Lion AI

AI – Artificial Intelligence – is much in the news these days. Some say it is our future and super-powerful; some say it is super-dangerous and will lead to humanity's downfall. I tend to be in the center between such extremes, middle ground, a "third way." As such I think we can gain great benefit from such tools, as long as we think about and examine the topic and AI's answers. The AI tool's output may not be perfectly true. And let's not leave all the "creativity," as it were, up to that tool.

With that caveat, there is a very useful tool at Lions International's homepage https://www.lionsclubs.org/ — "Lion AI". It is in red letters, at the top of the page, and you need not have a login username or password and need not enter the Lions Portal. Upon clicking on that link, it appears:

Want to learn more? Head to the About Lion AI webpage for tips, tools and even some sample prompts.

The Lion AI tool goes by the name Ellie. That link above gives some explanation of Ellie. Ellie is Lions Clubs specific. Ellie is "trained" on Lions International documents: Constitution, By-Laws, LCI Board Policy Manual (currently 395 pages long, in the English version), brochures, all the stuff in the Member Resource Center, on and on.

Oh, this is so much better than the "search" function at the home page (that works poorly for me most times). You can ask Ellie a question, or request information in plain English. She pays attention to the combination of words you enter. She might figure out mistyped words. She will come back with an answer, and then you can refine or request a follow-up query. You can ask Ellie for the reference to her answers.

Some examples:

- "what are lions global causes"
- "tell me about knights of the blind"
- "give me an example of an eyesight screening event"
- "give an outline for forming a new Lions Club in rural West Virginia (Ellie listed 9 steps)"

• "explain the difference between activities and administration accounts for a Lions Club"

Ellie's answer to that last request is:

In a Lions Club, funds are typically managed through two separate accounts: the Activities Account and the Administration Account. Here's a breakdown of the differences between them:

1. Activities Account:

- Purpose: This account is used exclusively for funds raised by the public through fundraising activities. The money in this account is intended for charitable purposes and community service projects.
- Usage: Funds from the Activities Account must be used for the benefit of the community or to support Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) initiatives. They cannot be used for administrative expenses of the club.
- Transparency: It is important to maintain transparency and accountability in how these funds are used, ensuring they are directed towards the intended charitable activities.

2. Administration Account:

- **Purpose:** This account is used for the club's operational and administrative expenses. It is funded through club dues and other internal sources, not through public fundraising.
- o **Usage:** Funds from the Administration Account cover costs such as meeting expenses, club supplies, and other administrative needs necessary for the club's operation.
- o **Flexibility:** Unlike the Activities Account, the Administration Account can be used for any expenses related to the club's internal operations.

By keeping these accounts separate, Lions Clubs ensure that funds raised by the public are used solely for charitable purposes, while administrative costs are covered by the club's own resources. This separation helps maintain trust and integrity within the community and among club members.

If you have any more questions or need further clarification, feel free to ask! Is this what you need?

The Lion AI page says "Ellie (beta) is still learning and will make mistakes. Only publicly available information is used to train Ellie (beta)" I suggest you try it out, play with it – you may get some useful ideas, that your human Lions Club can build upon.

Please let me know about upcoming service projects, events and significant meetings. I hope to be able to attend.

Alaska Update – Typhoon Halong – District 49A has applied for an emergency grant to assist with disaster relief. District 49B has not requested a grant at this time, citing the robust support provided by Alaska Native Corporations along the northwest coast. REPORT SERVICE - Did you know?

- Every district has a goal to increase the percentage of clubs that report service! District leaders can access Insights Reports in the Lion Portal to view the number of service activities reported by each club.
- If you're a district leader, here are a few ways to help your district reach its reporting goal:
- Connect with club leaders. Find out who is responsible for service reporting and offer your support. Share the benefits of reporting service activities.
- Encourage clubs to elect a service chairperson. This person can take ownership of reporting if that works best for the club.
- Provide coaching. Walk service chairpersons and club secretaries through the steps of reporting service in the portal.
- Appoint a district IT chairperson. This role can provide hands-on assistance to clubs entering service activities.
- Let's work together to make District 29L proud by ensuring every club reports at least one service project each month!


