# 2nd Chance Computer



Stories Behind Some of our Favorite Hymns 🞜 by Audrey Foster

#### "The Old Rugged Cross"

Great suffering and tribulation in George's Bennard's life led him to write the words of this song. Through his own pain, he gained a heightened awareness of the cross where Jesus' sufferings occurred. He began to identify with the sufferings of Christ.

The inspiration for the melody of this popular hymn came to George first and then he began to compose the words. His first attempt at the lyrics seemed imperfect to him. He said that the words of the finished hymn were put into his heart "in answer to his own need." Here is the first of the four verses:

> On a hill faraway stood an old rugged cross The emblem of suffering and shame And I love that old cross where the dearest and best For a world of lost sinners was slain. So I'll cherish the old rugged cross Till my trophies at last I lay down. I will cling to the old rugged cross And exchange it some day for a crown.

The hymn was introduced to a large convention in 1913 and quickly became very popular throughout the country. According to my husband, Father Tom, who has been a priest for 65 years, The Old Rugged Cross has been one of the most requested hymns for funerals over the years.

- · Bucket and paint stirrer


#### What you do:

- 1. After reflecting on the past year, use markers to decorate stones with memorable words, dates and drawings.
- 2. Spray pan with cooking spray. Set pan outside on a drop cloth.
- 3. Wearing gloves, mix concrete in a bucket, according to instructions.
- 4. Pour concrete into pan. Smooth top with paint stirrer.
- 5. Press in stones, handprints and other decorations.
- 6. Let dry completely. Remove from pan.
- 7. Place the stepping-stone outside as a reminder of God's continued goodness.

The **Rector's** Message

"Our Anglican Church Family of Jesus Our Savior

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I invite you to enter the New Year 2020 with me by looking at the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. We look at this family as the standard of the way we fulfill the responsibilities that God has placed on us towards our Church family and our own families.

Our marriage rite describes the original plan and model of the family in these words: Almighty God established the bond and covenant of marriage in creation as a sign of the mystical union between Christ and his Church. Our Lord Jesus Christ adorned this manner of life by his presence and first miracle at a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and it is commended by Holy Scripture to be held in honor among all people.

The union of husband and wife in heart, body, and mind was ordained by God: for the procreation of children and their nurture in the knowledge and love of the Lord; for mutual joy, and for the help and comfort given one another in prosperity and adversity; to maintain purity, so that husbands and wives, with all the household of God, might serve as holy and undefiled members of the Body of Christ; and for the upbuilding of Christ's kingdom in family, church, and society, to the praise of his holy Name.

According to the plan of creation, we are, first of all, husbands and wives. We were given the responsibility of fostering our unity in heart, body and mind. We are called to mutual joy and to help and comfort one another in good times and in bad.

Secondly, we become fathers and mothers. As such, we are then called to remember that our children are a gift from God. We are entrusted with the responsibility of nurturing them in the knowledge and love of the Lord.

Finally, in the family, there are children who are called to remember the commandment: "Honor your father and your mother." This means that when needed and able, we children are called to help support our parents in their old age and illness.

This original plan of the family was realized in the Holy Family. We look up to it for our inspiration and our standard.

As parents, Mary and Joseph took care and nurtured Jesus physically and spiritually. They were the first educators of Jesus. Their home was the first school where Jesus learned prayer, love, respect, forgiveness,

obedience, service and fidelity. As parents we are called to do likewise.

As a child in the family. Jesus took care of Mary, his mother. In the cross, Jesus trusted her to the care of John: "Behold your Mother." As children, we are called to love our parents to the end.

What is true of our life as families is likewise true of our Church family of Jesus our Savior Church. When we were baptized, we came children of God; we have God for our Father, and we became brothers and sisters to one another. That is why the family is called the domestic Church.

The Acts of the Apostles' describes the early Church Community in Jerusalem as a Christian family: All the believers were one in heart and mind. (Acts 4:32). This fellowship or communal life is fostered thus: <sup>42</sup> They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. <sup>43</sup> Everyone was filled with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. 44 All the believers were together and had everything in common. 45 They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. <sup>46</sup> Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, <sup>47</sup> praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved. (Act 2:42-47).

Our Church family of Jesus our Savior is, therefore, called to follow the original plan of the family by God. We are called to live according to the example of the Holy Family. We are called to be like the early Church family in Jerusalem.

We pray for the grace of living out our identity and vocation as Christian families and as the Church family of Jesus Our Savior.

May God bless our Church family and all our families in the New Year and in the years to come.

#### **Exhortation to Parents and Godparents**

Dear friends.

Greetings in the mighty name of the incarnate Christ! We've entered into a new year, a new decade, and a new season -Epiphany! In this season of Epiphany, we continue our examination of the 2019 BCP and the service of Holy Baptism. When we left off last year, we looked at the presentation of the candidate by the parents and godparents and I shared with you about the baptism of Isaac. This year, we pick up where we left off with the exhortation to the parents and godparents of infants and younger children being brought forth to receive the sacrament of baptism.

The celebrant, having described the importance of baptism in the Exhortation to the congregation now makes a personal exhortation to those responsible for raising the child in the faith. The service continues with the following words, which speak to the heart of being a godparent and sponsoring parent.

It is clear that this work is not for the faint of heart and is certainly not simply done out of social obligation. Becoming a Christian, raising and discipling a Christian, is work that holds eternal consequences. It breaks my heart when at confirmation or when I gather with a couple before marriage and ask if their godparents will be taking a role and the response comes, "I don't really know my godparents," or "My aunt isn't really religious." Of course, I think, "why did your parents ask them to be godparents?" The answer is, of course, that they didn't appreciate the role and responsibility of being a godparent or, even more sadly, a Christian parent. Reading the exhortation below will help to place this role into perspective.

When the following promises are made by Godparents and Sponsoring Parents of infants or young children, the Celebrant addresses them

Today, on behalf of *this child*, you shall make vows to renounce the devil and all his works, to trust God wholeheartedly, and to serve him faithfully. It is your task to see that *this child* is taught, as soon as *he is* able to learn, the meaning of all these vows, and of the Faith that you will profess as revealed in the Holy Scriptures. He must come to put his faith in Jesus Christ, and learn the Creeds, the Lord's Prayer, the Ten Commandments, and all other things that a Christian ought to know, believe, and do for the welfare of his soul. When he has embraced all these, he is to come to the Bishop to be confirmed, that *he* may publicly claim the Faith for his own and be further strengthened by the Holy Spirit to serve Christ and his kingdom.

Are you willing and ready to undertake this? Godparents and Sponsoring Parents I am, the Lord being my helper

I pray you all blessed worship this coming Sunday when we celebrate the Baptism of Jesus!

### **A Sacred Partnership**

Bible scholar William Barclay notes that John the Baptist was "startled and unwilling" when Jesus asked to be baptized. The evangelist thought he needed what Jesus could give, not the reverse!

We are pros at taking our needs to God — indeed he invites this: "Call on me in the day of trouble" (Psalm 50:15). But God also comes to us with needs: "Mortal, I am sending you" (Ezekiel 2:3, NRSV); "Go ... make disciples" (Matthew 28:19); "Carry each other's burdens" (Galatians 6:2, NIV).

Apparently, God prefers partnership to acting solo. From the beginning, God has invited people to name the animals, tend the garden, welcome strangers, build the tabernacle, proclaim his word, ensure justice and mercy, share his love.

What does God need from you, as Jesus needed baptism from John? Salvation is God's alone to accomplish, but then he calls us to share work with him, for the world's sake. So we echo Jesus: "Let it be so now; it is proper for us to do this" (Matthew 3:15, NIV).

## Love in Action



Martin Luther King Jr.,

whose life and legacy we honor this month, spoke often about the power of love. In fact, he equated the practice of nonviolence with "absolute commitment to the way of love."

Love, declared the minister and activist, "is the only force capable of transforming an enemy into a friend." And, he said, anyone who's "devoid of the power to love" is "devoid of the power to forgive."

King distinguished between true love and "empty sentimentalism," however. He taught — and showed — that love is "the active outpouring of one's whole being into the being of another."

Jesus' sacrifice on the cross is the ultimate "active outpouring" of love, and we can choose to follow his example daily.

"Because of Calvary I'm free to choose," writes Max Lucado in When God Whispers Your Name. "No occasion justifies hatred: no injustice warrants bitterness. I choose love. Today I will love God and what God loves."
