FROM THE PRESIDENT: Jim Donahue

FORETHOUGHT

Probably in the natural course of your golf adventures, most of you encounter situations about which you have questions. We know we have. THE WINNING PLAYERS EDGE

It is getting to be the time of year when our game is honed to that point of perfection where even the most subtle edge in equipment really makes a difference on the course. This month I want to share with you some of the "professional secrets" discovered through hours of investigative reporting (and at great expense) to give our readers that little extra advantage when you tee it up with an outsider.

First, and one of the most obvious tricks, is the use of the proper colored tee. Pick a tee color that you have had success with and stick with it. Everyone knows that tee color effects the flight of the ball. Pink tees cause a ball to fade weakly to the right and land limply behind some tree or bush. Blue tees fly skyward and green tees hug the grass. Choose a tee for your game and use this important edge to your best advantage.

Never use a new golf glove. Statistics prove that a new glove will add 4.7 strokes to your round. I usually give my new gloves to my wife and have her rake the lawn while I play golf. I must admit that occasionally I have returned from a round to discover my new glove in pieces and laying on top of a packed suitcase by the back door. Giving a new glove to an opponent just before the match is a good trick. Make sure the bet will cover the cost of the glove.

Ball selection is the key to success.

you play a course with hard greens, the 42 compression Whimpee McGee autograph model is for you. If you're playing where there are lots of water hazards, then pull out the Jato Floater. Forget all the high image balls the pros claim to play and go for one that works. I personally wouldn't care if my ball was made out of white dimpled pigeon droppings if it would take strokes off my game. Incidently if your using white dimpled pigeon droppings, don't lick your ball to clean it even on the city courses.

REALISTIC GOLF GOALS

Do you often wonder how good athletes consistently repeat their best performances? Many determine their own strengths and weaknesses and then set realistic goals. Golfers also can do this. For example, instead of setting rigid outcome goals for 18 holes (85) or 9 holes (43), make your goals more flexible by setting them hole by hole. Do this by first checking the scorecard of the course you are playing for a hole by hole analysis of difficulty. If a hole is the #1 handicap hole, it is the hardest on the course. The #9 handicap hole is of medium difficulty for the course and is the easiest on the nine holes you are playing. The #18 handicap hole is the easiest on the course.

Secondly, before teeing off on each hole check the handicap and set an individual goal for the hole. For example, if you are a bogie golfer (90) and are playing the #5 handicap hole, a realistic goal would be a bogie. If you are playing the #15 handicap hole, a realistic goal would be a par. As you play the round adjust your hole goals accordingly. If you are playing better than your average, lower your expected score for the appropriate holes. Similarly, if you are playing above your average, raise your expected scores on the appropriate holes.

Finally, compare your actual hole scores sum to the sum of your goal scores for each nine holes played. If you are setting realistic scoring goals for yourself, then the difference between scores should be only 2 to 3 strokes.

In 1986 the All-City Golf Team will be composed of two (2), six (6) player units. Selection to this team will change from that of 1985. This year's requirements are as follows:

First Team: a) Winners of any of the following individual tournaments (not to exceed six (6) spots):

> -All-City Medal Play Championship -All City Match Play Championship -Oak Lane Medal Play Championship -Spartan Classic Medal Play Championship -U.S. Amateur Championship -U.S. Open Championship -Michigan Amateur Championship -Michigan Open Championship

-U.S. Publinx Championship

b) Should spots on this team still remain after the above tournaments have been given consideration, the remaining spots would be filled by the following point system:

> -All-City Medal Play Championship - 50 pts. for 2nd place, decreasing by 5 pts. thru 10 place.



MICHIGAN AMATEUR PREVIEW

With Jack Nicklaus winning his sixth Masters title (20th major overall), the golf season seems to be in full bloom, with more interest than ever. The tournament schedule seems very competitive with many dates dotting the calendar to keep any avid golfer busy. All GLAGA members seem to have their eyes fixed on the nine designated tournaments that will shape the All-City team (a point system is in effect this year).

The Michigan Amateur is such a designated tournament and one in which Lansing area golfers have been quite competitive in the past. In 1985 the Golf Association of Michigan (GAM) decided upon a sectional qualifying system in which approximately 8 sites are used to enable more players the chance of qualifying. This of course has spurred interest in the tournament and increased entries considerably. Those area golfers who qualify at the section al sites will join a field of 168 at Belvedere Golf Club in Charlevoix, Michigan. With 1985 quarterfinalist Jon Kosier and GAM honor roll honoree Fred Behymer Jr. exempt for the tournament, the Lansing contingent looks stronger than in past years.
