


We thank God for all his blessings to keep this wonderful ministry going!

Stories Behind Some of our Favorite Hymns by Audrey Foster

"Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow"

One of the most widely sung verses in the world is the one we sing almost every Sunday as our offering is being presented at the Altar:

> Praise God from Whom all blessings flow Praise Him all creatures here below Praise Him above ye heavenly host Praise Father, Son and Holy Ghost.

This was written in 1674 by Thomas Ken, an Anglican priest who was called "England's first hymnist" because up to that time, only the Psalms were sung in public worship.

Thomas was the chaplain at Winchester College, a boy's school in Engand, when he wrote three songs for the the boys to use privately in their rooms. One was to be sung upon waking, one on going to bed and one at midnight if sleep didn't come. All three hymns ended with a common refrain—the words and music familiar to us as our doxology, "Praise God from Whom all Bessings Flow."

How touching to think that we are linked in the communion of saints with those young men from 500 years ago. They sang God's praises first thing in the morning and last thing at night, using the same words we sing on Sunday mornings.

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+ Christian Symbols + Triangle & Circle

Dating back to ancient Christianity, a circle symbolizes eternity, and a triangle, with its three equal sides and three equal angles, symbolizes the Holy Trinity. Placed together, they represent the eternal Three-in-One and One-in-Three: God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.


Make this craft to show appreciation for your dad or another special man.

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The Rector's Message

INVITATIONS OF THE FEAST OF PENTECOST

The Feast of Pentecost recalls the descent of the Holy Spirit on the community of the disciples of Jesus gathered in the Upper Room in prayer. Appearing like tongues of fire, the Holy Spirit enflamed their hearts. And then "the rush of strong wind" that accompanied this descent drove them into the streets to begin the mission of the Church in the world.

Thus, the Church was born. Birthdays are always a good time to reflect on questions about our life and mission. And there is one question that I like us to think about: Where are we going as a Church family of Jesus Our Savior?

Today, there is a growing realization that, looking at our membership's demographics, we see an aging family. Over the years, our membership has shrunk through natural attrition. Our average Sunday attendance has fluctuated with the ups and downs of health issues of our membership.

Admittedly, we have not replaced those we lost from within our ranks and from newcomers. We have very few newcomers or 'returnees' whose numbers are not enough to re-fill even just the empty seats.

Where do we look for hope and courage to go on? The Feast of Pentecost gives us three good reasons for hopeful encouragement. These also serve as the three invitations of the Feast of Pentecost.

First Invitation: STAY TOGETHER. Before his ascension, Jesus commanded his disciples not to depart from Jerusalem, but to STAY TOGETHER to wait for the promise of the Father: "While at table with them, he had told them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for what the Father had promised." (Acts 1:4).

To STAY TOGETHER was the condition for the disciples to receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. Likewise, if we continue

to stay together, the Holy Spirit will be our hope and our strength.

Second Invitation: PRAYER. 14

They all joined together constantly in prayer, along with the women and Mary the mother of Jesus, and with his brothers." (Acts 1:14) They were gathered in prayer with Mary in the Upper Room, awaiting the promised event.

Prayer kept the "emerging Church" together and nurtured Her and gave Her growth. If we pray together as a community, the Holy Spirit will nurture us and give us growth.

Third Invitation: MISSION.

The Holy Spirit is the gift of our Lord Jesus to his disciples and to us. For Jesus says: "I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate to remain with you forever." (Jn 14:16).

Jesus meant this gift to be shared with others. And it is this same gift of the Holy Spirit that we received that impels us to give: to take to the streets of the world in order to bring the Good News of Salvation.

On the Feast of Pentecost, let us pray for the Holy Spirit to fill our hearts so that we will be able to respond to the invitations:

TO STAY TOGETHER, TO PRAY, TO DO MISSION.

Feast of the Ascension

Today is the fortieth day after Easter, the day we celebrate the Feast of the Ascension. On this date we commemorate Jesus' ascension into heaven where he sits at the right hand of the Father making intercessions for us. Jesus' ascension into heaven is recorded in the gospels of Mark & Luke but perhaps most fully in the first chapter of the Book of Acts:

6 So when they had come together, they asked him, 'Lord, will you at this time restore the kingdom to Israel?" 7 He said to them, "It is not for you to know times or seasons that the Father has fixed by his own authority. 8 But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth." 9 And when he had said these things, as they were looking on, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. 10 And while they were gazing into heaven as he went, behold, two men stood by them in white robes, 11 and said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking into heaven? This Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven." (Acts 1:6-11)

The question exists for us — "So what does this mean?" Well first of all the Feast of the Ascension is based on the Word of God. It is based on an actual historical event. It is the fulfillment of Jesus' own prophetic words. It is the fulfillment of his exaltation - the redemption of his humility — that this man who had so horribly died on the cross for our sins now sits at the right hand of God.

But what do we understand by the Ascension?

Intercessor - St. Paul tells us that Jesus ascended into heaven and is busy ... Who is to condemn? Christ Jesus is the one who died — more than that, who was raised — who is at the right hand of God, who indeed is interceding for us. (Romans

8:34) There he sits as our intermediary between God and man. Every prayer you pray Jesus hears and brings to the Father – constantly advocating on our behalf.

■ Judge – St. Matthew tells us, in chapter 25, that Jesus will come separate the sheep from the goats and 2nd Timothy chapter 4 tells us that Jesus will judge the living and the dead. So, there he waits enthroned at the right hand of the Father waiting to be our judge. This same King Jesus who intercedes on our behalf also prepares to be our Judge.

The Feast of the Ascension, which is on a par with Christmas, Easter and Pentecost, is all about Jesus AND our present and future in Him! The question for us then is how do we live in the in-between time? We have to ask ourselves the question, "Are we redeeming the time until Jesus returns? Are we fulfilling the ministries he has given to the church?" We have been placed where we are for a purpose.

In the account from the Book of Acts, the two angels asked the disciples, "Why do you stand here looking into the sky?" It was the Earth, not the sky, which they should be occupied with - to be witnesses not stargazers! Our calling is not upwards in nostalgia, but outwards in compassion to a lost world that needs Jesus.

I pray you all a very blessed celebration of the Ascension of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

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A Father's Legacy

For Joseph Dodson, the pressures

and responsibilities of parenthood felt compounded when he and his wife adopted a son. Dodson, a Bible professor, wonders if Jesus' earthly father also struggled with doubts and fears.

Scripture doesn't say much about Joseph, but he clearly left Jesus "a significant legacy," Dodson writes in Bible Study Magazine. Joseph obeyed God — despite the risk to his reputation — by marrying a pregnant woman. Joseph, a son of David, raised the Son of David as his very own. To protect his family he fled to Egypt, foreshadowing the "new exodus" of Jesus' saving ministry. And Joseph heard neighbors mock Jesus as "the carpenter's son."

"Joseph taught Jesus much more than woodworking," Dodson writes. "He modeled for his adopted son how, for God's glory, he must drink the Father's cup no matter the cost."
