Fish and kapenta in the lake are not a common talk among many but after touching those silent tongues its completely another story that is worth a record in memoirs.

The best meal in Kariba is obviously the Kariba Bream and with the genius touch of the chefs in the hotels and lodges around Kariba, the Kariba bream served with other dishes such as rice and sadza has always been the main headline for each and every tourist. Even the local residents are always in hot pursuit of this stomach rejuvenating meal as it tends to be more and more tasty each and every day. Though few tend to boil it, the Kariba bream is served fried and that is actually when you can get the best taste out of it. Is one of those unusual meals that brings all the human senses together and that is what really makes it an enchanting meal. The shiny golden brown colour itself makes you ponder what it will be like in your mouth leaving you salivating. With other secret additives of chefs, the nose will completely be shattered to atoms as it tries to figure out the diffusing aromatic smell. The crunchy fried fish is so brittle that it cracks audibly when it is grinded gently by the premolars giving the body goosebumps and an immense anticipation for another bite.

On the other hand, kapenta is well popularized with sadza. It can be served fresh or dried and that does not really change its cognitive attributes to the taste buds. Those small clupeids may be numerous in a dish but once they reach the mouth, they drive the taste buds crazy in one accord such a great example of unity. When they are dipped in soup it's another magical moment, they would want to swim again but this time desperately down your throat. Carps and crayfish are undoubtedly the most expensive of all the enchanting Karibean meals due to their rarity and uniqueness as they are almost identical to sea foods. It actually requires brave pockets to be able to taste this peculiar and mostly admired meal Kariba has to offer. Served with a diverse range of vegetables and any desired carbohydrate, these meals are actually worth their price. Karibean meals are always state of the art and there is no wonder many people always aspire to be in Kariba and those in Kariba always wish that they can live in Kariba for eternity only to get a chance of eating those precious delicious meals.

What is a hippo?

(amphibious) Hippopotamuses are large, semi aquatic mammals native to sub-Saharan Africa. Although their name comes from the Greek for "river horse"—because of the time they spend in the water their closest living relatives are whales, dolphins, and pigs. They can't swim, breathe underwater, or even float—but they have developed a tactic that lets them nap underwater.

These huge herbivores are known for their enormous teeth, aggressive nature, and the myth that they sweat blood. Here's what you need to know about one of Africa's most dangerous animals.

Appearance

Hippos are the world's third-largest land mammals after elephants and white rhinos. Males can reach lengths of 10.8 to 16.5 feet, and weigh up to 9,920 pounds, while females weigh up to 3,000 pounds.

These muscular animals have round torsos and pinkish brown bodies with two-inchthick, waterproof skin, and short, stout legs. They might not look aerodynamic, but hippos can reach speeds of up to 22 miles per hour on land over short distances.

Hippos have impressive teeth inside their huge mouths. Their molars are used for eating while their long, sharp canines—which can reach 20 inches—are for fighting. Their 180 degrees and their bite is nearly three times stronger than a lion's. One bite from a hippo can cut a human body in half.

Life in the water

Hippos live in waterways such as rivers, lakes, and mangroves. Their skin may be thick but it is extremely sensitive and can easily burn or dry out in the fierce African sun. So, they spend most of their day in the water or mud to keep cool, wet, and protect their delicate skin.

When basking on the shore, they secrete an oily red sweatlike substance that moistens their skin, repels water, and protects them from the sun and germs. This reddish liquid is behind the myth that hippos sweat blood.

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lippos cannot swim or ÷ breathe underwater, and unlike most mammals they are so dense that they cannot float. Instead, they walk or run along the bottom of the riverbed. Because their eyes and nostrils are located on the top of their heads, they can still see and breathe while underwater. When totally submerged, the ears and nostrils shut tight to keep the water out, and hippos can hold their breath for five minutes.

Hippos often nap in the water during the daytime. A subconscious reflex allows them to push themselves to the surface to breathe without waking up so they can sleep without drowning. At sunset, they leave the water to graze, eating up to 110 pounds of grass each night.

Aggression and dominance

hese social animals live in groups called herds or pods, which typically include around 40 individuals or as many 200. They are highly territorial, and use dung middens-an area where they repeatedly poop—to mark their territory and communicate with other hippos. Males will use their tail to flick their dung in all directions as a display of dominance.

Although hippos are vegetarian, they can be aggressive when they sense dangersuch as when something, or someone, encroaches on their habitat—and their deadly strength makes them one of Africa's most dangerous animals

The likelihood you will die in **Threats to survival** a hippo encounter (86.7 percent) is higher than that of lions (75 percent) and sharks (25 percent). While the number of human deaths from hippos is unknown, it could be as many as 500 to 3,000 each year.

Reproduction

Females reach sexual maturity around the age of 10. Gestation lasts eight months, and they give birth to one calf every two years. Hippos mate and give birth in the water.


Weighing nearly a hundred pounds at birth, newborn hippos can hold their breath for 90 seconds. Once mother and calf have bonded, they join schools of other hippos for protection against predators. The calf stays with its mother until around seven years old.

The International Union for Conservation of Nature classifies hippos as vulnerable to extinction. Although the hippopotamus doesn't have many predators, it is threatened by poaching for its meat, fat, and ivory teeth. Other threats include the loss of its habitat and human-hippo conflicts. Because the species is slow to reproduce, threats can significantly impact population numbers.

DID YOU KNOW?

Drug lord Pablo Escarole is responsible for a growing population of hippos in Colombia after four hippos escaped from his personal zoo and started breeding. There are now around a hundred of these so-called "cocaine hippos" in the wild.

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

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WHAT IS ZTA?






Kariba have been always known as the best get away place when it comes to all wonders of nature, beauty, adventure and the best tourism destination.




for visitors looking for a good time. Parasailing is one of those recreational options for adventure seekers. Live on the wild side a bit and enjoy a unique way to see the beauty of Lake Kariba.

Enjoy a non-conventional form of Parasailing whereby the participant is attached to a hydraulic winch, the shoot is deployed behind the boat, you are then attached to the shoot via a harness and a hydraulic winch lets you out from a deck at the back of the boat. After the flight, the winch draws you back onto the deck again alleviating the need for a traditional parasail where you would land into the water.



he activity is available all year round and is dependent on weather conditions. No experience is required, ideally, the participants should be 12 years or older special concessions can be made for younger children if they are accompanied by an adult and participate via tandem flight. Participants will soar over the lake for up to 80 metres. It takes about one hour and fifteen minutes for the experience. Guests are encouraged to bring the following protective gear Sun Hat, sunglasses, and sunscreen.




lephants are the largest land mammals on earth and have distinctly massive bodies, large ears, and long trunks. They use their trunks to pick up objects, trumpet warnings, greet other elephants, or suck up water for drinking or bathing, among other uses. Both male and female African elephants grow tusks and each individual can either be left- or right-tusked, and the one they use more is usually smaller because of wear and tear. Elephant tusks serve many purposes. These extended teeth can be used to protect the elephant's trunk, lift and move objects, gather food, and strip bark from trees. They can also be used for defense. During times of drought, elephants even use their tusks to dig holes to find water underground.

Two genetically different African species exist: the savanna elephant and the forest elephant, with a number of characteristics that differentiate them both. The African savanna elephant is the largest elephant species, while the Asian forest elephant and the African forest elephant are of a comparable, smaller size.

sian elephants differ in several ways from their African relatives, with more than 10 distinct physical differences between them. For example, Asian elephants' ears are smaller compared to the large fan-shaped ears of the African species. Only some male Asian elephants have tusks, while both male and female African elephants grow tusks. Led by a matriarch, elephants are organized into complex social structures of females and calves, while male elephants tend to live in isolation or in small bachelor groups. A single calf is born to a female once every four to five years and after a gestation period of 22 months—the longest of any mammal. Calves are cared for by the entire herd of related females. Female calves may stay with their maternal herd for the rest of their lives, while males leave the herd as they reach puberty. Forest elephants' social groups differ slightly and may be comprised of only an adult female and her offspring. However, they may congregate in larger groups in forest clearings

where resources are more abundant.

Elephants need extensive land areas to survive and meet their ecological needs, which includes food, water, and space. On average, an elephant can feed up to 18 hours and consume hundreds of pounds of plant matter in a single day. Karibean elephant falls under savanna specie but different in terms of their behaviour. They have been coexistence with people which resulted in human animal conflicts. This resulted in an otherwise behaviour of elephants and they started to kill people. The number of death toll caused by elephants continue to rise each year and it shows the sour relationship of wildlife and human beings

It's another story for people who are thriving through throwing. Fishing in Kariba is a source of income as well as protein. Some people are involved in kapenta business to feed their families and a catch is a big deal. Therefore, overall making fishing very significant in Kariba. Lake Kariba is 300 km long and covers an area of 5,000 square kms. This vast expanse of fresh water is home to some fantastic species of fish including the Tiger fish, Bream, Tilapia, Catfish, Barbel, Labeo, Jack and the mighty Vundu, that commonly attains the size of a fully grown man. The Tiger fish is responsible for the now world renowned 'Tiger Fish Tournament' that is held every year on the lake in October.

Tiger fish are considered by many to be one of the most exciting game fish (pound for pound) and they have flourished in the rich waters of Lake Kariba with the average weight caught in competition being just under eight pounds. The speed, courage and strength of the tiger fish make it a worthy opponent for the skillful angler.

Safaris on Lake Kariba are usually conducted from a houseboat with this platform providing ample opportunity to fish for tiger and bream or just to kick back, relax and do some leisurely game viewing along the lake shores.

Tiger Fish

The Tiger fish has been officially recognized by the International Game Fishing Association as a game fish and a world renown tournament is held annually on Lake Kariba. The most rewarding Tiger fishing ground is the Masuna area along the Zambezi River, mainly during the months of October through to December. The Tiger is best caught with Kapenta, but will also take other fish fillets, lures and spinners. It can be caught along the dead tree lines in underwater features such as holes, drop-offs and ridges. It can also be found in river estuaries and off weed beds.

Bream

(Oreochromis Mortimer)

The Kariba bream is easily recognizable with olive green blotches and/or bands on its back and side. They are usually caught at around 2kg and make up a large percentage commercial catch on the lake. The bream mainly feed amongst weed beds along the dead tree lines and are a popular angling fish caught on worm.
