Drunkard's Path: featured block for Red Top retreat 2025 quilt

Demo and planning session AND Sit and Sew meeting
All are welcome
January 14, Robert's school at 10:00

Bring your sewing machine so you can try out this block. It's only a 2-piece block so it goes together quickly! I will have several different templates you can use. This can easily be done with cardboard templates as well, as 2 sides can be straight cut with a rotary cutter.

I will also have fabric available to make test blocks. And remember, you don't have to commit to a large quilt to use this block! Table runners, pillows, placemats and wall hangings are a great way to give it a try!

The 2 quilts in the patterns above were made with 4" finished blocks.

If you haven't done much curved piecing, I would suggest starting with a larger block, which makes the curves easier to sew. Using the same layout as above would result in a larger quilt.

Red Top Retreat (cont.)

The quilts shown at meetings have 6" finished blocks. I made them by making an 8" block and trimming to 6 ½". This makes the quarter circle a larger part of the block. I found that it was easier to do it that way than working with a very skinny background piece.

There are so many variations on arrangements for the Drunkard's Path blocks. I encourage you to look on Pinterest. The arrangement of blocks in the above quilts are lovely, but only the tip of the iceberg of what this versatile block can do!



Recipe Corner



GERMAN CHOCOLATE UPSIDE DOWN CAKE

- 1 box German Chocolate Cake mix
- 1 cup chopped pecans
- 1 cup shredded coconut
- 1 stick of butter
- 1 8oz pkg cream cheese
- 1 box confectioner's sugar

Spray cake pan with Pam. Sprinkle chopped pecans and shredded coconut in bottom of pan. Mix the cake according to package directions-USE ONLY 2 EGGS. Pour cake mix over pecans and coconut. Over low heat melt butter and cream cheese stirring until smooth. Pour over top of cake mix. This mixture should drop into cake during baking.

Bake at 350 degrees for 35-40 minutes. Glass pan takes longer to get done in the middle. TIP- use full fattening cream cheese.



BIG STITCH HAND QUILTING

(Borrowed from Create Whimsy)

What is Big Stitch Quilting

- Big Stitch Quilting is a method of hand quilting that generally uses bigger threads like perle cotton in #8 size, which then becomes a visual design element to the quilt. Sometimes people refer to Big Stitch Quilting as Utility Quilting.
- Typically stitches are 1/4 to 1/2-inch in length and become part of the design element of the quilt. Try different sizes of stitch lengths for the look you want.

Materials

- · Your fabric project, ready for quilting.
- Perle Cotton in the colors you want for your quilting, such as #8 size.

Tools

- Embroidery needles for perle cotton, such as Bohin Crewel needles, or a chenille size needle. You'll want a needle with a larger eye for the heavier thread
- Thimble
- · Embroidery scissors

Instructions

- Prepare your quilt top such as using basting pins to hold the quilt sandwich together.
- Thread your embroidery needle with about 25-30" of thread. If you go longer with your thread, sometimes it frays. A needle threader makes threading needles super easy. Knot your thread with the quilter's knot, with only two loops around the needle.
- If you start in the center of your quilt, you can smooth out both the top and bottom as you go. Bring your needle up from the back to the front. Gently tug the thread so that the knot 'pops' through the fabric back of the quilt. Hold the quilt and just pull the backing fabric gently so they knot 'snaps' through the back and gets layered between the backing and the batting. It might leave a hole where the fibers are separated to allow the knot to pass through. Just rub gently and the fibers go right back in place.
- There are two methods of stitching. Use the one you want for the look you want. For a more precise stitch length, use the stab method. For a more improvisational look, you can use a mix of both the stab method and the running stitch method. Use the stab method when you need to stitch through extra layers in seam allowances, and the running method when the needle is gliding through the fabric and batting.
- For the stabbing method, start by bringing your threaded needle straight up ("stabbing") through all layers from back to front. Next, 'stab' the tip of the needle back down, making the stitch length you'd like. Use the running stitch method on long, straight stretches without bulk that are easy to stitch. Rock your needle to load several stitches and pull your thread through gently. This is not as precise of a method of stitching.
