The prospect of losing this beautiful house that was so representative of Orange Park's past galvanized a group of citizens to band together and petition the Town to spare Mrs. Clarke's home. The success of the group's efforts led them to form our historical society to preserve other aspects of our town's history. We are grateful for their efforts to preserve our heritage and provide a foundation for those that have followed. The Clarke House was built with a family in mind and many memories were created there. Please join us as we celebrate Mrs. Clarke on March 8 and make memories with your family at the Clarke House.



Quarterly Member Meeting

Please join us at 5:30 PM, Tuesday, March 18 at the Orange Park Library for our next Quarterly Member Meeting. Bob Scallan will present "Heroes, Legends, Histories, and Mysteries". Bob will delve into the lesser-known aspects of Clay County's history, presenting intriguing narratives that highlight obscure events and figures. Bob will explore a range of topics, including the enigmatic Humanzee, unsolved sheriff murders, the historical significance of covered bridges, the contributions of Washington Gano Benedict, the founder of Orange Park, and the mysteries surrounding unmarked graves in Magnolia Cemetery. His examination will reveal compelling stories from the community that may be unfamiliar to many residents, inviting them to discover the rich and hidden history of their surroundings. Black History Walks - Our First Experiences

The Society conducted historical walks through Magnolia Cemetery on February 15th and 22nd to highlight the key Black families in Orange Park's history. We invited family members and acquaintances to tell these stories in their own words and supplemented with researched talking points along the way.

Our first Saturday offering was greeted with rain but still folks stayed for the whole tour. We greatly appreciate the help from Sandra DiGiovanni and Bob Scallan who, along with Cindy Cheatwood, led tour groups to various stops throughout the cemetery.

Speakers, including Desiree Allen, Betty Demmons, Ed Keyes, Dr. Cheryl Gonzalez, and Shauntai Arrington, talked about the Filmore, Pollard, Keyes/Burroughs/McDowers/Hill families as well as Joseph Green. Guides explained the stories of Lawrence Hicks, Alice Gittens and World War One veterans, Early Glover, Milton Weston and Rollin Smith. These represent a substantial number of folks over the generations, all of whom contributed to the community.

A *Black History of Orange Park* pop-up museum was displayed for the event. This included large panels with pictures of some of the folks remembered on the walks as well as background information about the Black community in Orange Park, the Orange Park Normal School, turpentining and more. Students from the National Jr. Honor Society of Orange Park Junior High were on hand both Saturdays to record the presentations. They are compiling their footage into a presentable video that can be shared for years! We appreciate the help of their sponsor, Paige Iacob, who recruited the students on our behalf and assisted them throughout, even now assisting with the process of video editing.

Thanks go out to Barry DiGiovanni, Davarye Coleman, Richard Cheatwood and Van Hogan for logistical support and front table management. Visitors made donations, bought tee shirts and books and we even gained a few new members! We hope to repeat the event next year.

















Orange Park Memories

The Society is highlighting Orange Park businesses each first-of-the-month throughout 2025, one from the town's early days and one which will be recognizable to many locals. This month we remind folks of the Fisk Tire Company and Horton's Garage.

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Fisk Tires, shown here in the business district on Kingsley Ave., offered full automotive services in the 1940's as the town became a go-between for Jacksonville and Green Cove Springs. Many commuter businesses were established during the 1940s and '50s including motels, tea rooms/diners and service stations like this one.

Cars first arrived in Orange Park in 1913, and a new industry began. Three generations of JC Horton's family (pictured) worked in the Horton Garage, from 1957 to 2016. Locals knew they could get good work done with honesty. Horton's Garage was a fixture in Orange Park for many years however, as the town grew, the Horton's property increased in value until it became prudent to sell. The land was sold to Orange Park Medical Center to provide room for the expansion of their operations.


