FROM THE PRESIDENT:

As another golf season has fallen into that wonderful category of days gone by, I decided to reflect back on what I consider to be positive strides which our association took in 1989.

Probably the most significant, yet least noticed change, was that of trimming the size of the GLAGA Board of Directors down to nine members. This move has enabled us to expedite the process of decision making and has raised attendance to the board meetings substantially. With our streamlined board (made up of ambitious volunteers) our tasks have changed from what once seemed like tedious "who really cares" work to that of a well structured goal oriented and goal attaining system.

Another plus was the organizing and running of our sponsored events. The All-City Match Play had an increased field over that of 1988, the Men's All-City Medal Play, our Junior Golf Program, the Women's All-City Medal Play and the Reniger Memorial tournaments all had great participation. We also paid out more in prize money (gift certificates) in these events and allocated more funds for the Junior Golf Program than ever before.

This ability to disperse more money towards all of our various programs was brought about by positive feedback from the golf community. Out total membership has gone up significantly over the previous years, and our advertising and hole sponsorships have increased sharply too. By bringing in more dollars, this will

expand our possibilities of enhancing our golf assocition now and for years to come.

Also, this year we implemented two new programs which we feel greatly benifitied the golfers in the Lansing area. These were the "Golf Equipment Sale and Swap Day" (which was held at Foster Community Center) and the Junior Golf Raffle which helped to enhance the Junior Golf Program. With the success of both these new programs, we hope to make them long lasting annual events for years to come.

In ending, I would like to say
"Thank You" to all of you who have
supported our association in the past.
I look forward to your continued support

The United States Golf Association has announced that beginning with the 1990 Golf Season, the maximum amount of merchandise that an individual can win in any one tournament has been increased from \$450 to \$500.

I noticed the other day that people I talk to keep drawing the conclusion that I play a lot of golf. I also noticed that I keep denying that I play a lot of golf. This discrepancy led me to look at how much I play. My list looks something like this: 20 or so tournaments in the summer (almost every weekend), some foursome golf during the week, fall Oak Lane scrambles, snow golf in Michigan with McIntyre, two trips south in January, and mud golf in the spring with Hankey. Now that's not so much is it?

Well the first step in rehabilitation (I am told) is to recognize that there is a problem, to quit denying what is obvious to others. I have now done this and in an attempt to help others I am considering starting a new organization called Golfer's Anonymous. We will hold weekly meetings in church basements. There each member will be asked to stand up and publicly declare, "I am a Golfer". They will then proceed to tell their story: How they started golfing, what drove them to it, how it ruined their life, their relationships, how they tended after a while to black out bad rounds.

The aim of the organization will be to rehabilitate. We will hear from those who are well along in that process. They will stand up and tell how many years they have been off golf. We will institute a phone chain, so that golfers who feel the urge can talk it through with a member/friend. For example, Todd Colthorp will have many people to call (from Palm Springs), to whom to describe each shot in his round (not just me).

And, of course, to prevent temptation at the meetings, to divert attention to something else, Jack Daniel's will be served.

So if you think starting a GA affiliate in Lansing is a good idea, don't call me. I won't be home, I'll be out golfing.



1990 ALL-CITY GOLF TEAM POINT SYSTEM

At the present time a panel made up of members of the G.L.A.G.A., the Lansing State Journal, Walnut Hills Country Club and the Country Club of Lansing is studying changing the current method of team selection to that of a point system.

The changes in the selection system will be announced prior to the first major tournament in the Lansing area.

All area golf courses and country clubs will receive a copy of these changes.





TURNING PRO by Jim Donahue

So you want to turn pro? Your game has improved as you have gotten older. The Kids are grown and you have become somewhat financially independent over the last few years. Now you see guys like Walt Zembriski making it on the Senior Tour. Why not me? I can play. I win my share. All I need is some time and a couple of new clubs and I can play with those old guys.

Well let's see what it really takes to get on the Senior Tour. The first thing is that you must be 50 years of age and you must be able to prove it with a valid birth certificate, which has to be attached to your application. The second thing is that you must be a Professional golfer. This alone is something that should not be taken lightly, since once you cross over the line to professionalism you are stuck there for a year or more.

The next thing that you must have is \$1,000.00 to spend on a Regional Qualifier. This fee is non-refundable. A pretty steep price for a minimum of 36 and a maximum of 144 holes. But that doesn't scare you. You have the money and you know you can make it. What else do you need to do?

There are 3 sites available for Regional qualifying. All regionals have a maxi-

mum of 144 players and are played over 72 holes. The fields are reduced to the low 90 and ties after 36 holes, and to the low 60 and ties after 54 holes. The number of players who advance from each Regional site to the Finals is decided on a pro rata basis, and is announced prior to each qualifier. So now you need to be prepared to spend some money on hotels, travel, etc.. The 1989 qualifying sites were held at:

Sarasota, Florida. Houston, Texas. Murrieta, California.

The finals were held at: Middleburg, Florida (The Ravines G.C.).

The qualifying rounds and the finals are all held in the course of one month. You should also be aware that Senior Tour cards are awarded to only the low 16 players and of those 16, only the top 8 will be exempt into the weekly Senior Tour events. Positions 8 through 16 can get in the events only with sponsors' exemptions or by qualifying weekly. In addition to all of the above you are required to dress properly and keep a neat or acceptable appearance while you are participating.

It is estimated that it costs around \$1,000. to \$1,500. each week to stay on the regular PGA tour. It may not be that expensive on the Senior Tour, but it would be at least in the \$750. to \$1,000.

I asked PGA pro Ray Barr what he figures his expenses are and exactly what he gets free, and here is his answer:

Ray Barr is sponsored by Tommy Armour Golf and Mark Scot clothes. He gets 10 pair of slacks at least twice a year, shirts as needed, and a minimum of 4 gloves per event. He gets 4 pairs of shoes from FootJoy twice a year and socks as needed. Balls are provided by Maxfli (he was playing the Royal Maxfli at the time). He also stated that there are several manufacturers who have equipment repair trailers at each tournament and they provide clubs and repair work free to all tour players and other players who have qualified for each event. The manufacturers include Taylor Made, Mizumo, and True Temper. They do everything in these trailers from reshafting to giving you custom made clubs to your specifications. These trailers often visit the Senior Tour events when they are within a day's drive of each other.

Ray figured that his expenses for each

week were as follows:

Meals: \$150 to \$250. Motels: \$250 to \$300. Caddie: \$250 plus 10% of any winnings.

Travel: \$150, does not include air

Thus Ray's total is around \$800 to \$950 per week. Clearly, you must have a sponsor lined up prior to qualifying and you should be prepared to spend the first year just trying to make expenses. This of course means loss of income for you and your family. You must be prepared also to meet all the demands and commitments required of you by your clothing and shoe agreements.

I guess the old adage still applies - "If you can't beat the players in your local and state areas, you should not even think about the tour until you can.

WORLD'S LONGEST COURSE

Dub's Dread Golf Club, near Piper, Kansas is the world's longest course, according to Bartlett's WORLD GOLF EN-CYCLOPEDIA. The course measures 8,101 yards from the back tees and carries a USGA course rating of 78.

Dub's was built by Harold "Jug" McS-paden, who along with Byron Nelson, was dubbed a "Gold Dust Twin" of the 1940 pro tour. McSpaden also holds the course record, a three under 69.

The average length of the par threes is 270 yards, the par fours 473 yards, and the par fives 596 yards. One must conserve ones strength during the round because the 18th hole is a mere 530 yard par four.

GLAGA awaits the report of one of Lansing's long lashers as to how easy the course is. Any volunteers?

This agreement will be unique in that for the very first time both Groesbeck Golf Course and Forest Akers will be used in the same tournament.
- The newest "hot selling" irons will be the perimeter weighted forged irons from MacGregor the new JNP irons.

 These irons will gain instant fame when Jack Nicklaus makes a fantastic charge in this year's "Masters" using these irons. Jack will really help the sale of these clubs when he announces "I could have doubled my "Major" total if I would have had these irons."
- A "new" trend (I use the word "new" loosely) will begin this year as more and more of the good players revert back to the real woods that they have used in the past.

- Under the leadership of Scott Walker, the 1990 All-City Stroke Play Championship will be the best run tournament of this type yet.

WINTER GOLF JOURNAL by THE SNOWMAN

Well me hardies (as Long John Silver used to say, or was it Mae West?), some of us got the new decade off to a golfing start January 5 and 6 by playing 10 holes each day at a local course. Saturday the 5th, Red McIntyre, Mark Strolle, and I tossed a coin over pond hockey or golf and waiting until it warmed up (30 degrees, no wind) teed off about 1:00. Sunday our fivesome (McIntyre, Ted Bratchi, Todd Colthorp, Harry Schmidt, and I) had no trouble holding up other players (40 degrees, but windier). Some of our special rules are, no lost balls, a maximum of 2 putts per green, and hitting a pin frozen in the hole (at reasonable speed) is in.

We did not lose too many balls (there were only patches of snow) but putting was tough. Some greens were clear but most had either snow or ice, and some, ice ridges from the cross country skiers. Even so some putts were made. Now, should you think this too crazy, remember that one of the advantages of winter golf is that you cannot lose a ball in a water hazard. Hmm, I wonder if anyone has ever played lite-stick night winter golf.

Word is that Tim Russell's Christmas present was a trip south for golf lessons with Jimmy Ballard. I only report this fact out of consideration for those who are deciding how many strokes Tim should give this summer.

Heard also that Jim Donahue will be the first in town to play the new Jack Nicklaus irons. They are a combination of forged and perimeter weighted irons.

John Peakes, his son Ian (#2 man on MSU's golf team), Ian's roommate--Mike, and I took off Christmas day for 9 days of golf in Myrtle Beach, S.C. Alas, that

was the week that Myrtle had 14 inches of snow, the most ever. We made the best of things however and diverted to Lake City, Florida—the first town you come to on 75.


There are two courses in town and they are well worth a play. We managed 36 a day for 6 days, including motrin for the old guys. Lake City CC is as good as any course I have played. Some of the local motels include greens fees in their lodging price, \$32. per room, so \$16 per man for sleep and golf (carts extra).

We then drove south to Ocala (70 miles) to play Golden Ocala. The course has about 8 copies of famous holes from around the world. For example, it had the 12th, 13th, and 16th from Augusta. It had the 17th (road hole) from St. Andrews, the 1st (the first hole in golf) from St. Andrews, and the 'Postage Stamp' from Troon. The price was \$30. for 18 and cart, and \$13 more for a second 18. We ran into Monty Litwiler on the course who said he had been playing 36 all week. The rest of the course is difficult and beautiful—this is no 'see Rock City' tourist trap—I recommend it.

From Ocala we drove then to Myrtle Beach (snow gone) thru Charleston S.C. I cannot fully describe the destruction caused by the hurricane. One example may hint at it. The Francis Marion National Forest borders highway 17 for 25 miles between Charleston and MB. It was a pine forest with most trees 1 to 2 feet in diameter and 30 to 50 feet high. Almost all of the trees were snapped off about half way up, and it was like that for most of the 25 miles. It reminded me of pictures of Mt. St. Helen's forests. We drove to MB with our eyes wide and our jaws dropped.
