Untangling the Airwaves: Wireless Networking

Wireless networking has transformed how we access the internet, replacing wired systems with easily deployable wireless devices that provide seamless connectivity across rooms, walls, and even entire stores. However, this convenience comes with an increased need for security to protect data transmitted over wireless networks. Fortunately, there are simple and effective ways to safeguard yourself while using wireless connections.

Self Protection: It's nothing personal (Firewall)

Personal firewalls are built into most personal devices and help protect them from harmful traffic. It is recommended to keep your personal firewall activated at all times. This firewall safeguards your phone or laptop from unwanted connection requests or commands from unknown sources.

The configuration of your personal firewall depends on your operating system, such as Android, iOS, or Windows. Default settings are designed to protect against common cyber-attacks with minimal user effort.

For more information about your personal firewall, refer to your device's user manual or contact the manufacturer.

Broadcast safely: At home Wi-Fi

Wireless networking has become an integral part of our lives, providing internet access for work, school, entertainment, and even home security devices like fire alarms and cameras. These devices rely on wireless signals to transmit information within (and sometimes beyond) your home. To ensure your home network is safe, it's essential to configure it with strong encryption.

Home wireless networks are secured using encryption protocols set by the broadcasting router, typically WPA2 or WPA3. For maximum security, it's recommended to use the most advanced encryption available. You can configure your router by logging in directly or using a web portal, such as those provided by internet service providers like Comcast or Verizon. Many ISPs also offer user-friendly apps to help you adjust settings, including your router's firewall, without requiring technical expertise.

When naming your wireless network (SSID), choose something meaningful to you but avoid revealing personal information, like your last name or address. Such

details could provide valuable clues to malicious actors. Finally, change the default wireless network password to one that is strong, unique, and memorable when setting up your device. These small steps can greatly improve the security of your home network.

Stay Smart: Navigating Public Wi-Fi Safety

Public Wi-Fi hotspots have become increasingly popular, offering convenient wireless connectivity in places like shopping malls, coffee shops, and libraries. Businesses provide free Wi-Fi as a way to attract customers and enhance their experience. However, public Wi-Fi networks come with significant security risks because you have no control over the other devices connected to the same network.

These networks are inherently insecure, making it unwise to send sensitive information, such as passwords, credit card details, or personal data, while connected. One common threat is "packet sniffing," where attackers monitor Wi-Fi traffic to capture sensitive information being transmitted.

To stay safe, avoid activities like online banking or shopping when using public Wi-Fi, unless you are using a VPN or another secure connection method. Taking these precautions can help protect your personal information and reduce the risk of cyber threats.

Wireless networking has revolutionized the way we connect, making it easier and more cost-effective by eliminating the need for extensive hardwiring and construction. However, it has also introduced new vulnerabilities that require proactive attention. By following a few simple security practices, you can strengthen your digital defenses, protect your personal information, and reduce the risk of threats like credit card fraud or identity theft. Embracing these steps ensures a safer, more secure online experience in an increasingly connected world.

Upcoming Opportunities

Greater Buffalo Run Valley Baker's Class

The 2025 baking classes are here! The second Wednesday of the month will be bake night.

- Two hour class starting at 6:30 PM
- 30 minute clean up with Questions and Answers
- Twelve is the maximum class size
- The materials are provided
- Students will bring their own utensils
- Donation to cover materials are accepted

The kitchen will be reserved at 5:00 PM to allow for setup. Classes are hands on or group demonstrations. Everyone participates and works together. The goodies made are divided and sent home to enjoy. The steps are demonstrated by the instructor. Then with guidance the students follow along and make their own dough to be baked at home.

The first two lessons are:

Bread 101 – Introduction to yeast, kneading, and baking easy white breads. This is a basic beginner's class to prepare for the Artisan Bread Class series. No baking experience is necessary.

- Overnight No Knead bake in Dutch Oven
- The Easiest Loaf of Bread You'll Ever Make King Arthur Flour

Honey Oatmeal Bread – Learn to knead. Yes, learn to knead. Honey Oatmeal Bread is a popular item for GBRV UMC. It is great bread for toast; it can be made into dinner rolls, or is the base bread for Cinnamon Raisin Bread.

Artisan Breads – Once the basic kitchen techniques are mastered, the students select what we do next. Any of the following are available:

- 1. **Baguettes** –Classic crunchy French bread adapted for home bakers.
- 2. **Challah** Traditional Jewish Hanukkah braid breads.
- 3. **Ciabatta** Extreme high hydration dough which requires special handling techniques.
- 4. **Mad About Pizza** Handcrafted pizza party at the Church for your family and invited guests.
- Brioche Lovely light buttery breads, many shapes and sizes. One of the best breads for French toast. We can even make Jacques Pepin ice cream based French Toast. (Group Demonstrations)

6. **Bagels** – Authentic New York style boiled bagels. (Group Demonstration)

French Breakfast Pastry Classes include:

- 1. **Croissant** a demonstration of laminated dough (think 27 layers of butter). Learn the tricks in preparing laminated dough. It will include Pain Au Chocolat, Centre County Stickies, and Almond Buns.
- 2. **Tarts** Bakewell Tarts, French Apple, and many more options

For young people: Parent / Child classes can be arranged.

Class ideas include:

- Soft Dinner Rolls Make a dozen of rolls to take home and bake them with your child for dinner.
- 2. **French Puff Pastry** Cinnamon Sugar coated delightfully light pastry. They are a great morning treat for sleep over nights.
- Spicy Ginger Molasses Cookies These are the popular cookies featured at our bake sales.
- 4. **Bake Sale Madness** Team effort to make items for the BEA Bake Sale. Items can be cookies, quick breads such as Poppy Seed, Better than Starbucks pumpkin bread, small size (two servings) pies, or tarts.

Anyone with a class idea can come forward and we will develop a class plan. Other bakers are welcomed to show case their favorite Formulas. Until we get a stocked baking center students will need to bring their own equipment. Mixing bowls, baking sheets, and proofing containers with lids are desired.

A LOVE LETTER FROM GOD JUST FOR YOU!

Adapted from Lori Anderson's Extravagant Hope

A LOVE LETTER IS A TESTAMENT TO THE HISTORY OF THAT LOVE - "Yes, I have loved you with an everlasting love; with unfailing love and kindness, I have drawn you to myself." Jeremiah 31:3.

God has loved you...Read through the Bible, from Genesis to Revelation, and you will discover the history of God's love. You'll witness how God has pursued us, across generations. That's a love with a future; a love that will not come to an end. With that unfailing love, God gently and tenderly draws us in. There's no coercion; no demands. Only kindness and perfect love.

A LOVE LETTER RECALLS WHEN YOU FIRST MET -

Jeremiah 1:5 "I knew you before I formed you in your mother's womb."

God has known us from the start. He's always known us. God has been around for every moment of our lives and has loved us through it all – the good and the bad? Not going anywhere.

A LOVE LETTER STATES THE DEPTH OF COMMITMENT -Isaiah 49:16 "See, I have written your name on the palms of my hands."

A LOVE LETTER TELLS US WHAT WE MEAN TO THE ONE WHO LOVES US - 1 John 3:1 "See what great love the Father has lavished on us, that we should be called children of God!"

We are precious to God – just as children are precious to a parent. God calls us his own children.

A LOVE LETTER ASSURES US THAT OUR LOVE IS SECURE -Romans 8:38-39 "Neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord."

People come and go from our lives. Circumstances change. It's just a part of life. But sometimes it's painful when the people we were so close to are no longer that close.

It's not like that with God. There's nothing that will ever change the way God loves us; no circumstances that will cause God to move on to other things or other people not even death. Nothing can separate us from God's love.

Are You All In for Jesus?

I recently heard a pastor talk about being all in for Jesus. His inquiry was posed as a question to each of his listeners asking "Are you all in?" He explained it this way: If you're having bacon and eggs for breakfast the chickens who produced the eggs are contributors but the pig who gave the bacon is "all in". Think about it!! Are you a contributor or are you willing to give your all to serve God as he asks you?

Preparing for the Walk to Lent and Easter

Beginning the Journey: Ash Wednesday Lent begins with Ash Wednesday which is on March 5, 2025. We officially begin our journey to Easter on this day. We confront our mortality and confess our sin before God within our faith community. Ash Wednesday is about death, first of all, because this journey of being born anew to a living hope in Jesus Christ requires that we also die with him, "buried with him in baptism." We submit more profoundly to the means of grace provided for us. We do not "make ourselves better." Rather, the 3 aspects of grace are: Prevenient grace (God's grace that is operating before we are in any way aware of it); Justifying grace (God's grace that restores us to God -- as we become aware of God's love for us); and Sanctifying grace (the grace that brings us closer to God's way throughout our lives). Since we cannot make ourselves better, we need to let go, trusting God, through submitting to these means of grace, to make us more holy. We remember, we face up, and we fess up. We are mortal. We cannot save ourselves from death, or the second death. And we are sinners... in the hands of a compassionate God who seeks to save us, not leave us in the paths of destruction on which we are inevitably heading.

As we walk toward Easter take time to thank God for the grace he has provided you and soak it in filling you with all that he has for you. As you are filled, share it with others who may not have had an opportunity to hear the Good News given for them also.

May these words remind you of his grace for you.

Marvelous grace of our loving Lord
Grace that exceeds our sin and our guilt
Yonder on Calvary's mount outpoured
There where the blood of the Lamb was spilt
Grace, grace, God's grace
Grace that will pardon and cleanse within
Grace, grace, God's grace
Grace that is greater than all our sin


