

Wet Pets N Critters Pet Mice Care Guide

Mice are small, active, and intelligent pets that are fun to watch and can become friendly with regular handling. With proper care, mice typically live 1.5–3 years.

Housing

- Cage Size:
 - o Minimum: 24x12x12 inches for 2–3 mice. A larger cage is better for exercise and enrichment.
- Bar Spacing:
 - o No more than 1/4 inch to prevent escapes.
- Bedding:
 - o Use paper-based bedding or aspen shavings (available at Wet Pets N Critters).
 - o Avoid cedar or pine bedding—these can cause respiratory problems.
- Cage Setup:
 - o Include hides, tunnels, climbing toys, and chew toys for mental stimulation.

Social Needs

Mice are **social animals** and do best in **same-sex groups**. Keeping at least **two or more mice** together is recommended for companionship.

Diet

- Staple Diet:
 - o Feed a high-quality mouse pellet or block diet (available at Wet Pets N Critters).
- Fresh Foods (in moderation):
 - Offer small amounts of fresh vegetables (broccoli, carrots, spinach) and fruits (apple, banana, berries).
- Occasional Treats:
 - o Small animal-safe treats such as yogurt drops or whole grains.
- Provide **fresh water daily** in a water bottle or heavy dish.

Avoid:

- Sugary, salty, or processed human foods.
- Citrus fruits.

Chewing

Mice need to chew to keep their teeth healthy! Provide chew toys, untreated wood blocks, or cardboard tubes.

Exercise & Enrichment

Mice are very active! They need:

- Daily playtime in a secure, supervised area.
- Solid-surface exercise wheels (avoid wire wheels).
- Tunnels, climbing toys, and foraging items.

Rotate toys weekly to prevent boredom.

Cleaning & Maintenance

- Spot-clean daily to remove waste and uneaten food.
- Change bedding at least once a week.
- Clean the cage and accessories with a **small animal-safe cleaner** (available at Wet Pets N Critters) weekly.
- Wash food and water dishes daily.

Handling & Taming

- Handle gently and regularly to build trust. Let your mouse explore your hands and avoid sudden movements.
- Always support their body; never grab a mouse by the tail.

Health Tips

Signs of a healthy mouse:

- Bright, clear eyes
- Clean, smooth fur
- Active, curious behavior
- Normal eating and droppings

Signs of illness:

- Sneezing, wheezing, or labored breathing
- Hair loss or scabs
- Lethargy or weight loss

Contact a small animal-savvy veterinarian if you notice any concerns.

Supplies Checklist (Available at Wet Pets N Critters)

- Large cage with tight bar spacing
- Paper-based bedding or aspen shavings
- Mouse pellets or block diet
- Water bottle or bowl

- Food dishes
- Chew toys
 Tunnels, hides, and climbing toys
 Solid-surface exercise wheel
- Small animal-safe cleaner Foraging toys
