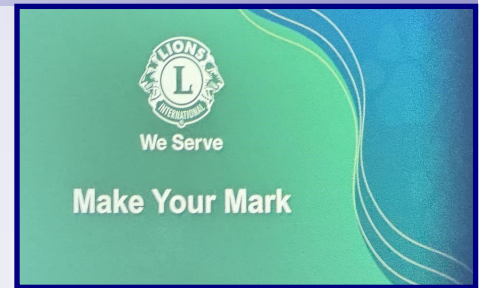

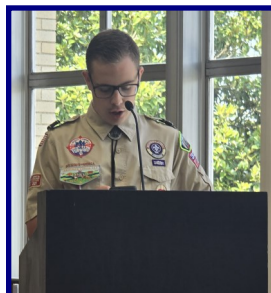
These extraordinary young men really reinforce my belief, which is my theme for this year: Together We Can Make a Difference For "That One".

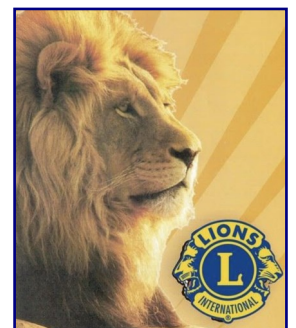

The Role of the MD Global Leadership Team Coordinator

What's it all about? What's his role? What are his plans?

When you carefully review the duties of this position as articulated by Lions International (Rev.7/1/2023), you will find fifteen bulleted items under the section on Actions for Success. I personally find this language pretty daunting in its scope so I have decided to boil it all down for you into six main functions that I feel are important enough to focus on this year and that will ensure a positive net membership growth for our multiple district, which will allow us to meet the goal of Mission 1.5 and allow us to **Make Your Mark!**

Those functions are as follows:

Training (who? when? and at what level? - From club officers through to current district governors

Communication (what and with whom?) – Most importantly, with club leaders, zone chairpersons, and newer Lions. It goes without saying that district leadership and Global Action Team members must be in the information loop.

Reporting (what and to whom?) - Learning opportunities, what's in the Lions Learning Center, and reporting successes in Learn

Identifying (Who) – Lions with leadership potential who demonstrate an aptitude and desire for leadership positions

Promoting (What?) – leadership opportunities, training events, online learning tools, and LI sponsored seminars and institutes.

Maintaining (what and where?) – calendar of events. leadership development tools and resources, and informational articles of interest and use for Lions at all levels, which will be maintained on our multiple district and district web sites.

I wanted to use this first article to introduce myself as your multiple district global leadership team coordinator, give you some idea of my expectations of the role, share my goals for the year with you and invite your input.

I have three simple goals for this year: 2024-2025:

- 1) Improve communication across Multiple District 29 among all stakeholders at all levels regarding the challenges that we have in leadership development.
- 2) Enhance the promotion of leadership development training events, both for in-person and facilitator led events, that would enhance West Virginia Lions leadership skills and provide them encouragement.
- 3) Increase the number of Lions within the multiple district who are willing to take on higher leadership roles as part of a sound succession plan for each district.

Over the next five months I will offer an article on each of the following five critical areas of membership function:

Orientation Membership Recruitment Membership Retention
Extension Leadership Development

I'll leave you this month with one of my favorite quotes from Stephen F. Covey on his definition of leadership: ***“Leadership is communicating to people their worth and potential so clearly that they come to see it in themselves.”*** This must be our ultimate mission as district and multiple district leaders!

Adopt-A-Highway/ Adopt a River or Stream

Two suggestions for your club's environmental project are activities that are both popular and fun! They are also excellent opportunities to invite those folks who may become potential members. These two programs are conducted by two different WV agencies but have similar goals: to keep our highways, trails and rivers & streams clean of litter.

The Adopt-A-Highway Program is co-sponsored by the Division of Highways and the Department of Environmental Protection, REAP Program. It was established in the late 1980s to improve the quality of the state's environment by encouraging public involvement in the elimination of highway litter. The program offers volunteers the opportunity to take charge of their own environment by making a positive effort to create a cleaner, more aesthetic place in which to live.

Anyone who is at least 12 years old may participate. Any road that is maintained by the Division of Highways is eligible for adoption, with the exception of Interstates and roads deemed unsafe. Volunteers may select a road to adopt and then have it approved by the local Division of Highways office, or they may ask DOH to suggest an adoptable road. Country lanes, dirt roads and routes off the beaten path, as well as major routes, may be adopted. Adopted roads must be at least two miles long.

Adoptions are for a period of two years, during which time three cleanups are required per year. As volunteers pick up litter, bags that have been filled are placed on roadsides for removal and disposal by the Division of Highways. Garbage bags, safety vests, safety training, traffic warning signs, and gloves are furnished by the state.
