MYRTLE BEACH TWELVE CAN'T WAIT

Going South during the winter?
We are. (Todd Colthorp, Doug Hankey,
Red McIntyre, Fred Ignatovich, Tedd
Bratschi, Bob Aumaugher, Felix Ridsdale,
Barry Dean, Mo Sharick, Jerry Sharick,
Paul Kostamo, and Dave Barber) Seven
golf filled days at Myrtle Beach, South
Carolina. This will be the 12th year
our group of local golfers has gone to
MB. We started with 4 and got as high
as 16.

Some of you get South and some do not. In either case we thought you might be interested in the details regarding one winter golf trip. So come along with us as we prepare for our annual trip to MB-January 27 to Feb. 3rd, the last week of the cheaper winter rates. Here we will provide you with some of the details that the golf magazines leave out.

First, here is the package we chose for this year: \$380.00 gets each of us seven days of golf. We stay in condos on the second hole of the Oyster Bay

golf course, 2 to a room, 1 double bed each. The price also includes carts for 1 round a day, breakfast each day, and sur charges (some courses charge as much as 15. extra, a new unpleasant feature at MB). Myrtle Beach has 44 courses within an hour drive with 24 more under construction. And there is no comparison with Florida courses—MB's are three times as good.

We used to drive, but will all fly this year--\$158.00 round trip from Detroit--one stop in Charlotte-on Piedmont. Colthorp is in charge of renting cars, so we will probably have 3 Lincolns again, cost for the week: \$60.00 each, per. Also, we used to have dinners on the package but wanted more flexibility this year, so figure 10 to 15 a day for diner, \$70.00 each (some eat only Pizza, some eat free--chicken wings at happy hour). Lunch is a sandwich and an apple in the golf bag, a mass visit to the supermarket takes care of this. Losers of the first game of Euchre make the sandwiches. Ccst, a buck a day--\$7.00.

Now the miscellaneous costs. We throw 12 a person in the pot each day, 6 for skins, and 6 for a four man team bet. Any other bets are on the side. Some have a drink or two a day to celebrate or commiserate. Winners usually buy (or get their arm broke). Some must include Euchre money. All bring money for gifts to take home. We also play 27 holes a day, 9 holes of scramble after the 18 hole medal. That costs around 5 bucks a day, at some course not on our package. Such courses usually only charge for the carts after 3:30. Finally, gas for the week at most 10.00 each.

So what is the tab each for the week? That depends on how well you play, and what you drink and eat. But a minimal cost is 380. + 158. + 60. + 35. + 10. = \$643.00 for package, plane, car, scrambles, and gas. If one plays well one can break even on bets or make enough to take a bite out of dinner and lunch expenses, etc. Losing all bets, eating lunch and diner, drinking to blunt your sorrow, and buying gifts because you are somewhat guilty will raise the price to as much as \$900.00. STILL we have not found a package to match this in value for cost. Have you? Let us Know, write to GLAGA.

What was the cost 12 years ago you may wonder? The first year we went the people at MB did not realize that there were people in Michigan willing, even craving to play golf in 45 to 65 degree temps. So the Package was about \$23 dollars a day for room, golf all day, carts all day, breakfast, and dinner. In those days we drove, a 16 hour trip. Thus we saved on air fair and car rental. So a week's trip was between 3 and 4 hundred dollars total. Who was the fool that said that the more things change the more they remain the same?'

Teed off

Hit by stray golf balls, two swing back

Two golfers teed off about getting hit with stray shots have struck back: A Troy woman was awarded \$19,000 Friday by an Oakland County jury, and a Roseville man has filed suit seeking more than \$10,000 in damages.

Velma Wild's collarbone was fractured Oct. 10, 1984, when she was hit with a practice shot by James Kusmierz, 52, of Troy. Wild, 57, said she was permanently disfigured by an "unsightly large lump" where the ball hit

Wild's attorney said Kusmierz was practicing with a new driver in an undesignated practice area and did not yell "fore" before his client was hit as she played the sixth hole at Somerset Golf Course.

Before the trial, Kusmierz said, "I love golf, but now I'm afraid to go on a golf course. It was a freak accident, and I felt terrible about it. I've always been a careful golfer."

Wild, in a suit filed Feb. 28, 1986, asked for \$3,880 in medical expenses and unspecified damages for scarring, pain and suffering, "fright and shock" and "embarrassment, humiliation and mortification."

Meanwhile, ir Macomb County, a

complaint about narrow fairways the bane of many a duffer - has resulted in a lawsuit.

Golfers are exposed to unnecessary risk from hooks and slices at the Oak Ridge Golf Center course because fairways are too close together, according to the suit, filed this week in Macomb County Circuit Court.

Daniel Piche says he was hit in the head Aug. 13 by a stray golf ball at the Lenox Township course. He is seeking more than \$10,000 in damages from the course and golfer Joseph Ernst of Richmond, the suit says.

The first and second fairways, which run parallel with a common rough, are built "like bowling alleys," said John Carlisle, Piche's attorney.

Piche says Ernst failed to yell "fore" after slicing a drive off the first tee. The ball struck Piche near his eyebrow as he walked on the second fairway, causing facial injuries and blurred vision, the suit claims.

Carlisle said Piche "is a good golfer, but not a good ducker without warning."

Ernst, a self-described "terrible" golfer, said Friday he never saw Piche after hitting the shot. Oak Ridge representatives could not be reached for

TIMBER RIDGE NEWS RELEASE

Lansing is about to have a new 18 hole golf course. What follows is a news release from McKay Golf Properties of Lansing regarding the new layout.

"In Bath Township-East Lansing, Mi., construction has started on the Timber Ridge Golf Course. This is the site for what is destined to be one of the top courses in the country, and one that is likely to achieve national recognition. This beautiful property encompasses 192 acres with more than 80 per cent mature trees, several 65 to 80 foot hills and a 31/2 acre lake. With this large number of mature trees and the rolling terrain, the golfers will feel that they are in Northern Michigan.

When completed and opened for play in July of 1988, Timber Ridge will not only provide a challenge for the professional and low handicap players, but more important, will allow the average golfer the opportunity to enjoy

playing the course. Timber Ridge has been especially designed with multiple tees and flagstick placements so that all golfers, regardless of ability, will have an enjoyable and memorable golf experience.

Jerry Matthews, the golf course architect, using his creative and imaginative talents, has designed the golf course to take advantage of the natural features of the site, such as the marsh, ponds, and trees, and has used the higher elevations for tee and green sites. This will ensure that, when opened for play in July of 1988, it will provide a natural appearance. The firm of Matthews and Associates, Grand Haven/Lansing, Michigan has designed numerous golf courses throughout Michigan and the Midwest during the past forty years. Jerry Matthews, a resident of Bath Township, and W. Bruce Matthews, III of Okemos have designed a masterpiece of golf course architecture and playability in their own "backyard" for all gclfers to play and enjoy regardless of golfing ability.

Timber Ridge is being developed by McKay Golf Properties of Lansing, Michigan as a pilot project for The-Public-Golf-Course-of-the-Future. It will be an upscale facility with coordination between construction, marketing and operation, a model for all others to follow.

When completed, Timber Ridge will be Open to the Public; however, the services and amenities provided will give the golfers a feeling of being at a private or resort facility.

HOLE # 1, 420 yds. PAR 4

This inspiring opening hole at Timber Ridge Golf Course is a dog-leg left which starts from an elevated tee surrounded by pines. The landing area below the tee is just before a valley that crosses the fairway. The second shot from the tree lined fairway is to an elevated green protected on the right side by a large oak tree.

HOLE # 2, 360 yds. PAR 4

The view from the second tee is spectacular. The downhil hole is moderate in length thereby giving the golfer a rare opportunity for a birdie. However, with the pine trees and sand bunkers on the left and deciduous trees on the right, accuracy is important as an errant shot will be severely penalized.

HOLE # 3, 350 yds. PAR 4

This hole is a dog-leg left with a pond and natural marsh guarding the corner of the dog-leg and running along the left edge of the fairway. The fairway slopes from right to left thereby requiring an accurate tee shot. Some players may take the risk and cut the corner of the dog-leg to try and shorten the hole. The natural marsh area on the left is reminiscent of golf holes one identifies with the North and South Carolina coastal areas.

HOLE # 4, 170 yds. PAR 3

The tee shot on this par 3, the longest on the front nine, must cross a valley to a slightly elevated green built



into the side of a hill. The mixture of mature deciduous and pine trees provides an interesting background for this challenging golf hole.

HOLE # 5, 445 yds. PAR 4

The landing area on this long par 4 is just beyond a valley, thereby requiring a relatively strong tee shot. The rolling fairway and undulating green are bordered on the right by a naturally occurring marsh. The left side of the fairway and the green are protected with sand bunkers and trees thereby requiring accuracy in addition to length for the golfers' second shot.

HOLE # 6, 540 yds. PAR 5

This double dog-leg par 5 hole plays slightly uphill to the first landing area, downhill to the second landing area, and then somewhat uphill to an interesting green. The fairway winds through a dense pine forest. This hole begins the toughest stretch of golf holes on the course, known as "CASUAL-TY CORNER".

HOLE # 7, 370 yds. PAR 4

A solid tee shot on this downhill sharp dog-leg right places the golfer in position for the demanding second shot. The second shot to the green nestled among mature pines requires the player to hit over a large chasm. HOLE # 8, 150 yds. PAR 3

This is the shortest par 3 on the golf course. Although a short hole, the golf shot must carry the chasm and come to rest on the elevated green protected by several sand bunkers. The bordering trees add interest and excitement to this golf hole.

This hole is a dog-leg right that starts from an elevated tee tucked in among the pine trees. When the player reaches the downhill landing area a decision must be made whether to play safe and short of the large valley, or gamble for the additional distance and a shorter approach shot. The valuable yardage gained by "going for it" could result in a delicate wedge shot to the elevated green.

HOLE #10, 410 yds. PAR 4

The tenth tee is located amidst a pine grove and is high above the landing area creating another memorable vista at Timber Ridge. The landing area of the tree lined fairway gently slopes from right to left toward a fairway bunker. The long second shot is all carry to an elevated green surrounded by an assortment of Oaks and Maples.

HOLE #11, 200 yds. PAR 3

The longest par 3 on the course requires a shot over a pond to a green protected by a sand bunker on the right side. Usually, this hole is played with a long iron, but with a brisk northwest wind many players will need a wood.

HOLE #12, 330 yds. PAR 4

This relatively short par 4 is a dogleg left through the pine trees. The sand bunker on the corner of the dogleg discourages long hitters from taking the risk of cutting the corner. The rolling hills that converge in the landing area require that the golfer draw upon his skill and execute a shot to the uniquely contoured green, that is generously guarded by sand bunkers.

HOLE #13, 385 yds. PAR 4

The uphill tee shot required on this dog-leg left, along with the uphill approach shot to the green will make the hole play longer and more difficult than it would appear. Contributing to the difficulty of the golfers shot selection are the large amount of trees that limit the uphill landing area. HOLE #14, 390 yds. PAR 4

This freeform tee is located on a

hill in combination with # 16 tee and provides a panoramic view of the golf course. The landing area of this hole tightens up rapidly with many mature trees bordering the fairway, thereby reQuiring accuracy from the tee. The rolling terrain of this fairway is typical of the topography of Timber Ridge and results in a variety of approach shots to a green with an undulating putting surface.

HOLE #15, 500 yds PAR 5

This is one of the longer par fives on the golf course and will play every bit as long as the yardage on the scorecard indicates, due to the uphill landing area and hillsides that effect the golfers second shot. With the green being tucked into the side of the hill a challenging approach shot will be faced by many golfers.

HOLE #16, 160 yds. PAR 3

This par 3 hole has water encompassing a large portion of the putting green. Viewed from an elevated tee it will be one of the most photographed holes on the golf course. The aesthetic appeal that this hole provides will add to the golfers enjoyment as well as challenge him and reward a good golf shot.


HOLE #17, 510 yds PAR 5

The water confronting the tee shot adds to the anticipation and excitement the golfer feels when playing this hole. The second shot on this long par 5 is slightly downhill to the landing area guarded left and right by large trees. The approach shot to the elevated green demands an accurate pitch.

HOLE #18, 440 yds. PAR 4

The phrase "a great finishing hole" has become a cliche, but this one merits the description. Because it is slightly uphill, it will play even longer than the indicated yardage. The long second shot must carry a portion of the four acre pond to the green nestled among pine trees on the side of a hill. This setting provides one of the most challenging finishing holes in golf and is the climax of an outstanding golf experience at Timber Ridge."
