The month of May means that it is time for our second quarterly member meeting of the year. Our next meeting will be held on Monday, May 6 at the Orange Park Library. 123rd May also marks the anniversary of the Great Jacksonville Fire. At midday on May 3, 1901, stray sparks from a nearby chimney ignited a flame in dried moss at a local mattress factory. Windy conditions spread the flames to nearby structures. The fire spread quickly through the many wooden buildings in the downtown area moving from Northwest to southeast. By the time the fire was brought under control 8 hours later, it had burned



all the way to the St. Johns River leaving a trail of destruction in its wake. The fire burned 146 city blocks and destroyed over 2,300 buildings, leaving almost 10,000 residents homeless. Stephen Butcher, Superintendent of the Orange Park Normal and Industrial School, and his wife, Sybil,




made a trip to Jacksonville by riverboat not long after the fire and took the accompanying photos. They show the complete devastation caused by the fire. It took many years for the city to rebuild but some of the new structures have become architectural landmarks that still serve the city well to this day.

Outing to Kingsley Plantation

Join us for a special ranger-led tour of Zephaniah Kingsley's home (after his time in Orange Park), including the "big house" and grounds. We will meet at 8:30 am to carpool to the site of the former estate on Fort George Island, in Duval County, where we will meet with the ranger at 10 am.

We will explore the grounds at Kingsley Plantation, which include the slave quarters, barn, waterfront, planter's house, kitchen house, and interpretive garden. The visitor contact

station/bookstore is located in a 1920s building adjacent to the plantation buildings. After strolling the grounds and touring the buildings we will take a ferry ride into Mayport for lunch. We will enjoy a leisurely meal before returning to the planation site and then back to Orange Park.

As most of you know, Kingsley's wife, a former slave named Anna Madgigine Jai, came to Florida in 1806 when she was 13 years old, after being carried to Cuba from West Africa. He freed her in 1811 and charged her with running his Laurel Grove plantation at Doctors Lake in modern-day Orange Park and later she managed the Fort George Island site until being forced to leave Florida as the threat of American slavery loomed large. For the protection of their children, Anna, her

children and some of the family's slaves fled to Haiti for years before returning to Florida after Zephaniah's death, to claim his estate. Come join us to hear the rest of the story!

Kingsley Plantation is open Wednesday through Sunday, from 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., except on Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day, and New Year's Day. Admission is free.

In Memorium – Barbara Davidson

Last month, we said goodbye to Society member and long-time friend, Barbara Davidson. Barbara passed away at her Holly Point Road home on April 11 at the age of 98. Barbara lived a good, full life. She resided in Orange Park for many years and watched it grow from a small, quiet town to a bustling suburban community. She was truly a link to our past.

Barbara was born in Jacksonville and later moved to Orange Park with her husband George, who preceded her in death. Barbara was very involved in town affairs. She served at various times on the Orange Park Police Pension Board, the Code Enforcement Board, the Environment and Quality Board, the Planning and Zoning Committee and the General Government Committee. She was also a fixture at Town Council meetings where her excellent memory for details was on display. No one needed to refer to the minutes of past meetings when Barbara was there. If they did, it was simply for confirmation. Barabra was no-nonsense and direct in her assessments and believed in adherence to the rules. This attitude might have been fostered by her 49 years of service at the Naval Air Station. Rules are there for a reason and, if followed, they keep us out of trouble.



We will miss Barbara's wit and style. She was truly a part of Orange Park and we are the lesser without her.




Images of America: Orange Park
