Dear Fourth Avenue UMC Friends,

***Everyone wants to play a significant role on a winning team.*** I seemed to know this instinctively as I joined Mr. Deshaies' baseball team at the ripe age of 10. In those days, my fielding was a bit suspect and my fear of being hit by a pitched ball was a barrier to overcome. And placed in right field, I was tucked away where the ball didn't often find less skilled players and the liability of my daydreaming minimized. Yet, over the years, with my coach's direction and encouragement, I overcame my fears, developed a head for the game, and practiced my way into performing at an increasingly higher level. With an enthusiasm and love for the game, lots of practice, and growing baseball instincts, I became a pretty good ballplayer. Eventually five seasons later, I did play a vital role on a championship team.

***Everyone wants to play a significant role on a winning team.*** And by the grace of God, we can all do just that. As members of the Body of Christ, we are on team Jesus. No matter how talented and ordinary we are, we have a vital role to play. Our mission is to re-present in our time and place the earthly ministry of Jesus once demonstrated powerfully in his brief life. We proclaim the good news, teach God's way, heal the sick, comfort the afflicted, set free the oppressed, respond to human need, and witness to God in Jesus' name. This big, bold mission calls us all to utilize our God-given gifts (called spiritual gifts).

What is a spiritual gift?

***A spiritual gift is a special, unique ability given by God the Holy Spirit to a Christian believer***

***for the purpose of replicating the life and ministry of Jesus in and through the Church for the sake of the world and pointing people to the greatness of God.***





The scriptures identify in several places (**1 Corinthians 12:8–10, 12:28–30, Romans 12:6–8, Ephesians 4:11, 1 Peter 4:11**) the spiritual gifts God has placed in the Body. I don't think this is an exhaustive list, but it is a good start for our prayerful consideration. As you look at the gifts, one way to organize them into at least four broad categories.

Serving Gifts  
Support Gifts  
Speaking Gifts  
Supernatural Gifts

I hope these categories will help you to prayerfully ask,  
***Lord, what is the gift that you've planted in me?  
What can I do to serve you and build up the Church?  
In this season of my life, what significant role do you want me to play  
on Team Jesus?***

I believe if you will pray that prayer each day with a readiness for God to answer, God will honor that prayer and answer it.

In addition, God calls forth his people to offer their gifts in an environment of encouragement. Let me call you to simply pay attention, to open your eyes to see what God is doing through his people. When you see someone serving, thank them. When you see someone exercising a gift that elevates the church, say something. When a person takes a risk to serve in a new way, express your delight and joy! And to keep the culture of encouragement nourished, be careful not to let a spirit of envy, criticism, or grief quench the Holy Spirit.

As we come out of the pandemic with atrophied muscles, I am praying that we will begin to seek fresh ways to be in ministry again and address human need. Toward that end, I am envisioning some ***Breakthrough Brainstorming Sessions*** where groups of five persons can gather to pray, brainstorm, and implement some action that will elevate our church's life and touch people. When you are invited to one of these sessions or hear about one, resolve now to say YES!

I know that you love Jesus. I know that you love the Church. I know it's your heart's desire to serve significantly and make a difference. I know you want to be faithful to the call of God. And you know that you have a gift to stir up and share. I believe that God is not finished using you. And I believe that God is not finished with this church. ***I know that you want to play a vital role on Team Jesus.*** And by the grace of God, we can all do just that.

For Christian teamwork, a culture of encouragement calling forth gifts, people who say "YES!" and victory in Jesus, I am sincerely yours,

## What's Happening in the UMC?

Changes are around the corner for the United Methodist Church. The UMC is expected to split into two principal denominations following its General Conference scheduled for August 29-September 6, 2022.

### When can we expect these changes?

Eventually, the Minnesota Annual Conference will need to decide with which denomination to align as will Fourth Avenue UMC. When that decision will need to be made is not clear at this time. The Church's Council and Staff-Parish Relations Committee (SPRC) have been studying the issues prayerfully and are committed to leading the congregation in this process. We are discussing and discerning the best way to keep the congregation informed and listen to the feelings of the church members. This article is the first of several articles that will be shared in the *Fourth Teller* that we hope will keep you informed about the unfolding process.

### Why is a change necessary?

In the last 50 years, the church's historic teaching on human sexuality has been called into question. The new alternative sexual ethic is being expanded to include the practice of homosexuality. The core issues at the heart of the conflict have been the authority and interpretation of scripture and a challenge to the church's historic doctrine. The lack of agreement on these core issues has resulted in sharp disagreements around the church's teaching about human sexuality and marriage, the ordination and appointment of practicing homosexuals as ministers, and whether ministers can perform same sex weddings.

### How will this happen?

Currently, two principal denominations will emerge from the split. One will be the post-separation United Methodist Church which will change the historic definition of marriage to allow for same sex couples, remove traditional barriers to the ordination and appointment of ministers in same sex relationships, and will celebrate same sex marriages. Churches that choose to remain in the UMC will need to be prepared to welcome homosexual and/or transgendered clergy. While it will inherit long-established structures, it will also assume the significant costs and concerns of maintaining the church's boards, agencies, colleges and universities. The other denomination will be the *Global Methodist Church*. It will seek to restore Methodism to its traditional biblical teachings, historic sexual ethics, and envisions a renewed Christian faith and mission. It will assume many risks in launching a new denomination, but it expects to do so as a lean institution with wide global participation. ### Has this happened in other churches?

Other church bodies in the United States have gone through similar processes in the past two decades. Those processes by and large have been messy, contentious, and costly. The United Methodist Church, however, is resolved to go through this process in a grace-filled and amicable way.

In contrast, the UMC proposed plan allows annual conferences, congregations, and pastors to choose with which branch of Methodism to align. Congregations leaving the UMC for the Global Methodist Church will retain their properties and assets and clergy pensions will be secure. Pastors and congregations will be able to minister according to their convictions.

Leaders of good will on both sides of the conflict are committed to blessing one another in the separation and collaborating where values align. They hope that the way that we conduct ourselves in our disagreements will be a witness to the world how Christians can disagree in a spirit of love. Please pray for our Church Council, SPRC, congregation, and the United Methodist Church as we approach the momentous General Conference.

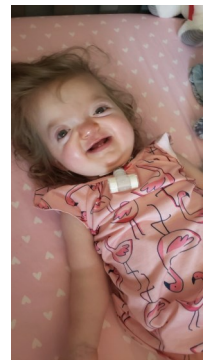

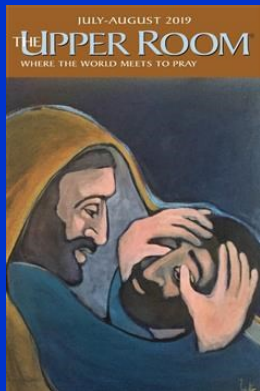


### KIDS EAT FREE
