WHAT CAN I DO?

If you have been a member of AA for a while, or maybe even if you are still very new, you may have noticed that there is more to keeping a meeting going than simply attending the meeting. I recall when I was still pretty new to AA and attending the Sunday General Meeting. At the time, it worked very well for me, since I really did not want to go to an AA meeting anyway. Sit for an hour, get a little card signed to show the court that I had been to an AA meeting, and that was it. But one Sunday night as I was heading to the meeting in the cafeteria (this was back when it was in the building known then as the Rehab Center and the hospital was still called Saint Mary's) I noticed a sign on one of the bulletin boards in the hall. It read:

AA at Saint Mary's is made up of lots of willing people. 5% are willing to do the work, the other 95% are willing to let them.

The name of the hospital has changed, but I believe the percentages are still about the same. As important as it is for an alcoholic to attend AA, there is so much more that is possible. You could... be a sponsor, help with the Sunday General Meeting, help with Wing Meetings, be an AA trustee, help with Gopher State Roundup, write something for Straight Talk, take a meeting to a jail, help set up as needed before a meeting, clean up after the meeting, or maybe you have some special skill that could benefit AA. My experience with doing things like this has been that it gives me a greater connection to AA and makes my sobriety even stronger.

Am I Giving Back to AA?

People don't like to talk about money, but we have too. Folks have complained about it for years, but we need to have these discussions. Bill W. wrote extensively about this topic; he even wrote an entire Tradition about it. (#7)

He talks about helping a hung over drunk by giving him five dollars (which was a seventh of his weekly income); but when it came to adding to the basket at the meeting that night he only threw in a dime. Bill realized that his ego was not in check, and his priorities were not in the correct order. I need to ask myself the same question—are my priorities in order?

You always hear the words in meetings "we are self supporting through our own contributions." For me, the key words are WE and OWN – which means all of us. So here's the big question I ask myself... Am I giving back to AA?

Contributions in AA mean many things. Do I contribute to the meeting that I'm at? How about my local Inter-group or Central Office? The seventh tradition is more than just throwing a buck or two in the basket. Self support means that I carry my own weight, I pay my bills in a timely manner, I give back to a program that has freely given to me, I help other alcoholics as best as I can.

12 Tips for Sober Holidays

1. Line up extra AA activities (help on the phones, speak, empty the ashtrays).
2. Be host to friends, especially newcomers, at home or at a coffee shop.
3. Keep your AA telephone list with you at all times.
4. Find out about holiday meetings or celebrations in your local groups.
5. Skip any drinking occasions you're nervous about.
6. If there's one you can't skip, take an AA friend--or keep candy handy.
7. Don't think you have to stay late (plan an "important date" in advance).
8. 8. Go to church. Any church. And don't forget about extra meetings.
9. Don't sit around brooding; catch up on reading, museums, walks, letters.
10. Don't project about holiday temptations: remember "One day at a time."
11. Even if you cannot give material gifts, enjoy the beauty of holiday love.
12. Carry the message. Give the joy away, and it will be yours to keep.
