General Meeting - Harriet Beecher Stowe's Visit to Laurel Grove

In late winter 1867, the world-famous author, Harriett Beecher Stowe, disembarked from a sailboat and walked ashore at Laurel Grove Plantation, the future site of the Town of Orange Park. Mrs. Stowe wrote of her visit to the area, sharing her observations about the condition of the old plantation, the state of the people that lived and worked there and her reflections on a local area resident. Mrs. Stowe's words capture some of the societal changes of the times and how people were adapting as the pace of change increased. Veterans Memorial Update

While it may seem like just yesterday, the Veterans Memorial at Magnolia Cemetery was dedicated on November 11, 2011. That's right, it was just over 10 years ago that the first of many ceremonies have been held at the Veterans Memorial. Unfortunately, time and weather have been hard on the Memorial granite and pavers.

Recently we have noticed several maintenance related issues at the Memorial. The Florida sun and wet weather have created a fading of the lettering on benches and the Memorial itself. Further, many of the pavers have been deteriorating. The HSOP has formed a committee to review these problems, evaluate the issues and identify solutions to these issues. We want the Memorial area to be in the best condition possible. We also want to be sure to keep all our members and the public aware of what steps are being taken to address this.

The first area of concern is the fading lettering on the granite benches and the Memorial itself. We received a proposal from Jacksonville Memory Gardens to re-letter the granite benches and Memorial. Jacksonville Memory Gardens originally provided all the Granite fixtures for the Memorial site. Further, the Shipley Family has been a major supporter and contributor to the Veterans Memorial project from its inception through the construction phase. Mr. Michael Cunningham, their Maintenance Director, who has been involved with the Memorial project since its inception has now personally completed the re-lettering on the Memorial and all benches. We think you will notice immediately the expert job he has done.









The second area of concern is that many of the inscribed pavers have begun to deteriorate. The lettering on many engraved pavers is at the point where it is almost unreadable. Certainly not what we anticipated, but a problem that must be dealt with.



During Phase 1 for this issue, a search was begun to identify a new provider for the pavers that would hold up better in our temperature and moisture conditions. We have received sample engraved pavers that we believe will be better suited for the exposure that we have to expect. We are now in Phase 2 of resolving this issue. The committee must individually review the installed pavers to determine which have to be replaced and then contract with the manufacturer to provide these engraved pavers.

Phase 3 will be to contract with Ragland and Sons Landscaping Co. who will do the removal/replacement of the pavers. They have been working with the HSOP installing engraved pavers as additional requests for pavers were received over the years since its initial construction.

Phase 4 of this project is to implement an annual sealing and maintenance plan as recommended by the manufacturer. We, in partnership with the Town of Orange Park, will work to ensure that the maintenance plan that is developed will be the solution we need to keep the Memorial area at its best for many years to come.

The HSOP is committed to the ongoing care of this wonderful Memorial area.

Kids Fest

This year, Kids' Fest, which is typically held in June, was moved to the weekend of April 23 – 24. June thunderstorms have disrupted the festival the last couple of years, particularly last year's cloudburst, and the move to April was made with the hope of better weather. It turned out to be a great move. Mother Nature did not disappoint. The weather was perfect all weekend with good crowds both days of the festival. The festival ran very smoothly and everyone had a good time.

The Society hosted a booth this year. Our display included toys of yesteryear such as marbles, Tinkertoys and Lincoln Logs. Every child that stopped by had a great time playing with the toys. Some parents and most grandparents brightened when they saw the old toys as they brought back many good memories.





We also shared small fans with the children. The fans were constructed of pleated, orange paper topped with a small, green paper leaf, which resembled an orange when completed. It was a nice way to celebrate Orange Park and served as a small memento of the day.

We met several visitors that were new to the area and curious about the history of the town. We were happy to share our information with them and encourage them to learn more.




<u>Images of America - Orange Park</u>
