Humble Saints, Heavenly Sent

Dear Fourth Avenue UMC Friends,

All Saints' Sunday will be celebrated this coming Sunday, November 1. The annual observance reminds us that the Christian faith is proclaimed and passed down from one generation to another mostly by "little people." What I mean by "little people" are the multitude of precious souls who will never be considered as "movers and shakers" in the Church and certainly not on the world stage. They will never be written about in the history books, yet their lives are of great significance in God's economy.

And so, the Church remembers these saints (meaning *holy ones*) because each of them revealed the light of Christ along their earthly pilgrimage and impacted people with whom they rubbed shoulders for Christ with the gospel. And now, we rejoice in their (and our) hope of eternal life through Jesus Christ. By faith, we believe they now rest from their earthly labors in the fullness of God's eternal presence. They now surround us as a great cloud of witnesses encouraging and cheering us on to run with perseverance the race of faith ever proclaiming Christ and living for him until our last breath.

On Sunday, we will remember the dearly departed souls who were part of our Fourth Avenue UMC family and died this past year. We will also lift up many treasured departed souls connected with members of our church family. Like many of you, I have lost loved ones during this stretch where Covid-19 circumstances have delayed many funerals, dampened many celebrations of life, and made travel difficult. I am thinking about my Uncle Richard, my mother's cousin Phyllis, one of my parents' dear friends Paul Ash, and a woman named Ann Horn of Brainerd who died unexpectedly in her sleep last week at the age of 55. We all keep in our memory precious souls who by God's grace made a difference in our lives. Their lives pointed us from life on earth to the promises of heaven. Most

will never be remembered in the annals of human history, yet will forever be remembered by the Author of life and the faithful people of God.

In 2012, a group of historians in Washington, DC, wanted to honor Abraham Lincoln for President's Day by building a tower of books written about the famous American president. When completed, the tower, displayed in the lobby of Ford's Theatre, was eight feet wide and three stories high—and still, it contained less than half of the books written about Lincoln.

Impressive as that may be, there is one person who has been the subject of more books than Lincoln: Jesus. And do you know why we even know anything about Jesus? It's because of his apostles, whose testimonies formed the basis of the four Gospels.

Considering Jesus' importance, you'd think we would know a lot about his apostles. But in fact, we know very little. Take, for example, Saints Simon and Jude, apostles remembered by the Church this week on October 28. If we wrote down everything we knew about them, we could maybe fill a short paragraph or two—not even close to a tower of books!

And yet, consider the effect that these two men had. Tradition holds that they traveled to Persia to spread the gospel. There, they told people about Jesus, and those people told others, who told others, and so on. The seeds they planted took root, grew, and spread throughout the region, long after they were martyred. Together with the other apostles, Simon and Jude took the message of the gospel far and wide. In fact, each of us can trace our faith, like a family tree, through the “apostles sent to us” eventually back to these early apostles.

All Saints' Sunday calls us to give thanks for the early apostles and saints as well as for the “humble saints, heavenly sent apostles” in our own lives. We will remember our parents who took you to church, the coworker who prayed with you, and the friend who encouraged you to return to the faith. We'll remember the pastor, the teacher, the mentor at school or the author of a book that helped you grow closer to Jesus. Some of these people may be remembered by history, but most won't. And that's okay. They—and you—are all important in God's plan for building his kingdom.

Here's to all of God's “little people” who in every generation have made a big difference for Christ and in our lives.





Those who want to pick up their own meals can do so between noon and 1:30 p.m. Thanksgiving Day on the south side of the Legion off of Ravine Street.




