Member Outing to the Penny Farms Historic Museum

On Tuesday, June 21, members of the Society traveled south to Penney Farms to visit their new historical museum. We were met by, Cathie Parrott, who graciously gave us a guided tour of the museum and explained each of it exhibits. The museum features exhibits of the early days of Penney Farms, including a number of maps and artifacts.

Penny Farms was established by James Cash Penny, founder of the JC Penny department store chain. The success of his department store chain allowed Mr. Penny to pursue other endeavors. One of these endeavors was Penny Farms. In 1922, Mr. Penny purchased 122,000 acres of land west of Green Cove Spring with the intent of creating a modern, model agricultural community. In addition to farming, Mr. Penny also created the J. C. Penney Foundation Memorial





Community, a retirement community for retired ministers, missionaries and their spouses. The great Depression severely impacted the JC Penny department stores and the Penny farming community. Mr. Penny lost most of his personal wealth and had to sell most of the farmland but he was able preserve the retirement community. The retirement community eventually became the Penny Retirement Community in 1971.

After our tour of the museum, we were met by Regina Diller, of the Penny Retirement Community, who gave a tour of Penny Farms. Our first stop was the 95-year old chapel, a beautiful building with a high, wood ceiling. The chapel is non-denominational with a variety of denominations holding services there. We next visited a resident's cottage, which was modern, spacious and well-appointed. The homes within Penny Farms are owned by the Penny Retirement Community. Residents of the community pay an initial fee followed by a monthly fee for their homes, based on the size of the dwelling space. This fee covers building maintenance and includes use of all amenities at the site. Our next stop was the community garden where residents grow a variety of vegetables and flowers. We next visited the recreation center, which contained a fitness center, coffee shop, library and a large, indoor swimming pool. The Penny Retirement Community also features a on-site medical facility and on-call nurse that is available for residents. We concluded our visit with a delicious lunch in the Dining Hall.





All residents are encouraged to volunteer their time to serve others. The formula works very well. The residents of Penny Farms are uniformly friendly, helpful and happy. We enjoyed our time at Penny Farms. All of the residents were most gracious toward us, Their hospitality, and that of the staff, was very much appreciated.









Veterans Memorial Update

In the last few editions of this newsletter, we have described the ongoing project to make sure the Veterans Memorial remains well maintained and a place that truly represents our nations veterans. The last step in that process is to address the deteriorating state of the engraved pavers.

We wanted to give everyone an update on the status of the plan to identify the engraved pavers that must be replaced. The first step was to build a spreadsheet inventory that included all the engraved pavers. We then had to assign each of the pavers to a row and then a position in the row. We now have a document that will identify every paver's location. Lastly, we had to do an evaluation of each paver and prioritize it based on its condition using a 1, 2 or 3 scale with 3

assigned to any paver that was basically unreadable or approaching that. We are happy to report this phase of the project was completed on June 25.

We also spent the past few months reviewing paver suppliers. We identified two suppliers and contacted them to provide samples. We also requested references. After reviewing the samples and references we have decided on a supplier for all pavers as we move forward.

With those two significant milestones completed, we are now at a point where we need to begin the procurement process. Our hope is to have the order process completed by the end of July. We had previously reported in this newsletter that all new orders for pavers will remain as a donation of \$50 thru July 31, 2022. After that date, due to rising cost, new paver orders will be available for a donation of \$100.

We have also established a Go Fund Me site to help offset the cost of this needed update to the Veterans Memorial. We also wanted to make sure you are all aware of vandalism that occurred on the evening of June 10 at the Memorial. The attached photograph shows the American Legion Post 250 granite bench that had been the target. Vandals had kicked the back of the bench off and in doing so also broke the granite seat.





The Town of Orange Park was immediately involved. They have already replaced the back of the bench and a replacement for the broken seat is on order! While we do not yet know the expected delivery date of the granite seat, we feel assured that it will be here within the next few months.

We are thankful to the Town of Orange Park management and Vada Davis of the Public Works Department for being so responsive to this issue. We are also thankful to Mr. John Shipley of Jacksonville Memory Gardens for his assistance in procuring a replacement seat.

World War II Plane Crash Site Tour

On July 20, 1944, two Army lieutenants took off from Pinellas County in P-51 Mustang fighters on a training mission. They deviated from their assigned flight plan to fly over the home of one of the pilots in the Riverside area of Jacksonville. As the pilots flew low over the neighborhood, one clipped a tree which resulted in both planes crashing, killing both pilots and one resident on the ground and damaging several homes. 


Images of America - Orange Park
