Salt and Light

My attention has recently been drawn to the concept of salt and light. Searching the internet for “how to be salt and light in the world today” gives interesting thoughts. You may recognize guidance along these lines from religions and social teachings. Here is some of what has come to my mind, as we continue our Lions Club year.

Light

Light is necessary for human eyes to see the world, our loved ones, or how we can serve our communities. Helen Keller called upon Lions to be Knights of the Blind – and we do so, by helping people obtain eyeglasses, vision screenings, eyesight research. We spread light by looking for ways to serve our communities, local, state, national, international. We Lions individually, or as a Club help address Lions global causes; support Lions Clubs International Foundation, the West Virginia Lions Sight Conservation Foundation and West Virginia state service projects; and help guide young people to become leaders, for instance through Leo Clubs.

We spread light and we see light in others by being open to ideas, points of view, and working together for the common good; making a point to look for Service opportunities; promoting peace within our Clubs, communities, and country; being a Servant Leader.

Salt

Over many centuries, salt has been used as both a preservative and flavor enhancer. The right amount of salt is necessary for human life: too little or too much can damage health. And that amount is small, as evidenced by laboratory tests. Similarly, the right amount of salt, a tiny fraction of the pot's contents, in chicken coup makes it delicious. So, a small amount goes a long way.

None of us can solve all the world's problems. In our Lions Clubs and communities, "small" acts, mere ideas or suggestions, or a smile, all perform like salt to preserve and enhance our Service and Fellowship. By helping others and taking away even a tiny fraction of their pain, that is kindness, goodness and service.



He asked us to pass along his gratitude, personal story reflecting the incredible impact your support has on the lives of people who are blind or visually impaired, as well as a challenge to all Lions for the future. Please take a moment to read his letter below:

Dear Fellow Lions,

On behalf of myself, my guide dog Tucker, and the 18,000 other men and women whose lives have been forever changed by the gift of independence, I want to extend my deepest gratitude to Lions Clubs across North America for your unwavering support of Leader Dogs for the Blind.

Because of you, people who are blind or visually impaired have found their way safely, confidently, and independently. Because of you, lives have been restored, dreams rekindled, and barriers broken. The story of Leader Dog begins with the Lions, and its success continues because of you.

Our Shared History

More than 85 years ago, Lion Dr. Glenn Wheeler lost his vision and needed support. When he was denied access to the only guide dog organization around, three of his fellow Lions took on the challenge to build their own. **From day one, the Lions and Leader Dog have been inseparable. Without the Lions Club, there would be no Leader Dog.** That partnership remains one of the greatest testaments to our motto: We Serve.

As a Leader Dog client myself, I've personally experienced the life-changing power of this mission. I received both Orientation & Mobility training and my first guide dog through Leader Dog in 2022. My dog, Tucker, has given me more than just mobility, he's given me freedom, confidence, and the ability to serve others again.

Every day, I see how your support makes this possible, not only for me, but for countless others. Many of these people are in your very own district.

A Challenge for Today's Lions

Leader Dogs for the Blind provides all its services completely free of charge to clients, but the cost to train one guide dog exceeds thousands of dollars. That's why your continued involvement is absolutely vital. Leader Dog's entire mission is sustained through donations, and the Lions are the heart of that support.

You have already built something extraordinary. But the need is greater than ever.

Across the world, millions of people who are blind or visually impaired are longing for mobility and independence. So, I challenge every Lions Club in the U.S. and Canada to:

1. **Continue and increase your financial support.** If your club already donates, thank you! Consider increasing your contribution or setting a new fundraising goal this year. Every dollar makes a difference.
2. **Encourage members to get involved personally.** Become puppy raisers, breeding hosts, or district-level Leader Dog Chairs. Your time and leadership multiply the mission far beyond financial giving.
3. **Promote awareness in your communities.** Host a Leader Dog presentation or invite a graduate

like me to speak. Share the story of how your club's support changes lives. People give when they see the results.

4. **Strive to become a Top Dog Club.** Clubs that contribute \$5,000 USD or more in a fiscal year earn this distinction, recognition of true dedication to the legacy Lions began in 1939.

My Personal Gratitude

Because of the Lions, a single act of service in 1939 continues to ripple outward, touching lives across the world one cane and one harness at a time. From the bottom of my heart, thank you. Thank you to every Lion who ever raised a puppy, made a donation, referred someone to Leader Dog, or who simply believed in the power of independence.

My guide dog Tucker and I are the result of your service. Every step we take is a reminder of your compassion, your vision, and your enduring commitment to serving others.

But our work isn't finished. The next person waiting for their chance to walk freely is counting on us. Let us honor the Lions who came before us, those who founded Leader Dog and lit the path of service we walk today by ensuring that path continues forward.

Let's renew our commitment. Let's expand our reach. Let's ensure that every person who is blind or visually impaired can experience the same independence that your support has made possible.

The world needs more independence. Leader Dog needs more Lions. And together, we make that happen.

As we look ahead to our District and Multiple District Conventions, below are several steps our clubs can take to ensure we remain in good standing. Now is the ideal time to begin preparing.

1. Convention Dates:

- District 29-L: March 13-14, 2026
- Multiple District 29: May 15-17, 2026

These dates will help your club to determine the number of delegates allowed and identify any outstanding dues or fees that must be paid.

2. Number of delegates:

- District Secretary/Treasurer PDG Bill Syphers will be sending out e-mails/letters to each club letting you know how many delegates your club is allowed.

3. Club Balances:

- Clubs need to work with the club's treasurer to ensure the club's account is not outstanding. All balances must be paid at least 15 days before participating in district and multiple district conventions. Failure to pay outstanding balances may result in your club being ineligible to vote.


