

Wet Pets N Critters Guinea Pig Care Guide

Guinea pigs are gentle, social pets that can make great companions for families. With proper care, they can live 5–8 years.

Housing

- Cage:
 - A spacious cage is important—at least **7.5 square feet** for one guinea pig. Bigger is better, especially if you have more than one.
 - Use a solid-bottom cage with kiln-dried pine or paper bedding (both available at Wet Pets N Critters). Avoid cedar or non-kiln-dried pine bedding.
- Hiding Spots:
 - o Provide a **hideout** like a tunnel, igloo, or wooden hut where your guinea pig can feel safe.
- Temperature:
 - o Keep your guinea pig's environment between 65–75°F. Avoid drafts, extreme heat, and sudden temperature changes.

Diet

- **Hay:** Unlimited **timothy hay** is essential for digestion and dental health.
- **Pellets:** Feed a high-quality **guinea pig pellet** daily (available at Wet Pets N Critters).
- Vitamin C: Guinea pigs cannot produce vitamin C, so their diet must include it. Our guinea pig pellets contain added vitamin C. You can also offer vitamin C supplements if needed.
- Fresh Vegetables: Offer small amounts of guinea pig-safe veggies daily (ask our staff for recommendations). Avoid iceberg lettuce, onions, and potatoes.
- Treats: Feed only guinea pig-safe treats occasionally—avoid sugary or fatty human foods.

Water

Provide **fresh water daily** in a water bottle or heavy bowl. Clean and refill every day.

Enrichment

Guinea pigs are active and enjoy exploring. Provide:

- Chew toys made of safe wood
- Tunnels, hay-based chews, and hideouts
- Playtime in a secure, enclosed area daily

Grooming

- **Brushing:** Brush your guinea pig regularly, especially long-haired breeds, to prevent tangles.
- Nail Trimming: Trim nails every few weeks using small animal nail trimmers (available at Wet Pets N Critters).
- Bathing: Guinea pigs rarely need baths. If needed, use a small animal-safe shampoo.

Cleaning & Maintenance

- Spot-clean daily to remove waste and soiled bedding.
- Fully clean the cage and replace bedding **weekly** using a **small animal-safe cleaner** (available at Wet Pets N Critters).

Health & Social Needs

Guinea pigs are social animals and do best with a friend. Consider adopting a pair of guinea pigs.

Signs of a healthy guinea pig include:

- Bright, clear eyes
- Clean nose and ears
- Normal eating and drinking habits
- Healthy weight and alert behavior

If you notice signs of illness, such as lethargy, weight loss, or changes in appetite, seek veterinary care.
