Good News!! The new playground at Clarke Park has been completed! The Town of Orange Park is hosting a ribbon cutting ceremony to re-open the park at 3 PM, Friday, September 3. The new playground is approximately 20,000 square feet with state-of-the-art play equipment and includes play equipment for ages 2 to 12 years, shade sails and Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) improvements. This playground boasts 21 climbing features, 6 musical elements, nearly 90 feet of swings, 7 slides and much more!

In addition to the playground, the Town also installed a sidewalk connecting the parking lot, playground and bathrooms, new sod near the playground, repaved the parking lot and replaced the roof on the historic Clarke House.





The new playground and the re-opening of Clarke Park has been a long time in coming but it will be worth the wait. With the park open once again, the Clarke House will be open the second Sunday of each month for tours. This month, the house will be open on Sunday, September 12 from 2 PM to 4 PM.

Veterans Day Ceremony 2021


November 11, 2021 is the day America will celebrate Veterans Day this year with ceremonies stretching across our great country. The Historical Society of Orange Park, in cooperation with the Town of Orange Park, will once again host its Veterans Day Ceremony at the Veterans Memorial located inside the main gates at Magnolia Cemetery, located at 1040 Kingsley Avenue, directly across from Clarke Park. The ceremony will begin promptly at 11 AM.

It will have been 10 years since the official Groundbreaking Ceremony for the Memorial on November 11, 2011. Planning for the Veterans Memorial had begun well before that. It all began at a monthly meeting of the HSOP when the Guest Speaker, Mrs. Joan Jones, spoke of the process that took place to build the recently completed Veterans Memorial in Keystone Heights. Upon hearing her presentation, the Board of the HSOP decided to create a committee to explore the possibility of building a Veterans Memorial in the Town of Orange Park.

After several months of research, it was determined that a publicly accessible Veterans Memorial in the Town of Orange Park did not exist and that the best location to build one would be on the Town of Orange Park's property at the entrance to Magnolia Cemetery.


The HSOP then went to multiple Town Council meetings to present their plans and ideas on how a Memorial could be built. Over several months the HSOP Memorial Committee developed several renderings of what the Veterans Memorial might look like. As we prepare to celebrate our Veterans this year, we thought you might be interested in seeing the evolution of the artistic renderings created by Committee member Carolyn Day as the HSOP Memorial Committee continued to work with the Town Council to make this dream a reality.

<u>Calling all Young Writers! Honor our Veterans!</u>

The Historical Society of Orange Park, in recognition of Veterans Day, will, once again, sponsor an essay contest for students in Clay County. The purpose of the contest is to give young people the opportunity to explain the importance of celebrating veterans and Veterans Day. Students, using their own words and creativity, are invited to tell a personal story about how veterans have made an impact in their life, neighborhood, or town.

This year, instead of having three different topics for the contest, one winner will be chosen in each of the 3 grade levels (Elementary, Middle and High School) that addresses the topic: Why Do We Honor Veterans? Students should research Veterans Day and speak with veterans and family members about what our military veterans have done that deserves recognition.

Entry forms for the contest are available on the website of the Historical Society of Orange Park, <u>Veterans Memorial (ophistory.org)</u>. Odds of winning will be determined by the number of entries received. Essays will be measured for: Expression of the theme (50%) Content of writing (25%) and Creativity of writing (25%). Judges will be members of the Historical Society of Orange Park. The contest is divided into the following categories:

Last December, the Society was proud to award Steve its Earl Harrington Award for Community Service for his many contributions to this town. 
preservation of historical structures. This workshop will be the first of a series of workshops on historical preservation hosted by Mr. Corrales.

<u>Orange Park Memories – Hurricane Dora</u>

As we approach the height of Hurricane Season this month, we have been reminded of the devastation these storms can bring. Hurricane Ida, with winds approaching 150 mph tore through Louisiana this past weekend bringing with it death, flooding and destruction. Damage assessments are still underway, and it will take some time for many communities to get back to normal. Fortunately, Northeast Florida has been spared a direct hit from a storm like Ida however, we have had our share of tropical storms including recent brushes with Hurricanes Matthew and Irma. While these storms always bring rain and wind damage, Irma brought

flooding at levels not seen in over 50 years. The last storm to cause such flooding was Hurricane Dora, the only hurricane to have a direct hit on this area in well over 100 years. Hurricane Dora came ashore just north of St. Augustine in the early morning hours of September 10, 1964. Its winds caused a great deal of damage, followed by extensive power outages, and its onshore winds filled the St. Johns River and its tributaries with water, which overflowed its banks.



We asked our members, who were here for Dora's visit, to provide their recollections of that time. Their responses follow.

Kathleen Colter

I was 6 years old, but I still remember the wind noise to this day and why I don't like to stay during storms now. I remember thinking it went on for a week but know it was not that long. I remember a huge oak tree falling and the mess it made. I remember seeing all the docks destroyed on River Road.

Barney Clark

I was living on Creighton Road when Dora came ashore. Many trees were knocked over by the storm. Most of the area along Creighton Road was flooded by the storm. My brother-in-law, Jessie Quigley, lived on Creighton Road adjacent to Doctors Lake. He and I had tied up his boats before the storm. Jessie went to bed as the storm approached. He woke up in the middle of the night and heard water lapping. His first thought was that Doctors Lake had risen and was lapping up against the side of his house. He got out of bed only to realize that his home was flooded, and water was lapping against the side of his bed. The wind-driven tide submerged one of his cars and half-submerged his truck. Electricity in the area was out for about a week. We were fortunate to have an artesian well in the area so we could get drinking water. Doctors Lake returned to normal levels as the tide turned and the winds subsided however, there was a lot of standing water. Most of the area remained wet and soggy with large puddles for days after the storm.

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Carolyn Clark

I lived in Orange Park on Claire Lane. As the storm approached, the women and children of the Johnson family that lived on Smith Street, came to stay with us. Large trees overhung their home and there was a concern those trees might fall on the house during the storm. The men of our families went to the fire station to serve as volunteers in case someone needed assistance. At one point during the storm, just before daylight, we heard heavy weather was moving down the St. Johns River toward Orange Park. We were very concerned about the approaching storm but then relieved to learn it had abated and we were no longer in danger. We were all grateful. After the storm we had to find ways to deal with the lack of electricity. We cooked meals on our carport using camp stoves. We also stayed with other family members in the Meadowbrook area during the day to conserve resources and assist each other.

As a young child, I remember there was a lot of water and flooding. Water came in our house on Clinton Drive. Our home was surrounded by ditches and all the roads were still dirt. Dr. Bergh's house on Doctor's Lake was badly flooded.


I remember the disruptions the storm caused. At the time Dora hit, my youngest son was a toddler still in diapers and we had a Doberman puppy. Those were the days before disposable diapers. I vividly remember the challenge of washing cloth diapers and hanging them to dry in our house while trying to keep up with a frightened puppy that could not go outside and kept having accidents in the house. Also at this time, my husband and I were preparing to build a new home at the south end of Doctors Lake. My husband went to check the property to see how it had fared. He reported back that all was good however, he did not want me to see the property, which caused me to have my suspicions. My suspicions were confirmed when I drove across the Doctors Inlet Bridge. All I could see were the tops of the houses that bordered the lake. As a result of the flooding, we brought in fill dirt to raise the elevation of our new home on the lake. Power in the area was out for over a week. We had to cook using Sterno, a flammable gel in a can. We would light the Sterno and put our pots and pans on a rack over the flame to heat our food. That method of cooking was difficult, so we visited my mother's house several times while the power was out. She had a gas stove and was as happy to feed us as we were to get a good, hot meal.
