Dear Fellow Villagers:

With spring approaching, we would like to address the recent issues related to frozen water pipes. February was particularly challenging, and Maintenance assisted in defrosting pipes **as a courtesy**. Please note that this service is not part of CVA's responsibility.

These efforts have had a significant impact on the budget due to overtime costs and the purchase of heaters used in utility rooms. After-hours service requires a minimum of two hours of overtime pay, and in one instance, the Maintenance Supervisor worked more than ten hours in a single day. These costs ultimately affect all residents, and the Board remains committed to managing expenses responsibly.

Going forward, Maintenance will address frozen pipe issues during regular work hours when possible. However, after-hours or weekend service calls for frozen pipes will incur a \$100 charge to the owner.

Residents are encouraged to help prevent frozen pipes by allowing faucets to drip and keeping utility rooms adequately heated with a small space heater. Please note that CVA is responsible only for the sewer mainline, which would be indicated by a toilet backup.

Plans are underway for the Annual St. Patrick's Day Luncheon. The date is scheduled for Sunday, March 15, 2026. Coffee and dessert will, of course, be served. Dancers from Daly School of Irish Dance will also be there to provide entertainment.

The Office is open Monday through Friday from 8:00 am until 3:00 pm. For an emergency, call the emergency number – 732-425-2011. **Calls to the office over the weekend will be returned on Monday.**

The storm in January was a surprise and difficult for everyone. That amount of snow has not been seen for several years. Everyone was inconvenienced. It was disheartening to deal with some of the calls, messages, and angry residents at the window. The women in the office were subject to rude, nasty, and vulgar remarks. The first day of spring, also known as the spring equinox, has deep roots in history, culture, and science. It marks the moment when the Sun crosses the celestial equator, resulting in nearly equal daylight and nighttime hours across the globe. This phenomenon occurs around March 19-21 in the Northern Hemisphere and September 21-23 in the Southern Hemisphere.

The arrival of spring has been celebrated for thousands of years in various cultures:

- Pagan and Neolithic Traditions – Ancient civilizations, including the Celts and Druids, recognized the equinox as a time of balance and renewal. Megalithic structures like Stonehenge in England and Chichen Itza in Mexico align with the equinox, suggesting their importance in early astronomy and agriculture.
- Persian Nowruz (New Year) – Celebrated for over 3,000 years, Nowruz marks the beginning of the Persian calendar and is still observed today across Iran and Central Asia. Rooted in Zoroastrian traditions, it symbolizes rebirth and new beginnings.
- Japanese Shunbun no Hi – In Japan, the equinox is a national holiday where families visit graves, clean their homes, and honor nature, reflecting Buddhist and Shinto influences.
- Christian and Easter Connections – The equinox plays a role in determining the date of Easter, which falls on the first Sunday after the first full moon following the spring equinox.

Today, the first day of spring is still a time for festivals, gardening, and symbolic fresh starts. Whether celebrated through traditional rituals, personal reflections, or outdoor activities, it remains a moment to welcome nature's renewal.

## **RECYCLABLES & TOWNSHIP INFO**

### **RECYCLABLES PICK-UP DATES:**

**March 2, March 16 & March 30**

If the recyclable date falls on a Monday holiday, the pickup will be on the following Saturday. Recyclables should be put out the night before, after 4:30 PM. In the Gettysburgs, please place them in the walkway between the cars near the street and **keep them outside, rain or shine**. If recyclables are not picked up, call (800) 488-6242.

**Please follow these rules:**

### **DO NOT PUT RECYCLABLES IN PLASTIC BAGS. USE YOUR RECYCLE BINS.**

**RECYCLE ONLY:** Aluminum cans, clean glass bottles and jars, steel and tin cans, plastic bottles with a #1, #2 & #5 on the bottom, newspapers, corrugated cardboard (boxes must be flattened and tied), and mixed paper (magazines, paper, and junk mail).

**ITEMS NOT FOR RECYCLING: PIZZA BOXES, STYROFOAM, ELECTRONICS OR BATTERIES, SHREDDED PAPER, CERAMICS/DISHWARE, PAINT, POTS & PANS, OR PLASTIC BAGS.**

Recyclable buckets can be purchased at the Old Bridge Town Center for \$10.00. New residents (within a year of occupancy) can get them free, if available.

Do not put recyclables in the garbage as there are strict rules about this from the State EPA. Garbage collectors are not allowed to pick up recyclables so please be aware of this.

**White Appliances (microwaves, refrigerators, dishwashers, or stoves):**  
**Schedule pick up for these items at Old Bridge Recycling (732) 721-5600 Ext. 6107 and they will advise of the pickup date, cost, and procedure.**

## **IMPORTANT UPDATE**

**MAINTENANCE FEE:** Since July 1, 2025, the maintenance fee is **\$215**. It is due the first of each month. No statement is sent unless it has not been paid by the 15<sup>th</sup>, at which time a \$25. late fee is charged. The check must be **received in the Office by the 15<sup>th</sup> of the month to avoid the late fee**. Do not post-date your check.

**If you are still writing a check for the maintenance fee, please make sure your unit address is on the check and print the amount very carefully.**

Call the office and leave a message if you are having difficulty in paying your monthly maintenance fee.

## **GARBAGE PICKUP INFORMATION**

The garbage pickup days are **TUESDAYS** and **FRIDAYS**. If either day falls on a holiday, then garbage will be picked up on the following pickup day.

**Garbage:** Must be in the green receptacle. Overflow should be on top of receptacle. **Bulk pickup:** Call Suburban Disposal, Inc. (732) 659-9020 or email [Notifysdimc@gmail.com](mailto:Notifysdimc@gmail.com) for further information. Please note there is a charge for this service.

## **DO'S & DON'TS IN A SNOWSTORM**

- Please stay indoors as much as possible during snowy weather. If you must go outdoors, be careful as it gets very slippery when temperatures drop.
- **AT THE ONSET OF SNOW, REMOVE YOUR DOOR MATS AND DOG CHAINS FROM THE GROUND BECAUSE THEY DISABLE THE SNOWBLOWERS.**
- All main roads are initially plowed by the township.
- **Emergency areas will be plowed first.**
- Our landscape company provides the Village with the staff to shovel snow from pavements and walkways only. They will be wearing fluorescent green or yellow vests. (Please do not ask them to shovel out your car.)
- Salt will be available at the Office. Pick up 3 bags per unit to start.
- Anyone needing help, please call the office.
- **Please be patient.**

## FROM THE BOARD

### **SEWER BACKUP PROBLEMS**

If you experience a toilet backup in your unit, Cheesequake Village Association policy requires that you **contact the office first**—or use the emergency number after hours:

**(732) 425-2011.**

Our Maintenance Staff is available full-time, with someone on call 24/7. A staff member will attempt to clear the blockage. If it's found in the main sewer line, the staff will call a company like A-General to resolve the issue, and the Association will cover the cost. **However, if you hire a plumber before giving the Association a chance to address the problem, you will be responsible for the bill.**

This procedure applies only to toilet backups, not to kitchen sinks or washing machines. Only toilet paper should be flushed; do **not** flush grease, wipes of any kind, rags, paper towels, tissues, or diapers. If any of these items are traced back to your unit, you will be held liable for repair costs.

Do not use baking soda and vinegar in your drains, as they can form clogs similar to those caused by powdered detergents. Instead, use products like ZEP or PEQUA, which are available at Home Depot.

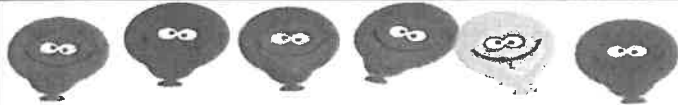

### **Footsteps in History by CVA Trustee James Nolan Episode 30 – March 2026 –**

#### **Early Cheesequake Village History**

Most historians agree that the word "Cheesequake," derives from the Native Lenape word "Cheseh-oh-ke," meaning land where uplands meet the lowlands, or place where dry ground meets marsh. This describes the geography where hilly hardwood forests sit above the surrounding salt marshes and bay, which can be seen within Cheesequake State Park today. For centuries, this area had been inhabited by the southern branch of the Lenape people who called their homeland "Lenapehoking." They lived in small villages of extended families, with a matriarchal society that centered around wigwam homes, with a daily diet of corn, beans, and squash. They hunted deer, turkey, and small game, and caught oysters, clams, and fish from Raritan Bay and local streams. They believed in Manitou, a spiritual force present in all things.

Before Cheesequake Village was built during 1968-1974, the area was a quiet countryside interspaced by spread-out farmhouses. Most properties had barns, sheds, and vegetable gardens, with chickens and small livestock. The subsoil underneath Cheesequake Village is one of accumulated deposits of clay, silt, and sand. Some early landowners were: the Thomas Warne family, who very early English landowners during the late 1600's; the David Owens family, who lived near Cheesequake Creek during the 1730's; the Davis Hall family, who lived on the road from Cheesequake to Matawan during the early and late 1800's; and the Cottrell Family, who were agricultural producers living around Route 516 and Cottrell Road. Other family names prominent in the area were Wood, Furman, Burlew, Buckelew, Gordon, Hillier, Wright, Clark, Seaman, Provost, Bennett, and Bloodgood.

So, when you open your door and step outside, it is possible you are treading on a former Native American wigwam, or a 19<sup>th</sup> century farm – thoughts to consider!



## THE SHAMROCK: A TIMELESS EMBLEM OF IRELAND

The word **shamrock** originates from the Irish word *seamrog*, meaning "little clover." It refers to a species of clover with three leaves, often identified as **Trifolium dubium** or **Trifolium repens**. While there is no definitive evidence confirming which exact plant was originally considered the shamrock, historical records from as early as the 16<sup>th</sup> century mention it as a symbol linked to Ireland.

The most famous legend associated with the shamrock dates back to **St. Patrick**, the patron saint of Ireland. In the 5<sup>th</sup> century, St. Patrick was instrumental in converting the Irish people from paganism to Christianity. According to legend, he used the shamrock to illustrate the concept of the **Holy Trinity** – the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit – while preaching to the Irish Celts. The three-leaf clover became a powerful religious symbol and was subsequently adopted as a sacred representation of Irish Christianity.

Though no historical document from St. Patrick's time confirms this specific story, the connection between shamrock and Irish religious identity has persisted through the centuries. By the 17<sup>th</sup> century, the shamrock had become firmly linked to Ireland, particularly in association with St. Patrick's Day, celebrated annually on March 17<sup>th</sup>.

During St. Patrick's era, Ireland was a land of Druids and Celtic polytheism, where nature played an essential role in religious practices. Sacred trees, stones, and plants were believed to hold mystical powers. The Celts revered the number three (3), seeing it as a symbol of harmony and balance, which explains why the three-leafed shamrock resonated so strongly with both Christian and pre-Christian traditions.

As Christianity spread across Ireland, it intertwined with existing folklore and beliefs, allowing symbols like this one to bridge the gap between old traditions and new religious teachings.

Despite centuries of change, the shamrock remains one of Ireland's most cherished symbols. Every year, it plays a central role in St. Patrick's Day celebrations, both in Ireland and across the world.

It continues to be a powerful symbol of unity, faith, and Irish heritage, embodying the spirit of a nation that has endured hardship and flourished through resilience and cultural pride.

## **REMINDERS**

**SELLING YOUR UNIT:** If you are selling your unit, it is **mandatory** that you contact the office to inform us of the sale. There is paperwork that needs to be completed and the unit's files in the office need to be updated.

**ALTERATION FORMS:** It is imperative that Alteration forms be submitted to the Office for any renovations to the unit. We are required to keep updated records on all units in the Village. Alteration forms will **NOT** be accepted for electrical or plumbing projects without a copy of the electrician's or plumber's valid license and insurance attached.

**PARKING PERMIT STICKERS:** Every car parked in the Village **MUST** have a parking sticker. Bring your car to the Office with your license and registration. This is mandatory. If you receive a letter about getting a permit, you must reply within 10 days, or you will be fined.

**DOGS ON EXTENDED LEASHES:** Please be mindful of other people when using extended leashes for your dogs or cats. Your neighbors can easily trip on them. Better yet, try not using them at all because Old Bridge rule allows for only 6-foot-long leashes!!

**DOG & CAT OWNERS:** Dog droppings are still an issue. By law, you must pick up after your pet. If you are observed not picking up after your pet, you will be fined. **CHANGES IN UNITS:** As equipment has been changed (Ex: Furnaces, air conditioners, windows), new situations have arisen. When contractors add or change equipment, be advised that these changes created by your contractor are your responsibility and must be maintained by you and be added to your insurance policy. You must apply for an alteration permit from the CVA and from Old Bridge Township before making changes to your unit. Failure to do so will generate a fine.

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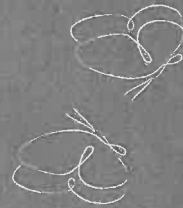
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
