Countrywide Incidents for the Week

2. 3 IED attacks by terrorists were reported in Borno state.
3. Bandits kidnap several individuals in Sokoto state.
4. Several protests were held in parts of the South West region.

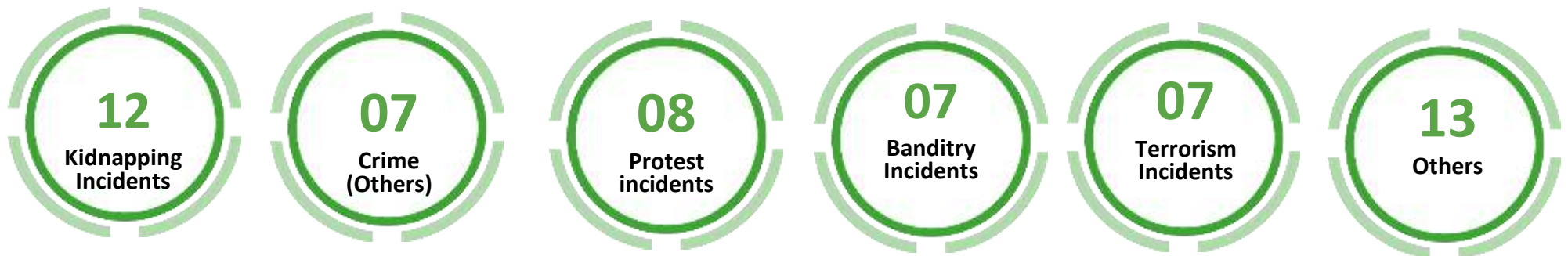


Figure 1. Incident map

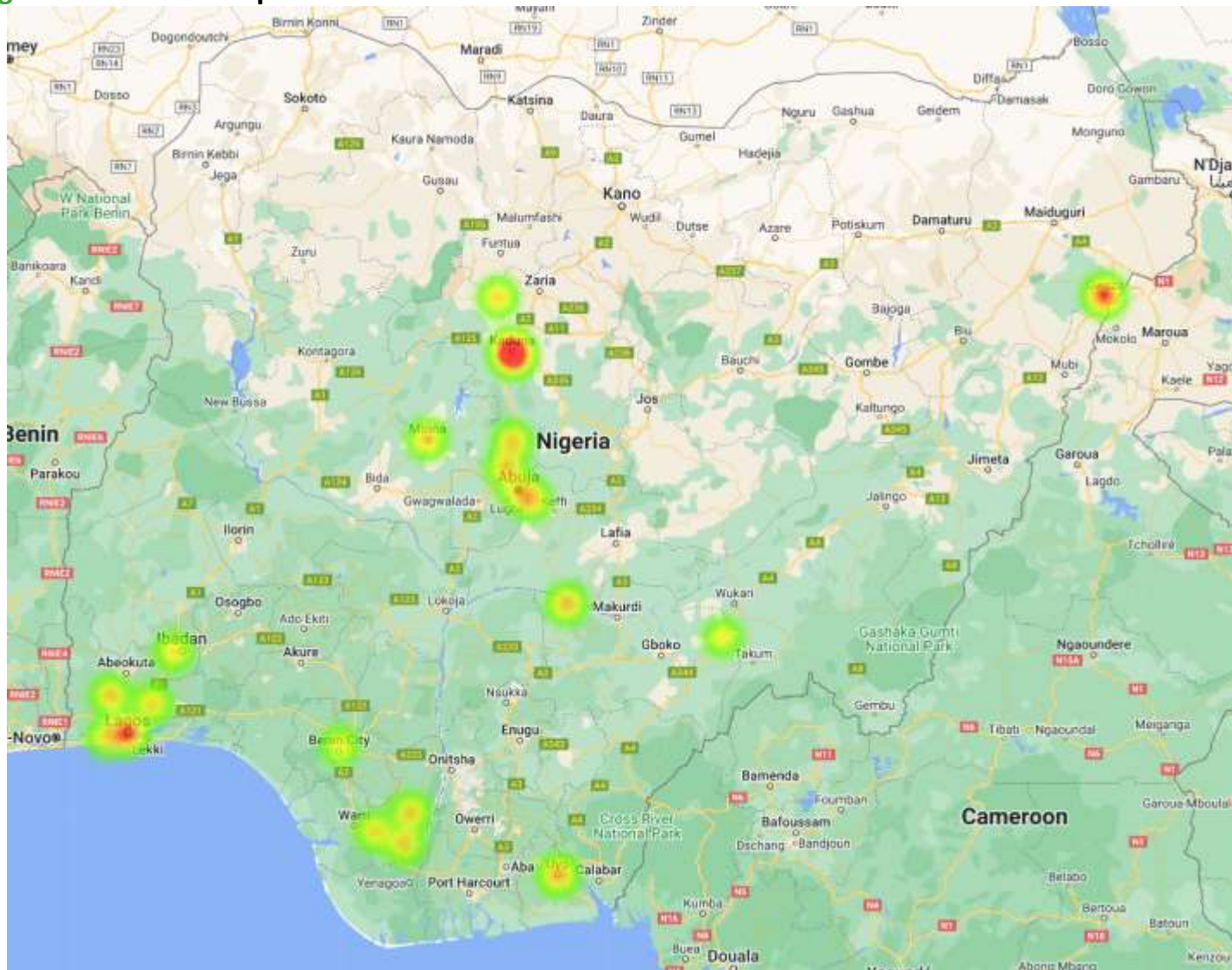


Figure 2. Graph portraying incident types per region

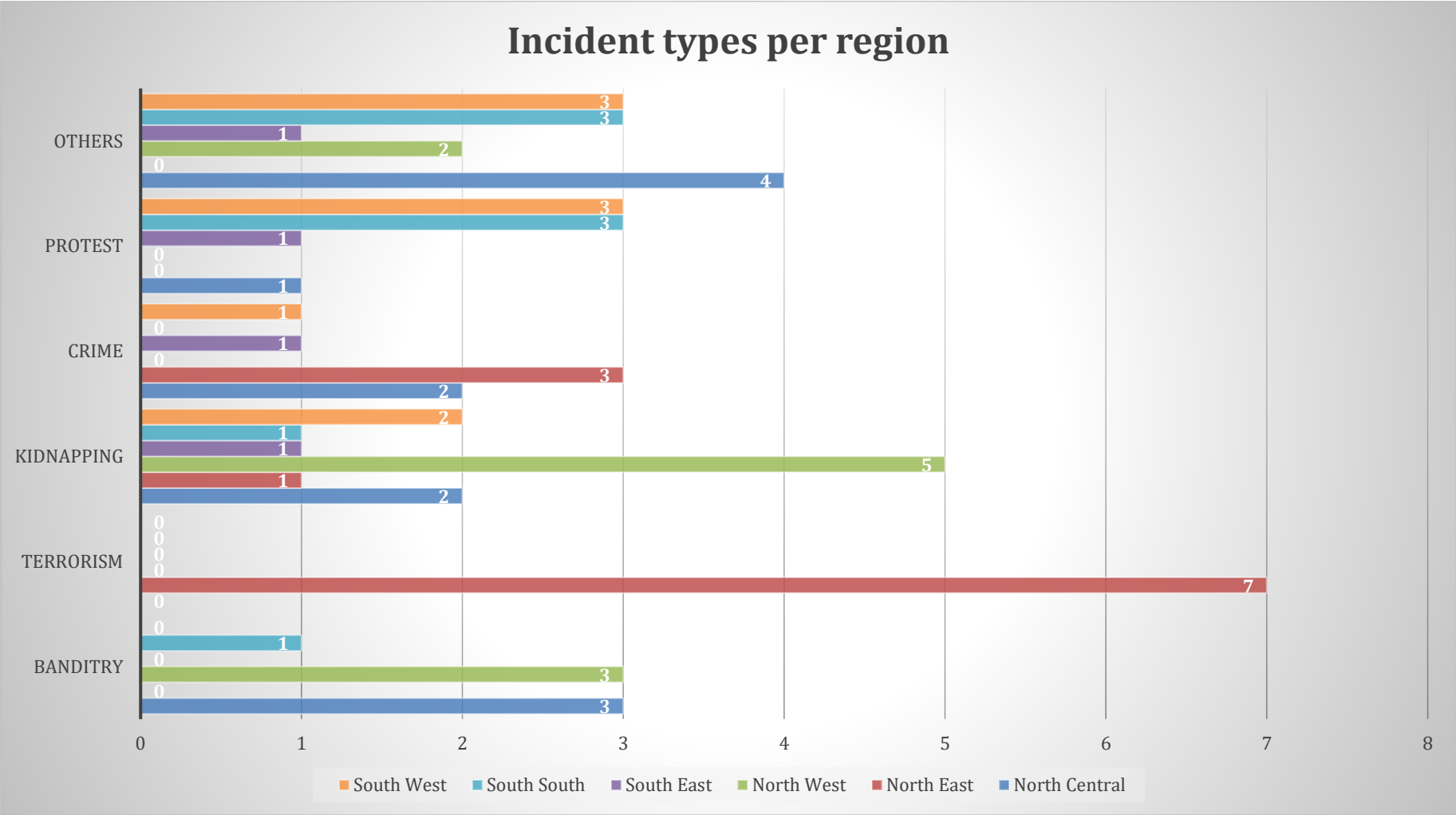

Risk map showing kidnapped victims

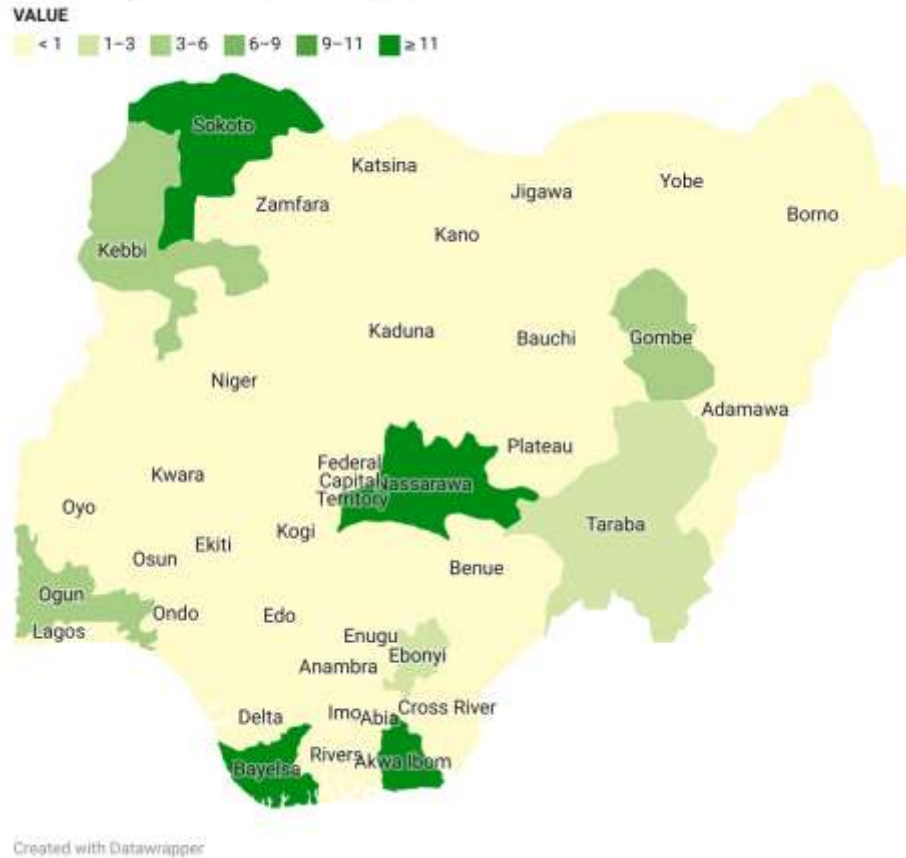
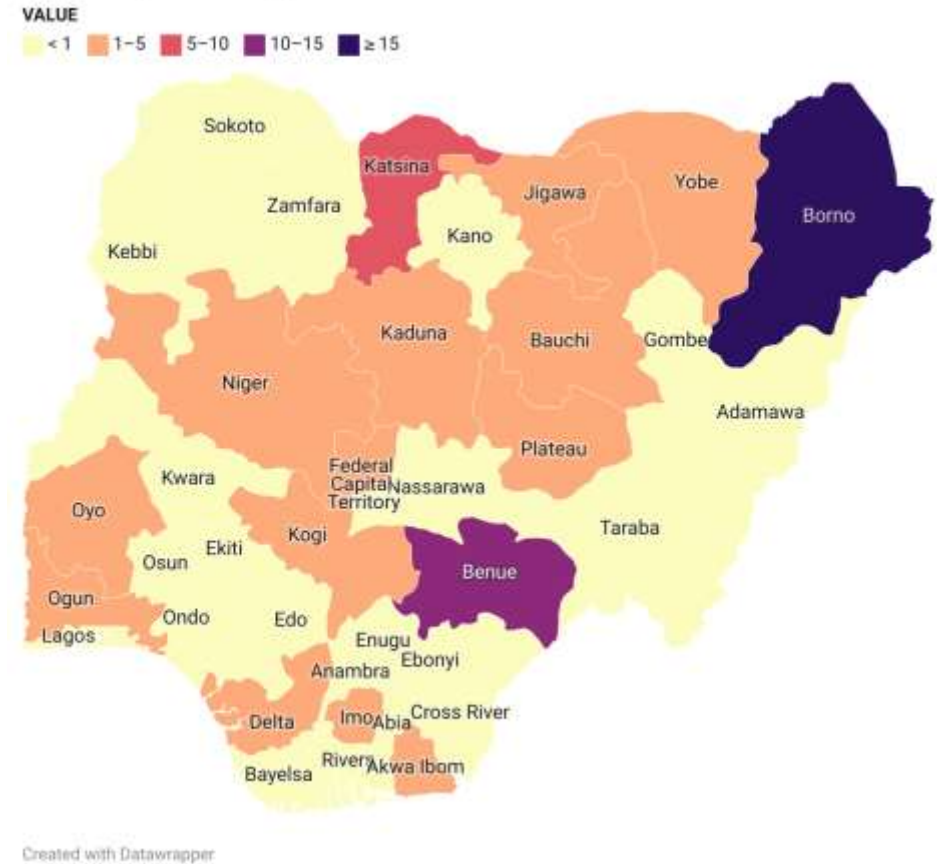

Regional fatalities/kidnapped victims

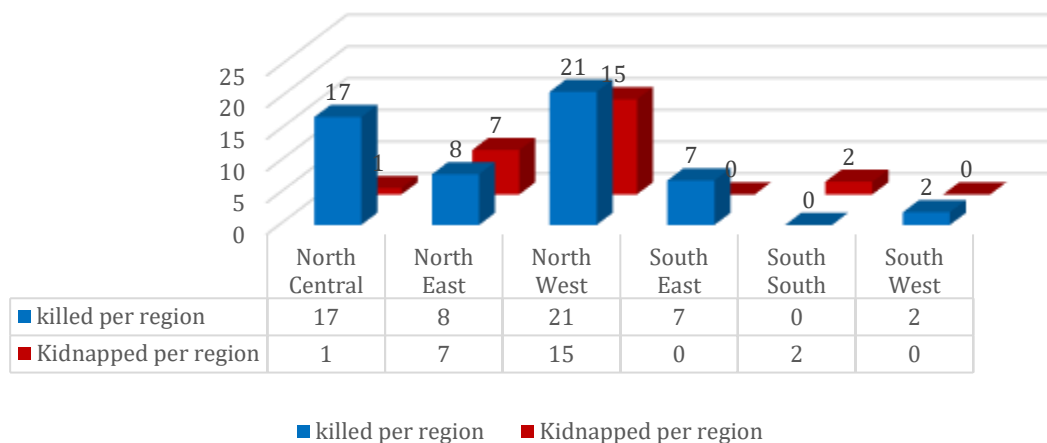
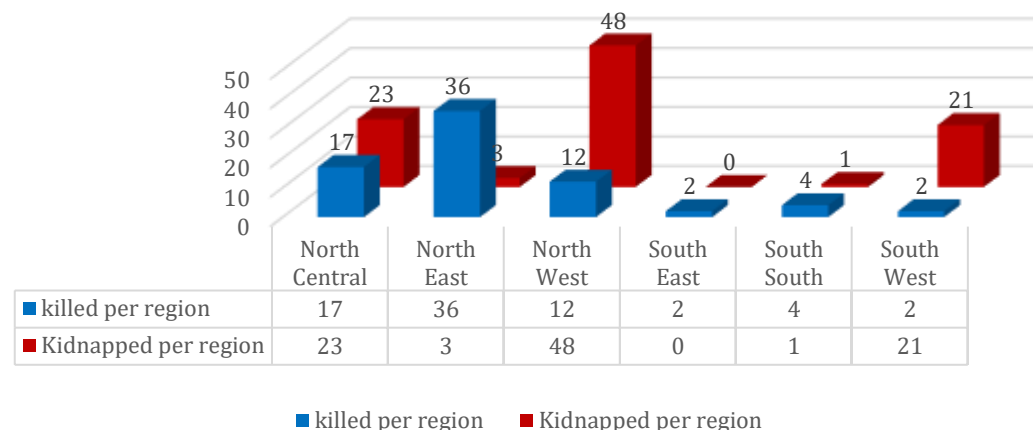


Figure 6. Week 27

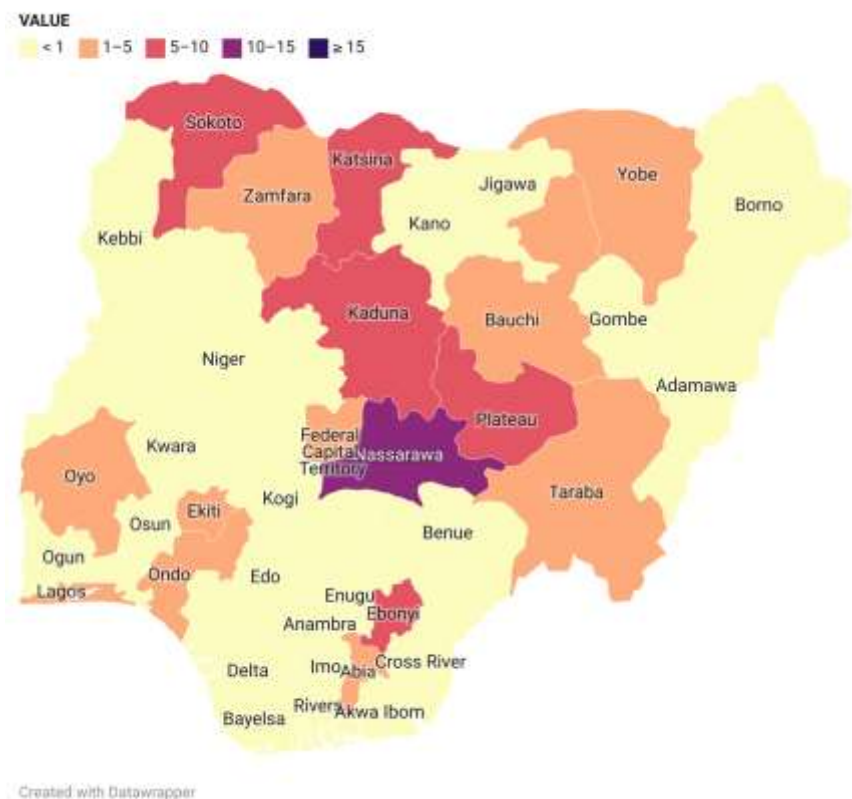
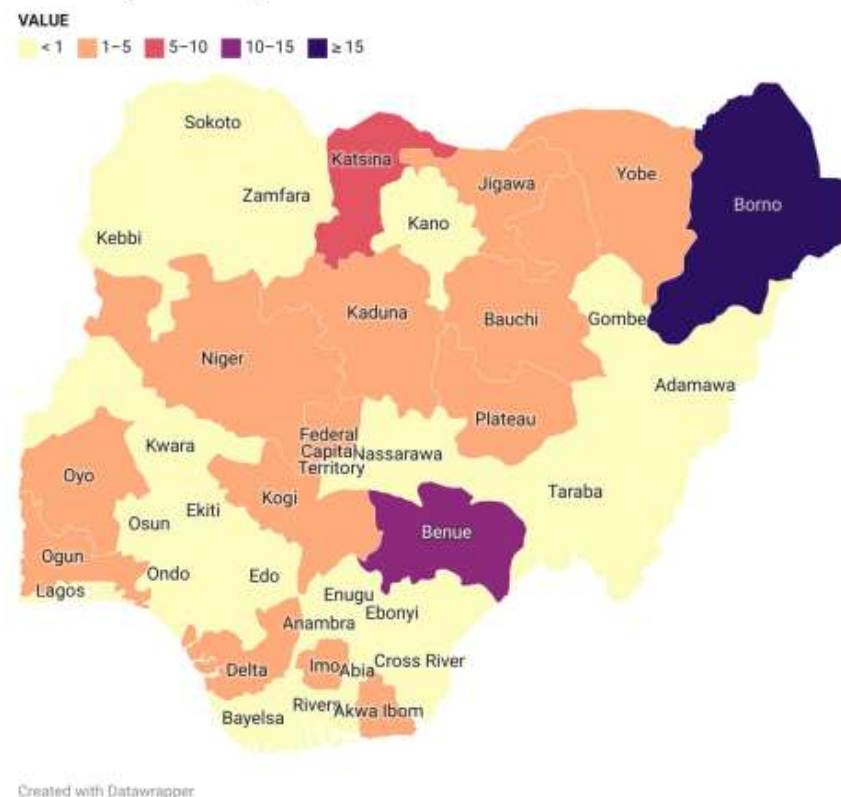


Figure 8. Week 27

The contrast between week 26 and week 27 helps spot the progression of conflict-related fatalities and shows areas where fatalities occurred the most and least. The color intensity and lightness depict areas with the least and most fatalities. Based on the above map, there was an overall increase in fatalities, with Borno and Benue state having the most fatalities nationwide.

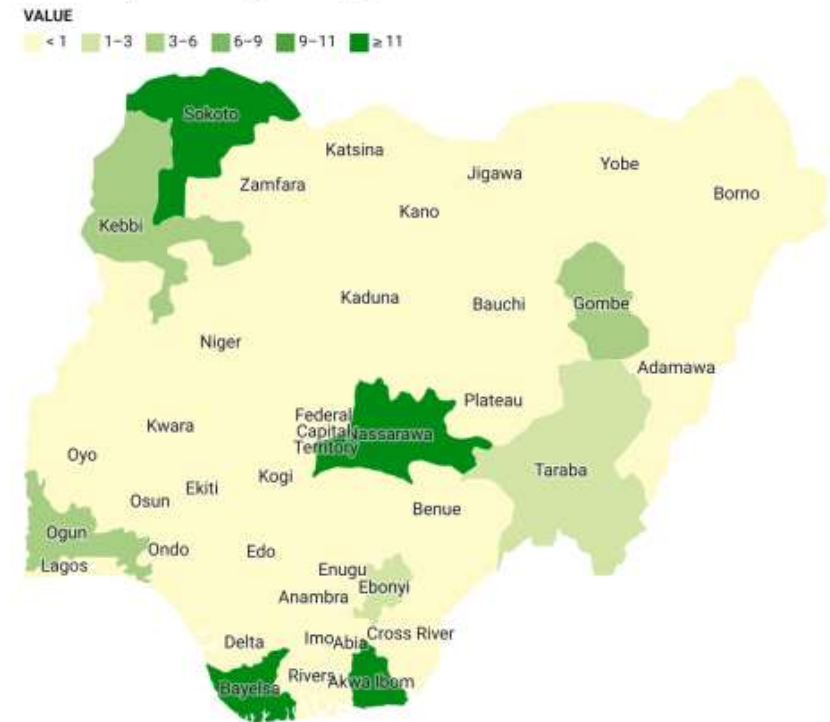

The above figure captures areas where victims fall into kidnapping threats the most or least. In week 27, most kidnapped victims were from Sokoto, Nasarawa, Bayelsa, and Akwa Ibom states State. This is most likely because kidnap incidents were underreported in other states during the week.

Regional Summary/Incident list

NORTH CENTRAL (NC) - Summary

Analysis – During the week, the number of fatalities stayed the same as the previous week, with 17 fatalities recorded, while the count of kidnapping victims increased, with over 23 victims.

The North Central region experienced a slight increase in reported incidents, from 08 the previous week to 12 this week. Key threats like herdsmen attacks, kidnappings, cult clashes, and protests remain significant concerns. The North Central region of Nigeria has seen a notable rise in gang violence and armed attacks. These incidents typically involve confrontations between rival gangs or assaults on villages and towns, leading to significant casualties and property damage. States like Benue, Nasarawa, and Kogi are particularly affected. The escalation of such violent activities highlights the urgent need for enhanced law enforcement and community engagement to mitigate the threat and restore peace.

The North Central region has experienced numerous protests, often driven by socio-economic grievances or political issues. Cities like Jos, Minna, and Lokoja have seen demonstrations, some of which have escalated into violent confrontations with security forces. In response, government security operations aimed at quelling protests or addressing insurgent activities can sometimes lead to further unrest and human rights concerns.

Kidnappings for ransom are a pervasive security challenge in the North Central region. This crime targets individuals from various demographics, including students, businesspeople, and ordinary citizens. High-profile abductions, particularly in states like Niger and Kogi, have garnered national attention. During the reporting week, over 23 individuals were kidnapped in Abuja and Kogi state.

NORTH CENTRAL (NC) – Incident List

05 July 2024 – Three persons were shot, and properties destroyed during a violent clash stemming from a long-standing land dispute between the Katakpa and Elegi communities in Ebbo Gbacinku ward of Lapai Local Government Area of Niger State.

05 July 2024 – Armed robbers on Friday attacked a road safety officer, simply identified as Abu, who was coming from a bank and heading towards his house at Zango in Lokoja, Kogi State. Abu was disposed of yet to be ascertained sum of money by the armed robbers after firing several shots at him.

03 July 2024 – On Monday night, a group of unidentified armed individuals killed six people IVO Ayati settlement in Ukum LGA, Benue state.

03 July 2024 – On Monday night, a group of unidentified armed individuals killed six people in Ayati settlement, Ukum LGA, Benue state. Consequently, some residents in protest brought the bodies of the victims to the Zaki Biam Council Secretariat and set multiple buildings on fire. Security operatives, in their effort to forestall further destruction while firing SAF, incidentally killed two people from stray bullets.

03 July 2024 – According to reports, passengers of an 18-seater bus en route from Edo State to Abuja were attacked and kidnapped by unidentified armed individuals suspected to be bandits at Okene LGA, Kogi State.

03 July 2024 – An unidentified motorcycle robber was mobbed to death by alleged angry commercial motorcyclists, popularly known as Okada riders, in the Karshi area of the nation's capital, Abuja, on Wednesday night. The motorcycle robber allegedly snatched a motorcycle from an Okada rider but ran out of luck when other Okada riders mobilized, chased, and caught him, mobbing him to death in the process.

03 July 2024 – As part of efforts to rid the nation's capital of criminality, operatives of the FCT Police Command from the Utako division, acting on credible intelligence, trailed and arrested five notorious kidnappers at Gwagwa and Dei-Dei on the outskirts of Abuja.

02 July 2024 – Operatives of "Operation Zenda" of the State Police Command raided the hideout of suspected bandits IVO Tse Uza, Katsina-Ala lga of Benue state. Sources disclosed that the bandits engaged the SF in a gun duel and two bandits were neutralized while others escaped with gunshot injuries. Two pistols loaded with ammunition, three locally-made short guns, 13 motorcycles, camouflage uniforms, six walkie-talkies, a Toyota Corolla, and a tricycle were recovered.

01 July 2024 – Members of the "Aye" cult gangs attempted to attack a "Vikings" cult member in the Zarmaganda area, Jos South LGA, Plateau state. The "Vikings" cult member was not at home at the time of the attack, however, his wife's shop was vandalized.

01 July 2024 – Three persons from the Agagbe Internally Displaced Persons camp have been killed by suspected armed herders while returning from their farms in Gwer West lga of Benue state.

30 June 2024 – Four persons were reportedly kidnapped in the Guto village of Bwari Area Council by unknown persons who killed one of the victims. The SF reportedly rescued two people.

29 June 2024 – SF operatives were accused of killing a 23-year-old herder during an operation IVO Donkasa community in Jos North Local Government Area, Plateau state. The Nigerian Army set up a panel to investigate the alleged incident.

NORTH EAST (NE) - Summary

Analysis – There was an overall increase in the number of fatalities as 36 persons were killed while kidnapped victims decreased slightly to 3 victims as compared to the previous month.

The region experienced 11 major incidents this week, which is the same as last week. Patterns of incidents include bandit and terrorist attacks, murder, kidnapping, and criminal incidents. The North-East region of Nigeria continues to grapple with violent attacks perpetrated by the Islamic State West Africa Province (ISWAP) and other armed groups. On 4 July 2024, suspected ISWAP fighters attacked Dabi village near Sansan village, in Mobbar LGA, Borno State, killing three people and abducting two others. Similarly, on 2 July 2024, ISWAP elements kidnapped a farmer near Awulari village, north of Bama LGA, Borno State, demanding a ransom that was partially paid. In another incident, suspected ISWAP members killed a civilian in Buniyadi town, Yobe State, and on 30 June 2024, ISWAP members raided Bultram Community in Yobe State, looting and causing structural damage.

High-impact terrorist activities have devastating effects on communities in the North-East. On 29 June 2024, Gwoza LGA witnessed a series of bombings carried out by young females with IEDs, resulting in 26 deaths and 54 injuries. These coordinated attacks targeted a wedding reception, a burial site, and a hospital, causing widespread fear and trauma. Furthermore, on 30 June 2024, an IED explosion in the Baga Road area, Borno State, killed four people. Such incidents underscore the lethal capabilities of terrorist groups and the critical need for enhanced counter-terrorism measures, community resilience programs, and comprehensive support for affected populations.

Various forms of localized violence and security incidents also plague the region. On 29 June 2024, a mob in Bauchi Metropolis lynched a local hunter mistaken for an armed robber, revealing deep-seated mistrust and vigilantism. On the same day, a security guard was arrested for theft by vigilante operatives in Bauchi. Additionally, a secondary school teacher in Government Science Secondary School Donga was stabbed by a new student recruit's brother, underscoring the tensions within educational institutions. These incidents point to the broader issues of law enforcement, community relations, and the need for systemic improvements in handling local disputes and crime.

NORTH EAST (NE) – Incident List

04 July 2024 – Suspected ISWAP fighters attacked Dabi village near Sansan village, off the Damasak-Maiduguri road, in Mobbar LGA, Borno state killing three people and abducting two others. The victims were reportedly Damasak natives who recently relocated to Dabi village for farming activities.

02 July 2024 – A secondary school teacher was stabbed by a newly recruited SF in Government Science Secondary School Donga. The incident occurred after the teacher punished his brother for arriving late to the school.

02 July 2024 – ISWAP elements kidnapped one person from his farm around Awulari village about seven km north of Bama LGA, Borno state, and later contacted the victim's family demanding one million Naira ransom. The victim was released the following day after payment of ₦350,000 ransom.

02 July 2024 – Some suspected ISWAP members on foot reportedly attacked and killed a civilian in his residence IVO the College of Agriculture in Buniyadi town, along the Damaturu-Buniyadi-Biu MSR, in Gujba LGA, Yobe state.

30 June 2024 – Vigilante operatives arrested a security guard for alleged theft at a store IVO Kofar Dumi Area in Bauchi Metropolis LGA, Bauchi state. The suspect was handed over to the police.

30 June 2024 – Suspected ISWAP members raided Bultram Community about 25km east of Katarko town, along the Damaturu-Katarko-Goniri road searching for food and non-food items. They looted roofing sheets from the primary school, leaving the structures prone to further damage by the rains. No casualties were recorded.

30 June 2024 – An IED assessed as being emplaced by ISWAP elements struck a group of people in the Baga Road area along the Kekenno – Cross Kauwa to Monguno LGA, Borno state killing four people.

30 June 2024 – ISWAP elements attacked the Umerari/Wajiro axis about four km south of Bama IDP Camp in Bama LGA. The SF engaged the attackers in an exchange of fire and repelled the attack.

29 June 2024 – Two armed men suspected to be ISWAP elements attacked a group of people around Fodan village 3 km North of Bama LGA along the Bama-Maiduguri Road. The assailants robbed the group of one bicycle, and the victims immediately alerted a CJTF team who pursued the attackers and shot dead one of them while the other escaped. The CJTF recovered two Bicycles, one Dane gun, some daggers, and illicit drugs.

29 June 2024 – A mob lynched a local hunter around the Gwallameji Area in Bauchi Metropolis, whom they mistook for an armed robber. The deceased was a vigilante member of a team that went to the area to arrest a suspected criminal.

29 June 2024 – Three series of bombings were carried out in Gwoza LGA by young females with IEDs strapped to their bodies and suspected to be members of ex-JAS Shekau at different locations within the town. The first attack was carried out by a lady with a child strapped at her back and holding another by the hand at a wedding reception around the “T” Junction in the Mararaba area, opposite Gwoza Motor Park at 1515 hours. The second took place at the burial site of the victims of the first attack, at 1715 hours, and the last at General Hospital Gwoza (1815 LT) where victims of the attacks were evacuated for medical attention. According to Borno State Emergency Management Agency (SEMA), a total of

26 people (amongst which children, and one INGO national staff) were killed while 54 others were wounded (amongst which one INGO volunteer) during the incidents.

NORTH WEST (NW) - Summary

Analysis – The number of fatalities decreased significantly, with 12 persons killed, while kidnapped individuals increased significantly with over 48 victims during the week.

Between June 29 and July 05, 2024, numerous violent incidents and security operations occurred in the North West region. Kidnapping incidents continue to plague various regions. On 5 July 2024, over 30 people were kidnapped by bandits in Gwaddodi Community, Rabah LGA. Similarly, on 2 July 2024, unidentified armed persons invaded a home in Dutsinma, Katsina State, killing a university lecturer and abducting four others. The same day, bandits attacked the Allo community in Kachia LGA, Kaduna State, killing one person and abducting 11 others. These incidents underscore the urgent need for enhanced security measures and community-based protection strategies to address the pervasive threat of banditry.

Clashes between different groups continue to contribute to the insecurity in the region. On 2 July 2024, a violent clash between farmers and herders in Birnin Kudu LGA, Jigawa State, resulted in two deaths and the burning of three houses. The conflict arose after herders allegedly destroyed farmlands. Additionally, ongoing clashes involving organized crime groups (OCGs) have led to multiple casualties. For instance, on 29 July 2024, OCG members killed five MOPOL personnel in Katsina State, and on 1 July 2024, OCGs invaded Birnin-Gwari LGA, Kaduna State, resulting in one death and several abductions.

NORTH WEST (NW) – Incident List

05 July 2024 – Bandits reportedly kidnapped over 30 people at Gwaddodi Community in Rabah Local Government Area. Reports indicate the gunmen besieged the community while firing sporadically.

02 July 2024 – In a clash between farmers and herders, two persons were killed and three houses were burnt. The clash occurred after cattle herders from Katsina State, allegedly invited by local herdsmen, invaded and destroyed farmlands in Safa and Gaurakai villages in Birnin Kudu LGA of Jigawa state. The Police have confirmed the incident and the investigation is ongoing.

02 July 2024 – According to reports, members of an OCG killed a teenager who was abducted alongside his mother (a customary court judge) and three other siblings on 23 June 2023 at Mahuta new extension in Chikun LGA, Kaduna state for the family's inability to pay the sum of 300 million naira in ransom. Additional reports also indicated that the abductors threatened to kill more victims if their demands were not met. An investigation by the police is ongoing.

01 July 2024 – Members of OCG invaded the Allo community in the Gumel ward of Kachia LGA and killed one person while 11 others were abducted in the process to an unknown location. An investigation by the police is ongoing.

02 July 2024 – Unidentified armed persons invaded a family home, killed a lecturer of Federal University Dutsinma, and abducted two of his sons and two other women in Yerima Quarters, Dutsinma LGA, Katsina state. A police investigation is in progress.

02 July 2024 – According to reports, members of OCG invaded Rugar Sojidi, a pastoral settlement IVO Issan Makaranta in Kagarko LGA, Kaduna state, and attempted to abduct three people. However, members of vigilantes were mobilized and resisted the attackers resulting in the death of one of the assailants. An investigation by the police is ongoing.

01 July 2024 – OCG members invaded the Tudun-Jega area of Birnin-Gwari LGA, Kaduna state killing one person and abducting an unspecified number of people.

29 July 2024 – Armed persons invaded a family home in Kahutu village of Danja LGA, Katsina state, and abducted an aged woman. The abductors had yet to contact the victim's family.

29 July 2024 – Suspected armed persons attacked and killed five MOPOL personnel traveling along the Zamdam – Jibiya LGA, Katsina state. The attackers also carted away five rifles belonging to the policemen.

29 July 2024 – OCG members abducted the village head of Tunburku in the Kidandan ward at Giwa LGA of Kaduna state.

SOUTH EAST (SE) – Summary

Analysis – The number of fatalities decreased slightly, with 02 killed victims while kidnap victims stayed the same with no recorded victims during the week.

Despite the significant decrease in incidents reported within this region, armed attacks remain prominent and continue to cause tension among affected states. Despite the significant decrease in incidents reported within this region, armed attacks remain prominent and continue to cause tension among affected states. On 4 July 2024, cult gang members shot and injured one person in Awka, Awka North LGA, Anambra State. Just

two days earlier, on 2 July 2024, a violent clash between rival cult gangs occurred along Uratta Road in Okwu Uratta, Owerri North LGA, Imo State.

Protests over socio-economic issues and government policies also contribute to the security landscape. On 3 July 2024, members of the Academic Staff Union of Universities (ASUU) at Imo State University (IMSU) protested on the school premises over poor working conditions and unpaid salaries by the State Government. This protest underscores the ongoing grievances of academic staff and the broader implications for the educational sector.

Kidnappings and armed attacks by suspected herdsmen continue to pose serious security threats. On 2 July 2024, unidentified armed individuals suspected to be herdsmen shot at a moving vehicle on the Ndegwu Okuku road in Owerri LGA, Imo State, abducting a couple from the vehicle. This incident, along with others, points to the persistent danger posed by armed groups and the need for enhanced security measures, including improved intelligence gathering and rapid response capabilities, to protect vulnerable communities and individuals

SOUTH EAST (SE) – Incident List

04 July 2024 - Cult gang members shot and injured one person in Awka, Awka North LGA, Anambra State.

03 July 2024 - Members of the Academic Staff Union of Universities (ASUU) at the Imo State University (IMSU) are protesting on the school premises over poor working conditions and unpaid salaries by the State Government.

02 July 2024 - There was a violent clash between rival cult gangs along the Uratta Road in Okwu Uratta, Owerri North LGA, Imo State. No further details.

02 July 2024 - Unidentified armed individuals suspected to be herdsmen shot at a moving vehicle IVO Ndegwu Okuku road in Owerri LGA, Imo state, bringing it to a halt and abducting a couple. Some of the occupants of the vehicle were said to have escaped and reported the incident to the police. The assailants and the victims had left the scene before the arrival of the SF.

SOUTH SOUTH (SS) – Summary

Analysis – The number of fatalities increased this week with 04 victims captured, while 1 individual was kidnapped during the reporting week, which is an increase compared to the previous week.

The South-South region of Nigeria has experienced significant civil unrest, driven by various grievances. On 3 July 2024, students from a tertiary institution in Edo State protested over a power outage, disrupting vehicular movements and stranding commuters on the Benin-Ore Expressway. On the same day, staff and students from the Faculty of Law at the University of Calabar in Cross River State protested on the school premises over insecurity and poor welfare conditions. Additionally, on 2 July 2024, aggrieved youths in Bayelsa State barricaded an oil well project site, demanding compliance with environmental and legal directives.

Kidnappings remain a persistent threat in the region. On 30 June 2024, an entrepreneur was abducted at gunpoint in Eket LGA, Akwa Ibom State, with the perpetrators using an unregistered vehicle and yet to contact the family. Meanwhile, security operations have seen some successes. On 30 June 2024, the Air Component of Operation Delta destroyed illegal refining sites and arrested five suspects in Rivers State, while police in Nsit Ibom LGA, Akwa Ibom State, engaged kidnappers, resulting in the death of two suspects and the rescue of a victim. These events emphasize the ongoing security challenges and the importance of sustained and coordinated security efforts to combat criminal activities.

SOUTH SOUTH (SS) – Incident List

03 July 2024 - Students of a tertiary institution in the state staged a protest over a power outage in the institution's campuses in Ugbowo and Ekhewan, Oredo LGA of Edo state. Sources indicate that vehicular movements were disrupted and commuters were stranded as the students blocked the Benin – Ore Expressway.

03 July 2024 - Reports revealed that a community leader was found dead at IVO Obodougwa-Ogume Junction along Kwale Obiaruku Road, Ndokwa lga, Delta state. Further investigation indicates that the deceased was macheted to death and set ablaze alongside his motorcycle by unknown assailants. An investigation was ongoing.

03 July 2024 - A 28-year-old man killed his father using a machete IVO Okpare-Olomu Kingdom, Ughelli South lga, Delta state after an argument. The report revealed that the suspect has been suffering from mental health issues.

02 July 2024 - Several aggrieved youths, carrying placards with various inscriptions, barricaded the site of an oil well project in OPL 2005 IVO Onuebum community, Ogbia LGA, Bayelsa state for allegedly disregarding the state government's directive on resumed negotiations with host communities and compliance with local, state, and federal laws including Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA).

01 July 2024 - Staff members and students of the Faculty of Law, University of Calabar, Calabar Municipal LGA, Cross Rivers state held a protest on the school premises over insecurity and poor welfare. No further details.

30 June 2024 - Unidentified armed individuals trailed and abducted an entrepreneur at gunpoint IVO Uqua Road, Eket LGA, Akwa Ibom state on his way back from his shop to an unknown destination. The reports revealed that the abductors used a black, unregistered Toyota Corolla car to abduct the victim. The abductors were yet to establish contact with members of the family. An investigation was ongoing

30 June 2024 - The Air Component of Operation Delta destroyed three illegal refining sites with seven overhead tanks concealed under thick mangrove vegetation at Wilcourt in Okrika LGA, Rivers state. Four boats suspected to be loaded with illegally refined products were also destroyed; while five suspects were arrested.

30 June 2024 - The Police exchanged SAF with six armed men at Afaha Nsit in Nsit Ibom LGA, Akwa Ibom state, and killed two suspected kidnappers. They rescued a kidnap victim and recovered one tricycle, one Mitsubishi pickup vehicle, mobile phones, expanded cartridges, and other items suspected to be charms.

SOUTH WEST (SW) - Summary

Analysis – The number of fatalities stayed the same with 2 fatalities captured while over 21 individuals were kidnapped during the reporting week. This is a significant increase, compared to the previous week.

The South-West region of Nigeria has seen a surge in protests and civil unrest. On 5 July 2024, medical students at the University of Lagos (UNILAG) protested over poor electricity on campus, while members of the Academic Staff Union of Universities (ASUU) and UNILAG students protested on 4 July 2024 against poor working conditions. Additionally, on 2 July 2024, staff members of a food company in Ibadan, Oyo State, protested demanding palliatives, leading to vandalism, one death, and multiple arrests. The protests underscore the frustration over infrastructure deficiencies and poor working conditions, emphasizing the need for responsive governance and improved public services to address these grievances.

Violent crimes and clashes have significantly impacted security in the region. On 3 July 2024, a final-year student was killed by suspected cultists on campus in Ijebu Ode, Ogun State. The same day, a robbery suspect was arrested in Surulere, Lagos State, for stealing his employer's vehicle. On 2 July 2024, a clash between two transport union factions in Osogbo, Osun State, led to sporadic gunshots and injuries, causing significant tension before security forces restored order. On 30 June 2024, twenty people were abducted along the Sagamu-Ijebu-Ode expressway in Ogun State by unidentified armed men, with one person escaping after being shot. On 29 June 2024, a clergyman was abducted from his farm in Akure North LGA, Ondo State, by suspected kidnappers who contacted the family but did not demand a ransom.

SOUTH WEST (SW) – Incident List

05 July 2024 - Tension has been reported in the Ikeja area following an alleged attack on officials of the Lagos State Traffic Management Authority (LASTMA) by hoodlums.

05 July 2024 - Medical students of the University of Lagos (UNILAG) are protesting at the school premises over poor electricity.

04 July 2024 - Members of the Academic Staff Union of Universities (ASUU) and students of the University of Lagos (UNILAG) are protesting on the school premises in the Akoka area over poor working conditions.

03 July 2024 - A robbery suspect (driver) was arrested by the operatives of the state police command for stealing his employer's vehicle on the same day he was hired as a driver in the Surulere LGA of Lagos state.

03 July 2024 - A final-year student of a private tertiary institution was killed on the campus premises by suspected cultists in the Ijebu Ode LGA of Ogun State.

02 July 2024 - Staff members of a food company held a protest at the Oluyole Industrial Estate, Ibadan, Ibadan South-West LGA. The protest was to demand the distribution of palliatives allegedly given to private companies by the Federal Government. The protesters vandalized property including vehicles belonging to the company. One person was killed, and 12 people were arrested.

02 July 2024 - There were sporadic gunshots in the Osogbo metropolisLGA, Osun state during a clash between two transport union factions at Ilesha garage, Oke Ayepe, Sadiat areas of the state. Reports indicate that the situation led to heightened tension in the area. The deployment of SF to the scene restored peace and normalcy. One of the faction's chairmen was injured during the incident.

30 June 2024 - Twenty people were abducted between the Nigeria Police Sagamu Area Command and Ilisan township along the Sagamu-Ijebu-Ode expressway in Sagamu LGA, Ogun state by unidentified armed men. One person was shot in the leg but escaped from the assailants.

29 June 2024 - A clergyman was abducted from his Ogbese farm in Akure North LGA, Ondo state by unidentified persons suspected to be kidnappers. The assailants reportedly contacted the victim's family but did not demand ransom
