The loss of natural shorelines is the biggest threat to the overall health of Michigan lakes per The National Lake Assessment (NLA) results. Those results indicate that inland lakes across the nation need better care. Many lakes may be losing too much natural vegetation both on the land and in the water. We all want to make our lake fronts beautiful; some by keeping the natural vegetation and some by creating a beautiful sandy beachfront. There are ways to strike a healthy balance. BALANCE IS THE KEY!!!

Many of the plants we see aren't just weeds. Lakes depend on natural vegetation such as trees, shrubs, cattails and many other plants. The plants are doing the "work" by supporting a large variety of fish and wildlife. Once the vegetation is gone the fish and wildlife are gone too. Each bird, frog, butterfly, fish, turtle, etc. have different requirements

for what they need for food, nesting and raising young and staying safe. We want to keep our lakes as beautiful as possible while maintaining areas for wildlife to live and prevent erosion from becoming a major problem.

Living on Woodbeck Chain of Lakes these past 17 years – I've heard on many occasions – people ask why do we pay for weed control? This article attempts to answer that question and explains why we do it and how it actually helps maintain lake quality!

"Good resource management of aquatic plants requires knowledge of the condition of the lake and the land surrounding it." - Michigan State University Extension; Water Quality Serios: WQ- 55

All Lakes age – they become more fertile with time. The rate of this depends totally on the 'watershed" surrounding the lake. This is the area that surrounds and feeds the lakes. In simplified terms: the more developed the land around the lake – the faster it will age. Excessive vegetation increases a lakes instability – as does excessive weed control.

Balance is the key. It is very important for those living on these lakes, to assess what state (or age) their lake is at and manage the quality through specific vegetation control. This is what your weed control assessment dollars are for. This is the only way to ensure all our lake residents can enjoy the activities that are important to their families: swimming, boating, fishing and other recreational activities.

WCLA contracted PLM Lake and Land Management Corp. (www.plmcorp.net) to manage our weed control many years ago – and since then the quality of our lakes has greatly improved. PLM is one of the largest aquatic herbicide and algaecide application companies in the United States. Their focus is on preserving and protecting desirable plant life while controlling unwanted weed species through remediation services.

Some fishermen believe that weed control hurts the fish in the lakes. This simply is not true.

Aquatic herbicides are extensively tested for the effects on fish and other nontarget aquatic organisms.

By performing this assessment and treating properly and carefully – it prevents excess vegetation from

decomposing and depleting oxygen levels in water – which can cause fish mortality or algae out breaks if these precautions are not taken.

It is also extremely important to make sure that effective control levels are used when applying herbicides. Professional Lake Management Companies are highly regulated and make sure that the rate herbicides are applied are well below those that would cause fish or wildlife toxicity. The herbicides selected for each lake are dependent on the specific target weed that is a problem – and ensuring that it is particularly sensitive to the her bicide used.

Or because the herbicide interrupts a biochemical pathway that the aquatic animals do not possess.

Please understand – no products are used that are not registered by the EPA and no aquatic herbicides currently registered by the EPA have fish consumption restrictions. The fish you catch and eat are safe to consume!!

SUMMER IS HERE!!

Summer is here - and so is a reminder to all Lake Residents to KNOW and FOLLOW all Boaters Safety LAWS and REGULATIONS on our Lakes!!

Knowing the LAW is YOUR responsibility!!

COMMON BOATING LAWS AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

PERSONS UNDER 12 MAY ONLY OPERATE A BOAT with 6 horsepower or less.

PERSONS 12 AND OVER may operate a boat with a motor of 6 horsepower or more – but no greater than 35 horsepower IF:

They have been issued a boating certificate (keep it on board), and;

Are directly supervised by a person 16 years of age or older.

They may not operate any boat powered by over 35 horsepower motor.

PERSONS BORN on or after July 1, 1996 – may only operate a boat legally if they have been issued a boating safety certificate (keep it on board).

PERSONS BORN before July 1, 1996 may operate a boat without a boaters safety certificate.

Personal Watercraft (PWC)

PERSONS UNDER 14 may not legally operate a PWC.

PERSONS 14 and 15 may operate a PWC legally only if they have obtained a boating safety certificate and...

He or she is accompanied on board by his or her parent or legal guardian or by a person at least 21 years of age who has been designated by the parent or legal guardian or...

He or she is operating or riding the PWC, at a distance of not more than 100 feet from his or her parent or legal guardian or from a person at least 21 years of age who has been designated by the parent or legal guardian.

PERSONS 16 years of age WHO WERE born after December 31, 1978 may operate a PWC legally only if they have obtained a boating safety certificate.

PERSONS born on or before December 31, 1978 may operate a PWC legally without a boaters safety certificate.

Unlawful and Dangerous Operation

Michigan law designates these dangerous operating practices as illegal.

Reckless Operation of a vessel or reckless manipulation of water skis, a surfboard, or similar device is defined as operation which disregards the safety or rights of others or endangers the person or property of others.

Some examples are:

Weaving your vessel through congested waterway traffic or swerving at the last possible moment in order to avoid collision

Jumping the wake of another vessel unnecessarily close to the other vessel or when visibility around the other vessel is restricted

Chasing, harassing, or disturbing wildlife with your vessel

Causing damage from the wake of your vessel

COMMON BOATING LAWS AND RESPONSIBILITIES cont......

Failure To Regulate Speed is operating a vessel at speeds that may cause danger to life or property of any other person or at speeds that will not permit you to bring your vessel to a safe stop. It is illegal to operate a vessel:

In excess of 55 mph unless you are at least one mile offshore on the Great Lakes or Lake St. Clair At greater than "slow, no wake speed" when a person is in the bow of a vessel without proper seating Faster than is reasonable and prudent under the conditions (weather, vessel traffic, etc.)

Improper Distance is not maintaining a proper distance while operating a vessel or towing a person. To maintain a proper distance when you are operating at greater than "slow, no wake speed" (except in channels that are not posted), the vessel or persons being towed must not be within 100 feet of:

A shoreline (if operating in water less than three feet deep) Any moored or anchored vessel A dock or raft

Requirements Specific for PWCs

Each person riding on or being towed behind a PWC must wear a U.S. Coast Guard– approved wearable Type I, II, or III PFD. Inflatable PFDs may not be used.

You may not allow a child under 7 years of age to ride on or be towed behind a PWC unless with a parent or guardian or designee of the parent or guardian.

The lanyard of a PWC's ignition safety switch must be attached to the person, clothing, or PFD of the operator.

It is illegal to operate a PWC during the period that begins at sunset and ends at 8:00 a.m. "Sunset" means that time determined by the national weather service.

PWCs must be operated in a reasonable and prudent manner at all times. It is ille-

gal to:

Jump the wake of another vessel unnecessarily close to the other vessel.

Weave your PWC through congested traffic.

Swerve at the last possible moment to avoid collision.

A PWC must be operated at "slow, no wake speed" if crossing within 150 feet behind another vessel unless the other vessel is also a PWC.

You may not operate a PWC within 200 feet of a Great Lakes shoreline unless traveling at "slow, no wake speed" perpendicular to the shoreline.

You may not operate a PWC in waters less than two feet deep unless you are operating at "slow, no wake speed" or are docking or launching your PWC.

It is illegal to harass wildlife or disturb aquatic vegetation with your PWC.

Boater Courtesy

Along with State Boating Laws and Responsibilities comes Common Boating Courtesy. While these are not laws - they are common courtesy's we appreciate all members following:

1. Be mindful when Launching:

Proper launching and docking techniques are essential knowledge for any watercraft owner. Knowing your launch area, keep the process efficient and courteous to other boaters, and practice safety to keep people and property safe!

2. Watch the Activity on the Lakes:

When the lakes are very busy with activity, consider waiting to water ski, jet ski or even boat until there is less activity.

Boat counter-clockwise so as to avoid any confusion!

Channels can be shallow or have trees & limbs in the bottom!! Always pay attention to where your boat is at all times through all channels!! WCLA is not responsible for damages occurring to your vessel should you hit anything in the channel.

3. Watch the Wake:

While you're blissfully cruising away, your vessel is kicking up waves, otherwise known as wake. Those waves might be fun if you're a surfer or a wake boarder, but for other boaters, they can be annoying and potentially even dangerous — a speeding vessel's wake may cause damage to other boats and even injure passengers. It's important to be mindful of the wake your boat creates, particularly if other boats are nearby!

Stay away from shore if creating wake! This is causing terrible erosion to our shorelines and seawalls. Be mindful of the destruction your wake can cause.

Never go through a channel with a wake.

4. Keep it Clean:

Be careful when refueling not to spill into the water. Check fuel lines and tanks and have a spill kit on hand.

Never, ever throw your trash into the water. (It's also helpful to pick up any other trash you may see, particularly in the water.) Collect it and dispose of it properly when you're shore side.

We can all have a happy, SAFE summer if you follow common courtesy while on the lakes.

Fish Plant News

Our Fish Plant Committee members (Don Hoogerhyde - Lead, Ed Armbruster, and Bruce Veldman), would like to keep you informed of recent fish plants and how we decide on what kind of fish to plant and when to have these fish plants.

After having no fish plants in 2021, due to lack of fish supplies from our distributors, we had two fish plants last year. The first was on July 22 at the Kindy boat launch. Our distributor, Laggis Fish Farm released 500, 3"-4" smallmouth bass at a cost of \$2215. The fish became available on July 21 and we received them the next day. As we fishermen know, largemouth bass in our lakes are plentiful and a lot of fun to catch. But we decided to plant smallmouth bass last year because smallmouths, pound for pound, are as good a fighter as any fish. We're hoping to develop a good, sustainable smallmouth population that will give us another enjoyable fishing experience. It will probably be a few years before we get to that point.

Walleyes have always been one of the favorite game fish in our lakes. They're fun to catch and, of course, very tasty on our dinner tables. Since we haven't had a walleye plant in a couple of years, we wanted to have a good walleye addition last year. The fall is usually the best time to plant walleye. After being hatched in the spring, the fry will be larger in the fall and have a better chance of survival from predators. We had the walleye plant on November 22. Our supplier, Stoney Creek Fisheries, released 2500, 5"-8" fry at the MacClain Street bridge. The cost for this plant was \$6587. Stoney Creek told us that this was one of the best walleye stocks that they have seen in many years. Hopefully, we'll have a good legal-size population from these fish in 2-3 years.


We did not plant any hybrid bluegills last year. Our bluegill population has been pretty steady. Each year we will consider adding more bluegills in our lakes.

Sometime in the next couple of months, the three Fish Committee members will get together and decide what we want to purchase for the next fish plants. Our current fish population, our fish plant budget, and fish costs all play a role in these decisions. Of course, we always welcome any input others have concerning our fisheries.

A large portion of the money used for our fish plants come from the private donations of residents on our lakes. A little over 100 WCLA members donated \$3021 toward last year's fish plant cost of \$8802.


