

A Golf Fanatic

How many people know or have a person in their family that lives and dies the game of golf (a golf fanatic)? My husband Jim is one of these people. First comes golf and then his wife and children.

When I was young and naive, I never thought that the man I would marry would be so involved with something that should or could be classified as a "kids game". As much as this surprises me, I am even more surprised at the control this "game" has over his life.

When he gave me the TV he had just won and since ours had quit working the week before, I decided to forgive him.

At least once during the summer he will come in and announce to the world that he is through with golf for good. He'll give me a list with prices of all his equipment and tells me if anyone calls to sell everything! Someday I'll fool him and do it.

I could continue but I think by now you have the picture of a true golf fanatic.

Now before you all begin to think that Jim is a jerk and I'm a fool for putting up with him, let me tell you the following: Jim was an All-American golfer (1970) at Central Michigan University. He has maintained a reputation as one of the best golfers in Mid-Michigan and was voted Golfer of the Year in Lansing for 1985. Every year he wins enough to keep me happy and to make up for all the time he is gone from his family.

Now while his interest in golf has waned a little, he started 6 years ago to create a golf association (G.L.A.G.A.) that would help develop and promote golf to all classes of golfers. Jim has done this through the excellent Junior Program that Lansing has now, and also with the advent of The Reniger (Lansing's Masters), which he created and supported from day 1. So the game of golf continues.

Area Golfers Support Anti-Cheating Article

Much to my surprise, within a few days after our members received the December issue of "Golf News", I have received several phone calls supporting my article. One of the calls even came from one of the "player/s in question" himself. It was this phone call (I'll explain why later) plus the number of requests from the other members who called, that prompted me to address their concerns, not only about cheating, but also about the problem of "Slow Play".

When I received the phone call from the "player/s in question", one very important thing became almost shockingly clear; most players who are perceived to be cheating, probably don't even realize that in fact they are cheating. So before I begin to throw rocks at my fellow players, I've decided to take a good long look at myself and see just how I either knowingly or unknowingly violate the rules.

First of all, let me start with the process of playing "Winter Rules" or "Preferred Lies". The United States Golf Association has this to say about "Preferred Lies" and "Winter Rules":

The United States Golf Association does not endorse "preferred lies" and/or "winter rules" and recommends that the Rules of Golf be observed uniformly. Ground under repair is provided for in Rule 25. Occasional abnormal conditions which might interfere with fair play and are not widespread should be defined accurately as ground under repair.

However, adverse conditions are sometimes so general throughout a course that the committee believes "preferred lies" or "winter rules" would promote fair play or help protect the course. Heavy snows, spring thaws, prolonged rains or ext. can make fairways unsatisfactory

and sometimes prevent use of heavy mowing equipment.

When a committee adopts a Local Rule for "preferred lies" or "winter rules", it should be in detail and should be interpreted by the committee, as there is no established code for "Winter Rules". Without a detailed Local Rule, it is meaningless for a committee to post a notice merely saying "Winter Rules Today".

The following Local Rule would seem appropriate for the conditions in question, but the USGA will not interpret it:

A ball lying on a "fairway" may be lifted and cleaned, without penalty, and placed within one club-length of where it originally lay, not nearer the hole, and so as to preserve as nearly as possible the stance required to play from the original lie. A ball so lifted is back in play when the player addresses it or, if he does not address it, when he makes his next stroke at it.

Before a committee adopts a Local Rule permitting "preferred lies' or "winter rules", the following facts should be considered:

- Such a Local Rule conflicts with the Rules of Golf and the fundamental principle of playing the ball as it lies.
- 2."Winter rules" are sometimes adopted under the guise of protecting the course when, in fact, the practical effect is just the opposite they permit moving the ball to the best turf, from which divots are then taken to injure the course further.
- 3.Extended use or indiscriminate use of "preferred lies" or "winter rules" will place players at a disadvantage when competing at a course where the ball must be played as it lies.

In the Lansing area tournaments we use everything from a "club length", "score card width" to "six inches" as to the distance to move the by Jim Donahue ball. Most tournaments also add the phrase "no closer to the hole" in their rule definition. In some tournaments we are allowed to use the club-head to move the ball - while at others you



must lift the ball with your hand. My problems here come from what I perceive as a "club length", "6 inches", etc.. In most cases I only estimate the distance and at times may have violated even this simple rule.

The fact that "preferred lies" or "winter rules" are so vague, only lends to the problems. I've moved the ball (with my club-head) around to get a good lie and when I finally find one I like - who knows if I've stayed in the limits for the tournament? My carelessness added to a vague rule only causes me problems.

Second - this seems to be the latest "major" concern - how you mark your ball. The rule book states: Rule 20-1, Lifting - Note: The position of a ball to be lifted should be marked by placing a ball marker, a small coin or other similar object immediately behind the ball. If the ballmarker interferes with the play, stance or stroke of another player, it should be placed one or more clubhead lengths to the side.

Until recently I've gotten somewhat lax about how I mark the ball-often moving it just slightly to the right or left so as to be away from "spike marks" etc. that I might have to putt out of. Once again - carelessness has probably caused me to violate the rule.

Other things that I've participated in (though not in tournaments) are the infamous "St. Johns rules" regarding hitting a second tee shot off the first tee or the "leaf rule" which allows a player to drop a ball (with no penalty) when a ball is lost in leafs in the fall. These things and things similar to these - most of us

have participated in. So I know I'm guilty here also.

How about the rules governing "Amateur Status"? Most players that I know (including myself) are guilty here also. Let me explain:

Definition of an Amateur Golfer: An amateur golfer is one who plays the game as a non-remunerative or non-profit-making sport.

- Rule I. Forfeiture of Amateur Status at Any Age - The following are contrary to the Definition of an Amateur Golfer and cause forfeiture of amateur status: (I'll only use the ones that really pertain to us.)
- Playing for Prize Money Playing for prize money or its equivalent in a match, tournament or exhibition.
- Note: A player may participate in an event in which prize money or its equivalent is offered, provided that prior to participation he irrevocably waives his rights to accept prize money in the event. (The G.A.M. has stated that this waiver should be done in writing.)
- 4. Prizes, Testimonials and Gifts-
- a. Acceptance of a prize or testimonial of the following character (this applies to total prizes received for any event or series of events in any one tournament or exhibition, including hole-inone or other events in which golf skill is a factor);
- (i) Of retail value exceeding \$500;

(ii) Of a nature which is equivalent of money or makes it readily convertible into money

Exceptions:

- 1. Prizes of only symbolic value (such as metal trophies).
- 2. More than one testimonial award may be accepted from different donors even though their total retail value exceeds \$500, provided they are not presented so as to evade the \$500 value limit for a single award. (Testimonial awards relate to notable performances or contributions to golf, as distinguished from tournament prizes.)
- b. Conversion of a prize into money.
- Accepting expenses in any amount as a prize.
- d. Because of golf skill or golf reputation, accepting in connection with any golfing event:
- (i) Money or
- (ii) Anything else, other than merchandise of nominal value provided to all players.
- 8. Golf Equipment

Because of golf skill or golf reputation, accepting golf balls, clubs, golf merchandise, golf clothing or golf shoes, directly or indirectly, from anyone manufacturing such merchandise without payment of current market price.

Now let's see where I have probably violated my "Amateur Status" -

#2 - Playing for Prize Money -All the "cash scrambles" that I, like

many of you, have played in - and accepted cash prizes - well there's one violation. Even when I've turned in a letter to protect myself, if I took the money anyway, I've still violated the rule. Still in this areathose players who go to Florida, Texas, etc. and play in the Mini-Tour events and who do not file a disclaimer and then return to Michigan to play in amateur tournaments are asking for trouble.

#4 (ii) Converting merchandize into cash - Violation Number 2. I've (like many of you) have taken a "dozen balls and the rest in cash" or redeemed my merchandize gift certificate for cash at a slightly less value than the gift certificate stated.

Dave Greeley's case makes an interesting point here. Dave basically gave up his amateur status so as to be able to teach classes for Lansing Community College. He called the U.S.G.A. and was told that if he received any money for teaching anyone or any class, he would be in violation of the rules governing "amateur status". How many of us are in violation here? I've actually seen posting at some local driving ranges where local amateurs are offering to teach classes. These individuals should realize that they are in violation of the rules governing "amateur status" and it would only take one phone call to cause them a great many problems that - as Doug Kahl found out - could take a year or more to get straightened out.

After glancing at the 1993 USGA Rule Book, I'm sure that if I went from rule to rule, I would violate many, many more rules. So my goal this year is to make a more conscious effort to play "by the rules".

#8 Golf Equipment - the key wording here is "current market price". This vague definition leads me to believe that this violation number 3. I try to get my equipment as cheap as possible and I've been offered deals that because of the actual cost of the equipment, were just too good to turn down. So without a clear definition of "current market

price", I'm pretty sure that this is violation number 3.

Now for "Slow Play". This has become a problem not only in Lansing - but at most courses all over the world. Rounds taking 5 to 6 hours are very common. Why? Well longer and more difficult courses sure don't help. But it is more than that.

Harvey Penick - in his "Little Red Book" had this to say about slow play: "Taking two or three practice swings before every shot when you are on the course playing golf takes up too much time. In these days of the four-or-five-hour rounds, we need to speed up the game, not slow it down."

"At many courses in Scotland and England there is a sign on the first tee that says, "A round of golf requires no more than 3 hours and 15 minutes. If you are on the course longer than this, a marshal will come escort you off."

"You don't see those Scots loitering in the fairway to take practice swings."

Slow play happens in many ways - pacing off distances for shots; not being ready to play; fiddling around on the green - such as being too obsessed with conditions, ball alignment, etc. Having exaggerated preshot routines that are long and contrived. It goes on and on.

What can be done? First of all pair the known slowest players in the last groups. This way you reward the faster players while not punishing the slower players.

Second - enforce your time limits. Getting warned, penalized and possibly disqualified has a unique way of speeding up play.

Third - and finally - just tell the slow players that you know that their slow play is very annoying and to try and improve on their speed.

Well - now that I've addressed everything that was requested, I ask all you members to write to me and explain some of the things you don't like about slow play and/or cheating, so that we can share this with our readers.

*Next issue - Cheating - Clever ways it's being done.


"Round Table Discussions" To Become a Regular Feature of "Golfnews"

In My Opinion

To whom it may concern:

I have been golfing for the past twenty years and during those years I have gotten progressively better. Amongst my golfing competitors, I have been labeled a slow player. It has always appeared to me that many of my fellow competitors have a mental attitude of "hurry up, hit your ball and get out of the way", of which I could never fully understand or control because of my competitive desire to be highly proficient.

As my game became progressively better, I ventured out to try to qualify for larger events, such as the Michigan Open, U.S. Open, Buick Open, Milwaukee Open, and I have played in amateur tournaments in Georgia, Wisconsin, Iowa, Indiana, Puerto Rico and Phoenix. In all of those experiences I have never been approached about my pace of play by a tournament official. During the last five years of my Lansing golf experiences, I have succeeded in being ranked as one of the top golfers, winning two match play championships, placing several top finishes in the all-city and Reniger tournaments, being selected on several allcity teams and winning this year's long drive contest and placing second in 1990.

I am only making references to my golf accomplishments, not to be boastful, rather to point out that golf is an avocation of which I have been successful in obtaining a high competitive level. However, in the recent tournament, All-City Medal at Ledge Meadows Golf Course, after the first 5 holes of the tournament I was harassed by Chuck Pohl the Club Pro, who felt the need to confront me personally about our threesome playing slow. This was not the first time I have experienced the subtleties of harassment in the golfing context; however, it was for me the straw that broke the camels back! Pohl singled me out calling my name and saying, "I have a good idea the reason for the slow play in this group." Not only was his accusation highly unprofessional, it had no validity because during the course of the 5 holes,

my playing competitors had taken just as much time reading and lining up their putts as I did, and also one player in the threesome had two errant T-shots which slowed up play. Chuck Pohl's professional approach should have addressed the threesome rather than singling me out personally. The All-City rules for slow play state that golfers will be given warning the 1st time; 2nd time a 2 - stroke penalty; and 3rd time disqualification.

I ask myself, what could have prompted Chuck Pohl to attack me personally? Was it because I was one of the favorites to win the tournament? Was it because I had gotten too much press coverage? Was it because I'm Black? Or could it be all three? According to one of my fellow competitors, who remarked, "He is the tournament official, Earl". And who later stated in private that Pohl's behavior was out of line. Well, needless to say I lost my concentration and my golf score ballooned to an 84 during the first round.

We all know that golf was one of the last sports which allowed the blackman on the scene. Today the white elitist mentality has not changed, rather social pressures have given way to minor changes, like: "Blacks get to swing their clubs on some courses now"! I guess coming from the south and enduring that mentality as a way of life is something that really never leaves just because you are in the "liberal" north. I have established myself in Lansing for the past 25 years as a respected professional working with children of Lansing. I work to help rid children from being afraid of life, of accomplishing any goal no matter what the challenge. So I guess after this incident, I'll have to practice what I preach; however I'll never forget this incident and I can't say it hasn't taken me back to my "good old days" in Georgia when I used my 6 iron in a field because I wasn't allowed to play on a course.

In closing, just a question to Chuck Pohl, "Do you know your reasons?"

P.S. Maybe white men can jump and Black Men CAN play golf!!!!



Chip Shots

- The Aluminum Shaft will return.
 Once thought to be the Edsel of the golf manufacturing industry, it is once again being strongly considered for use in the next couple of years. It is known that at least one major manufacturer has committed to its use.
- Hogan Company to move. Ben Hogan Company has finalized plans for a 150,000 square foot facility in Richmond, Virginia. The research and development aspect of the company will stay in Fort Worth, Texas.
- Contrary to current Hogan advertisements, we have learned that the Hogan Company is working on a "cast" club head which is to be unveiled at the Golf Manufacturers show in Orlando.
- Strange and Baker-Finch switch.
 Curtis Strange and Ian Baker-Finch didn't have to fight to switch, but they have switched golf balls. Both players have switched from "Maxfli" to Titleist". The main reason \$750,000 each for 3 years. Other players who have worked out deals with Titleist and/or Foot Joy are: Brad Faxon, Rocco Mediate, Colin Montgomerie and Peter Senior. Look for a golf-ball war with Spalding and Maxfi striking back.
- Too many Club Pros? According to the P.G.A., by the end of the 1990's there could by 115% more Club Pros than there are clubs for them to be at. At the PGA delegates 76th meeting in philadelphia in November a goal was set to enhance entrance requirements. Already objections to this plan are being made. Roger Maxwell of Marriott's VP-golf development and operations stated: "The answer is not to restrict growth, but to increase

- competition." Look for this to get more heated in the near future.
- Spring clothing trends for 1993. For you fashion buffs here are the latest and the greatest:
 - -Look for bright colors to make a comeback - not the wild colors, but rather classics blended with brighter shades.
 - -Microfibers are becoming even more important in rain suits, wind breakers, etc. As the technology improves, the prices will drop and they'll be an even greater influence.
 - -Basics, solid shirts with jacquard collars and cuffs and/or color blocks will be popular.

- Tour Edition ball makes comeback. According to Spalding, The most precise ball in golf is the Tour Edition. They (Spalding) feel that if you're looking for a ball with ultimate control, consistency and prestige, look for the Tour Edition ball. The Tour Edition ball has been redesigned, featuring a new cover, center and packaging for both the Tour Edition 90 and 100.

The Tour Edition has a new and improved zinthane cover which creates uniformly thin cover walls, providing superior consistency and trueness.

In addition to the new cover, a new reformulated softer center has been developed which is perfectly balanced and round, resulting in superior consistency and accuracy. The result of the new cover and new core is the highest precision and performance golf ball which has been proven on the P.G.A. Tour. According to Spalding, their tour players are an integral part of the Research and Development Team. Since Craig Stadler and Nick Price have used the new Tour Edition golf ball, Price has won the PGA Championship and the H.E.B. Texas Open while Stadler won the NEC World Series of Golf.

- Stu White, take notice. A recent ad in a golf publication states: "In the past 20 years, I've had 4 cars, 2 wives and 1 Bag Boy Cart." Stu, you're walking proof of that
- US Grips challenge Eaton and Lamkin. The leather - look rubber grip game has a new player.
 US Grips has entered the game and with Gary McCord as a spokesman they hope to impact the "leather-look" grip market. The most interesting aspect of this grip is that you can have your name engraved right on the grip.
- Nicklaus introduces new clubs.
 The new "Nichlaus N1" irons and metal woods are out. They look very similar to the new Toney Penra irons. They are very contemporary looking clubs. The irons are forged and have Linear Dynamics stamped on the back. The metal wood has a hollowed-out sole.

T.V. Coverage Unclear

At the time of this printing, it is still unclear if there will be national coverage of the LPGA's Oldsmobile Classic which is being held the last week of May at Walnut Hills Country Club. How To Speed Up Play:

- Keep your eye on your ball at all times and also watch other member's shots in case of lost balls.
- When it is safe to hit, fire away at the green, even though you may not be away.
- Always be ready to putt. It may be beneficial to putt out instead of marking. Miss them quick!
- Keep up with the group ahead don't worry about the group behind. This doesn't mean hitting into them.
- 5. Limit yourself to one practice swing per shot.

Practice Tips:

- 1. Chipping; You don't need much room to do this. A lawn, park or ball diamond will do. Begin at 10 yards and move back 10 yards at a crack. Use a lofted club and really concentrate, hitting toward some target. Over 50% of all golf shot are taken from within 60 yards of the green. This practice develops a sense for judging distance also.
- 2. Putting; You can save more strokes in golf here than any other place but most people don't practice this either enough or with a purpose in mind. Putting can be done on your carpet! Practice making 3-4 foot putts on a flat surface until you can sink 3 of 4. The long putts are fun to make but most of us can't consistently make anything over 6'. The best we can hope to do is 2 putt. However, think you can make all putts. Practice with only one ball after you are warmed up and have a rhythm. Play little games on the putting greens make two putts par and then play 9 hole rounds and see how close to par you can get.

- 3. Irons/Driver; Determine which iron you hit best and then do 80% of you practice with this club. I personally like my 8-iron so I use it the most. Some like their 150yard club but its really up to you. You swing all clubs the same so a grooved swing with one club will carry over to other clubs. The driver is important so it needs to be practiced, but most people practice it too much and easily tire. Most young golfers, and older ones for that matter, would be far better off driving with a 3wood. It gets the ball airborne, is hit straighter and usually just as
- 4. Keeping Score; All swings at the ball count a stroke as do all 2" putts. They have to be recorded. You can't improve if you cheat on your scoring. Golf assumes we are all honest individuals. It's mentally painful to have to count strokes we don't like but then that is why no one has ever mastered the game. Tis a humbling experience.

In Conclusion:

- Begin to develop a sense for the game, its history, tradition, stars and the beauty of the course.
 Don't forget the people you play with either.
- 2. Play as much as you wish with your folks, but on the tour, adults are not allowed to accompany you. It is good practice to play with strangers and really see where your game is with out anyone advising you as to club, distance or strategy. Most of you had no problem with this rule. We have some grand plans for 1993 and the Junior Tour and want you to be a part of them. So keep thinking good thought and see you in the spring.

Following are some categories dealing with golf that are intended to increase enjoyment and ability. Hopefully you will read them over and take what you can from them.

Golf Etiquette:

Golf etiquette is how a golfer behaves and acts on the golf course so as to reflect positively on both the game and on him (her) self. Following are some thoughts.

- 1. Even though your ball may not have left a mark on the green, take time to repair at least one pitch mark on each green in addition to your own. Most golf courses will provide you with a tool just for this purpose. Use it!
- On most iron shots, a divot is produced. Please replace this and lightly tap the divot down with your foot.
- 3. Never walk in front of someone who is hitting a shot. Some of our junior players confused fast play with unsafe play. Arriving on the green before everyone has hit on is included in this.
- 4. When removing the flagstick from the cup, do so gently and then lay the stick down, don't drop it.
- Always place your bag on the side of the green closest to the next teeing area. This speeds up play and prevents you possibly getting hit by someone approaching the green.
- Record scores on the next tee, not on the green.
- Mark your ball on the green and always be ready to putt when it is your turn. One person at a time putts.
- 8. Never hit into the group in front of you. This is not what we mean by fast play.



Tour Stops - Junior Tour

Both 9's were used for today's Qualifier. 7-12 year olds played the front 9 from the red tees; 13-17 year olds the back 9 from the whites. Following this round, the 9 & 18 hole venues were established thusly: any front 9 golfer to break 50 was placed into the 18-hole tour along with any back 9 golfer to break 60. 



Chip Shots

 Is Experimenting with Equipment and swing changes good or bad?

Tom Kite, a hero to all the local experimenters, sees some bad but a lot of good in experimenting. In a recent issue of *Golf World* he states: "If I had a fault in the past, it was that I liked to fiddle around. I say 'fault' because if you go too far, there's a good chance it will hurt you. The trick is to try out a lot of things, test their relevance and keep the good and throw out the load."

"I think I did the right thing, though. I heard that Thomas Edison experimented with 700 different types of filaments before he got a light bulb that worked. When they asked him about it, he told them he'd gone about it the right way, that by the time he got to number 700, he knew there were 699 filaments that he didn't need to try out."

 Seeking a better game through instruction?

Most players feel that going to the world class instructors is the ultimate cure for your game's ills. But that is not always true. At the recent Johnnie Walker Tournament Seve Ballesteros was seen working long and hard with golf guru David Leadbetter. Two days later - after rounds of 76 and 82, Seve was again on the shag range - this time with Ian Woosnam. The result - Ballesteros finished dead last at 26 over par.

This seems like a natural progression for David. He has won several local events (including the All-City "Match Play" Championship) and has a very good working knowledge of the swing. Dave should be able to easily pass this knowledge on to anyone who goes to him for lessons.

The Amateur Community will miss Dave, but we wish him success.

Equipment - 1993

- Taylor Made enters glove market. Taylor Made introduces two new gloves for 1993. One is constructed of top-of-the-line sheepskin leather and comes in "pearl" color only. The other glove is a (white only) all-weather glove made of a leather-like synthetic material. Both gloves feature long cuffs and come in all sizes - both left and right handed.
- Bickler "Chipping" Trainer. The Bickler Chipping Trainer is designed to help keep the wrists firm throughout the chip shot. The chipping trainer is a forked metal instrument that attaches to the top of the wedge through the grip cap while the arm serves as a pad used to brace the right forearm throughout the stroke. It will help keep your wrist firm and helps develop a steady, consistent chipping stroke.
- Spalding introduces "Thunder Heat" Driver. This new driver is slightly oversized with graphite insert. Spalding claims that by taking the weight out of the face and moving it to the perimeter of the clubhead, they have basically done the same thing as has been done with perimeter-weighted irons. The driver comes with either a graphite or steel shaft.
- Maruman's Clubs. If you're into "status clubs", then the new Maruman irons are for you. This club is used by both Curtis Strange and Ian Woosnam. The suggested retail price for a 2 to PW set is \$1200.00+.
- Callaway introduces the "Heavenwood". If you have been watching the golf tournaments on T.V., then you have no doubt seen Johnnie Miller pushing the new

Callaway Big Bertha 7-wood (Heavenwood). This club is suppose to be an alternative to your long irons.

Powerbilt introduces the "TPXL" drivers. The "TPXL" spells more power through science. This new line of metalwoods is scientifically designed and engineered for maximum performance. The "Ellipsoid of Power" is parallel to the scoring lines and produces a more forgiving and effective hitting area. The scooped sole is designed to produce greater clubhead speed and the bore - through shaft helps provide feel. These drivers come in 7.5 degree, 9.0 degree, 10.5 degree and 12 degree lofts with a wide selection of steel and graphite shafts available.

Glenbrier Golf Course

There will be a lot of noticeable differences at Glenbrier Golf Course when it opens April 1st.

The first thing you'll notice is the new maintenance facility and paved parking areas. This is just the beginning as several changes have been made on the course.

The front nine dramatically changed. The 4th hole, originally a 125 yard par 3 has been changed to a par four. It measures 340 yards and is a tight dogleg left with a tee shot requiring up to 180 yard carry over water. The green is surrounded by

trees and an approach shot from the fairway is in most cases required.

The 5th hole remains a par four although it has been changed to a 350 yard dogleg to the right. The hole requires a 180-210 yard tee shot with the approach shot needing to avoid water in front and behind the green.

The 7th hole originally a 265 yard par four has been converted to a par 3 and plays to a maximum of 186 yards. The green has 4 sand traps added for help defining the required tee shot.

On the back nine the par 4 14th hole is being changed to a 90 degree

dogleg left. And will be opened in early June 1993. It measures 308 yards and seems very tempting to shoot at the green from the tee. Looks can be deceiving as the green is well protected by water in front and entirely around the back and side.

The 15th hole will be lengthened by 40 yards when revisions to the 14th hole are ready for play.

The course also added over 200 assorted pine and maple last fall to help beautify and give more definition to the fairways.
