1. So, Kepler exploded the field by proposing that all orbits are conic sections.
2. This became increasingly complex and difficult.
3. Astronomers working under the geocentric Ptolemaic framework calculated planetary orbits with a series of increasingly complex epicycles.
4. These are motions in which bodies orbit one another using intricate patterns of circles about circles.





1. That said, Doughty notes that modeling is tricky work with several big questions involved.
2. The researchers found that a tipping point could occur when local average temperatures rise by about four degrees C.
3. But how quickly this feedback escalates remains unclear.
4. For one, scientists know that photosynthesizing leaves cool the air around them, so as they die off, neighboring leaves' temperatures rise more rapidly.





1. Sure, we admire the achievements and legacy of these lofty few, but it's a puzzle to determine precisely what launched these specific innovators into the stratosphere.
2. Yet, decades of research indicate otherwise: Exceptional talent or intellectual prowess is no guarantee of exceptional achievement.
3. The simplest answer — and one we take for granted — is that the root of genius is raw ability.
4. A few creative individuals, often labeled “geniuses,” have profoundly impacted science, culture, and society.

2. If you start beekeeping with the help of YouTube, but produce no honey, that's a clear sign something went awry.

1. Constructed over the course of 33 years, the 40-foot-tall, 85-foot-long palace is punctuated by Gothic turrets, towering archways, and whimsical statues.
2. As a mail carrier in the late 1800s, Ferdinand Cheval spent much of his time delivering mail to some of the most rural outposts of southeastern France.
3. Inspired, in 1879, he began collecting enough materials to build Palais Idéal on a family plot in the countryside outside of Lyon.
4. He often stumbled upon beautiful rocks and stones in his travels.





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1. The advantages to the patron are manifold: immediate assistance at the time of need, a richer communication medium allowing for better understanding between the patron and librarian, and better communication and instruction.
2. Chat reference allows for real-time, synchronous communication with a reference librarian.
3. These same advantages exist for the reference librarian.
4. Chat reference is not without its challenges in terms of communication and management and there have been many articles written recently that address the implementation of chat reference services.





1. This, paired with its rapid rise and visibility in the culture, drove its competitors to launch TikTok-style features: Instagram Reels, YouTube Shorts, and Snapchat Spotlight, to name a few.
2. TikTok, where videos play and loop automatically, displays various numbers — likes, comments, bookmarks, shares — prominently, helping to create TikTok's sense of ambient, shared growth and acceleration.
3. The more recent arrival of TikTok sent visible metrics into a period of hyperinflation as well as heightened visibility.
4. These auto-playing videos came with their new public metrics, omnipresent and always climbing.





1. Seen this way, dogmatic systems of valuation can find their real content in our finite world, while dropping their alienated form.
2. Similarly, the Christian passion for ethical perfection is an estranged expression of grief for a fallen world and a confession that goodness does exist – in this world.
3. For example, the transmigration of souls, part of Buddhist cosmology, is something we experience constantly: in every living moment, an individual soul combines change and permanence.
4. By discovering their basis in life, Simmel de-sublimates religious doctrines that place ultimate meaning beyond this world.
