be a good idea.

We put the plan in motion in 1985 and started tapping the trees. Each year we would add more taps than we had the year before. It took about 4 years and we ended with about 3500 taps.

Our average season in production was 1000 to 1200 gallons of finished maple syrup. Our largest production year yielded 1500 gallons.

All of our sugar bushes were eventually operated using tubing and a vacuum system, graduating from buckets hanging on the trees. The vacuum system means that all the trees were tubed in together and all ran down to just one collection point.

It was my job to maintain the sugar bushes by fixing any leaks, starting the vacuum pumps or shutting them down, and collecting the sap for the day and delivering to the sugarhouse. It was Joe's job to run the sugarhouse. He kept the evaporator running and tweaking it to operate at its maximum capacity. He would draw off the finished syrup at the exact temperature needed and strain into a tank, which would then be ready to pump over into the canning tank. I loved my job, and he loved his.

Once we were done boiling for the season, then we would spend countless hours canning into various sizes of jugs and tins to case up and sell to many of our outlets we serviced in the surrounding area. We also made maple cream, maple candy, and maple granulated sugar. Each was just another process of boiling further to a different temperature.

It eventually consumed much of our time throughout the year and not just springtime. We operated from 1985 to 1996, and at the same time we were maintaining the county roads and building homes. Those 3 endeavors together became a little more than we wanted to tackle and made the decision to sell the maple

syrup business.

We still make maple syrup every year for ourselves, family and friends. Once it's in your blood, it's hard to give it up. It's still my job to maintain the teeny tiny sugar bush and Joe's job to boil the sap. Our production is now about 12/15 gallons of finished maple syrup a year. I suppose we will continue to make it each year until we are physically unable to do so.

MAIL AND FERRY UPDATES

RURAL ROUTE MAIL- Bois Blanc Island no longer uses the HCR (Highway Contract Route) designation. Instead, be sure to use just the preface "HC-1" followed by the box number: i.e., Jane Doe HC-1 Box 123 Bois Blanc Island, MI 49775 The "box number" following the HC-1 designation is not the same as a Post Office Box. Any mail sent to an HC-1 Box 123 address will be delivered to your roadside box.

GENERAL MAIL- Packages/letters with only a P.O. Box designation will be delivered their designated box at the Post Office. Anyone without a P.O. Box or roadside box can receive mail at the post office if it is addressed to the individual with the following: Name, General Delivery, Pointe aux Pins, Michigan, 49775. In order for the package/letter to be held for that person, the Post Office needs to be given notice: 231-634-7211. Individuals with this situation need to physically go to the P.O. to pick up mail. If the post office doesn't receive direct verbal instructions, the package/letter will most likely be returned to sender.

DELIVERY OF PACKAGES- FedEx, UPS and other delivery systems will deliver to the HC-1 + Box # address. If you use your HC-1 address, do not have mail sent to you in care of Plaunt Transportation, 412 Water Street, Cheboygan, MI 49721. However, if you ONLY have a Post Office box, do add a note to send it "In care of Plaunt Transportation, 412 Water Street, Cheboygan, MI 49721. This will assure delivery in the event suppliers will not deliver to a P.O. Box. Do not use your actual street address – the one on your BBI tax bill. Typically you will get notice of delivery of packages through email from the delivery service, (ie Amazon). These packages are delivered on the boat carrying mail, usually late morning. If you have something important being delivered, please call the office to make other arrangements for the delivery of your packages to the island dock. Plaunt Transportation will not typically alert recipients of packages being delivered, unless they are clearly marked "Perishable". The ferry crew will not leave any prescription drugs at the dock, they must be personally picked up. Be sure to coordinate with the pharmacy and Plaunt Transportation so you know which boat your prescription will be on.

BRINGING ITEMS ACROSS ON THE FERRY- When travelling with a passenger, groceries and luggage will not be charged; however, larger items such as lumber, flats of flowers, 100# bags of corn feed, and bicycles (not on a car rack) are considered "freight" and will require extra payment. For groceries delivered to boat without a passenger, there is a \$5.50 charge/box or bag, in addition to delivery charges by Family Fare or other local services. If what you're transporting is deemed large, like a 4-bike rack on a car, or lumber extending well beyond a truck bed, expect an extra charge. If you don't want a surprise bill, check with Plaunt Transportation before loading any larger items.

TRANSPORTING GASOLINE/FUEL- Transporting gas or fuel outside of a vehicle is prohibited (no carry on gas cans). There is a maximum of 2 fuel containers/vehicle- (this includes propane). For example: 2 gas cans, one 20# propane tank + 1 gas can, or two 20# propane tanks per vehicle.
