

Wet Pets N Critters Basic Saltwater Aquarium Guide

Starting a marine (saltwater) aquarium can be exciting and rewarding. While it's a bit more involved than a freshwater tank, with the right equipment and care, you can create a beautiful, thriving marine environment.

Tank Size & Setup

- Tank Size:
 - Start with a 30-gallon tank or larger—bigger tanks are more stable and forgiving for beginners.
- Filtration:
 - o A high-quality filter is essential. We recommend a hang-on-back filter, canister filter, or sump system (available at Wet Pets N Critters).
 - o Consider adding a **protein skimmer** for improved water quality.
- Water Movement:
 - o Use powerheads or wave makers to ensure proper circulation.
- Substrate:
 - Use live sand or aragonite sand to help buffer pH and create a natural environment.
- Live Rock:
 - Live rock serves as natural biological filtration and provides habitat for beneficial bacteria and marine life.

Lighting

- Fish-Only Tanks: Basic LED lighting is sufficient.
- Reef Tanks (with corals): A high-quality reef LED light that provides proper PAR and spectrum is essential.

Water

- Use **reverse osmosis (RO) water** with **marine salt mix** (available at Wet Pets N Critters).
- Salinity: 1.020–1.025 specific gravity (test with a hydrometer or refractometer).

• Temperature: 76–80°F (use a reliable heater and thermometer).

• **pH:** 8.1–8.4

• **Ammonia/Nitrite:** 0 ppm

• Nitrate: Under 20 ppm (lower for reef tanks)

Cycling Your Tank

We recommend cycling your tank using hardy fish (such as damselfish or clownfish) and live rock.

Steps:

- 1. Set up your tank with live rock, substrate, heater, and filter.
- 2. Add hardy fish to begin the cycle (ask our staff for suggestions).
- 3. Allow the tank to cycle for **4–6 weeks**. Test water regularly.
- 4. Once ammonia and nitrite levels are **0 ppm**, your tank is cycled and ready for more fish.

Note: Live rock helps establish beneficial bacteria that break down waste products and stabilize your tank.

Fish Selection

Start with hardy beginner fish, such as:

- Clownfish
- Damselfish
- Gobies
- Blennies

Avoid delicate species like tangs, mandarins, or anemones until you gain experience.

Equipment Checklist (Available at Wet Pets N Critters)

- Aquarium (30 gallons or larger)
- Filter (hang-on-back, canister, or sump)
- Protein skimmer (recommended)
- Heater and thermometer
- Powerheads or wave makers
- Marine salt mix
- Reverse osmosis (RO) water
- Hydrometer or refractometer
- Substrate (live sand or aragonite)
- Live rock
- Marine-safe test kits (ammonia, nitrite, nitrate, pH, salinity)
- Algae magnet or scraper

Maintenance

- Daily: Check temperature, top off evaporated water with RO water.
 Weekly: Test water, clean glass, and check equipment.
 Biweekly: Partial water change (10–15%).

- Monthly: Clean filter media and protein skimmer.
