From the Pastor's Desk

Hello Church,

There are many things that might be said at the beginning of a new year. We often sin in the presumption that we have the fullness of a year ahead to do whatever we may set our heart on. Growing Deeper

As we come to the close of what has been a collectively hard and trying year it seems that the promise of a New Year shines with an even brighter glow than in years past. Aside from the albeit, funny posts about 2021, there does seem to be this sense or maybe more a hope that once the clock hits midnight on December 31st, things will start to get better.

Far be it from me to quash optimism, but what if they don't? What if the virus mutation creates a "second wave" of the pandemic? What if with the incoming administration we see rioting and violence resurge? Now, I'm not trying to fear monger by painting word pictures that portray a dark and dreary future. What I am saying is, how will you respond if those or other bad things do happen?

You see, the problem with hoping in a better tomorrow is that, at best, it can't live up to our hopes and at worst, it will bring calamity. In this sense, placing our hope on 2021 (or any other calendar event) to be better is another form of the prosperity gospel. We are attaching our hope on that which cannot sustain it and which is not promised to us.

First off, we must be reminded that the world we are living in is broken and will continue in it's downward spiral toward deeper and darker depravation. 2 Timothy chapter 3 points to us this truth saying in it's first couple of verses, "But understand this, that in the last days there will come times of difficulty. For people will be lovers of self, lovers of money, proud, arrogant, abusive, disobedient to their parents, ungrateful, unholy..." Further, the book of Revelation makes it clear that things will get a lot worse before they get better.

Secondly, Jesus Himself tells us that if we chose to follow Him we will encounter persecution and trials.

As Bro. Russell mentioned in his recent sermon on Mark 10:35-45. specifically in relation to verse 38 where Jesus says, "You do not know what you are asking. Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, or to be baptized with the baptism with which I am baptized?" The reality is that those who walk closest to our Lord are those who experience the greatest cost for their faithful living. It is foolish thinking that we would expect to be able to live with even moderate boldness for Christ in this world and not face some push back. So if these truths stand before us

from Scripture, are we to become pessimists? Is that the call I am making? No! Not at all! We have greater reason for hope and joy than any other! But the difference is that out hope is not misplaced on this coming year being better than the last. It's not placed on the shaky foundation of the circumstances that await us. Instead our hope is fixed upon the unchanging truth that Jesus Christ is the propitiation for sin and has redeemed us and reconciled us back to God! Because of this truth we can stand firm as God's children and can go through any struggle or trial knowing that none of them can separate us from the love of our God. And further, it is the confidence that we can have as we go through sufferings that it will produce in us, as children of God, endurance to run the race, and this endurance will produce the character of Christ in us and that gives us hope that one day we will be made like Him and we will know Him fully.

So happy New Year and may His purposes in us be fulfilled this year for His glory!

- ♦ Erected 1904
- Addition added 1922
- Mena High School destroyed by fire in 1940—Central School and Mena High School shared the Central School campus with MHS attending 7 a.m. until Noon and Central students from Noon until 5 p.m.
- Miss Louise Durham, principal, taught for 42 years

- In 1955 the school board voted to name the new elementary school for Miss Louise Durham who retired in 1949
- Ruth (Sanders) Wimberly, a Central student, played a processional for the students as they marched in to during the 1920's. Later, Ms. Wimberly served as an organist for the First Christian Church for over 40 years.
- Linda (Borders) Gandy and both of her parents, Charles and Opal (Williams) Borders were students at Central for their entire elementary years.
- Richard Martin is among others in our congregation who attended Central school.
- Miss Agnes Gilbert married Murray Johnson and they were members at FBC for many years. Agnes served as President of Women's Missionary Union & Choir Director. Continued on page 4
