
### THE MONUMENT AND THE SHIP OF THESEUS

The initial reports from surveying and engineering firms concerning the condition of the Hermann Monument have now been made public and various people have begun to digest the data and consider the implications. One thing is for sure: the monument needs repair, sooner rather than later. But how soon those repairs can take place and what the extent of those repairs will be are questions unanswerable at this time. The cost of repairs will also be a significant factor, to state the obvious.

One thing, though, that is interesting to think about—in a speculative way—is the important question: do we restore the monument...or rebuild the monument? No decisions about that have, of course, been made. But as we consider the scope of the project before the community, we undoubtedly will have people fall into one of two camps. One group, in genuine concern for historical preservation, will feel that in order for the monument to remain "the Hermann monument," it must be restored; the original materials should be cleaned, strengthened and reused. The other group may well have the attitude that the current situation presents an ideal opportunity to rebuild the monument with new materials, making it even better than before. Both groups want the best for the city, and both want generations to come to be able to enjoy and appreciate this impressive landmark.

In a way, this situation with the monument reminds me of an old problem from philosophy class called "The Ship of Theseus." The problem is meant to get students to think about the issues of "essence" and "identity." It goes like this: (cont.)


### HMS WELCOMES NEW MEMBER: JOHN VORWERK

### Who Was Varus?

Background: From Sept 15-19, 2009 a rather unique convocation of scholars took place in Regensburg, Germany, at the Institute for Classical Philology. The stated goal of the



The following is a portion of an essay by the great German classicist, Michael von Albrecht (Univ of Heidelberg). It provides some additional insights into the Roman Varus. (This article was translated from the Latin by Keith Wessel.)

I will now transition to speaking about Varus. This is a man who usually is denounced by both Romans and Germans – and in this particular matter there is marvelous agreement: denounced by the Romans because he was defeated, and by the Germans, simply because he was Roman. For that reason, it is worth the

effort to explore whether all these things said against him ought rightly to be applied to him.

However, prior to this disaster Quinctilius Varus was a man who possessed great authority. For he was married to Claudia Pulcher, the great-granddaughter of Augustus. His family clan was most illustrious and grew stronger while he was alive, and even the historians judged Varus rather gently. Before he had arrived in Germania, he had become consul along with Tiberius in the year 13 B.C. This demonstrates how important Augustus and Livia had made him to be. Then, from 7-6 B.C., Varus was busily serving as proconsul in Africa, that most celebrated senatorial province. We know this from coinage depicting the image of Varus upon them. Then he had been commissioned by Augustus as a propraetor in Syria (at that time an imperial province owned by Augustus). Finally, he served in the same capacity in Germania.

Writers of the past did, to some extent, attempt to defend with various excuses this man of such great authority even after he had been taken by such a disaster. For Tacitus says, gently enough, that he (Varus) had been "ignorant of the deception," (Annals 2.46.1), and Velleius (Paterculus) himself excuses him in this way: "Now the Fates stood in the way of his plans, and they entirely blinded the keenness of his mind. So, it was—and often is—for the man whose fortune some god is about to change, and corrupts that man's plans and brings it about –and this is the worst part—that what eventually happens is also viewed as having happened deservedly, and misfortune morphs into guilt." (2.118.4) In another place it is evident that Velleius, because he himself had served as a soldier, is more willing to defend soldiers than the emperor. [For he writes]: "It is evident that Varus, very much a serious man of good will, lost his most magnificent army more through the defective plan of the commander than through any lack of valor in his soldiers." (2.120.4-5)

Yet it also is true that Velleius complains about the "rottenness of the commander" (199.2), as does Tacitus, who writes about the "inactivity of the commander" (*Ann.*1.58.2). Moreover, Suetonius attacks "that Varro" more harshly by contending that the disaster that befell Varus happened "due to the rashness and negligence of the commander" (*Tib.*18). Without a doubt Suetonius simply repeated those very words which Tiberius was glad to hear.

For, in fact, both Augustus and Tiberius wanted to make the disaster appear to be the error of the commander, so that they themselves would not be blamed. For this reason, it is not by chance that we trust the account of Velleius Paterculus too much, that great admirer of Tiberius, who reports that Varus had come to wealthy Syria as a poor man, but left Syria poor as a rich man. However, it is true that we cannot deny that he was a lover of the arts and all things of great value. There are even those who suspect that the magnificent treasure trove of silver discovered at Hildesheim<sup>2</sup> once had belonged to Quinctilius Varus.

1 Suetonius likens Varus to Varro, an impetuous Roman commander who lost some 80,000 men to Hannibal in the  $2^{nd}$  Punic War, at the Battle of Cannae (217 BC).

<sup>2</sup> The Hildesheim Treasury, dated to the 1<sup>st</sup> cent. A.D., was discovered Oct. 17, 1868 and remains the largest cache of silver ever discovered outside of the boundaries of the Roman empire.

## A Hermann Monument & Montezuma Connection?

The conservation specialists who restored the copper Hermann statue in 2004 needed to re-create the ball or 'pommel' at the end of the sword handle and they admitted that they had no idea on how to create such a ball of copper. They had contracted to create it and asked about a substitute material.

Fortunately, at this time there resided part time in New Ulm a coppersmith by the name of Billy MacRae who creates copper jewelry such as pendants and earrings as well as decorative vases of copper. Most of these vases are made from recycled copper which is melted into clumps of copper the shape of a ball. Then, this ball is hammered into the shape of a vase.

Prior to the conquest of Mexico by the Spaniards there resided in the mountains East of Mexico City the Purhepecha people who created armaments of copper for the Aztecs and others. They discovered that by hammering the copper clumps found on the mountain sides that the copper would become very hard and this quality made their weapons superior to those made of copper that was molded and which had not been hammered. They taught Billy MacRae how to create vases from such copper clumps and Billy enhanced these vases by heating areas of the vases with a torch. This heating process brought out beautiful colors which had lain there forever.

After the Hermann statue was brought down for restoration, Billy stated that he thought that one of the vases that he had created would solve the pommel problem. Within a couple hours he had made the round ball to fit the sword handle and he made certain that the ball would drain by putting a hole in the bottom of the ball. (It is likely that water froze in the original ball which then expanded, causing it to fall off.) It was missing for over 100 years but it now has been restored since 2004, thanks to the art and craft and skills of one Copper Billy MacRae who donated the pommel to the project.

Copper Billy MacRae, a Canadian, had craft booths at major Renaissance Fairs and Art throughout the US.

Ed note: Copper Billy passed away Nov, 18, 2020 at the age of 76 yrs.

"Theseus" cont.

Suppose that the sailing ship of the great Greek hero Theseus sets sail from Athens and will be gone for years. With time, various planks will rot and be replaced, so that after a decade of sailing, Theseus returns to port in a ship that has had *every* board replaced over the journey. So, the question is, "Is this still the ship of Theseus?" And what if (hypothetically), some skilled worker managed to collect all the discarded boards from the first ship...and rebuild the entire (original) ship! Which one is the ship of Theseus? Is it the material that makes it the ship of Theseus? Is it the presence of Theseus on the ship that makes it "the ship of Theseus"? Is "the ship of Theseus" what the boat is made of, or is it merely a *symbol* of an idea...or an ideal hero? What exactly is the ship of Theseus?

So, what will the renewed / renovated Hermann Monument look like? If materials are changed or improved, is it still "the Hermann Monument"? Could it even possibly have a new design (as it once had a different paint scheme) ...and still be "the Hermann Monument"? Is it the *materials* that contribute to the authenticity of a monument, or is the monument's primary purpose to serve as a *symbol* of an ideal?

Wiser minds than mine will need to sort such questions out. But HMS has every confidence that the community of New Ulm will rise to this generational challenge and tackle the work that needs to be done in a manner that will make the city proud. - KCW
