Fall Festival

On Saturday, October 16 and Sunday, October 17, the Town of Orange Park will host its 39th Annual Fall Festival at Town Hall Park, located at the corner of Park and Kingsley Avenues. This event features two great days of music, entertainment, crafts, food and activities for children. The weather this time of year is usually about as good as it gets. The festival is a free event so bring the family and invite a friend. Parking is available at Moosehaven with a free shuttle running between Moosehaven and the festival both days.



The Historical Society is hosting a booth at the festival, which will be in our usual spot right behind Town Hall. Volunteers will be needed to share information about the history of Orange Park and our Society. Please consider spending a few hours at the festival and support your Society at the same time. If you are unable to volunteer, try to stop by to say hello.

Moonlight on Magnolia

Also in October, the Historical Society will host Moonlight on Magnolia at Magnolia Cemetery on Saturday, October 23 from 4 PM to 6 PM. This event has always been popular and a fun, family event. Visitors will be led on tours of Magnolia Cemetery where they will meet “former” residents of Orange Park and hear about their lives and times. What better way to learn about our town than from the people that came before. Tours will start at the entrance to the cemetery. They typically last around 45 minutes and will keep to the paved roadways within the cemetery. Tours will start at 4 PM and the last tour will start at 6 PM. Magnolia Cemetery is located at 2040 Kingsley Avenue, across from Clarke House Park. Parking will be available at First Baptist Church, a short walk to the west of the cemetery on Kingsley Avenue. Volunteers are needed so please let us know if you can help.



Veterans Day Ceremony 2021

November 11, 2021, is the day America will celebrate Veterans Day this year with ceremonies stretching across our great country. The Historical Society of Orange Park, in cooperation with the Town of Orange Park, will once again host its Veterans Day Ceremony at the Veterans Memorial located inside the main gates at Magnolia Cemetery, located at 1040 Kingsley Avenue, directly across from Clarke Park. The ceremony will begin promptly at 11 AM.

This year's ceremony marks the 10th anniversary of the official Groundbreaking Ceremony for the Memorial on November 11, 2011. It will be nice to gather again in person this year to celebrate our veterans.

Mary Helen Hoff Memorial Marker

A ceremony was held on September 17, 2021, to unveil the “Mary Helen Hoff Memorial Marker” located in front of the Moody Community Park in Orange Park. Mary was the driving inspiration for the POW/MIA Flag

A resolution by the Clay County Board of Commissioners, read by Commissioner Jim Renninger, proclaimed the section of Moody Avenue extending from Peoria Road to Bus Loop Drive at Montclair Elementary School would be designated “Mary Helen Hoff Memorial Avenue”. This area is only blocks from the home where she lived and raised her family.





Mary's husband, Lt. Commander Michael G. Hoff, was stationed at Cecil Field when he deployed as an A7 Sidewinder pilot with Attack Squadron 86 to Southeast Asia. On January 7, 1970, he was flying from the USS Coral Sea on an armed reconnaissance mission over Laos when his A7 jet was shot down. He was declared Missing in Action and his remains have never been found.

Mrs. Hoff worked tirelessly to honor all those that served and who did not return. Mary formed the local chapter of the National League of POW/MIA Families and pushed for a symbol that would let everyone know that there were POWs and MIAs that needed to be remembered. The words on the POW/MIA flag are evidence of her completing her mission: YOU ARE NOT FORGOTTEN. It took many years but that symbol, by act of Congress, is now flown proudly throughout the country with the American flag.



Mary Hoff was largely responsible for the creation of one of the most recognizable symbols in America. 50 years later the community gathered to honor her accomplishments.

International Archaeology Day

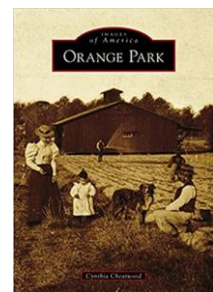
The Archaeological Institute of America—Jacksonville Society and the Beaches Museum are sponsoring the annual celebration of International Archaeology Day at the Museum (381 Beach Boulevard, Jacksonville Beach) on Saturday, Oct. 16. From 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. there will be demonstrations of pottery making and rope making, identification of artifacts by Dr. Keith Ashley, explanation of how Native Americans used plants by the Master Gardeners, and a simulated dig where children can pretend to be archaeologists.

At noon in the historic chapel at the Museum Dr. Kenneth Sassaman from the University of Florida will present a lecture titled "**Silver Glen Springs before *The Yearling*.**" He will discuss his research into a Native American metropolis that existed near the setting of Marjorie Keenan Rawlings' Pulitzer-winning novel, the backwoods of Florida in 1878 on Lake George. An anatomist from Harvard University in the late 1870s documented an archaeological landscape much different from the quiet, serene setting of Rawlings' story. Indeed, long before Europeans arrived to change the course of Florida's history, Silver Glen was more of a metropolis than it was a wilderness. Most above-ground traces of this past were erased by shell-mining operations in the 1920s. Since 2000, the St. Johns Archaeological Field School of the University of Florida has taken the opportunity to resurrect this lost past, which Dr. Sassaman will describe for the audience. All are welcome to join in the activities. This event is free and open to the public.
