be effective in practice — or worse, could backfire given what we know about adolescent
behavior(3) A third truth is that we have a generation in crisis and in desperate need of the

Despite initially seeming like harmless banter or playful rivalry, its underlying motivations can sow seeds of discord and resentment within relationships. ___(3)___. The persistent need to demonstrate one's worth or dominance can create an atmosphere of tension and mistrust, gradually corroding the foundation of mutual respect and understanding. ____(4)____. Sentence: Rewards for improved performance work better than punishment for mistakes. This proposition is supported by much evidence from research on pigeons, rats, humans, and other animals. Paragraph: . The problem with this approach is that it doesn't enhance performance or inspire self-improvement. It actually has the opposite effect as psychologist Daniel Kahneman notes in his book Thinking, Fast and Slow. (2) . Trustworthy leaders build up a person by focusing on their strengths and rewarding their successes. (3) . When they do have to mete out criticism, they do so one-on-one behind closed doors, and they couch the criticism as an opportunity for growth and a means to reinforce those strengths. ____(4)____.
