LITHIUM-ION BATTERY FIRES- INVEST IN EDUCATION & PROTECTIVE INFRASTRUCTURE

How many times have you heard someone in the industry say, “we need more education on lithium-ion batteries”? The hazards of lithium-ion batteries are well documented. Whether you operate a landfill, transfer station, MRF or are in the haulage space lithium-ion batteries are a concern. It only takes one battery to start a fire.

The reality of an operator is this: lithium-ion batteries will make their way to your facility and a fire is possible. How big or small the fire will vary, but it is likely that you will deal with a fire at some point. True, we need to continue to educate about lithium-ion batteries. Proper handling, recycling options, etc. Equally important is the investment in protective infrastructure to protect our workers and equipment in the event of a fire.

For operators, while budgeting and planning for a facility, consider the following:

- Educate your share or stakeholders on the dangers of lithium-ion batteries and fires.
- Public or private, budget for education AND protective equipment.
- Review multiple options to best fit your application.
- Communicate with your local fire regulatory agency.
- Investment into personnel and facility fire protection.

On the operations side, consider the following:

- Fire drills: ingress and egress, escape routes.
- Landfill fires: response plan and procedures, limitations.
- Fire extinguisher and other apparatus’ training.
- Waste/recycling truck fire procedures.
- Collaboration with local fire department: conduct facility walkthrough
