

Nine Lives is Too Many: Remembering Billie Meadows & Addressing the Nebraska Domestic Violence Crisis

Another young woman's life was tragically and violently taken recently in Nebraska. <u>Nine lives have been lost due to domestic violence in Nebraska so far in 2025, the latest tragedy happening in Dodge County.</u>

Domestic Violence is a serious crime that too often results in death. We know what it is! It is a violent crime that involves a pattern of behaviors used to maintain power and control over another partner in a relationship. Victims often know what their abuser is capable of, and many times can predict what they will do next. Countless survivors live in terror, believing any day could be their last.

Billie Meadows was only 24 years old. Young, beautiful, full of life and on April 12, 2025, was shot to death in Dodge County by her boyfriend. She leaves behind family, friends, co-workers, neighbors and a community that dearly loved and cherished her.

As a community we must continue the fight to prevent another precious life from being taken and another family shattered. The Bridge facilitates the Dodge County Domestic Violence Coordinated Response Team that brings together community partners such as domestic violence advocates, law enforcement, probation, our local emergency department, prosecutors and our county court judge. We believe that by coordinating a team approach and encouraging consistency of that approach, the result will increase the strength of the criminal justice system in responding to domestic violence and sexual assault so that victims and their children are safer, offenders are held more accountable and the responsibility for ending the violence is shifted from the victim to the community.

Personally, 3 out of 4 of us know someone who is currently in an abusive relationship. But many times, we don't know what to do. Here are some suggestions...

- 1. You are not alone. We are here to help. Know your resources so you can get them connected to an Advocate at The Bridge. We have a 24/7 Hotline 1-888-721-4340. Our services are all confidential.
- 2. Find a calm and safe time to talk, letting them know you care and want to help.
- 3. Believe them and don't pass judgement. Domestic Violence is personal. Never take it lightly when someone confides in you. Don't let not knowing what to say stand in the way. **Your conversation could save a life.**
