Attendees were able to play a unique bingo game, devised by our own Cindy Cheatwood, that featured notable people and places from Orange Park's history. It proved to be an excellent way to have fun, test our local knowledge and share our town's history. We also read the minutes of the first meeting of the



Society, which was held at Town Hall on March 1, 2003. That meeting saw the official name of the Society established, officers elected, dues determined and monthly meeting times set. The twenty people who gathered that day set the course for the organization and provided a framework to not only preserve and share the Town's history but to also help preserve a tangible link to the Town's past by providing a purpose for the Clarke House. We are grateful for the vision and dedication of our founding members. Their investment in time and resources benefit not only us but those yet to come.

#### **Carrie Clarke Day**

On March 4, we celebrated Carrie Clarke Day at Clarke House Park. The event started at 11 AM and all was ready. The Clarke House was open for tours and Randy Harris was onsite to host a display of antique tools. The Art Guild of Orange Park had set up tables so that children could decorate small flowerpots and take photos to commemorate the day. The Garden Club of Orange Park had furnished seedlings and soil to allow children to place their own plant in their newly decorated flowerpots. Unfortunately, as soon as the event began, the first significant rain in weeks also began. Rain continued off and on throughout the day. We were fortunate to have one interlude with no rain that allowed a group of children to prepare flowerpots and plant their seedlings but rain quickly returned, forcing a halt to outdoor operations. Visitors to the park were able to tour the Clarke House. We are grateful to our friends at the Art Guild of Orange Park, the Garden Club of Orange Park and Mr. Randy Harris for their participation and willingness to serve the community despite the inclement weather. #### <u>American Legion Post 250 Riders Recognized for Community Service</u>

At the Carrie Clarke Day event on March 4, The Historical Society of Orange Park recognized a very special and dedicated group of volunteers with the Earl Harrington Community Service Award. The American Legion Post 250 Riders have had a longstanding relationship with the Society and the Veterans Memorial of Orange Park.

The Post 250 Riders have been both promoting and fundraising for the Veterans Memorial since it was a watercolor rendering on a piece of paper. They began fundraising for the Veterans Memorial by selling hamburgers and hot dogs at Adamec's Harley Davidson on Wells Road and continued doing that for years to help procure the funds necessary to break ground on the Veterans Memorial. They have donated funds from their activities for years and most recently supported the maintenance project of paver replacement with a donation from their membership of \$2,000!

Their commitment to this project is evidenced by the fact that the Post 250 Rider's team has been a part of every single Veterans Day activity beginning with the groundbreaking ceremony on November 11, 2011, the dedication ceremony in 2012 and every Veterans Day ceremony since then. Their dedication to the Veterans Memorial and Orange Park community is worthy of the spirit and intent of the Earl Harrington Community Service Award.


#### Facebook Post: April: 1940s

The Historical Society of Orange Park is celebrating 20 years of history in our town! To share the anniversary, the Society is posting monthly messages on Facebook throughout 2023 to highlight the town's history, decade by decade. Look for these each 3<sup>rd</sup> day of the month. Following is this month's post:

Orange Park, in 1940's, saw a lot of changes come to the town. With the start of World War II, the town's population started to explode going from around 700 to over 1500 by 1953. The Mira Rio property at the base of Kingsley Avenue welcomed pilots training at nearby bases. Accommodations there took the name Azaleana Manor during the war years and offered the young officers a more comfortable housing option for rent. Also, during the 1940's, the Florida Driving Club opened a horse racing track off Wells Road and, following the war, the Orange Park Kennel Club got a new burst of life allowing dog racing to become a popular pastime. The Boy Scout's Camp Echokotee off Doctor's Lake Drive also came into full operations during the decade. Not far away, the new community of Holly Point was established on the waterfront.

#### Winn Dixie Community Bag Program

### **Town of Orange Park Completes Clarke House Repairs**

We are happy to report that the Town of Orange Park has completed some long-needed exterior repairs to the Clarke House. The old house is now 111 years old and needs occasional maintenance to keep it looking good. In many places the paint had begun to peel and rain had damaged the wood siding and trim. Some of the siding had deteriorated to the point that it had become soft was starting to decompose. Recently, the Town engaged a contractor to replace all the damaged siding and trim with new wood. Other small exterior repairs were completed as well. Once that work was completed, the entire exterior of the house was repainted. A new irrigation system was also installed. This will make a big difference to the plantings around the house. The Garden Club of Orange Park has been faithful in tending and updating the flower bed in front of the house but keeping those flowers adequately watered, particularly in the hot summer months, has always been a challenge. The new irrigation system will keep the flowers strong and healthy.

With the completion of the exterior work and the new metal roof that was installed last year, the Clarke House is now looking great. The recent care and attention do make a difference. We are grateful to the Town of Orange Park for their continued investment in the Clarke House. The

house and adjacent property are a direct link to Orange Park's past that is available to all residents. The Clarke family contributed a great deal to community life in their time and we are thankful that their home still welcomes visitors today. Thanks again to the Town of Orange Park for repairing and protecting so that it can welcome visitors for years to come.

#### **Clarke House Tours**




