INTRODUCTION

A Call to Put God First

WELCOME TO 21 DAYS OF FASTING, PRAYER, AND GIVING

THIS DEVOTIONAL JOURNEY WAS PRAYERFULLY DESIGNED TO HELP YOU REALIGN YOUR HEART, RENEW YOUR FAITH, AND REFOCUS YOUR PRIORITIES BY PUTTING GOD FIRST IN EVERY AREA OF YOUR LIFE.

FASTING IS NOT SIMPLY ABOUT ABSTAINING FROM FOOD OR HABITS—IT IS ABOUT MAKING ROOM FOR GOD TO SPEAK, HEAL, RESTORE, AND DIRECT.

THROUGHOUT THESE 21 DAYS, YOU HAVE BEEN INVITED TO CONSECRATE YOURSELF ANEW, STRENGTHEN YOUR PRAYER LIFE, WALK IN OBEDIENCE, BREAK STRONGHOLDS, RESTORE JOY, AND GROW IN FAITH.

EACH DAY BUILDS UPON THE NEXT, GUIDING YOU DEEPER INTO SPIRITUAL CLARITY, DISCIPLINE, AND INTIMACY WITH GOD.

THIS FAST IS NOT ABOUT PERFECTION—IT IS ABOUT POSITIONING. AS YOU SEEK GOD WHOLEHEARTEDLY, TRUST THAT HE IS WORKING BOTH VISIBLY AND INVISIBLY. SOME BREAKTHROUGHS WILL BE IMMEDIATE WHILE OTHERS WILL UNFOLD OVER TIME. BUT BE CONFIDENT.

WHAT GOD BEGINS, HE IS FAITHFUL TO COMPLETE.

May these 21 days strengthen your walk, deepen your trust, and prepare you for all that **God has ahead.**

DAY 1 — Consecrated for a New Beginning

Scripture: Joel 2:12–13; Romans 12:1–2

Joel 2:12 (NKJV): Now, therefore,” says the Lord, “Turn to Me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning.

Devotional

Every spiritual journey begins with a return. God’s invitation in Joel is simple, yet profound: “Turn to Me with all your heart.” Consecration is not merely about giving up food or breaking habits—it is about giving God permission to speak, to shape, and to sanctify us. A new beginning requires a new posture, and as we begin these 21 days, God is calling us to come to Him with our whole heart, not half-hearted commitment.

As we reflect on being consecrated for a new beginning, God invites us to go deeper in devotion and obedience. During this fast, He is drawing us closer, renewing our hearts, and reshaping our priorities. Each day becomes an opportunity to put Him first—in every decision, every thought, and every intention. Allow this sacred time to refine your spirit, strengthen your faith, and awaken a renewed hunger for His presence.

When we consecrate ourselves, we declare that God comes before our desires, our routines, and our comfort. True transformation begins when we stop conforming to the patterns of this world and allow God to renew our minds. This season is your reset. It is your spiritual cleansing and your invitation to experience God on a deeper, more intimate level. As you surrender fully, trust that God is working, moving, and preparing something greater within you.

Prayer

Father, I thank You for guiding me into this new beginning. Help me to walk in Your will with clarity and courage. Renew my heart, strengthen my spirit, and draw me closer to You. Let Your Word shape my decisions, and let Your presence anchor my soul. I surrender this day and this fast to You completely. Amen.

DAY 2 — Renewing My Mind

Scripture: Romans 12:2; Ephesians 4:23–24

Romans 12:2 (NIV): “Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God’s will is—His good, pleasing and perfect will.”

Ephesians 4:23–24 (NIV): “To be made new in the attitude of your minds; and to put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness.”

Devotional

A renewed year requires a renewed mind. Many believers desire new outcomes while continuing to think with old patterns. Scripture reminds us that transformation does not begin with circumstances—it begins in the mind. The battlefield of destiny is fought in our thoughts, where beliefs shape attitudes, and attitudes ultimately shape actions.

God is calling us during this fast to detox our minds from negativity, defeat, doubt, and destructive thinking. The patterns of this world will always pull us toward fear, comparison, and compromise, but God’s Word calls us higher. Renewing the mind means intentionally replacing lies with truth and choosing God’s perspective over our own experiences.

Putting God first requires allowing His Word to wash away the residue of past seasons—fear from past failures, regret over missed opportunities, insecurity rooted in old wounds. A renewed mind chooses faith over fear, truth over lies, and obedience over personal preference. As you seek God during this fast, allow Him to reshape how you think, so your life can reflect His perfect will.

Prayer

Father, I thank You for the power of Your Word to renew my mind. I ask You to cleanse my thoughts from fear, doubt, and anything that does not align with Your truth. Help me to let go of old patterns and embrace the new mind You have given me in Christ. Teach me to think like You think, to see as You see, and to walk in wisdom and obedience. Let my thoughts honor You and lead me into Your good, pleasing, and perfect will. In Jesus’ name, Amen.

Declaration: My mind is renewed, restored, and aligned with God’s purpose.

DAY 3 — Faith Over Fear

Scripture: 2 Timothy 1:7; Psalm 27:1

2 Timothy 1:7 (NKJV): “For God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power and of love and of a sound mind.”

Psalm 27:1 (NKJV): “The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? The Lord is the strength of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?”

Devotional

Fear always tries to move into spaces where faith should live. It attempts to take residence in our thoughts, decisions, and emotions, especially when we are stepping into something new. But Scripture is clear—fear does not come from God. Power comes from God. Love comes from God. A sound, disciplined mind comes from God. The enemy uses fear as a tool to shrink vision, hinder obedience, and delay destiny. Fear whispers lies that keep us stuck—fear of failure, fear of rejection, fear of the unknown, and fear of lack. But when God is first, fear loses its authority. Faith rises when we remember who God is and whose we are.

David’s declaration in Psalm 27 was not rooted in self-confidence but in God-confidence. He knew that if the Lord was his light, salvation, and strength, there was no reason to live in fear. As you fast and seek God, allow His presence to expose and dismantle every fear that has tried to attach itself to your life. When the light of God fills your heart, darkness has no place to hide.

This is a season to choose faith intentionally—to trust God even when the outcome is unclear and to move forward even when fear says stop. Faith over fear is not the absence of fear; it is the decision to trust God more than what threatens you.

Prayer

Father, I thank You that You have not given me a spirit of fear. I receive the power, love, and sound mind that come from You. Today, I release every fear that has tried to limit my faith—fear of failure, fear of the unknown, fear of lack, and fear of disappointment. Shine Your light into every dark place of my heart, and strengthen me to walk in confidence and obedience. As I seek You during this fast, help me to trust You fully and move forward boldly, knowing that You go before me and surround me on every side. In Jesus’ name, Amen.

Declaration: Today, I walk by faith and not by fear. The Lord goes before me, strengthens me, and leads me into victory.

DAY 4 — Walking in Obedience

Scripture: Deuteronomy 28:1–2; James 1:22

Deuteronomy 28:1–2 (NIV): “If you fully obey the Lord your God and carefully follow all His commands I give you today, the Lord your God will set you high above all the nations on earth. All these blessings will come on you and accompany you if you obey the Lord your God.”

James 1:22 (NIV): “Do not merely listen to the word, and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says.”

Devotional

Blessing follows obedience. When God is first in our lives, obedience becomes a lifestyle—not an inconvenience, but a loving response to His faithfulness.

Obedience is how we demonstrate trust in God’s wisdom, even when His instructions challenge our comfort or understanding.

Scripture makes it clear that obedience positions us for God’s favor. In

Deuteronomy, God promises that blessings will pursue and overtake those who obey Him fully. Obedience unlocks provision, protection, and promotion, while delayed obedience often leads to missed opportunities. God is calling His people not only to hear His Word but to respond to it with action.

James reminds us that hearing without doing leads to self-deception. True faith is revealed through obedient steps. Every act of obedience is a seed planted in faith, and God is faithful to multiply that seed in due season. As you continue this fast, choose the path that honors God—even when it is uncomfortable, unfamiliar, or inconvenient. Your obedience today is preparing blessings for tomorrow.

Prayer

Father, I thank You for Your Word that guides my life. Teach me to walk in obedience with a willing and humble heart. Help me not only to hear Your Word, but to act on it with faith and courage. Remove every hesitation, fear, or distraction that keeps me from fully obeying You. As I seek You during this fast, align my steps with Your will and position my life for the blessings You have promised.

In Jesus’ name, Amen.

DAY 5 — Reviving My Prayer Life

Scripture: Luke 18:1; 1 Thessalonians 5:17

Luke 18:1 (KJV): “And He spake a parable unto them to this end, that men ought always to pray, and not to faint.”

1 Thessalonians 5:17 (NIV): “Pray continually.”

Devotional

Prayer is where power is born. A revived prayer life has the ability to revive every other area of your spiritual walk. When prayer weakens, faith weakens. When prayer is strengthened, faith rises. Prayer is more than words spoken—it is a sacred exchange where we listen, align our hearts with God’s will, surrender our burdens, and receive divine direction and strength.

Jesus taught that prayer is not optional, especially in seasons of weariness. In Luke 18, He reminds us to pray consistently and not lose heart. Prayer keeps us connected when life tries to pull us away. During this fast, God is calling you back to the altar of prayer—not out of obligation, but out of relationship.

Putting God first means giving Him your first moments, your first thoughts, and your first devotion. When prayer becomes a priority, peace becomes your portion, and breakthrough becomes your expectation. As you seek God daily, allow Him to reignite your prayer fire. Let prayer become your refuge, your weapon, and your source of strength.

Prayer

Father, I thank You for the gift of prayer and the privilege of coming before You. During this fast, revive my desire to seek You consistently and wholeheartedly. Teach me to pray with faith, persistence, and expectation. Remove distractions, renew my passion, and help me to remain connected to You throughout each day. Let my prayer life be strengthened, and let Your power flow freely in every area of my life. In Jesus’ name, Amen.

Declaration: I am committed to prayer. God meets me when I call.

DAY 6 — Breaking Strongholds

Scripture: 2 Corinthians 10:3–5; Isaiah 54:17

2 Corinthians 10:3–5 (NKJV): “For though we walk in the flesh, we do not war according to the flesh. For the weapons of our warfare are not carnal but mighty in God for pulling down strongholds, casting down arguments and every high thing that exalts itself against the knowledge of God, bringing every thought into captivity to the obedience of Christ.”

Isaiah 54:17 (NKJV): “No weapon formed against you shall prosper, and every tongue which rises against you in judgment You shall condemn. This is the heritage of the servants of the Lord, and their righteousness is from Me,” says the Lord.

Devotional

Strongholds are mental and spiritual prisons built on lies—lies about who we are, what we deserve, and what God can do. Over time, these lies shape thoughts, behaviors, and reactions, creating cycles that feel impossible to break. But fasting and prayer release a power that flesh alone cannot overcome.

The Word of God reminds us that the real battle is not fought in the natural, but in the mind and spirit. God has given us weapons that are mighty, not to wound others, but to demolish strongholds and bring every thought into alignment with Christ. During this fast, the Lord is dismantling every generational curse, emotional barrier, addiction, insecurity, and unhealthy pattern that has held you captive.

Isaiah declares that no weapon formed against you will prosper—but victory also requires discernment. We must refuse to carry weapons forged in past seasons: fear, anger, trauma, shame, bitterness, or regret. Today is a day of release. God is breaking cycles, restoring identity, and reminding you that freedom is your inheritance in Him.

Prayer

Father, I thank You for the power You have given me through Christ to overcome every stronghold. Today, I bring every thought, every lie, and every pattern that does not align with Your truth into obedience to Christ. I renounce fear, shame, bitterness, and every weapon the enemy has tried to use against me. By Your power, I receive freedom, healing, and renewal. As I continue this fast, strengthen me to walk in victory and live fully in the identity You have given me.

In Jesus’ name, Amen.

Declaration: Every stronghold is broken. I walk in God’s victory.

DAY 7 — Renewed Strength

Scripture: Isaiah 40:31; Philippians 4:13

Isaiah 40:31 (NKJV): “But those who wait on the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint.”

Philippians 4:13 (NKJV): “I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me.”

Devotional

Fasting may weaken the flesh, but it strengthens the spirit. As we wait on the Lord, God promises not just relief, but renewal. Waiting does not mean inactivity—it means trusting, leaning, and depending fully on God rather than our own strength.

Isaiah reminds us that renewed strength is reserved for those who wait on the Lord, not those who rush, panic, or strive in their own power. When we put God first, He exchanges exhaustion for endurance, heaviness for hope, and weakness for supernatural strength. What the flesh cannot sustain, the Spirit empowers.

God never intended for us to live depleted. Through Christ, we are strengthened to rise above circumstances, push through challenges, and continue forward with grace and resilience. During this fast, God is restoring what has been drained—physically, emotionally, mentally, and spiritually. As you wait on Him, expect fresh strength to carry you into the next season of purpose.

Prayer

Father, I thank You for being my source of strength. As I wait on You, renew me in every area of my life. Replace weariness with endurance and discouragement with hope. Help me to rely on Your power and not my own, trusting that You are sustaining me each step of the way. As I continue this fast, strengthen my spirit and refresh my soul to walk boldly in Your purpose. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Declaration: God is my strength. I rise with power, endurance, and faith.

DAY 8 — Putting God First

Scripture: Matthew 6:33; Proverbs 3:9–10

Matthew 6:33 (KJV): “But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you.”

Proverbs 3:9–10 (NKJV): “Honor the Lord with your possessions, and with the firstfruits of all your increase; so your barns will be filled with plenty, and your vats will overflow with new wine.”

Devotional

To put God first is to make Him the priority—not an option, not a backup plan, and not a last resort. It is a daily decision to seek His Kingdom before pursuing our own desires. When God is first, everything else finds its proper place.

Jesus reminds us that when we seek God first, He takes responsibility for what we need. Provision follows priority. Alignment follows obedience. God promises to add, multiply, and provide when we honor Him above all else—not because He owes us, but because He is faithful to His Word.

Putting God first means trusting Him with our time, our resources, our decisions, and our future. It means choosing faith over worry and obedience over control. During this fast, God is calling us to realign our priorities and renew our commitment to Him. When God is placed in His rightful position, peace replaces anxiety, clarity replaces confusion, and blessing follows obedience.

Prayer

Father, I choose today to put You first in every area of my life. Help me to seek Your Kingdom above my own plans and trust You completely with my needs. Teach me to honor You with my time, my resources, and my decisions. As I continue this fast, align my heart with Your will and lead me in the path You have prepared for me. I trust that as I put You first, You will take care of everything else. In Jesus’ name, Amen.

Declaration: I put God first—and He blesses the rest.

DAY 9 — The Power of First Fruits

Scripture: Proverbs 3:9–10; Exodus 23:19

Proverbs 3:9–10 (NKJV): “Honor the Lord with your possessions, and with the firstfruits of all your increase; so your barns will be filled with plenty, and your vats will overflow with new wine.”

Exodus 23:19 (NKJV): “The first of the firstfruits of your land you shall bring into the house of the Lord your God.”

Devotional

First Fruits is more than an offering—it is a spiritual principle of honor. From the beginning of Scripture, God established the importance of giving Him the first and the best, not what is left over. When we honor God with our First Fruits, we acknowledge Him as our true Source, not our jobs, abilities, or circumstances.

First Fruits giving is an act of faith. It says, “God, I trust You with what is ahead because You have been faithful in what is behind.” God’s promise is clear: when we honor Him, He responds with provision, overflow, and divine covering. This is not about obligation—it is about alignment. When our giving reflects honor, our lives reflect blessing.

As you continue this fast, allow your First Fruits to be an expression of gratitude, trust, and expectation. You are not sowing into uncertainty—you are sowing into a faithful God who multiplies what is placed in His hands. Give with joy, confidence, and anticipation, knowing that God honors those who honor Him.

Prayer

Father, I honor You as the Source of every blessing in my life. Today, I bring You my First Fruits with a grateful and trusting heart. I place my increase, my future, and my provision fully in Your hands. As I honor You, I trust You to order my steps, bless my labor, and release overflow according to Your promises. Thank You for Your faithfulness in every season. In Jesus’ name, Amen.

Declaration: I honor God with my first, and He blesses the rest.

DAY 10 — Hearing God's Voice Clearly

Scripture: John 10:27; Isaiah 30:21

John 10:27 (NKJV): “My sheep hear My voice, and I know them, and they follow Me.”

Isaiah 30:21 (NKJV): “Your ears shall hear a word behind you, saying, ‘This is the way, walk in it,’ whenever you turn to the right hand or whenever you turn to the left.”

Devotional

Fasting clears the static that often drowns out the voice of God. God is always speaking—guiding, warning, correcting, and comforting—but distractions, busyness, and noise can make His voice difficult to discern. During this fast, God is inviting you to quiet your heart so you can hear Him more clearly.

Jesus reminds us that His sheep know His voice and follow Him. Hearing God's voice is not reserved for a select few—it is the privilege of every believer who belongs to Him. When God is first, His voice becomes familiar, and His direction becomes clear. As you seek Him, expect divine guidance, gentle corrections, and timely encouragement.

Isaiah assures us that God's voice will guide us at every turn. Whether you are facing decisions, seeking clarity, or needing reassurance, God desires to lead you step by step. This season of fasting is sharpening your spiritual hearing. Trust that God is speaking, and remain attentive and obedient to what He reveals.

Prayer

Father, I thank You that You speak to Your children. During this fast, quiet every distraction in my heart and mind so I can hear Your voice clearly. Help me to recognize Your guidance, trust Your direction, and respond with obedience. As I seek You, order my steps and lead me in the path You have prepared for me. I desire to follow You closely in every area of my life.

In Jesus' name, Amen.

Declaration: God speaks—I listen. My steps are ordered.

DAY 11 — Walking in Love

Scripture: 1 Corinthians 13:1–8; John 13:34–35

John 13:34–35 (NIV): “A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another.”

1 Corinthians 13:4–7 (NKJV): “Love suffers long and is kind; love does not envy; love does not parade itself, is not puffed up; does not behave rudely, does not seek its own, is not provoked, thinks no evil; does not rejoice in iniquity, but rejoices in the truth; bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.”

Devotional

Love is the highest calling of the believer. It is not merely an emotion—it is a decision, a posture of the heart, and a reflection of God’s character within us. Jesus made it clear that love would be the defining mark of His disciples. Not titles. Not gifts. Not accomplishments—but love.

When God is first in your heart, love flows naturally, even toward those who challenge you. Love requires patience when it would be easier to react, kindness when it would be easier to withdraw, humility when pride wants to rise, and forgiveness when wounds are still fresh. This kind of love does not come from human strength—it flows from a heart surrendered to God.

During this fast, God is shaping how we love. Love restores what has been broken, heals what has been wounded, protects what is vulnerable, and unites what has been divided. Walking in love does not mean overlooking truth, but expressing truth with grace. Today, allow love to lead your words, guide your actions, and shape your responses. As you do, you reflect the heart of Christ to everyone you encounter.

Prayer

Father, thank You for loving me with a love that is patient, kind, and enduring. As I walk with You, teach me to love others the way You have loved me. Remove anything in my heart that hinders love—pride, bitterness, offense, or unforgiveness. Fill me with Your Spirit so that love flows freely through my words and actions. Let my life be a reflection of Your love to everyone I encounter today. In Jesus’ name, Amen.

Declaration: I walk in love. Love leads my life.

DAY 12 — Healing and Wholeness

Scripture: Isaiah 53:5; Jeremiah 30:17

Isaiah 53:5 (KJV): “But He was wounded for our transgressions, He was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon Him; and with His stripes we are healed.”

Jeremiah 30:17 (NKJV): “For I will restore health to you and heal you of your wounds,’ says the Lord.”

Devotional

God does not merely treat symptoms—He restores the whole person. Healing in God’s kingdom goes beyond the physical; it reaches the emotional, mental, and spiritual places where wounds often linger unseen. Scripture reminds us that through Christ’s sacrifice, healing has already been made available to us.

Isaiah declares that our healing was secured through the suffering of Jesus. His stripes were not in vain—they carry power for restoration today. Jeremiah reinforces this promise by revealing God’s heart to restore health and heal wounds, even those caused by long seasons of pain, disappointment, or weariness.

When God is first, healing becomes more than a moment—it becomes a lifestyle of wholeness. During this fast, God is touching places that have been ignored, hidden, or endured for too long. Emotional wounds are being mended, spiritual fatigue is being lifted, and physical strength is being renewed. In God’s presence, “nothing missing and nothing broken” becomes the testimony of your life.

Prayer

Father, I thank You for the healing power released through Jesus Christ. Today, I receive Your healing in every area of my life—body, mind, and spirit. Restore what has been broken, strengthen what has been weakened, and bring peace to every wounded place. As I continue this fast, I trust You to complete the work You have begun in me. I receive Your wholeness and walk in Your promises by faith. In Jesus’ name, Amen.

Declaration: By His stripes, I am healed and made whole.

DAY 13 — Victory in Spiritual Warfare

Scripture: Ephesians 6:10–18; 2 Chronicles 20:15

Ephesians 6:10–11, 13 (NKJV): “Finally, my brethren, be strong in the Lord and in the power of His might. Put on the whole armor of God, that you may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil... Therefore take up the whole armor of God, that you may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand.”

2 Chronicles 20:15 (NKJV): “Do not be afraid nor dismayed because of this great multitude, for the battle is not yours, but God’s.”

Devotional

You are in a battle, but you are not fighting alone. Every believer is engaged in spiritual warfare, whether they recognize it or not. The opposition may come through circumstances, thoughts, relationships, or unexpected challenges—but Scripture reminds us that our strength does not come from ourselves. Our strength comes from the Lord.

Paul instructs us to be strong in the Lord and to clothe ourselves daily with God’s armor. Spiritual warfare is not about aggression—it is about standing firm in truth, righteousness, faith, and obedience. When God is first, warfare does not intimidate you; it reminds you that victory is already secured through Him.

In 2 Chronicles, God spoke clearly to His people: “The battle is not yours, but God’s.” This truth brings peace in the midst of conflict. Our responsibility is to trust, stand, and remain obedient while God fights on our behalf. During this fast, God is strengthening your spirit, sharpening your discernment, and reminding you that no battle you face is greater than His power.

Prayer

Father, I thank You that You are my strength and my defender. Today, I put on the full armor of God and stand firm in Your power. Cover my mind with truth, my heart with righteousness, and my steps with peace. Strengthen me to resist every attack of the enemy and to trust You fully in every battle I face. As I continue this fast, remind me that the victory belongs to You, and through You, I walk in triumph. In Jesus’ name, Amen.

Declaration: The battle is the Lord’s, and the victory is mine.

DAY 14 — Family Restoration and Unity

Joshua 24:15 (NKJV): “And if it seems evil to you to serve the Lord, choose for yourselves this day whom you will serve... But as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord.”

Colossians 3:13–14 (NIV): “Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity.”

Devotional

God is rebuilding families—one prayer, one act of forgiveness, and one step of faith at a time. Family restoration is close to the heart of God because the family is foundational to His design. Whether the wounds are old or recent, visible or hidden, God’s desire is to bring healing, unity, and peace back into our homes. Joshua made a bold declaration that still challenges us today: “As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord.” This was not just a statement of belief—it was a commitment to lead his household with purpose and faith. When God is put first in our homes, He becomes the center around which love, respect, and unity are rebuilt.

Colossians reminds us that unity requires intentional forgiveness and patience. Restoration often begins when we choose grace over resentment and love over offense. During this fast, God is softening hearts, mending broken relationships, and restoring trust where it has been lost. When we allow God to lead our families, peace replaces tension, love replaces conflict, and healing replaces division.

Prayer

Father, I thank You for my family and every relationship You have entrusted to me. Today, I invite You into every area of my home. Heal what has been broken, restore what has been strained, and bring unity where there has been division. Help us to forgive as You have forgiven us and to love one another with patience and grace. As I continue this fast, let my home be a place where Your peace, presence, and purpose dwell. In Jesus’ name, Amen.

Declaration: My home belongs to God. Restoration is happening now.

DAY 15 — Revival in the Church

Scripture: Habakkuk 3:2; Acts 2:42–47

Habakkuk 3:2 (NKJV): “O Lord, I have heard Your speech and was afraid; O Lord, revive Your work in the midst of the years! In the midst of the years make it known; in wrath remember mercy.”

Acts 2:42–47 (NKJV): “And they continued steadfastly in the apostles’ doctrine and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in prayers... And fear came upon every soul, and many wonders and signs were done through the apostles... And the Lord added to the church daily those who were being saved.”

Devotional

Revival begins with hunger. It is born when God’s people long for more than routine worship and surface-level faith. True revival happens when hearts are fully surrendered, priorities are realigned, and the presence of God becomes the central focus of the church.

The prayer of Habakkuk is still the cry of the church today: “Revive Your work.”

Revival is not manufactured by programs or personalities—it is released when God’s people humble themselves, seek Him wholeheartedly, and commit to living according to His Word. When God is first in the heart of the church, His fire ignites worship, prayer, unity, and generosity.

Acts 2 gives us a clear picture of a revived church—steadfast in teaching, committed to fellowship, devoted to prayer, and marked by supernatural power and generosity. As a result, God’s presence was evident, lives were transformed, and the church grew daily. During this fast, God is stirring fresh fire within His people. Expect Him to move in power—in our services, in our community, and in our homes. Revival starts with us, but its impact reaches far beyond us.

Prayer

Father, we cry out for revival. Revive our hearts, revive our church, and revive our community. Ignite a fresh hunger for Your presence, Your Word, and Your power. Let our worship be sincere, our prayers be fervent, and our unity be unbreakable. As we continue this fast, pour out Your Spirit and let Your fire burn in us and through us for Your glory. In Jesus’ name, Amen.

Declaration: Revival is here. God is moving!

DAY 16 — Vision and Purpose

Scripture: Habakkuk 2:2–3; Proverbs 16:3

Habakkuk 2:2–3 (NKJV): “Then the Lord answered me and said: ‘Write the vision and make it plain on tablets, that he may run who reads it. For the vision is yet for an appointed time; but at the end it will speak, and it will not lie. Though it tarries, wait for it; because it will surely come, it will not tarry.’”

Proverbs 16:3 (NKJV): “Commit your works to the Lord, and your thoughts will be established.”

Devotional

When God is first, vision becomes clearer and steps become steadier. God is not the author of confusion—He is the giver of revelation, direction, and divine timing.

Vision is more than a dream; it is a God-given assignment that requires faith, obedience, and patience.

Habakkuk teaches us that vision must be written and made plain. What God reveals should be stewarded with clarity and commitment. Writing the vision is an act of faith—it declares that what God has spoken is worth remembering, pursuing, and protecting. Even when the vision seems delayed, Scripture assures us that it will come at the appointed time.

Proverbs reminds us that when we commit our plans to the Lord, He establishes our thoughts. During this fast, God is aligning purpose with obedience and direction with trust. As you submit your goals, plans, and dreams to Him, expect alignment and acceleration. God is ordering your steps, removing distractions, and positioning you for what lies ahead. Walk forward with confidence, knowing that your purpose is unfolding according to His perfect plan.

Prayer

Father, I thank You for the vision and purpose You have placed within me. As I seek You, reveal Your plans clearly and help me to trust Your timing completely. I commit my work, my goals, and my future into Your hands. Order my steps, establish my thoughts, and align my heart with Your will. As I continue this fast, give me clarity, focus, and courage to walk out the purpose You have ordained for my life.

In Jesus’ name, Amen.

Declaration: My vision is God-given, and my steps are God-ordered.

DAY 17 — Restoring Joy and Peace

Scripture: Philippians 4:6–7; Nehemiah 8:10

Philippians 4:6–7 (NKJV): “Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God; and the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus.”

Nehemiah 8:10 (KJV): “...for the joy of the Lord is your strength.”

Devotional

Joy and peace are not optional for the believer—they are spiritual weapons. In a world filled with pressure, uncertainty, and constant noise, God offers something the world cannot give: joy that strengthens and peace that guards.

When God is first, anxiety loses its voice. Philippians reminds us that peace is released when we bring everything to God in prayer with thanksgiving. Peace is not the absence of problems; it is the presence of God in the midst of them. It is the assurance that even when circumstances are unsettled, our hearts can remain anchored.

Nehemiah declares that the joy of the Lord is our strength. Joy is not based on emotions or circumstances—it flows from knowing who God is and trusting His faithfulness. During this fast, God is restoring joy that may have been drained by worry, disappointment, or weariness. He is replacing heaviness with hope and anxiety with assurance. As you seek Him, allow His joy to renew your strength and His peace to guard your heart and mind.

Prayer

Father, I thank You for the joy and peace that come from Your presence. Today, I release every burden, worry, and anxious thought into Your hands. Restore my joy where it has been diminished and surround me with Your peace that surpasses all understanding. Guard my heart and mind through Christ Jesus, and let Your joy strengthen me as I continue this fast.

In Jesus' name, Amen.

Declaration: The joy of the Lord is my strength, and His peace guards my heart and mind.

DAY 18 — Greater Faith for Greater Works

Scripture: John 14:12–14; Hebrews 11:6

Hebrews 11:6 (NKJV): “But without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of those who diligently seek Him.”

John 14:12–14 (NKJV): “Most assuredly, I say to you, he who believes in Me, the works that I do he will do also; and greater works than these he will do, because I go to My Father. And whatever you ask in My name, that I will do, that the Father may be glorified in the Son.”

Devotional

Greater faith is required for greater assignments. God never calls us into more without also stretching our faith to meet the demand. As you continue this fast, God is enlarging your capacity to believe Him—not just for what is familiar, but for what is next.

Hebrews reminds us that faith is not optional; it is essential. Faith pleases God because it trusts His character even when the outcome is unseen. Faith believes that God is present, powerful, and faithful to reward those who diligently seek Him. Fasting sharpens our spiritual sensitivity and strengthens our trust in God’s promises. Jesus declared that those who believe would do the works He did—and even greater works. This is not a call to pride, but a call to partnership. God desires to work through surrendered, faith-filled lives to bring healing, restoration, and transformation to the world around us. During this fast, God is preparing you for greater responsibility, greater vision, and greater impact. Let your faith rise to meet the assignment.

Prayer

Father, I thank You for calling me into greater works. Increase my faith and expand my trust in You. Remove every limitation that has restricted my belief, and help me to walk boldly in obedience to Your Word. As I continue this fast, prepare my heart and strengthen my faith for everything You have planned ahead. I believe You are able, and I trust You completely.

In Jesus’ name, Amen.

Declaration: My faith is rising. Miracles and breakthroughs are being released.

DAY 19 — Financial Breakthrough and Stewardship

Scripture: Malachi 3:10; 2 Corinthians 9:8

Malachi 3:10 (NKJV): “Bring all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be food in My house, and try Me now in this,” says the Lord of hosts, “If I will not open for you the windows of heaven and pour out for you such blessing that there will not be room enough to receive it.”

2 Corinthians 9:8 (NKJV): “And God is able to make all grace abound toward you, that you, always having all sufficiency in all things, may have an abundance for every good work.”

Devotional

Financial breakthrough begins with putting God first. Scripture consistently teaches that when we honor God with our resources, we acknowledge Him as our true Source. Breakthrough is not merely about receiving more—it is about aligning our hearts, priorities, and stewardship with God’s principles.

Malachi reminds us that God invites us to trust Him with our giving. When we bring what belongs to Him with obedience and faith, He promises provision, protection, and overflow. This is not about pressure or manipulation; it is about partnership with a faithful God who desires to bless His people so they can be a blessing to others.

Paul reinforces this truth by reminding us that God supplies not just enough to survive, but enough to abound in every good work. Stewardship is worship. It is managing what God entrusts to us with excellence, integrity, and gratitude. During this fast, God is teaching us to handle resources wisely, give generously, and trust Him completely. As we do, He releases grace, provision, and opportunities for impact beyond ourselves.

Prayer

Father, I thank You for being my Source and Provider. Today, I place my finances and resources fully in Your hands. Bless the work of my hands and teach me to steward wisely all that You entrust to me. Remove fear, doubt, and lack-driven thinking, and replace it with faith, discipline, and generosity. As I continue this fast, align my heart with Your principles and position me for breakthrough and overflow according to Your will.

In Jesus’ name, Amen.

Declaration: I am blessed, supplied, and favored. God is my Source.

DAY 20 — Finishing Strong

Scripture: 2 Timothy 4:7; Galatians 6:9

2 Timothy 4:7 (NKJV): “I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith.”

Galatians 6:9 (KJV): “And let us not be weary in well doing: for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not.”

Devotional

Finishing strong requires focus, discipline, and unwavering commitment. Many can start a journey with enthusiasm, but Scripture reminds us that the reward is reserved for those who endure. As this fast nears its completion, God is calling you not to slow down, but to press forward with renewed determination.

Paul’s words to Timothy reflect a life marked by perseverance. He did not measure success by ease, but by faithfulness. Likewise, Galatians encourages us not to grow weary in doing good, because the harvest is tied to endurance. Weariness often shows up just before breakthrough—but God promises strength for the finish when He is first.

During this fast, God has been shaping your character, sharpening your faith, and strengthening your resolve. What you have sown in prayer, obedience, and sacrifice is producing results, even if you cannot see them yet. Stay focused. Stay faithful. You are closer to breakthrough than you realize, and God is with you every step of the way.

Prayer

Father, I thank You for sustaining me throughout this journey. As I approach the finish, strengthen my spirit, renew my focus, and guard my heart against weariness. Help me to complete this fast with intention, gratitude, and victory. I trust that You are faithful to bring a harvest from every seed that has been sown.

In Jesus’ name, Amen.

Declaration: I finish strong. God is with me every step.

DAY 21 — The Blessing of Completion

Scripture: Philippians 1:6; Psalm 126:3

Philippians 1:6 (NKJV): “Being confident of this very thing, that He who has begun a good work in you will complete it until the day of Jesus Christ.”

Psalm 126:3 (NKJV): “The Lord has done great things for us, and we are glad.”

Devotional

Completion is a blessing. What God begins, He is faithful to finish. As we come to the end of this 21-day journey of fasting, prayer, and seeking God, we pause to reflect on His faithfulness, His presence, and the work He has accomplished within us.

This season was never just about sacrifice—it was about transformation. God has been renewing minds, strengthening faith, restoring hearts, and realigning priorities. Some changes happened quietly on the inside, while others are already becoming visible. Even what you cannot yet see, God is still completing.

Philippians reminds us that God is committed to the work He started in us. He does not abandon His process or His people. Psalm 126 declares joyfully that the Lord has done great things—and our response is gratitude. This moment marks not an ending, but a beginning. You are stepping into a new season marked by divine order, blessing, clarity, and increase. God is first, and His favor follows.

Prayer

Father, I thank You for carrying me through these 21 days. Thank You for every answered prayer, every breakthrough, every moment of growth, and every place of renewal. I trust You to continue the work You have begun in me. Lead me forward with wisdom, faith, and obedience as I walk into the next season You have prepared. I give You all the glory and honor for what You have done and for what is still to come.

In Jesus' name, Amen.

Declaration: God has completed a great work in me—and greater is coming.
