August – named to honor the first Roman Emperor (and grand-nephew of Julius Caesar) Augustus Caesar (63BC-AD14)

September – from the Latin word Septem, (seven) because this had been the seventh month of the early Roman calendar.

October – from the Latin word Octo (eight) because this had been the eighth month of the early Roman calendar.

November – from the Latin word Novem (nine) because this was the ninth month of the early Roman calendar.

December – from the Latin word Decem (ten) this was the tenth and final month of the early Roman calendar. The early Roman calendar only had 10 months starting with March for Mars. However, Julius Caesar decided to add two more months to the calendar, so he added "Janus" with 2 faces, guardian of gates and doorways and Februa" which means to cleanse. It was named after Februalia, which was a month set aside for atonement and purification, much like Lent, but without any religious meaning. This was a pagan rite.

STONE TABLETS — The tablets of stone symbolize

God's giving of the Law to Israel through Moses on Mount Sinai (Horeb). They're often shown with Roman numerals I through III on the left tablet and IV through X on the right. This represents the Ten Commandments — with the first three focusing on God and the final seven focusing on other people. The image of the stone tablets also may represent

the entire Old Testament.

The Bible is filled with people who don't feel up to the challenge of serving God, speaking for God or leading his people. But God always knows what he's doing. Pastor Haviland Houston issues this challenge: "When you are hesitant to act, or feel a failure of nerve coming on, when courage lags, or even if laziness and the 'I don't care' blues get you down, may the words of Mordecai to Esther burn in your hearts and minds: 'And who knows whether you have not come to the kingdom for such a time as this?"" (See Esther 4:14.)

Max Lucado offers a similar reminder in You Were Made for This Moment. "God always has his person," he writes, also citing the book of Esther. "When we feel as though everything is falling apart, God is working in our midst, causing everything to fall into place. He is the King of quiet providence, and he invites you and me to partner with him in his work."

Lucado continues: "[God] has a Joseph for every famine and a David for every Goliath. When his people need rescuing, God calls a Rahab into service. When a baby Moses needs a mama, God prompts an Egyptian princess to have compassion. He always has his person. He had someone in the story of Esther. And in your story he has you."

- Black permanent marker


What you do:

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The Rector's Message

TO GROW IN CHRIST

The July 23, 2023 vestry meeting gave a lot of attention on our Church worship space. The discussion started with a review of various problems besetting our Church space – from a broken AC to the homeless issue literally at our doors. Several options to address the situation were presented and agreed upon to be explored.

Then the question arose on how to finance any of the options once selected. The discussion zeroed in on the Building Fund: what it is and how is it to be used, replenished or augmented. The discussion was tabled for another time. However, the treasurer distributed copies on the topic from the Diocesan Treasurer's Manuel to help us prepare for the next discussion.

Additionally, this article lists my suggested contribution to the preparation of the said discussion.

Firstly, I suggest framing our discussion form the perspective of this question: In what space or location is our prospect of growing in Christ as a congregation improved or enhanced?

Secondly, to follow up my first suggestion, I suggest these questions that I recalled, Ruth and I asked ourselves years ago, when we decided to settle in Stockton: what could we afford to rent or purchase, was the neighborhood safe, was it within a good school district for our children, how about hospitals, bus stops, etc. I remembered our asking Ruth's cousin who was a sheriff, friends who have bought homes, etc. To think of it, these are practically the same questions that we may be asking. Where can we grow in Christ as a family of Jesus Our Savior?

Finally, I suggest not only that question of growing as a Church family, but also the question why are we not growing? I found this question clearly articulated by Rick Warren (Purpose Driven Church):

The problem with many churches is that they begin with the wrong question. They ask, "What will make our church grow?" This is a misunderstanding of the issue. It's like saying, "How can we build a wave?" The question we need to ask instead is, "What is keeping our church from growing?" What barriers are blocking the waves God wants to send our way? What obstacles and hindrances are preventing growth from happening?

All living things grow — you don't have to make them grow. It's the natural thing for living organisms to do if they are healthy. For example, I don't have to command my three children to grow. They naturally grow. As long as I remove hindrances such as poor nutrition or an unsafe environment, their growth will be automatic. If my kids don't grow, something has gone terribly wrong. Lack of growth usually indicates an unhealthy situation, possibly a disease. [pp. 15-16]

These are some thoughts I am contributing to the conversation. My prayer is for more of us to join in.

Do not ask for more before saying "Thank you" for what you have already received.

If you're looking for somebody to blame, look in the mirror.

There is no problem that cannot be met and dreams that cannot be won.

The Ordination of a Deacon Closing Prayer, Blessing, and Dismissal

August 12, 2021

One of my great joys is celebrating the Ordination of a Deacon. The biblical role of a deacon is threefold: First, the public proclamation of the gospel. Second, catechizing new disciples. Third, making the needs of the community known to the church and helping the people of the church meet the needs of the community. Having made a deacon by the laying on of hands, the calling down of the Holy Spirit and the reception of the church the new deacon and all of the people of the church are sent forth into the world, to serve the Lord.

When the Communion is finished, after the Post Communion Prayer, the Bishop prays the following Collect

Go before us, O Lord, in all our doings with your most gracious favor, and further us with your continual help; that in all our works begun, continued, and ended in you, we may glorify your holy Name, and finally, through your mercy, obtain everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

People From this time forth for evermore. Bishop The blessing, mercy, and grace of Go
