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GLAGA INTERVIEW--DON BALLARD

Don has been working for the City of Lansing for the last 11 years. Don started out as Assistant Operations Supervisor and then quickly moved up to the position of Golf Operations Supervisor, which he held for a period of 5 years. For the last 5 years and counting, Don has been Golf Manager and supervises all aspects of the City of Lansing golf operations. GLAGA met with Don to find out what the \$4 million dollar master plan involved and meant to the golfers of Lansing.

Q: What is basically involved in the \$4 million dollar master plan now being discussed?

A: Starting with Waverly G.C., we determined that Waverly would do far better for us and for the community if it was an 18 hole facility. That is the biggest addition to our system. We are looking at \$2.5 million for the Waverly project. Groesbeck G.C. on the other hand is a 60 year old course with greens that have drainage problems, areas that flood frequently, and areas that are crowded in terms of tee location to greens. Basically, we want to bring Groesbeck up to industry standards and also renovate the clubhouse area so that we can accomodate beverage service and provide closed indoor seating for outings and other activities.

Q: What was the main idea behind a master plan for the city golf courses?

A: The idea 5 years ago when we became an enterprise fund for the city, was to not only provide golfing services to the City of Lansing but to improve services to the City of Lansing. Over the past 5 years, I think we have done a

good job in terms of increasing our maintenance levels and improving the services to golfers. When you reach a certain point, you have to go beyond the cultural things you can do, such as mowing greens, tee boxes, etc. You have to look at the physical aspect of what you are working with and ask, "How can you improve the services to the golfers of Lansing?". At the same time we have a new Director of Parks & Recreation (Eric Reickel) and with him being new and very interested golf, this was a good opportunity for him to be involved in the process and become familiar with our system. The idea was to have a plan to follow in terms of upgrading the services and physical structures that are presently available.

Q: Within the master plan, how are the projects prioritized?

A: In terms of the greatest return on the money invested I think Waverly is by far the No. 1 priority when you talk about increasing to 18 holes. With 18 holes your talking about bringing in 3 times the amount of revenue that it does as a 9 hole course. So purely from an economical standpoint Waverly has to be considered a high priority for us. Beyond that, the Groesbeck clubhouse is another area we are unable to provide very efficient food & beverage service. So that will benefit us from a revenue standpoint. The Groesbeck facility itself has always taken care of itself and done very well, but we want to make improvements over the next 2 to 3 years. Its something we have to do right now to be effective as a golf course operation.

Q: Is the proposal a package deal or would you be happy if 1 or 2 out of 3 were accepted?

A: From my standpoint, anything that we get as a commitment to improving our facilities will be acceptable. That's my job, make the golf courses as efficiently run as possible. Anything we can get will help.

Q: Where do we stand on the proposal at this time?

A: I think public opinion will be a part of a feasibility study that will probably be implemented quite soon. Basically to determine golfers of the area are willing to this through increased green If we can generate enough for it, without dollars to pay having to charge extremely which fees, counterproductive anyhow, then think people will accept it. But its going to boil down to golfers opinion as to if they are willing to fund it. That is what its all here are provide we to taxpayers and residents the best service possible. IF they willing to fund the project, we are more than willing to do it. As far as beyond that, we are at the point with the master plan that it could be implemented as early as this fall or 12 to 18 months down the road. It's really hard to say at this point.

Q: What do you believe the new fee structure might look like?

A: Assuming that our play remains the average that we have had for the last 3 years, which is 62,000 9 hole rounds, I am guessing that we are looking at a charge of \$2 per




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round. This would basically represent a surcharge that would go purely for the repayment of a loan. I'm not an accountant, but that is what we are looking at. Our fee comparisons for this year basically \$7 & \$11 weekdays and \$8 & \$13 weekends, as an average for a comparable course to Groesbeck. That puts us about average even with a \$2 increase that we talking about.

Q: The comments on Waverly going to 18 holes have been quite positive, can you give us an idea of what kind of golf course is proposed?

A: It should be a fun course play. Its going to have water on it (5 ponds), there will be 32 sand traps (66 at Groesbeck), and will probably not be as difficult as Groesbeck as far as hazards It will concerned. not tremendously long, in terms being comfortable to walk. As far as toughness, you will not have to be a scratch golfer to enjoy playing it. We are trying to build a course that the average



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GREATER LANSING AMATEUR GOLF ASSOCIATION will enjoy playing, not something you will beat your brains out for 6 hours and shot 97. Its a nice piece of land in terms of the topography and I think the plan that we have seen of the type of holes will be fun to play.

Q: Can you give us an idea of what kind of facilities we can look forward to if Groesbeck does get the funds for a clubhouse?

A: There has been a general made based on the square footage we have now. Basically what we wanted to do was update the restroom facilities and make them handicap accesible and increase the ladies restroom. We would be eliminating the existing locker room, we don't feel that is space well used at this point. We want to provide an expanded and more efficient food & beverage operation. There is a liquor license in the future at Groesbeck, assuming we can come to agreement with a concessionaire for an operation such as that. We would like to have some pro shop space not necessarily to compete in terms of golf club sales, but sweaters, shirts, jackets, and maybe some shoes and special items. We would carry some clubs but not a full line. We definitely would like to see indoor seating

for 100-150 people for outings, leagues, and such.

Q: There has been both positive and negative discussion on the redesign of Groesbeck G.C.. How do you respond to the residents that believe Groesbeck needs a little polishing not a redesigning?

A: The easiest way to address those types of concerns is with examples. With Groesbeck the intent was not to start from scratch, it has proven itself to be a very enjoyable golf course to play. It is obviously very popular with the golfers in the area. We have done a good job in maintaining the golf course over the last 5 years, given consideration of a new irrigation system and about \$250,000 worth of equipment purchased over the last 5 years. So we have proven we can maintain at a higher level than we did in the past, which is what we wanted to do. But you get past that and you have to look at the problems the golf course has. We have some drainage problems. Examples exist between 1 & 9, 3 & 18. We have tried to do some things with drain tile but you can only do so much. So what Matthews did was look at those areas and proposed making them ponds. A obvious solution to our problem. Another cont. page 8






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OBSERVATIONS FROM THE EDITOR

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
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QUOTE OF THE MONTH

In Alister MacKenzie's GOLF ARCHITECTURE, a selection from my membership in The Classics of Golf, Dr. MacKenzie speaks out in the following quote on his general opinion of what a golf course should offer, "A good golf course is like good music or good anything else; it is not necessarily a course which appeals the first time one plays over it, but one which grows on the player the more frequently he visits it."

The greens are after all 60 years old and made with material in the area such as peat moss. This is why they used to get so hard and never hold a shot. So you get to talking about greens and our greens are very small which causes a problem. The state of golf today is that you make your greens fast. We have done that over the last few years, as a result you eliminate pin placements when you do that. This is what happened to hole 14 in this years best-ball. Front right has been used forever on Sunday in golf tournaments. The green is probably twice as fast as its ever been so people were putting off the green. When you get into that kind of situation everything you do affects other things. So you can't build 3 or 4 new greens and have 14 old ones, because you end up with 4 lightning quick greens and 14 the old way. So that is another example. Some holes are very cluttered on the golf course due to the old design and advent of gas carts. One example being 11 green and 12 tee. There is no place for gas carts, the tee is very close to the preceding green, golfers can reach 11 in two shots, and it is a blind 2nd shot from the bottom of the hill. So safety has to be a factor in an area like that and has to be taken into consideration in a redesign plan. We've got par 4's that are for all practical purposes long par 3's, according to todays golfer that has better equipment and hits the ball farther. So thats another Alot of times problem. tournament day people will wait on the 2nd hole until they are off the green before they hit because they can drive the green. By moving the green 50 yards it solves all sorts of problems. So basically those are the kinds of situations we wanted to look at and the redesign Groesbeck is not significantly different in terms of the layout of the course. We have expanded a couple of holes and shortened a few others, but basically, as mentioned above is the rationale used in the g

redesign of Groesbeck. There are some fine golf holes on this course, they will not be changed other than rebuilding a green or adding a sand trap. The greens need be bigger and tees in cases, but have to be clearly defined in all cases. So with the plan, we will have multiple tees and greens that will be large enough to handle a great amount of traffic. We figure a 60 year old green has had well over 1,000,000 rounds of golf played on it. It's amazing that we have grass on them at all.

Q: Is there anything you would like to add?

A: I think that the biggest thing is that we have taken facilities for granted over the years and they are not totally renewable resources. Our plan was to see to the future of these courses, so that 60 years from now people will be able to say, "Hey, those people knew what they were doing and they thought ahead and they made sure that golf courses in Lansing were available generation too." We feel we are at the point now where we have to do some things. We are getting so much play and Groesbeck is so popular, that if you don't take steps now to ensure the success of these places in the future, we are going to get that downward spiral again that we were fortunate enough 5 to 6 years ago to turn around with support from the community. I realize everybody looks at it as a cost, its going to cost more! Yes, its to cost more, improvements cost! But at least if we have the ability to make those type of improvements and not have to rely on going into a general fund meeting and trying to explain to someone why you need to rebuild a green as opposed to buying a new ambulance for the Fire Department. There is no choice, the Fire Department needs an ambulance, you buy it! At least with golf you have the ability to say we are going to do that and the golfers are going

are going to pick up the tab in the form of an increased fee. So I realize that people don't like to pay more and everyone is on limited budget and seniors are on a fixed income. It is not our intent to raise our golf fees and put it out of reach for anybody! Its still going to be reasonably priced, its not going to be dirt cheap because we do have to cover our costs, but its going to be something to be able to look back 10 years from now and realize that you had something to do with this golf course looking so nice because your green fees in for part these improvements.

Thanks Don for taking time out of your schedule to give us a clearer look at the future of our golf courses.

SANDY'S THOUGHTS AND PREDICTIONS

After seeing where some pins have been placed on the greens and reading the accounts of others, I got my 1990 U.S.G.A. Rule Book out (it came free with my GLAGA membership). I looked through it for the rule that states, "Amateurs should not make birdies in tournaments". Even though I couldn't find it, I'm sure that it must be in there because every tournament seems to be going by this rule.

I really wonder if those involved know the effect that these types of pin placements have on the players? An interesting quote was made in the June 11th Detroit News. Larry Ziegler, a well known and highly thought of touring pro stated: "After playing Dearborn Country Club the scores were a tribute to the golf course. You don't see great rounds with lousy conditions". With this in mind, lets take a long look at the last three tournaments and how the pin placements affected the players.

My friend Jim Donahue stated, "The reason people keep coming back to Portland is because they get to see people that they haven't seen all winter. They get a good meal and they can make birdies, which cures alot of ills". Obviously, the person or persons who set the pins didn't read the last sentence of his statement. Let's look at two holes at Portland and happened:

HOLE #7 (SUNDAY) - With the pin at the crest of the slope on the front the green, only the extremely strong and long hitters could make birdies because they were the only ones who could drive the green. Oh Sure! There were a few teams who made long putts for birdies, the majority of the field made par or worse. I saw more than one club fly after a well played chip or pitch shot ran twenty to thirty feet down the hill and well the cup.

HOLE # 12 (SUNDAY) - This converted par 4 (it used to be and still should be a par 5) was unreachable for 95% of the field on Sunday.

That figure may have been higher because I never saw anyone even beside the green, let alone on it. That wasn't the worst part, the worst part was the fact that the pin was placed behind the front trap about ten feet from the front edge of the green and on a rock hard hump. You basically couldn't reach the green and then couldn't get close enough to even have a decent putt at a par.

PREDICTION: Unless more serious thought is given to pin placements, the size of the field will start to decline. People enjoy Portland as Jim stated, because they can make birdies. Once you take that away, the course and the meal is not enough to keep people coming back. When you add all of this to the fact that Bay Valley (near Saginaw) is going to Tounament the have а Best-Ball the same weekend Portland's, things could change in a hurry.

OAK LANE G.C. - First of all I want to apologize to Bernie Simons for putting the name of his course in the prediction about cheating. The prediction was done to hopefully put some fear into those who shade the rules, not to insinuate that Bernie, Jamie, or their staff would overlook or accept cheating of any kind in their tournament.

About the pin placements, some of the complaints don't merit comment. Tough pin placements on #6, #11, #12, #13, #17 and #18 are all-right just because of the length of the hole. But to put the pin on the front, right corner of #2, just on the green on #3, and on the rear down slope on #8 is not only unfair, but it detracts from a golf course that is one of the most enjoyable and well conditioned in the Central Michigan area.

Watching your putt or chip roll off the green is neither enjoyable or funny. It damages not only your score, but your overall thinking about the course. Oak Lane is just too good of a course and the people who run the course are just too nice to continue to allow this type of thing to happen tournament after tournament.

PREDICTION: Knowing both Bernie and Jamie, I feel that you won't see those three pin placements in the Best-Ball Tournaments. You might in scrambles (and that's allright because you have four shots at it) but not in the Best-Balls.

ALL-CITY BEST-BALL (SPRING): I guess the Lansing State Journal has really covered the pin placement on #14 on Sunday in this year's spring Best-Ball. It seems like every couple of years the guy who sets the pins gets a little carried away. First it was #9, now #14. What hole will be next?

Don Ballard, Sue Carroll, John Johnson and Doug Kelley have worked too hard and have done too much to improve not only Groesbeck, but Waverly as well, to have one carelessly made pin placement detract from all the good that they have done.

It was really bad timing for that to happen. People should have come off the course raving about the shape Groesbeck was in, and they would have -- except for #14. People were mad, disgusted and vocal about what they went through on #14.

PREDICTION: Knowing both Dan and John, this will not happen again. They will make sure of that. Too much is at stake now for that to be allowed to happen again.

One thing that happens on a hole like #14, with that type of pin placement is the back-up of play. With most of your group three and four putting, you'll take some time. One last thing that everyone should know now -- the improvements to #14 will, in time, eliminate the whole problem.

I think the best comment I've heard about the entire pin placement situation came from a veteran player who stated: "I have knocked a putt off a green only once in 34 years until the last two weekends. Since then, I've putted the ball off the green four times, three at Webberville and once at Groesbeck. Sure some were wind-aided, but the pin placements 11 were just unfair and I consider

myself to be a decent putter. That just shouldn't happen to a decent putter".

Pin placements should be fair. They can be hard and still be fair. Putting through the clown's nose belongs on the putt-putt course -- not in best-ball tournaments. Now what you've all been waiting for, my all-city predictions:

The Winner: Gary Domagalski (unless Chris Rule enters)

Second: Gary Domagalski (if Chris Rule enters, otherwise Todd Colthrope)

Third: Tim Russell - Jimmy Ballard begins to smile.

Fourth: Ned Bacon - Loves State and hits it straight.

rifth to Twentieth: not necessarily in order of placement. Ian Peaks, Kevin Miller, Jerry Gunthorpe, Chris Nelson, John Clark, Jim Olsen, Fred Behymer Jr., Tom Jamisoin Jr., Tom Jamison Sr., Hank Schlissberg, Brian Donahue, Jim Dickey, Doug Kahl, Earl Anderson, Mike O'Connor, and Dave Greeley.

Other long-shot candidates: Howard Evans, Bob Aumaugher, Doug Hankey, Dick Wakulsky, Dennis Shumway, and Jim Donahue.

That should cover it.

Edges Evans by Stroke With 222 at Green Meadows

Schubel Rallies to Win All-City Golf Crown

Otto Schubel, 28 - year - old building contractor and a veteran publing golfer, has won many titles, including the city public course crown and a host of best-balls, but he had never won an all-city championship.

Sunday he corrected this as

he stormed from two strokes behind in the final round of the 54-hole tournament at Green Meadows to grab his first allcity title by a single stroke in a stretch race with Howard Evans that wasn't settled until Evans missed a birdie putt on the final hole.

Schubel finished with a 222 total on rounds of 75-75-72, six over par, as the exacting Green Meadows' greens took their toll over the entire field of 38 players who qualified for the final day of play. Evans closed with a 73 to Schubel's 72, losing out with a 78 round Saturday after an opening 72, for 223.

Although the golfers encountered the third day of perfect weather they found the greens as tricky as ever and scores were the highest ever recorded in the event. They ranged as high as 247, 31 over par, and three of the 38 contestants, including five-time champion Bud Reniger, failed to turn in a final card.

The top 10 players earned a slice of the prize fund which saw Schubel pocketing \$100 in a merchandise certificate, along with The State Journal title trophy. Other prize win-ners were Stan Harper, third at 225, Dick Ray fourth at 227, Gordy Wolf fifth at 228, and tied for sixth at 229 were Jim Dickey, Fred Behymer Jr., Dick Hill and George Wakulsky. Jerry Bartlett was all alone at 230 for 10th.

Schubel, who had been second in the all-city three times, almost threw it away on the final hole. Coasting along at two under par for the day he visioned a 69 and tried to hit a No. 7 iron right to the pin on the 162-yard 18th. But it fell short, in a trap, and he blast-ed out well over the green. He chipped long and two-putted for a double bogey five.

Evans was playing right behind him but thought Schubel was one over par instead of even after the double bogey. He hit for the middle of the

green to make sure of his par and a tie but he needed a birdie two to tie and his 30foot putt stopped just short.

"Now I've got one more ambition," said Schubel." I want to win that Country Club bestball with Bud. Reniger next weekend.'

Schubel started the final round in a four-way fie for second two strokes behind Wakulsky. One by one all but Evans fell away. Wakulsky was out in 37 but a triple bogey 8 on the 10th ruined his chances. Dickey was 40 going out and Hill 39, Evans staying with Schubel with a 36.

Then Otto set the pace. He birdied the 10th with a 15-footer and the 13th on an 8-footer. Three putts on the 14th and a trap on the 15th slowed him up but he birdied both the 16th and 17th to go two under. Meanwhile Evans three-putted the 14th for his only bogey but he couldn't buy a birdie, missing sinkable putts on both the 16th and 17th.

Schubel was driving well all through the tournament and got around in 31 putts, birdying all four par fives. Evans hit the ball well all the way but had 10 three-putt greens in the three days and took 36 putts Sunday.

Harper was out in 34 and right in contention but slipped to 40 and a 74. Ray had a 74 to land his fourth spot and Wolf was 75 for fifth. Dickey and Behymer Jr. each had 78s, Hill a 79 and Wakulsky cracked for an 81. Bartlett's 78 just edged Jack Curry who had 74, out of 10th. The other ex-champion in the field, Bob Tansey, tied for 17th at 236.
