Putting the PLAN before the Land

It's okay to look around and see what plans and layouts you like. We often come across clients that love a plan or two, however the site that they are working on will not work for whatever reason. If you have fallen in love with a showhome or model home, if it requires significant modifications which in term loses the "Spirit of the Design" you may not get what you had originally envisioned. Things like lot size, slope, view or overall placement could turn your plan upside-down, resulting in a complete redesign.



2 Utilize What Your Land Has to Offer

Your new home and your land should be harmonious together. Take full advantage of views, lighting or grade elements like a walk-out basement or sunshine basement. Is there a view that needs to be captured, like our beautiful mountains or lakes? Or avoided, like other buildings, roadways, or power poles to name a few. Of course, this would apply to those that have already acquired land.



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3 Consider Your Lifestyle



This is a big one, sometimes hard to define a lifestyle into simple terms. We will explore with you what factors should be considered in your design. Your new home must represent your habits and lifestyle, and each floor layout must represent your tastes and requirements. If you choose a single-story or multi-story home, it is better to have an open floor plan with wide open areas or proper boundaries between rooms, this is your choice. When we are designing a floor plan for your home, we will ensure that it includes all the critical elements and tiny details beneficial for your lifestyle.

Having a Basic Concept is Beneficial But Not Critical

Even the basics, single story, two story, estate home or lake side cabin is a start. After all, Rome was not built in a day. Often the greatest designs come from piecing together a few of your favorite pictures. Having a few pictures from sites like Houzz or Instagram are often better than having an actual floor plan. 5 Be Prepared to Make Decisions Throughout the Entire Process

From the very start of this process throughout your entire build, you will be making decisions. In the design process we work together in developing the basic layout as well as the exterior. Have a Budget in Mind & Be Realistic



Unless you have an unlimited budget, you'll need to make some compromises as you work on the design of your home. From the beginning we would be able to determine if the plan or thought is inline with your budget. Not sure where to draw the line? Defining the difference between the absolute 'Must Have' with the 'Would be Nice to Have' and the 'Doesn't Matter' is critical in this process. Reminding yourself that it's okay to settle and compromise if it gives you the things you really want. This is typically the key to sticking to your budget and coming up with the perfect design.

Never Use 'Cost per Square Foot' to Price Your Home.... Never!!



This is a completely inaccurate method of estimating the cost of a new home. We design homes for many other factors including, overall

layout, features like a unique set of stairs or special elements like ceiling heights, roof pitch, oversized windows to capture views for example, none of which are

calculated by the square foot. There are too many variables that can range in price drastically. Think of how much per pound you paid for your current vehicle, it too does not make sense to estimate overall cost this way. We will have a basic idea of the range your home should cost very early, however, this will become accurate pricing once the 'Tender Drawing' is issued and your builder or you are able to receive actual quoting.








8 Utilize Square Footage

Having designed hundreds of homes, MjP Design Studio understand that overall square footage doesn't matter as much as some might think. A well designed home will feel much larger than what square footage may suggest. A poor design will not allow the home to flow properly. Function, Flow and Form must align perfectly. This is not an easy task, you will utilize our experience to ensure that your design feels right and works together with all the other elements of your home.



Competing Architectural Styles

It's ok to like a variety of overall architectural styles, there are several to choose from. A common mistake is trying to piece multiple styles into one design. This is something that is discussed, among other things, very early in our



conversations. If there is a style that you prefer early on the process is considerably easier.



Room and Furniture Placement



Room placement is pretty much straight forward, and we will use the information that we have gathered from our earlier conversations. Door and window locations and sizes should also be taken into consideration early in the process. Within the rooms, who will be using them and how will they be used? For example, what are your dining requirements? Formal, informal or hang around the kitchen island? If a room is to have a crib in it today, the bed that will go into the room soon will take up a lot more space and should be designed to incorporate that future change.





Don't Forget About Storage and Utility Space



As we acquire more and more items in our lives, think of where you will be storing them. If you are downsizing, this is also of great importance. It's great to have a vacuum on the upper floor of your new home, unless you have to lug it up from the basement each and every time you need to use it. Do you have extra bedding on hand? It can fill a little closet quickly. Family entries (formally called the Mudroom) have become an essential part of our daily lives. They are getting bigger and more functional than ever. Charging stations, drop zones, individual lockers or sport storage might make sense.

1 2 Plan For the Future

Regardless if this is your forever home or not, always keep in mind the ability to sell it. You should always try to avoid designing something that is a little 'out there' and will not appeal to others in the future. It could be the perfect for you, however, be so strange that no one would consider buying it later in life. Life changes quickly and for many reasons, a new employment opportunity, the need to be closer to family, physical restrictions, the list is endless. You are in control of the design, we are here to help avoid a potential costly error.



13 Utilize Natural Lighting



Pay particular attention to the positioning and exposure of the windows in your new home. There are many different possible window types and energy efficiencies to choose from. The program used at MjP Design Studio to draw your home allows us to create a solar study for any day, time and location. You are able to see where the sun is located at that particular time and how shadows will look in a certain location. We can then focus on where to locate windows effectively.

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Think of Your Energy Usage



Building 'Green' and greatly reducing energy consumption is very much now a must do in new home

construction. Awareness is increasing quickly with heating, plumbing, air conditioning, liahtina manufacturers and suppliers continuing to modify and upgrade their products to keep up to if not surpass local building codes. There are some amazing systems that not only save energy, but increase the overall comfort of your home. Hot water on demand? High efficiency heating and cooling? Led vs. incandescent lighting? Thinking about solar power? This can be discussed with professionals in the future but should be noted on your drawing.

15 Avoid Under Utilized Space

The addition of a playroom, game room or multipurpose room sounds enticing, but only plan to build a room that will actually get used. What good is a wasted home gym

where the treadmill not used? is Often an unused room becomes a dumping ground to place the items never get used. If you plan on adding a spare room, make sure that it is a room that can transition well from one type to the next. A sewing



room may never get used, but a sewing room or office that also doubles as a guest room could indeed get used often.

Combine Open Spaces as One On Occasion

Use two rooms as one on special occasions. The dining room table may not have all the leaves in it to accommodate a special dinner for 12, year round, and if you designed your dining room to accommodate this oversized table, it may look disproportionate when the leaves are removed the other 364 days of the year. Consider a location that can take advantage of using a small part of the great room for such occasions. Same could be considered for lower development such as family rooms and recreational space.







T Leaving Undefined Spaces



Everyone loves an open concept home, and why not? These houses are perfect for entertaining and just the right mix of bright and casual. But while you're designing an open-concept space, take care that you don't forget to define spaces altogether. When spaces are left undefined, it can seem useless and a waste of valuable square footage. Keep an open concept home airy and casual by using flooring, furniture and cabinetry to create distinctions between the kitchen, living areas and hallways. That way, you preserve the flow, making sure each room really shines.

1 Managing Your Time Effectively



This could also be considered moving too slow in some sense. During your selection process, try to make multiple selections simultaneously. When you are working with the cabinet supplier, also work with the flooring and countertop people if not all the selection companies required. This will aid in having uniform continuity through your home. Not saying do them all in one day, however you may want to work through the process with multiple suppliers at the same time, take a floor sample to the cabinet manufacturer to ensure they will work well together.

19 Rely on Your Designer
