5. Formal Minnesota Organization

A major externally documented milestone occurred on July 22, 2025, when The United Monarchy of Giezwa (Government-In-Exile) was legally registered as a Minnesota nonprofit corporation under Minnesota Statutes Chapter 317A, File No. 1569958100027.

This corporate filing does not create Royal status or sovereign recognition. Its historical importance is that it provides an independently traceable legal-organization milestone in the broader institutional timeline.

6. The Royal House Framework

Within UMG, The UMG Monarch Dynasty functions as the founding Royal House. King Giezwa Monarch Jr. is identified as the founding Monarch, and Queen Teyaira Monarch participates in the ceremonial, advisory, family, and regency continuity framework.

The Royal House is preserved through Crown continuity, succession, the Monarch surname, the Ruling Tree, Royal titles, archives, ceremonies, Royal duties, and public historical records.

7. Public Filings & External Milestones

UMG's public record includes external filing milestones such as Minnesota organization and federal trademark activity for THE UNITED MONARCHY OF GIEZWA, Serial No. 99295546, involving Class 045 legal information services.

8. The Crown & Succession Record
