In January, I attended the 2025 Wilderness and Primitive Trails Summit in Eureka. This event, hosted by the Bigfoot Trail Alliance, was important for our North State BCHC Units as we continue to forge partnerships with Northern California and Southern Oregon volunteer trail work organizations that have similar missions and goals. At this meeting, I was introduced to Trevor Meyer with the Siskiyou Mountain Club based in Ashland. Since then, we scheduled with Trevor a chainsaw classroom and field training and certification opportunity on March 28-29. Grider PCT work scheduled

As we wait for the snow to melt on the trails and campgrounds at the higher elevations, we have scheduled a Pacific Crest Trail log-out weekend on April 18-20 on the southbound trail out of Grider Creek TH. This work will be done with chainsaws on foot because the trail is too dangerous for safe stock use at this time. Sawyers must provide their own saws and PPE. Swampers are also needed for this event. The poison oak and ticks will be out at this location, so please wear appropriate clothing and bring repellent.

Carter Meadows work: We have scheduled our Carter Meadows work weekend for June 4-8. 2025. Youth Packing teams prep for Rendezvous

With Rendezvous closer to home this year, our Unit has the opportunity to send youth packing teams to compete and learn. The Youth Packing competition at Rendezvous will challenge children ages 12-17 to work in pre-determined teams of four to earn points by attending education clinics and showing their skills in team challenges, such as balanced load and team packing on an iron mule.

In January, Jamie Essex offered to take lead on forming teams for this competition, and through the magic of social media and Jamie and Scott Essex's vast network, we were able to recruit six coaches and mentors and eight local youth, ages 12-15, to learn about packing and build the skills to compete on April 12-13 at Rendezvous. The teams have been practicing and learning each Sunday at Double H Ranch in Yreka.

The Top of the State Unit is helping sponsor these teams by providing western shirts and camping spots at the event.

Packing Competitions

April 12 & 13 | Equestrian Center at Rolling Hills Casino, Corning, CA

Adult Competitions

BOX HITCH AND DIAMOND HITCH SPEED COMPETITIONS:

Animals and all equipment will be provided. One packer will load and balance boxes with load provided. He/She will put boxes on the mule from each side. He/She will then put mantee on the mule properly, tucking all corners and top, then tie box hitch or a single diamond hitch of your choice. Speed and correctness of procedures will be split 50%-50%. This is a timed event and faults will incur a time penalty. Clean run beats a fault.

COST TO ENTER: \$20 EACH

PACKING CONTEST (ODD LOAD/BALANCED LOAD):

Animals and all equipment will be provided. A two-packer team will use live mules. The teams will be provided with two separate loads, one top load and one side load. The team will load the top load items provided on one mule, and tie on securely with a box or diamond hitch. The team will load the side load items on the other mule, and tie on securely with a box or diamond hitch establishing the best possible weight balance. The pack animals will then be led from the ground around a cone to establish stability. Scores will be a combination of time and load balance.

Intercollegiate and Youth Packing Competitions

Contests will be similar to the Bishop Mule Days competitions, however the packing systems to be used will include Decker and Salmon River packing systems along with traditional sawbucks.

Intercollegiate teams: Will consist of four college students who will compete in team and individual contests. Teammates may also gain points for their teams by attending any education events during Rendezvous.

Youth teams: Will consist of four students, ages 12-17, who will compete in team and individual contests. Teammates may also gain points for their teams by attending any education events during Rendezvous. Teams will be sponsored and trained by BCHC Units.


