

FROM THE PRESIDENT: Jim Donahue

Recent events in city government might have a great impact on golf in the Lansing area for years to come. Led by Sid Worthington, a move is under way to restore Groesbeck to its former prominence. As I write this, two dramatic things have already taken place:

1. \$80,000.00 has been approved to upgrade the watering system, 2. the golf courses have put under an enterprise account—which means that all profit from the golf courses will be used to upgrade the courses.

For those of you who do not remember, Groesbeck was once the outstanding public course in the mid Michigan area and one of the top 10 public courses in the state. With this renewed interest in our course, the "Beck" can once again be something to be proud of. But Mr. Worthington will need the help of all of us to make it happen.

What can you do? Well for one thing make your complaints known. But make sure what you have to say is constructive. Give this some thought, I have done so and feel that the following things would make Groesbeck a better course:

- 1. Make #4 a par 3. It would be safer and make the course more challenging. Besides, what is wrong with the Par being 71?
- 2. Add new traps on the face of the hill of #9. They used to be there and having them would give us a hole that people will talk about.
- 3. Revamp the green of #9 so that it would hold shots from top to bottom.

- 4. Make the green bigger on #4. It could be brought down near the traps on the right and left sides of the fairway and this would really be a good par 3.
- 5. Fill in the fairway trap on #18. Not too many people know it's there and even fewer ever get into it. Leave it as a grass bunker.
- 6. Clean out and enlarge the pond on the left side of #14. Not only would it be more attractive, but the hole would have more character
- 7. Bank the back of #10 green so that it would better hold incoming shots. Again character would be added to the hole and play would be speeded up.
- 8. Put a bell on #11. A bell would prevent hitting into groups in the fairway and prevent waiting too long for those who have moved on to the green.
- 9. Do something to #15 green to make it playable for more than 2 or 3 weeks a season.

These are but a few of the things I feel could be done. What are your ideas? Make sure that they are heard. If you live in the city, contact your representative. In the Lansing area contact Sid Worthington, Don Ballard, or me and we will make sure that your ideas are heard.

I for one would like nothing better than to see <u>our</u> course be the top public course in the Midwest. The layout is there, it just needs some revision and renovation. Let your feelings be known <u>before</u> a master plan is developed in the next year or so. I have and I invite you to do so also.

Over 300 young people and adults turned out to watch touring Pro Jim Gallagher put on a most enjoyable exhibition as a fitting climax to our association's first Junior Golf Program. The exhibition featured some great shot-making by Jim. He won over the crowd by his easy going low key approach. As he stated prior to the clinic, "Kids want to see us hit a driver and a 2 iron, not a pitching wedge." The highlight of the clinic was a driving contest between Jason Hansen and Jim, which was called a draw.

In this our first year in Junior Golf, our program attracted about 200 youngsters. Four sites were used for instruction. At two of those instruction was based on a teaching plan given us by Sheila Marcotullio. Ken Horvath and his staff (Dean Holland and Bob McKnight) handled instruction at Forest Akers. Don Clark and Bill Collett offered instruction at Chisholm Hills and Lansing Golf Center respectively.

Other instructors in the program were: Mike Boynton, Stan Bragg, John Clark, Brian Donahue, Jim Donahue, Steve Martin and Burton Smith.

at the Women's State Amateur. Kathy
lost 1 up to Lisa Marino in the finals.
Lisa plays for the MSU golf team and
has won the State Am two years in a
row. Kathy used to play for Mary
Fossum on the MSU team but is now Head
Women's Golf Coach at Western Kentucky.
Kathy grew up in St. Johns and played
her high school golf there.

Watching the rain, I noted to Kathy that there seemed to be very little golf coverage of the Women's State Am. Kathy confirmed my observation, adding that almost no one from the media interviewed her or Lisa especially about their final match.

Lisa hit a good shot from the hazzard and holed an 8 footer for par. Kathy's second nicked some leaves, fell to the fringe, a chip was 3 feet short and the putt was missed. Kathy instead of being 1 up is 1 down (how many times this happens in match play!!).

ALL CITY MEDAL EVER

Bob Fossum turned rounds of 73, 69, and 70--212 into victory in the All City Medal Play. It was his 2nd win in as many years. He edged Fred Behymer Jr. by 1 shot. No one else was within four shots, though Tom Belen and Burton Smith (not picked by pretournament prognosticators -- see previous issue-- to be even in the top 10) tied for 3rd at 217. 255 players began the tournament that was played on two courses, Groesbeck and Highland Hills. This year's tourney had four flights including championship and paid out a record \$4,640.00 in prize money gift certificates. Many local businesses agreed to accept the certificates, thus making the All City one of the few tournaments which offers other than golf related prizes. GLAGA thanks those businesses for their participation. GLAGA also thanks those people who purchased Hole Sponsorships, increasing the purse by almost \$1800.00. There were 16 of these this year next year we hope to fill all 36.

The night before the tourney saw about 120 people turn out for a pretourney gathering and long drive contest. Maybe the food provided set well with Bill Dowell, because he hit a dead straight 290 plus drive to win the contest (and \$62.00 to boot). Cris Nicholoff was second and won \$36.00.

PUBLIC LINKS WRAP-UP

Steve Wakulsky and Bill Kost competed in the 61st U.S. Amateur Public Links Championship with mixed results. Bill Kost shot rounds of 77-77--154 to miss the cut for match play by 2 strokes. Steve Wakulsky, however, took advantage of a fine 69 on the 2nd day (to go with a 1st day round of 75) to make the cut into match play. However, in his first match Steve fell victim to Mark Wurtz of Port Ludlow, Washington 6&4.

With Tom Mase providing the impetus, an ad hoc group has set up a new golf outing aimed at raising money for the MSU men's golf program. Called the SPARTAN ALL-AMERICAN SCRAMBLE, the outing will be held October 5 at Forest Akers West golf course. Deadline for entry is October 1, and the fee is \$50 per person, of which \$30 is a tax deductible contribution to the Ralph Young Fund earmarked for the men's golf team.

The outing will be a 5-player scramble, with a current or former Spartan varsity golfer assigned to each foursome. Following play there will be a get-together for food, beverages, awards, and comraderie at the University Inn on Trowbridge road.

Among the prizes is a round of golf for two people with cart for each member of the winning team at Michaywe.

Apart from improved practice facilities, the money raised will go towards sending the team to Florida for a winter golf trip. Coach Fossum expressed interest in having his team play in the Florida International Golf Tournament for example. Such competition can only help improve the team's play and draw ever better golfers to MSU.



IMPROVING YOUR GOLF GAME:

MAKING THE MOST OF LIMITED PRACTICE TIME


Golfers are vain. Many of us want to be perfect and we are always looking for ways to improve our golf games. The best way to achieve this, we are told, is practice, practice, practice. But the fact of the matter is even hours spent on the practice tee beating eggs won't always produce results on the score card. And who has all those hours? Not most of us that's for certain. It is important therefore to try to make the most of limited practice time. The best way to do this is to accurately evaluate your game and to identify areas where improvement is necessary. This evaluation process requires patience as there should be a good deal of time spent gathering data with which to go to work on your subject. It is necessary to correctly identify and rank the problem areas of your game. This can be done by breaking each round of golf down into it's component parts or shot types: 1. tee shots, 2. fairway woods, 3. long approach shots, 4. medium approach shots, 5. short approach shots, 6. the chipping game, 7. putting.

After each of your next 5 to 7 rounds of golf sit down (with your favorite beverage, of course) and spend 15 or 20 minutes going over your score and shot making process. Record each shot on a simple chart you make in a 5 by 8 spiral notebook (you can keep it in your bag). Each hole of a round

might be recorded as follows:


This particular player, who shall remain nameless, could identify a couple of problems if this pattern persists. The tee shots tend to be pulled left with frequency and nearly all iron shots come up short and to the right. Thus missed greens is a problem. Chipping seems good because as we all know being past the hole is better than being short! Putting looks sound. This Player can now go to the range confident that the practice session will make the most of his limited time. Remember, proper identification of your 'problem' will result in productive practice sessions.
