From the Pastor's Desk

Church Family, There has been plenty of things in so called "Baptist life" to lament recently. However, I want to use my column this month to let you know about something that is very positive concerning some cooperation with like minded churches. In recent years Baptist associational ministry has been anemic. There are exceptions to that statement, but not many. Even our own beloved Ouachita Baptist Association has struggled to motivate churches and people to engage in cooperative activity. Knowing this, in recent months, leaders from three associations began to meet to discuss growing concerns that the association ministry may have outlived its usefulness. These three associations (Buckner, Caddo, Ouachita) are all very similar.

They are composed of smaller membership churches, their churches are led predominately by bivocational pastors, and they have experienced a decline in church involvement in association life. Also, many of these churches have great concerns about the direction of our national and even some of our state agencies and institutions. We share a conviction that we need to be able to better resource our churches because there may be a time approaching when we will not be willing to engage with some of the bigger conventions or associations because they have drifted to far from biblical truth. We also know that there are just not many large Baptist organizations that are focused on rural and small town churches like ours.

With those things in mind we have come together to form the Western Arkansas Baptist Network. This collaboration is focused on two things. First, we want to gather together for some major ministry events that no single association could do on their own. The first of these events will be in August. This event will be focused on equipping small churches and bivocational pastors. We believe that bivocational pastors are the unsung heroes of our denomination and we want to resource them so that they can better minister to their churches and communities as they carry multiple responsibilities. We are also going to focus on bringing our associations together for the youth conference that Bro. Kevin has been planning over the last year. Finally, we hope to bring together senior adults from these associations for some sort of event in 2022.

The second area of focus is really based on information sharing, particularly related to missions. We know that different churches and associations have different missions focuses. What we want to do is to communicate really well about missions opportunities

Growing Deeper

Discipleship is pivotal to the Christian life. It is the training grounds for maturing our faith as we follow the steps of brothers and sisters who have gone before us. Though not stated by name, discipleship is also clearly commanded to the church in Scripture (Matt. 28:20, Titus 2:1-10, 2 Timothy 2:2). And yet, it is neglected all too often.

In our ever growing individualistic culture, discipleship can feel uncomfortable and invasive. If we're honest about it, discipleship is inconvenient to our already packed schedules. Who has one to two hours a week to just lay around?! Reasons abound for why not to do discipleship. But they aren't good enough. We are called and commanded to do this so we must.

If you're like many (most, I'm afraid) Christians, you're response is, "I don't even know where to start! I've never been discipled so how am I supposed to do it?" So let me take the rest of this article to answer that question.

The first thing I would encourage you to do is to pray. As with anything we do as believers, discipleship is a work of grace that is both born and empowered by the Holy Spirit. As we are convicted about our need to be obedient in discipleship, we need to call out to God to give us the desire to obey and the ability to do so. As you pray, ask the Lord to give you a burden for the person that He would have you disciple and that He would

begin to work in them to desire discipleship.

The next thing I would point you to is to read. Look deep at how Jesus discipled those around Him. Look at passages that teach us about what discipleship should look like (a good place to start is the passages referenced above). There are also good books that can help you to grow a biblical understanding of discipleship. Rediscovering Discipleship and Bearing Fruit by Robby Gallaty, Spiritual Mothering by Susan Hunt, Disciple Her by Kandi Gallaty and Discipling by Mark Dever are resources that can help prepare you for the task.

Lastly, I would encourage you by letting you know that you'll never feel ready so don't wait until you do to start. I am not confident in my discipleship. I have no set pattern that I use and still struggle to meet regularly with those I am discipling. But praise God it doesn't depend on my confidence or ability! So just remember to keep the essentials of Bible study, relationship and accountability and jump in! It's ok to figure some of the other things out as you go. Do the best you know how to and be humble enough to learn as you walk in obedience.

May God awaken a desire in His people to disciple those around us so that we may become mature believers for the glory of God!
