

Do I Even Want To Be Sober?

As I tried to bend the universe to my desires, the only thing that seemed to keep bending was my elbow as the bottle found its way to my mouth again. When I entered Lodging Plus in the Spring of 2017, I wasn't sure if I wanted to be sober but when I had moved home to live with my parents the previous year the stated goal had been to get healthy again. Was I going to be a man of my word or not? Would this time be any different? Do I even want to be sober?

Many questions ran through my mind as I struggled to find a new magical idea or something I had missed in the multiple attempts at treatment. They seemed to keep saying things I already "knew" but had never applied consistently to my life. Was it as simple as they made it out to be? Had I just been overcomplicating things for all these years?

All I found was more questions and still no new answers. I connected with my sponsor who said we could re-evaluate working together after I got out of treatment. I didn't have to call him every day but he suggested we touch base weekly. I loathed his suggestions, especially the one to pray about whatever problem I hoped he could solve. What I wanted most of all at this time was to feel how he looked. He had peace; I hadn't had peace in a long time.

I completed treatment and the aftercare and still wasn't certain about the only requirement for membership in AA. Do I have a desire to stop drinking? Do I want to be sober?

After reading How It Works, I was reflecting with a member of one of the groups I started attending while I was in the treatment program. I said I thought I might be one of the unfortunates they talk about. I just didn't think AA was going to work for me. I felt as though I was a lost cause and just wanted to disappear from existence more and more as the fog receded. Maybe I was stupider than I thought. She told me that she had never seen anyone too stupid to work this program, but she had seen many die who thought they were smart enough to solve it on their own. She hoped I wasn't too smart for my own good and encouraged me to take a service commitment.

This service commitment and other service changed my life in a way I can't begin to describe. I kept coming back and eventually I was proud to be sober. I was glad to wake up free from the grip of the bottle. My life became one I was excited to live again. It had always been a good life, I just hadn't always been grateful for the many abundant blessings in the people, places, and things my Higher Power put in my life for me to do my best each day.

Today I do want to be sober and hope to spend the rest of my life that way. I know I am not going to find the escape or solutions I am looking for at the bottom of the bottle. Practicing these principles in all my affairs is not easy and I don't do it perfectly. By the grace of my Higher Power I get to be sober and of service today even though I wasn't sure when I started exploring my program of real health and recovery. What I found was by giving back I get to keep it.

AA at Fairview Riverside (1968 - Present)

Among the thousands of people who have gone through Chemical Dependency Treatment here, there is an inside joke: "What was the name of the Treatment Center when you were in treatment?" The original treatment center was started at St. Mary's Hospital in 1968 by Dr. George Mann, an anesthesiologist at the Hospital. It was called St. Mary's Rehabilitation Center and was the first hospital-based addiction treatment program in Minnesota. Dr. Mann, also a member of Alanon, wrote a book entitled *Recovery of Reality: Overcoming Chemical Dependency* in 1979. His wife, Marion C. Mann, a member of AA, served as a family counselor for many years at St. Mary's Rehabilitation Center.

In 1986, St. Mary's Hospital was sold to Fairview Hospital which was an adjacent neighbor. In 1997, Fairview Hospital merged with the U of M Hospitals. And in 2018 the University of Minnesota Medical Center became the flagship for the Hospital with the addiction treatment program still named the Fairview Chemical Dependency Program.

AA has been on-site since the treatment center was established in the late 1960's. During the 70's and 80's, nearly 100 AA and other 12-step groups met weekly on campus. There was a drop-in AA Club House where 100's of AA's met in fellowship and celebrated sober birthdays for many in recovery. Also in the 80's a monthly newsletter, *Straight Talk*, was published and distributed to AA members.

In 1974, St. Mary's AA was one of the founding organizations of Gopher State Roundup, an annual statewide recovery celebration over Memorial Day weekend attended by 1000's of gratitude-filled AA's.

Today, although fewer in numbers, AA at Fairview Riverside continues to welcome approximately 500 attendees per month and vibrantly stewards the principles of **Unity**, **Recovery**, and **Service**.
