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
We are very happy to announce that we are now holding church services every Sunday at 10:00 a.m. under the tent in the parking lot.

Our Restless Hearts by Audrey Foster

The life and writings of Saint Augustine have been inspiring people for more than 16 centuries. He has had a powerful and lasting influence on the Christian church. Quotes from him fill my journal and some have become part of my basic philosophy of life, like "Love God and do as you please"... so brief but so full of meaning and not what it seems to be on the surface.

While he always loved scholarly pursuits, Augustine was a wild and restless young man, who ran around drinking and carousing for many of his early years. He was seeking answers to the deep questions of life, but looking in the wrong places. Later, he was to write about sin, "Sin is a wandering from home, a wandering from happiness, a wandering in a region of darkness where we lose the things we love most. Sin is loving what won't make you happy, the thing that takes you far from true happiness into agony, loss, grief and miserv."

When he finally stopped resisting God's pursuit, Augustine wrote this moving poem:

Late Have I Loved You

Late have I loved You, O Beauty so ancient and so new. Late have I loved

You were within me while I have gone outside to seek You.

Unlovely myself, I rushed towards all these lovely things You had made. And always you were with me and I was not with You.

All these beauties kept me from You--although they would not have existed at all unless they had their being in You.

You called, You cried, You shattered my defenses.

You sparkled, You blazed, You drove away my blindness.

You shed your fragrance and I drew in my breath and I pant for You.

I tasted and now I hunger and thirst.

You touch me and I burn with longing for your peace.

Augustine was able to put timeless emotions into words that speak to our hearts with illuminating simplicity. He captured our deepest feeling that life here on earth is not enough; we long for something else; we want eternity: "You have created us for Yourself. Our hearts are restless until they find rest in You."

Amen to that!!

The Rector's Message

September 2020

I wish to share with you the salient points of the August 2020 message of our ACNA Archbishop Foley Beach that I consider most relevant to our situation.

During this challenging time in our history, we are faced with unprecedented challenges:

- A. The Pandemic;
- B. Civil Unrest;
- C. Election Season

However, these are also opportunities to trust, follow, and obey the Lord. To maintain our focus and to maximize our response to these opportunities, we have to keep the Main thing the MAIN THING – Jesus Christ and His Gospel!

This is how it looks like in the concrete:

- 1. We all are going to be tempted to spend a lot of time and energy on the cultural concerns which are in the forefront of media. Not that these are not important, but as the Church our focus and our mission is Jesus Christ and His Gospel.
- 2. Specifically, regarding the pandemic, clergy and vestries should work together following the guidance of their bishop and the specific local, state, and demographics of the parish.
- 3. Specifically, regarding racial issues, we now have a Lord under the leadership of the Holy Spirit Provincial Working Group on Race, Racism, and Racial Reconciliation which has begun meeting and who will present their results to the bishops in several months. Until then, it is time to listen and not to pontificate our specific political positions. Let us love our neighbors as ourselves.
- 4. Specifically, regarding the **upcoming election** in the United him. While we grieve our various losses, we States, clergy should attempt to minister to both the democrats and the republicans in their congregations and to not take for us. public stands for one candidate or another. God is more concerned about our love and servant spirit than He is for us preaching that He has taken sides. Sadly, every issue is now politicized and the "cancel culture" attitude of writing off those who don't agree 100% with one's point of view is pervasive. Let us do unto others as we would have them do

Archbishop Beach puts up St. Paul's model of responding to his situation and context in Philippians 3:8-14

"Indeed, I count everything as loss because of the surpassing

worth of knowing Jesus Christ my lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things and count them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which comes through faith in Christ, that I may know him and the power of his resurrection, and may share in his sufferings, becoming like him in his death, that by any means possible I may attain the resurrection of the dead. Not that I have already attained this or am already perfect, but I press on to make it my own, because Jesus Christ has made me his own. I do not consider that I have made it my own. But one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead. I press on toward the goal of the upward call in Christ Jesus. Let those of us who are mature think this way."

- Paul is speaking about his personhood, his prestige, his popularity, and his position which he had lost because of his commitment to Jesus Christ.
- Paul says it's all garbage compared to knowing Jesus by faith and being "made His own." We know Paul didn't have it easy (see 2 Cor.6), but he was serving and obeying the in gratefulness for what God had done for him because of his faith in Jesus.
- We have lost many things during this season, but what is most important flows out of our faith in Christ and our obedience to keep our eyes looking toward the Lord's will
- Like Paul, let us "strain forward" to what is coming, and let us press on "toward the goal" of his upward call in Jesus. If we seek and ask, He will give us goals and objectives to move forward in our ministries, moving them toward his upward call and his eternal purposes.

I hope this helps us in more ways than one.

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The Bishop's Corner

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

As you may have heard, Governor Newsom has announced a new framework from the State of California with guidelines to minimize the risk of Covid-19 transmission. These new guidelines will go into effect Monday August 31, so they shouldn't impact your services this coming Sunday.

With the framework there are now four categories for counties rather than just being on or off the "watchlist". As of now, it appears that all of our congregations in California are in the highest category, purple or widespread. The guidelines state that church activities in purple counties must be outdoors and include precautions, so essentially no change for the moment.

There is something to be hopeful and thankful for in the new guidelines though. Once a county becomes red, indoor activities can resume at 25% capacity, and at orange with 50% capacity, all with proper precautions of course. We won't soon be getting back to a situation like we were before COVID-19, but this framework shows that with improving conditions in our counties we will be able to gather together indoors.

Also, it's important to note that while this framework has changed, the current church guidelines on recording services have not. We will still be able to record services indoors with a group of 10 or fewer people as long as precautions are being taken.

I encourage all of you to visit the new state covid website <u>covid19.ca.gov</u> to

familiarize yourselves with the new framework to better prepare for indoor worship. I've also attached the most recent guidelines for churches in California. Please make sure your church services and other activities are in accordance with both state and your local county guidelines.

As always, please keep our governing authorities at both the state and federal levels in your prayers, that God give them the wisdom and the discernment to best lead our state and country at this time.
